Grand Jury Returns 47 Indictments Pageant Time for West Virginia Cupcake Festival

Putnam County Prosecuting Attorney, Kristina D. Raynes, reports that forty-seven indictments were returned by the March 2026 Term Putnam County Grand Jury alleging fifty-five persons committed one hundred forty-four (144) felonies and thirty-five (35) misdemeanors. The following is the last known address, and offenses for which they were indicted.

Stolen Vehicle Pursuit Ends in Fatality

A 20-mile stolen vehicle chase which began on Trace Creek (north of Hurricane), proceeded to Johns Creek, then to Milton and onto I-64, ended just east of the Hurricane interchange in a fiery crash which took the life of Kanawha County resident Angela Born.

At 2:37 p.m. on Thursday, March 5, Hurricane Creek resident Linda Fitzwater reported to Putnam County law enforcement that her grandson Joseph Elswick had stolen her red 2025 Jeep Cherokee Sport and her purse and was possibly headed to Poindexter Creek. Putnam County Deputy Sheriff C. Ford responded to the call and

located Elswick and the stolen vehicle on Trace Creek at 2:48 p.m. Elswick chose to flee. Ford followed and advised the Hurricane Police Department when Elswick headed toward Hurricane on I-64.

The Hurricane PD attempted to end the flight which reached speeds of close to 120 MPH at one point by initiating spike strips in Elswick's path at the interchange. Elswick continued to flee with flattened tires and rear-ended Born's vehicle resulting in fatal injuries. Officers managed to remove the victim from her vehicle as it burst into flames.

Elswick, 22, of Hurricane, was known to law enforcement for

drug charges and DUI arrests. Elswick was taken to CAMC Teays Valley for treatment. He faces numerous charges, including vehicular homicide.

The crash caused the eastbound lanes of I-64 to be completely shutdown for six hours. Detour traffic on Teays Valley Road between the Teays Valley and Hurricane I-64 exits was at a standstill for hours.

Beginning of the End for Redskin Stadium Press Box

March 3, 2026, was the beginning of the end for the press box at Redskin Stadium. Demolition of the press box and concession stand at Hurricane High School is the first visible

expenditure of the \$50 million School Bond funds that voters approved in the 2024 November election.

The bond authorized \$40 million in county funds for a new \$65 million

Hurricane Middle School and \$10 million in county funding for athletic field upgrades throughout the county. \$3.25 million was allotted for a new press box, new bleachers and lighting for Redskin Stadium.

Athletic upgrades include new press boxes, bleachers and lighting at Poca and Winfield High

Schools; new lighting for baseball and softball fields at Buffalo High School; and new lighting for football fields at George Washington Middle, Winfield Middle and Poca Middle.

The upgrades are slated to be complete in time for high school football kick off in August.

The Capon Bridge, Hampshire County

An iconic green bridge stretching over the Cacapon River, the Capon Bridge was originally built in 1933 and underwent significant rehabilitation in 2021—2022 to preserve its historic integrity.

Hutchinson-Parsons-Fulk Mail Pouch Barn, Jackson County

The Hutchinson-Parsons-Fulk Mail Pouch Barn, located on Route 21 in Sandyville, is a well-preserved example of the iconic Mail Pouch tobacco advertisements painted on barns by the Bloch Brothers Tobacco Company, a tradition that ran from the late 1800s to 1993.

Old Hill Cemetery, Lewis County

Also known as the historic Arnold Cemetery, this spot was established in 1820 as the town's first burial ground, holding notable early settlers and Civil War veterans and is home to a massive historic Yellow Poplar Tree estimated to be over 200 years old.

Wilson Mail Pouch Barn, Mason County

This historic Mail Pouch Barn lies near the town of Leon, between Charleston and Point Pleasant.

Henrietta Dismukes Hospital Nurses' Home, McDowell County

The Henrietta Dismukes Hospital served African American coal miners and their families from 1929 to 1932 and was the largest privately owned African American hospital in the country at the time. The hospital burned in 2013, and all that remains is the nurses' home.

Spring is upon us, and that means prom night. The other day a friend told me the cost of her grand's dress... more than my wedding cost in 1968... the whole wedding...

I remember... Prom 1964... our class of juniors was in charge. Mrs. Boggess, our sweet home room teacher, reminded us in a letter, she later wrote, that I and other classmates made sure everyone showed up to decorate. Yes. We decorated for a week. That ugly yucky old gym was the place we transformed into a night of magic. "Tender is the night" was the theme... we used pastel colors of crepe paper to change that place into a night of teenage love and romance and fantasy. Beautiful...

I am sure my lovely white chiffon gown was not expensive. The gold shoes were inexpensive also... Mother budgeted to purchase my outfit, but it was not that much. Mike wore a white sports coat, and was handsome.

Before the dance, some of us ate at Shoney's... not expensive... Mike and I got each other flowers... the bank was not broke that night, and the night was memorable.

When I was teaching in South Carolina, Kanawha County and Putnam County in WV, I attended prom as a chaperone. Beautiful and fun... that being said, I was shocked at the expense.

In South Carolina, the proms were usually at the schools, but in WV, they were at the Civic Center. There was a huge difference in expense at each of the schools where I taught.

The girls told me what their parents spent for their dresses, shoes, jewelry, manicures, pedicures, hairdos... flowers, tuxedos for the guys... rented limos... meals out... after

parties... weddings would be cheaper...

The students planned and shopped for weeks. They talked about it for days. They were so excited. They could not wait for the big night.

Often, on Monday morning, my students would share their disappointed of the big night. Oh, some enjoyed it, but some not.

I wondered what would happen if the simple days returned. I could not imagine the price of the dresses... seems to be the norm now... mercy...

What would happen if students decorated the gym the way we did? A week of fun before the big night... nothing cost too much. Parents did not have to be concerned that they would be paying a fortune for one night of prom.

My two children attended their proms, Junior and Senior Year. Both were careful about the cost. My daughter told me that she did not want a dress to be too expensive. She was beautiful both years, and my son was handsome. There were no limos...

Simple times... fun times... it would be interesting to hear the comments of the students this spring when proms are over. There will be students who will never forget their big night... others maybe not. My question is where are those dresses?

Tender is the night... what a night... memories made... times remembered... always...

Prom is fun... because the way we were is the way we are... dancing and romance... awww... those were the days my friends. I will chuckle when friends are sharing how they help pay for dresses for their grands... after all, we are grandparents who love our grandkids... I must insert here that although my Granddaughters were home schooled, two of them attended proms with friends and were quite frugal when purchasing their dresses. They had fun...

THIS WEEK IN THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES

For the week ending March 6, 2026

Members of the House of Delegates voted just after 6 p.m. on Day 51 of the 60-day session to concur with the Senate and complete a budget bill presented by House Finance Committee Chairman Vernon Criss, R-Wood, as the compromise and described as "responsible."

Senate Bill 250, the budget bill, sets the \$5.5 billion General Revenue budget for Fiscal Year 2027, which begins July 1, 2026. It includes a 5% reduction in personal income tax rates, and a 3% average pay increase for all state employees as well as public school teachers, school service personnel and the West Virginia State Police. An increase of nearly \$40 million above the current year's funding levels was allocated to adoption and foster care. Medicaid within the Policy and Programming Budget is funded roughly \$28 million more than current levels, and the directives were moved from the surplus section of the budget to ensure it is covered. The waiver programs were funded a little more than \$5 million greater than the current-year funding levels as well.

The higher education funding formula is funded in full for the first time with this budget, and an overall increase in funding is allocated for the dual enrollment program through the Higher Education Policy Commission. About

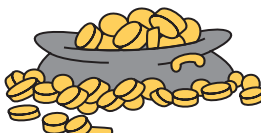

- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 3/4 cup (1 1/2 sticks) unsalted butter, softened
- 3 large egg whites, at room temperature
- 1 tablespoon pure vanilla extract
- 1/2 cup full-fat sour cream, at room temperature
- 1/2 cup whole milk, at room temperature

Frosting:

- 1 cup (2 sticks) unsalted butter, softened
- 4 cups powdered sugar
- 3 tablespoons heavy cream
- 2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract
- 1/8 teaspoon kosher salt
- green food coloring

To make cupcakes: Preheat oven to 350 F and arrange rack in center of oven. Line 12-cup muffin tin with paper liners. In medium bowl, whisk flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt.

In large bowl, using handheld mixer on medium-high speed, beat granulated sugar and butter until light and fluffy, 3-4 minutes. Add egg whites and vanilla; beat until smooth, about 2 minutes. Add sour cream and beat until combined.

Add half of dry ingredients to wet ingredients. Beat on low until incorporated. Add milk and beat to combine. Add remaining dry ingredients and beat until combined.

Add batter to liners until three-quarters full. Bake 19-22 minutes, until slightly golden on top.

Remove cupcakes from pan and cool completely.

To make frosting: In large bowl, using handheld mixer on medium-high speed, beat butter until fluffy. Add powdered sugar and beat until combined. Add heavy cream, vanilla and salt; beat until combined. Mix in green food coloring.

Transfer frosting to piping bag and pipe frosting onto cupcakes.

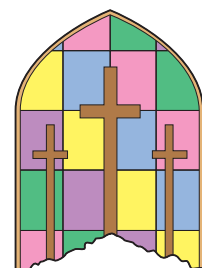

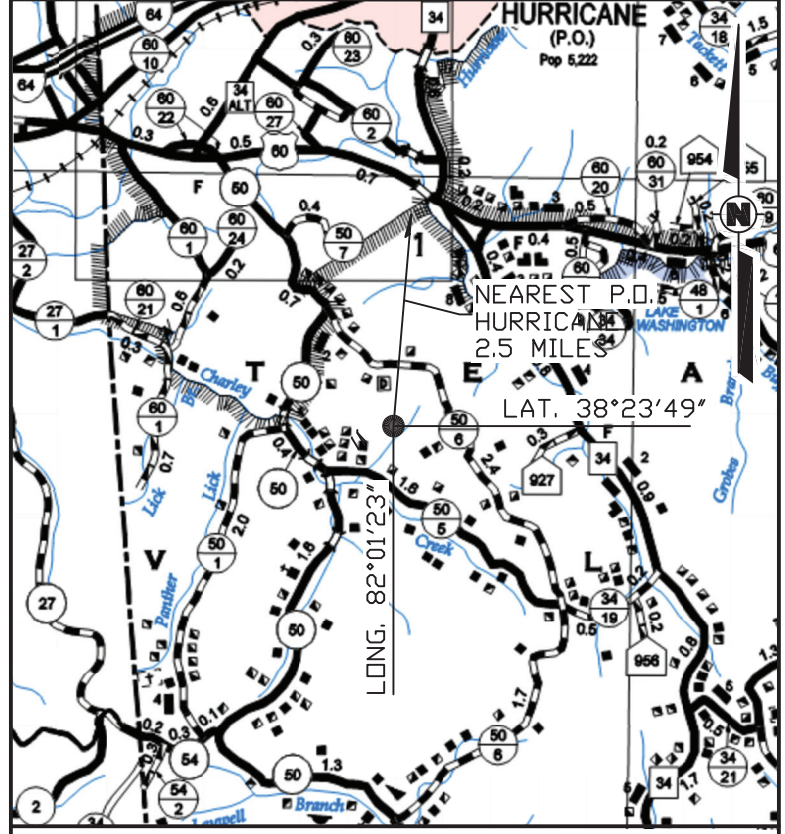

God's Wrath Revealed

Romans 1:18-23

In writing to the church at Rome, the Apostle Paul addressed believers who were surrounded by individuals who practiced ungodly and unrighteous lifestyles. In verse 18, Paul states that the wrath of God is revealed from heaven against all ungodliness and unrighteousness of men who hold the truth in unrighteousness. Paul's message gives us (believers) understanding of God's dealings with the ungodly and the unrighteous whom we dwell among.

What does it mean to hold the truth in unrighteousness? To hold the truth in righteousness is to believe God as Abraham believed God. God counts belief for righteousness. God is a God of truth (Deut. 32:4).

Paul makes it known that the truth is that which may be known of God (v. 19). Believers know God through the Son. The Son has said, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life" (John 14:6). We know the Son to be the promised seed of woman who should bruise the serpent's head (Gen. 3:15). While God reveals Himself to believers through His scriptures, He reveals Himself to all men through His work of creation.

In verse 20, the Apostle states that God's eternal power is evident in all of God's creation. The physical universe is governed by cause and effect. The world about us did not come to be without a cause. Cosmology is the science of the origin and development of the universe. Men gain understanding of a cause by observing its effects. Scientists attribute an effect to a cause. Natural laws, while cited by scientists as causes, are effects of God, the ultimate cause of all things. To declare that creation is without a creator is willful denial of that which God has shown all men — that He is the cause of all things. There are consequences that result from this denial of God.

In verse 21, the Holy Spirit through Paul makes it known that man's denial of God causes the imaginations of men to become vain and their hearts to be darkened. Again, the effect (vain imaginations and darkened hearts) is produced by a cause. Cause and effect apply in both the spiritual and the physical realms. Refusal to believe that the physical realm in which we exist is the work of the Creator is a cause which produces vain imaginations. "Vain" means empty, worthless, or lacking substance, while "imaginations" are thoughts or images which are contrary to reality. Denial of God is cause for men to imagine a reality which is not governed by God — a creation without a creator. "The fool hath said in his heart, There is no God" (Ps. 14:1).

"Professing themselves to be wise . . ." (v. 22). The wild imaginations of men result in declarations of wisdom, declarations which are contrary to reality. Wisdom and God are not separate. "For the Lord giveth wisdom: out of his mouth cometh knowledge and understanding" (Prov. 2:6). In professing themselves to be wise, men reveal that their wisdom is not of God. Again, a man's declaration of wisdom is the fruit of a vain imagination. In reality, it is an unwitting confession of foolishness.

The heart of a fool is darkened by his imagination (thoughts contrary to reality). Some fools imagine that there is no spiritual reality. They imagine a meaningless physical reality. God is a Spirit (Jn. 4:24) and He speaks to men through and by His physical creation. Fools fail to hear God speak and bring condemnation upon themselves.

In verse 23, Paul speaks of fools who imagine spiritual realms governed by images of corruptible man and/or images of birds, four-footed beasts, and creeping things. Fools imagine a spiritual reality which is governed by creatures made by a source they believe to be non-existent. Only a fool can imagine scenarios where non-existence produces existence.

Return to verse 18. The cause of God's wrath is the ungodliness and unrighteousness of them who hold the truth in unrighteousness. Believers do not hold the truth in unrighteousness. God does not see the ungodliness and unrighteousness of believers because the blood of the Lamb cleanses us from all sin (I Jn. 1:7). God sees only the ungodliness and unrighteousness of those who lack the Lamb's covering blood.

Verse 18 does not state that God's wrath will be revealed (future tense); it states His wrath is revealed (present tense) from heaven. The manner in which it is revealed is stated in verse 24. God allows men to follow the depraved lusts of their darkened hearts. God allows fools to dishonor themselves. God allows men to suffer the consequences of their actions. God allows fools to remain fools. How different it is for them whom God loves. "For whom the Lord loveth he chasteneth, And scourgeth every son whom he receiveth" (Heb. 12:6).

God reveals His righteousness in a manner differently from His wrath. God's righteousness is revealed from faith to faith (v. 17). The just shall live by faith. The righteousness of God is made known to men through the gospel of Jesus Christ. God gives His righteousness to all who believe. God gave His Son for whosoever should believe in Him. God reveals His righteousness by grace through faith (Eph. 2:8). His righteousness is seen in all who abide in Him. When we abide in Him, we bring forth much fruit (Jn. 15:5).

God sent His Son, not to condemn, but, to seek and to save the lost (Lk. 19:10). Believers are called to mirror the Son. Let us love one another and tell all men in all places of His love. God is not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance (II Pet. 3:9).

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KIDS TALK ABOUT GOD

What Does It Mean to Pray in the Name of Jesus?

"Praying in Jesus' name is like having a VIP pass to talk to God," says Mia, 10. "Because of Jesus, we can go straight to God and He listens!"

Before we dive in, let's be clear: saying "in Jesus' name" at the end of a prayer isn't magic. You probably won't see candy fall from the sky or teleport your homework from another galaxy. There's a reason praying in Jesus' name is far more powerful and real.

In John 16:23, Jesus said: "And in that day you will ask Me nothing. Most assuredly, I say to you, whatever you ask the Father in My name He will give you" (John 16:23).

Jesus was pointing to a big change that was about to happen, the transition from the Old Covenant to the New Covenant. Under the Old Covenant, people couldn't come directly to God. They needed priests, animal sacrifices and religious rituals to get near Him. But Jesus was about to change everything.

When Jesus died on the cross and rose again, He became the final sacrifice for our sin. The temple veil that separated people from God's presence was torn in two. Why? Because through Jesus, we now have direct access to the Father. That's the heart of the New Covenant.

In John 16:26-27, Jesus explained more: "In that day you will ask in my name, and I do not say to you that I shall pray the Father for you; for the Father Himself loves you, because you have loved me, and have believed that I came forth from God."

Because of Jesus, we no longer need a human priest to approach God for us. Jesus made all believers part of God's family. Now, under the New Covenant, every believer can talk to God personally, anytime, anywhere.

"When I pray in Jesus' name, I think about what He would do," says Olivia, 11. "It helps me pray better."

"When I pray, I imagine Jesus standing next to me, helping me find the right words," says Ethan, 9. "It makes me feel like He's really listening."

Praying in Jesus' name means praying in line with His heart and mission. It's not about asking for a mansion with a waterslide and a candy machine. It's about praying for what Jesus values, which are fruits of his indwelling Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience and more (Galatians 5:22-23).

Jesus finished His teaching in John 16 with a promise of peace and victory: "These things I have spoken to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation; but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world" (John 16:33).

When we pray in Jesus' name under the New Covenant, we're not begging. We're believing. We're standing on the victory Jesus already won.

Under the Old Covenant, God visited his people through prophets and a physical temple in Jerusalem. In the New Covenant, God inhabits his people. All Christians are living temples of the Holy Spirit (I Corinthians 6:19). Under the Old Covenant, God visited his people. In the New Covenant, God inhabits his people. The Old Covenant was a mere shadow of a greater reality.

Think About This: Under the New Covenant, praying in Jesus' name means we come boldly to the Father, trusting in Jesus' finished work, not our own.

Memorize This Truth: John 16:23 previously quoted.

Ask This Question: When I pray, am I trusting in what Jesus has done or what I have done?
