

Kathie Hess Crouse to Represent 13th Delegate District

Kathie Hess Crouse of Buffalo will represent the 13th Delegate District when the State Legislature convenes in January 2022.

On Wednesday, November 24, Gov. Justice appointed Crouse to the House of Delegate seat left vacant by the resignation of Joshua Higginbotham (R-Putnam).

Higginbotham announced in September that he intended to run for the State Senate. He recently moved to Kanawha County from where he could be elected in 2022 to represent the new 8th Senatorial District. The new 8th District consists of a small section of Kanawha, the northern portion of Putnam, eastern portion of Jackson, and all of Roane and Clay counties.

Higginbotham submitted his letter of resignation to House Speaker Roger Hanshaw on Friday, November 5. He wrote, "It has been my honor, since my election in 2016, to serve as delegate to the 13th district. From day one my goal has been to make West Virginia a place where young adults can find jobs that affords them a chance to stay in West Virginia and raise their families."

During his tenure as

delegate, Higginbotham served as vice chairman of the House Education Committee and served on committees for Energy and Manufacturing; Small Business and Economic Development; and Veterans Affairs and Homeland Security.

Gov. Justice selected Crouse from a list of three candidates nominated by the Republican 13th Delegate Executive Committee. In addition to Crouse, the executive committee nominated Putnam resident Tony Lester and former delegate Scott Cadle of Mason County.

The delegate nominating committee consists of one female and one male member from each of the 13th Delegate District portions of Putnam, Mason and Jackson. Executive committee members representing Putnam are Kris Raynes of Eleanor and Tim Gibson of Poca. Other members are Michael Ihle and Cindy Morrison (Jackson) and Jared Nutter and Sarah Stover (Mason).

In a statement issued on the day before Thanksgiving, Gov. Justice said, "I'm incredibly honored to appoint Kathie today and I know she is going to do a great job representing the people of the 13th District."

NORAD is Ready to Track Santa's Flight for the 66th Year

The North American Aerospace Defense Command is celebrating the 66th Anniversary of tracking Santa's yuletide journey around the globe! The NORAD Tracks Santa website, www.noradsanta.org, launching Decemeber 1, features Santa's North Pole Village, which includes a holiday countdown, games, movie theater, holiday music, webstore, and more. The website is available in eight languages: English, French, Spanish, German, Italian, Japanese, Portuguese, and Chinese.

The official NORAD Tracks Santa app is also in the Apple App and Google Play stores, so parents and children can count down the days until Santa's launch on their smart phones and tablets. Tracking opportunities are also offered through social media on Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, and Instagram, as well as on partner platforms Bing, Amazon Alexa and OnStar.

Starting at 4 a.m. EST on December 24, website visitors can see updates as Santa makes preparations for his flight. Then, at 6 a.m. EST, trackers worldwide can call to inquire as to Santa's whereabouts by dialing the toll-free number 1-877-Hi-NORAD (1-877-446-6723) where they will either speak with a live phone operator or hear a recorded update. Due to COVID concerns, the NORAD Tracks Santa Operations Center will have fewer phone operators, so callers who do

not reach a volunteer will hear a regularly updated recording as to Santa's current location. Anytime on December 24, Amazon Alexa users can ask for Santa's location through the NORAD Tracks Santa skill for Amazon Alexa, and OnStar subscribers can press the OnStar button in their vehicles to locate Santa. Santa Trackers can also use the Bing search engine to learn of Santa's location.

Tracking Santa has been a tradition since 1955 when a local newspaper advertisement informed children they could call Santa directly – only the contact number was misprinted. Instead of reaching Santa, the phone rang through to the crew commander on duty, U.S. Air Force Colonel Harry Shoup, at the Continental Air Defense Command Operations Center, the predecessor to NORAD. Col. Shoup was quick to realize a mistake had been made, and assured the child he was Santa. Shoup then assigned a duty officer to continue answering calls. Thus, a holiday tradition was born, which NORAD has carried on since it was created in 1958. Each year since, NORAD has reported Santa's location on December 24 to millions of children and families around the world.

NORAD Tracks Santa is truly a global experience, delighting generations of families everywhere. This is due, in large part, to the efforts and services of numerous program contributors.



2 tablespoons butter

2 cups diced Envy Apples

1/2 onion, diced small
- Gravy:

3 tablespoons butter

3 tablespoons flour

2 cups beef broth

2 teaspoons kosher salt


20 turns fresh cracked pepper

1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

1 tablespoon finely chopped rosemary
- Preheat broiler.
- Cook stuffing according to package directions; set aside and allow to cool slightly.
- In large saute pan, melt butter saute apples and onion until tender. Set aside to cool slightly.
- Stir together stuffing and apple mixture. Spread stuffing on sheet tray and allow to cool in refrigerator.
- After cooling, form stuffing into medium bites and place on sheet tray lined with parchment paper.
- Broil bites until golden brown and slightly crispy.
- To make gravy: In small pot, melt butter and whisk in flour. Cook flour 1 minute, whisking frequently.
- Whisk in beef broth, salt, pepper and Worcestershire sauce; bring to boil, whisking frequently. Remove from heat and stir in rosemary. If desired, continue gently simmering gravy to thicken.
- Arrange stuffing bites in serving dish and drizzle with gravy. Serve hot.

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

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Sorrow Before Triumph

Matthew 1:18-21; John 12:1-8

The two passages before us would seem unrelated. Time wise, they are separated by more than thirty years. The first was penned by Matthew and records a happening that preceded the birth of our Lord and Savior. The second by John, describes an incident that transpired less than a week before Jesus would die upon the cross and then to rise victorious over the grave.

Both passages are similar in that both record the actions of individuals which actions testify of their faith. In Matthew 1:18-21, we see the faith of Joseph, husband of Mary, and in John 12:1-8, we see the faith of Mary, the sister of Lazarus. Both believed the word of God as delivered to the prophets and both acted upon that belief.

Verse 19 states that Joseph “was minded to put her away privily.” Through an arranged marriage, Mary was to wed Joseph. Mary was his espoused wife — the two were legally engaged. Joseph was minded to put Mary away because she was with child and the child was not his. Joseph was considering options by which the legal arrangement could be terminated without bringing public scrutiny upon Mary’s apparent infidelity.

All thought of putting Mary away ended when the angel of the Lord spoke to Joseph in a dream and said, “Joseph, thou son of David, fear not to take unto thee Mary thy wife: for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Ghost.” Prior to the dream, Joseph believed that Mary had broken the marriage vow. Before the angel spoke to him, the fulfillment of the virgin birth prophesied by Isaiah (Isa. 7:14) was far from his mind. Joseph believed that Mary was the virgin of whom Isaiah had spoken seven hundred years earlier because he believed the scriptures to be the word of God. He believed the words of the angel to be from God because God, through the lips of Isaiah, had declared the virgin birth to come. Joseph took Mary to be his wife because he believed that God keeps His every promise.

Let us look upon John 12:1-8. “Then Jesus six days before the passover came to Bethany . . .” (v. 1). That which is recorded in the text before us took place five days before Jesus would die upon the cross at Calvary. Jesus came to the home of Lazarus, Martha and Mary where Mary anointed Him with spikenard, a very costly ointment. The house was filled with its fragrance. Mary’s action was triggered by faith.

Mary’s faith was the same as that of Joseph, husband of the mother of Jesus. New Testament believers know Mary, the sister of Lazarus, through the gospels of Luke and John. Luke 10:39 states that Mary sat at Jesus’ feet and heard His word. New Testament scripture does not reveal the words which Jesus spoke in her presence. Mary’s action, however, (pouring ointment upon Jesus and wiping His feet with her hair) testified of that which she believed. She believed that His death to come was that which was prophesied by Isaiah (Isa. 53) and that His death would be soon.


When Judas Iscariot questioned Mary’s action, Jesus responded, “Let her alone: against the day of my burying hath she kept this.” Jesus knew and fully understood the reason Mary had poured the costly ointment upon Him. The meaning of Mary’s action was hidden from those present. Only Jesus understood. Jesus knew her thoughts and that which was in her heart.

Mary knew that Jesus had an appointment with death because she believed Him to be the One of whom the scriptures speak. She believed that Jesus was the Messiah who would die for the sin of men. She reserved a pound of spikenard for the day of His death. That appointment was six days to the future. She did not wait for that day to anoint His lifeless body.

She believed in her heart that He was the Promised One of God. She believed Jesus to be the one of whom Isaiah prophesied saying: “Therefore will I divide him a portion with the great, and he shall divide the spoil with the strong; because he hath poured out his soul unto death: and he was numbered with the transgressors; and he bare the sin of many, and made intercession for the transgressors” (Isa. 53:12). She did not wait to act upon faith.

She acted, believing the scriptures to be the very word of God. She believed that Jesus, through His death, would make intercession for her. Her act was an expression of thanks for that which the scriptures declared that Jesus would do. She gave thanks to Jesus for that He would do before He did it.

New Testament believers know that we are saved by grace through faith. That grace has been revealed to us in that God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son that we might be in His presence forever. Let us act upon that which we have been given, knowing that the Lord would have all come to Him in repentance (II Peter 3:9).

DHHR Announces Application Period for Low Income Energy Assistance Program

The West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources (DHHR) announced applications for the Low-Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP) will be accepted beginning Wednesday, December 1, 2021, and ending at the close of business on Monday, January 31, 2022, or until funds are exhausted. The federally funded program assists eligible state residents in paying home heating bills.

Eligibility for LIEAP benefits is based on income, household size and whether the household is responsible for paying its heating bill. To qualify, households must meet all program guidelines, which includes an applicant's annual income being at or below 60 percent of the state median income. In situations where a heating emergency exists, applicants must contact a DHHR worker for case evaluation.

The maximum allowable gross income levels for LIEAP Fiscal Year 2022 are listed

below:

*Social Security and Veterans income will be excluded for the current LIEAP application period.

Applications are available online at www.wvpath.org and may also be obtained at local DHHR offices, Community Action Agencies, or senior centers operated by an Area Agency on Aging.

Completed applications should be delivered or mailed to the DHHR office located in the applicant's county of residence. A list of local offices may be found at <https://dhhr.wv.gov/bcf/Pages/MapList.aspx> or by calling 304-352-4431. Mailing the application to any other office or to a utility company may delay the receipt by DHHR and prohibit processing the application.

The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

Dec. 2, 1859: John Brown was hanged at Charles Town in Jefferson County. Maj. Thomas J. Jackson, later nicknamed “Stonewall,” was among those commanding the Virginia forces standing guard at the execution of the abolitionist who led the raid at Harpers Ferry.

Dec. 2, 1933: The Charles Town Race Track opened shortly after West Virginia legalized racing and parimutuel betting. The Jefferson County complex contained 22 buildings and included 12 stables.

Dec. 3, 1787: James Rumsey demonstrated the steam engine he invented on the Potomac River near Shepherdstown. This was 20 years before Robert Fulton's boat, though the Fulton design was more practical, and it is Fulton who is honored today as the inventor of the steamboat.

Dec. 3, 1949: WSAZ-TV provided the first telecast of a Marshall College (now University) basketball game. The television station, the 72nd in the nation and the first in West Virginia, was an affiliate of WSAZ radio station.
