The Jelly Generation Meets its God

Note from Ron:
On Monday (November 22), while experiencing an acute case of writer's block, I wanted to compose an article in which I compared the fears of today to the fears which my generation experienced in the 1950's. Children of the 1950's lived in fear of instantaneous nuclear incineration while children of today harbor fears of future global warming and a planet unable to feed future populations. I planned to express thanksgiving that the fear of the 50's has almost disappeared. I told my daughter Betsy that I was struggling with words to capture the fears of seventy years ago. She reminded me that I did not need to because "Reb" (her nickname for her mom/my late wife, Cookie) had written an article following the terrorist destruction of the World Trade Center that captured the common fear of that era. I will let Cookie describe the 1950's for me. I will comment upon the fears of today in a future article. Cookie's article of October 11, 2001, follows:

Once again, the picture of the family of mannequins appeared on the black and white TV set as the narrator dramatically informed the watchers that "These mannequins are about to be tested during a nuclear explosion." As I watched, the family disintegrated before my eyes. Then

the picture broke suddenly and another picture appeared on the screen of the familiar mushroom shaped cloud rising far away in the distance. Once again, I was getting educated on what can happen to a family of dummies who are blown to pieces by a government nuclear testing experiment.

All during the 1950's, the American public was "educated" to the fact that any day, we might be turned into nuclear waste by the big Russian/Chinese terror duet.

There wasn't much we could do about it because if those two ever got really upset, they might just push that button.

The government sponsored education programs told us that we possibly might survive if we stockpiled a 14-day food supply in a safe, underground fallout shelter. Lists of foods were available at any government agency office.

I remember that besides water and specially prepared food, the government people said that eggs were probably safe because they were covered in shells. Since I never liked eggs, I decided I would just skip them if I ever had to go to a fallout shelter.

I got a lot of "educating" back in the 50's because there was only one local TV channel, and when a kid comes home from school, he or she generally wants to watch something. I always seemed to get the government education

Gov. Jim Justice and his pet English Bulldog, Babydog visited Hurricane High School on Wednesday, November 17, with a \$50,000 check in hand.

The Governor told the students and staff assembled in the

bleachers at Redskin Stadium that Hurricane High was the \$50,000 prize winner because the school recorded the highest Covid vaccination rate among the 77 high schools that registered to participate in the West Virginia Department of

Education's I Got Vaxxed Competition.

The Governor and Babydog visited Hurricane High School twice previously this school year to present full-ride college scholarships to Livvi Miller and Connor Reece, winners of

the "Do it for Babydog" vaccination sweepstakes.

Justice said that the school plans to use its \$50,000 winnings to make its 2022 Prom the best prom ever and to hold an event at the school for HHS families to enjoy.

Chloe Bailey to Serve as Legislative Intern

Chloe Bailey of Buffalo, a political science major at Shepherd University, will intern at the State Capitol during spring semester.

She is one of ten students selected to receive the Judith A. Herndon Fellowship who will participate in the upcoming 60-day legislative session. A Herndon Fellow must be a full-time undergraduate of any major or discipline from a public or private institution of higher learning in West Virginia. Fellows must have completed 60 undergraduate hours, have a 3.0 GPA or better, and have completed courses in political science or have extensive public affairs experience.

During the session, Bailey will be assigned to perform various staff duties for a legislator from either the State Senate or House of Delegates.

"I will be doing everything from helping draft legislation, to research, to communicating with constituents," Bailey said.

Bailey's fellowship starts January 8. The legislative session is scheduled to run from January 12-March 12. After the session ends, she will be assigned to work in an executive agency. Bailey said she doesn't have a strong preference for what legislator or agency she's assigned to.

Without the vaccines, Putnam's numbers would be far worse. We have cause to give thanks.

"I'm going in pretty open minded," she said. "I'm excited to see what they're going to do to help with the K-12 education system because it hasn't been that long since I was in there. Other than that, I'm just excited to see what they're going to do and to get an inside scoop on how things work there."

"We are very excited that Chloe has won a spot in this program, our first Herndon Fellow in my nearly 20 years at Shepherd," said Dr. Stephanie Slocum-Schaffer, political science professor. "I believe that this will be an amazing experience. She will be fully immersed in the state legislative process for the entire semester."

Slocum-Schaffer said the goals of the program are to expose students to both the theoretical background of the American legislative process and the practical application as exemplified by the West Virginia

Covid Numbers for which to Be Thankful

During the last twelve months, Covid has changed and, consequently, Covid numbers recorded this year do not represent true changes from the Covid numbers of 2020.

In 2020, the Delta variant did not exist. The Delta variant is everywhere today. It is more transmittable than the Covid strains that caused Putnam County's active case numbers to climb from 30 in August 2020 to more than 1,000 in December 2020. The Delta variant is more deadly than the Covid strains of 2020.

No one is thankful for the Delta strain. But everyone should be thankful for the Covid numbers which the Delta variant is producing.

Last year's weaker strain of Covid saw a dramatic increase of active cases during the weeks leading up to and following Thanksgiving. There were 778 active cases in Putnam County

on the Tuesday before last Thanksgiving. This year, the Tuesday before Thanksgiving active case number was 229 and dropping.

The weaker Covid strains of 2020 produced an infection rate of 69 per 100,000 population during the week leading up to Thanksgiving. The stronger, much more infectious, Delta variant produced an infection rate of 43 per 100,000.

Last year's weaker strains produced 279 new cases during the 7-days prior to Thanksgiving week. The Delta strain produced 100 fewer new cases in the equivalent 7-day period.

Delta is worse than the strains of 2020 in every way — more contagious, more severe, more deadly. Delta numbers, however, are dropping during a period which case numbers rose in 2020.

Delta's wings have been clipped by Moderna, Fizer, and J&J vaccines. Delta is decreasing during a period in which it was expected to increase.

of legislating, legislative research, bill drafting, the role of committees, constituent service, the budget process, and legislative/executive relations," Slocum-Schaffer said.

Interning at the West Virginia Legislature has been one of Bailey's longtime goals. She first learned about the internship opportunity when she was a junior in high school attending West Virginia Rhododendron Girls State, a leadership academy that the American Legion Auxiliary National Convention started in 1937 for young women who are interested in government.

"I took a political science class in high school and loved learning about how the government works," she said. "When I attended Girls State, I had a weeklong 24/7 look at how government works, and they talked about this internship. I knew then that I wanted to get the inside scoop at the Legislature."

This will not be Bailey's first experience in the State Capitol. She served as a page three times. The Page Program gives students in grades six through 12 the opportunity to assist legislators on the floor during the yearly regular

session. She said that gave her what she calls a "front door look" at the legislative process.

"As an intern, I expect to see more of the backdoor," she said. "I'm hoping with this internship to see a lot more of the closed-door debates and discussions and how they come up with the issues that they want to cover in the legislation."

This past summer, Bailey also interned with the West Virginia Secretary of State's office helping with the Alexa project, which makes it possible for people to ask Amazon Alexa questions and get quick answers about elections and the business services the office provides.

"I helped come up with questions, helped test questions, and then at the end of the internship I had to report on where I thought it should go and provide a plan on how to get to that point," she said.

Bailey is on target to graduate in May 2023. After graduating from Shepherd, she wants to go to law school and eventually work in government as a general counsel or part of a legal team for an elected official.

"Getting experience in the legislative branch will help me once I finish all my education and start a career," she said.

their grandchildren, Thomas J. Spurlock, son of A.O. (Drew) and Virginia Ratcliff Spurlock and Mildred Harrison, daughter of Homer H. and Nannie Jane Henson Harrison, met in Hurricane, West Virginia, and were married November 12, 1936. To us were born two sons, Thomas J. Spurlock, Jr. (October 4, 1938) and Richard Harrison Spurlock (April 29, 1941).

Tom was employed at the Union Carbide for 10 years and I taught in one-room schools for 5 years in Putnam County. Life was great here with all our friends and relatives but in 1944, we decided to "Move On" and find a home in the farm lands across the Ohio River. We first moved to a dairy farm near Albany, Ohio, but after four years, we again "Moved On" to a farm in Meigs County. We enjoyed life here very much-everyone made us feel most welcome. Tom stayed busy with his dairy and buying and selling farms. I was busy with my homemaking, teaching private piano lessons and teaching school for five years.

Our life on the farm and the growing up of our sons was wonderful - in fact, an unforgettable memory. Both boys graduated from Albany High School. Tom, Jr.,

became interested in police work and a week after graduation in 1956, he was accepted into the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Washington, D.C. After a couple of years of working and studying he "Moved On" to Miami, Florida to work in the Dade County Sheriff's Office. He married Sue Ellen Bridges, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Olin H. Bridges. They have 2 children, Charlene Michele and Thomas Michael. Then he had the opportunity to work at the National Radio Astronomy Observatory in Greenbank, West Virginia where he worked for nearly 3 years. Being interested in electronics since high school, he decided to make Electronic Hospital Equipment (installing and repairing) his life's work so he "Moved On." He is presently located in Columbus, Ohio.

So the years have rolled by - Tom and I live on a 25 acre farm now. It has been almost 43 years since we left out home in Hurricane and we will never forget it but Ohio has been good for us and we have made many friends so we think we will stay here as long as the Lord wills it for us.

Nov. 25, 1896: Athlete Clinton Cyrus Thomas was born in Greenup, Kentucky. Thomas was a star in the Negro Leagues, during the days of racial segregation in major league baseball. Thomas settled in Charleston

after his playing days and made a long career in West Virginia state government.

Nov. 26, 1952: A fire on the evening before Thanksgiving at the Huntington State Hospital killed 14 patients, with three more patients later dying from their injuries. Huntington State Hospital is known today as the Mildred Mitchell-Bateman Hospital.

Nov. 26, 1861: The

Constitutional Convention of 1861-63 was convened in Wheeling. The convention provided the foundation for state government in preparation for statehood.

Nov. 27, 1933: Daniel Boardman Purinton, a faculty member and president of West Virginia University, died. He was an early and strong supporter of co-education.

Nov. 28, 1864: In a local skirmish north of Moorefield, Rosser's Confederate cavalry

and McNeill's Rangers rebuffed a raid by Union Col. R. E. Fleming and spared the South Branch Valley from destruction. The battlefields are part of the Middle South Branch Valley rural historic district.

Nov. 29, 1921: The actress Dagmar was born Virginia Ruth Egnor in Lincoln County. Her acting career took off in 1950 when she was hired to be on NBC's "Broadway Open House," the network's first

late-night television show.






What if we start counting our blessings rather than counting the days?


Being thankful reminds us that if it's broken it's an opportunity.

films.

Some of the films that were geared to kids seemed to want to make us think that staying alive could be a fun experience. Cartoons of some little woodland animal who wore a jaunty expression and smiled a lot set the stage for "Survival During a Nuclear Attack." A catchy theme song might tell us that "When the bombs are falling down, stay low to the ground." We were often advised to take refuge under a table but any kid knows during a nuclear attack, a table is not going to keep you very safe from the bomb. I always supposed that the people who made these films were just plain stupid or didn't know what they were talking about. When we went to the movies on Saturday, we were very likely to see a second feature about a monster that had mutated somewhere near Japan because of the atomic bombs that were set off there in World War II. Everyone would watch as some huge lizard tried to attack Tokyo. The only thing that saved that city from destruction was that the creature was held back temporarily by the high voltage electric lines around Tokyo. Some scientific genius finally figured out how to get rid of the big critter, and so mankind was saved from the Frankensteinian monster that nuclear pollution had created. A lot of the films were just plainly too bizarre to ever have been anything more than a fantasy experience for kids and grownups who liked excitement. However, some of the films were "supposed to make you think." One of the "thinking" films was a black and white picture called simply, "Seven." In this grim story, only seven people had survived the nuclear holocaust. Only one woman was among the group, and the only reason she had been saved was because she was under a lead table in an x-ray room. She was searching for her husband, and much of the film dwelt upon that. When she finally found what was left of him, the audience got one of those usual "jolts" and a "Ack!" from the audience when they saw her husband had been reduced to a skeleton.

Due to one reason or another, all the group had perished by the end of the film except the woman and one man. The idea

there, of course, was that they were the new "Adam and Eve" who would start the human race all over again, although under a more enlightened, non-warlike type of society. I came to the conclusion on that one that if the first Adam and Eve had failed so miserably, how could we hope for anything better with the second pair.

I wasn't a big fan of the nuclear holocaust film and much preferred Roy Rogers to either seeing monsters or "thinking films." A good adventure story held more interest to me than watching giant lizards crush part of Tokyo.

Although nuclear holocaust could provide themes for entertainment, mostly the idea just scared people. People had a reasonably mature response to the possibilities of nuclear attack and did not panic. Yes, it could happen, but every right thinking person was doing everything he or she could possibly do to prevent it.

One thing that did spook me a little during life under the shadow of the atomic bomb was the CONELRAD test on the radio. Right while you were listening to an exciting cowboy show, the announcer would come on and say, "For the next 60 seconds, a test will be made of the CONELRAD emergency radio network system." Then this awful shrieking, buzzing sound would come over the radio for the next minute. I never could see what good a noise on the radio would be if the Russians ever did pull the trigger and drop the A bomb on us. Who would be around to listen to the noise anyway?

I remember one time back in the early 1950's that a test was conducted in St. Albans to simulate an evacuation of all the people in the area. At a pre-determined time, everyone was supposed to start driving away from St. Albans as quickly as possible. I listened to the descriptions of this on the radio as it was happening and it seemed to be more chaos than an orderly test. The whole thing must have been a big flop, because to my knowledge, no one ever tried to repeat that one.

Surprising thing about all this was that no one ever really seemed to panic. We developed a good healthy fear and respect of what the atomic bomb could do, but we learned to carry on our every day lives in

spite of the fact that there was some possibility that we might all be blown to smithereens, possibly in the near future. There was no massive movement to construct bomb shelters, no matter how the government bureaucrats tried to inspire people to do it. Nobody to speak of stockpiled great quantities of food, water and the perpetual "safe egg."

Back in the 60's, a demonstration bomb shelter was built at the Ohio State Fair in Columbus. We visited it along with a lot of other people who were curious. The bomb shelter wasn't much bigger or deeper than a small root cellar. Those who suffer from claustrophobia might have preferred the bomb to spending 14 days in a thing like that. They kept the thing around at the Ohio State Fair for years. When Ron, Betsy, William Taylor and I visited the fair in 1998, I made it a point to see if the bomb shelter was still there. It had long since been abandoned and a new building had been built over where it once reposed.

Also missing from view in most places are the old bomb shelter notices in cities. While in Columbus, we did see a few old rusting signs on some buildings, but they seemed to be a sight that is fading into oblivion. Back when they were first put up, maybe they did provide some feeling of security for some people.

When I was a kid, I did quite a bit of philosophizing. I thought about the atomic bomb, as did many other kids of that period. After all the government "education" films, talk by experts, watching both giant lizards and "thinking" films, and seeing that little forest creature smiling and singing about how to survive an atomic bomb attack, I came to the conclusion that if you managed to survive an atomic bomb by living 14 days in a hole, when you came out, there would not be anything worth coming out for. That childhood realization satisfied all my musings and cogitation, and nothing since that time has done anything to change my opinion.

When the Cuban Missile Crisis came around in 1962, I scarcely batted an eyelash. When I once make up my mind about something, I usually keep that opinion and my opinion was that if the world ever had an

atomic holocaust, there would be nothing worth coming out of the ground for.

Not even the campaign pictures Lyndon Johnson's election team came up with during the 1964 election did anything to change my mind. The Johnson propaganda machine paid for a TV ad that showed a sweet little girl sitting in a daisy covered field. As she picked the leaves from a daisy flower, in the background were the words "Ten... nine... eight... seven ... six... five... four... three... two... one...BOOM," and the mushroom cloud then spread over our screen. The message that the Johnson boys wanted to convey was that if Barry Goldwater were elected President, he would plunge the country into a war with Russia/China that would end in a nuclear catastrophe. I still voted for Goldwater.

Most of the people probably came to the conclusion that I did: if the world were stupid enough to bomb itself to annihilation, there wouldn't be anything worth coming back for anyway. Although some people might call it fatalism, there is a certain strength in the realization that after all, that if man has not the sense enough to keep himself from destroying himself, then the only thing between disaster and man is God Himself. In other words, it is all out of our hands and in God's hands. People who feel this way generally are less inclined to panic.

I have seen more panic over the internet in the past month than I ever saw at any time during the super hot days of the Cold War. People seem to think now that terrorists are lurking everywhere, hiding behind trees, just waiting to nail them. Now, the sight of powdered sugar on a donut in a restaurant might drive some of them to the state of total panicked mindlessness. People have rushed out to buy so many gas masks that there are none left in stock, as though a gas mask would be any possible use to any of them anyway.

Now some fearful people are even afraid to buy supermarket tabloids because they think the ink has anthrax in it. Just say the word, "Anthrax," and it will have the effect of a wizard shaking his hands and pronouncing a curse upon his unfortunate, doomed victim.

"The end is near, the people run in fear,

oh dear, oh dear," and Chicken Liken says the sky is falling down on her head. If there are any aliens in outer space, they must look down and say, "Our invasion will be easy; look how the wimps on earth run in fear and panic." An older alien might interject, "I remember their ancestors, the stanch frontiersmen and women, who braved diseases, hostiles, and cold weather to settle the country. It looks like the gene pool ran out with this crop. I don't think the place is worth taking now; let's find a more worthy planet. These lamers would probably want us to come down and protect them!" and with that, they would fly their spaceship to another galaxy.

Just what did our ancestors endure? Many of their children died from childhood diseases before they reached the age of 5. The old cemeteries are filled with graves of babies who died of such things as measles or mumps. People back then commonly were beset by plagues of cholera, diphtheria, thyroid fever, and other fevers that have long since succumbed to the skills of the doctors. Although the hardships were great and the dangers were high, these rugged pioneers had the pure nerve, courage and guts that it took to go on, come what may. Many of them had their faith and destiny placed firmly in the hands of God and no danger was too frightening for them to face.

Obviously something has been lost over the years when people turn to simpering piles of jelly by the sight of some harmless powder or by the very mention of the word "anthrax." Materialism has made many Americans soft and weak and with materialism comes the easy life. Many have come to expect government protection from the cradle to the grave, and when that government cannot protect them, they suddenly discover that their god, whose feet were always clay, has failed them.

Underneath all the weakness, the wimpiness, the silliness, the mind and spirit turned to jelly mood that has swept America since September 11th, I still have hopes that the country will not be washed away into a state of total wimphood and lameness and cringe and quake at the slightest mention of some disease. Somehow

underneath all the pudgy softness that has come about through reliance on the government and upon materialism to save mankind, somewhere, that spirit that empowered the pioneers who first settled this country still exists and men and women of reason will prevail.

For the past month, I have felt like shaking a lot of the people of this country back into common sense. The words and behavior of many have sickened me. Fools have cried, "War when there was no war. Sensationalists have spouted, "Attack upon America!" so they could sell more copies of their newspapers and tabloids. Alarmists and extremists have helped set the stage for the panic and fear that has now engulfed so many people.

Rather than seeing nonexistent terrorists lurking behind every tree, and catching some disease that it is not even remotely possible that the average citizen would ever contract, I would like to see a return to the courage and strength to face life with dignity and to fear no human but only God Himself.

I would like to see these words written in the hearts and minds of all Americans, "This great Nation will endure as it has endured, will revive and will prosper. So, first of all, let me assert my firm belief that the only thing we have to fear is fear itself - nameless, unreasoning, unjustified terror which paralyzes needed efforts to convert retreat into advance." - First Inaugural Address of President Franklin D. Roosevelt (1933-1945).

Yes, those of us who were kids during the Cold War did have a good reason to think about the atomic bomb, but few were ever driven to the state of panic and out of control fear that many of today are experiencing. I really don't think that we were "built of sterner stuff," but I don't think that many of us allowed television commentators, news media, the internet, and the fears of others to influence us. We held tightly to our own minds and thoughts. If Americans are victims of anything now, it is a victim of itself and its artificial crisis that its leaders and mind controllers have conceived for us. Indeed, the only thing we have to fear is fear, and perhaps ourselves.

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BASIC BIBLE

Water from the Rock

Numbers 20:1-13

"But the Comforter, which is the Holy Ghost, whom the Father will send in my name, he shall teach you all things . . ." (John 14:26). The Holy Spirit indwells New Testament believers. The Holy Spirit teaches us all things. All things include understandings of Old Testament scriptures that were hidden from us before we knew Jesus Christ as our Lord and Savior. It is by and through the Holy Spirit that believers are given the ears to hear that which is in the text before us.

In verses 2-5, we see a people who have gathered themselves together against Moses and Aaron. We see a people who lashed out against God, saying, "Would God that we had died when our brethren died before the Lord!" We see a people who accused Moses of bringing them up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness. We see what Moses saw. The picture that we see is the picture that the Lord wants men to see and consider.

What follows in verses 6-8 is the Lord's response to the picture that He has placed before us. The Lord reveals Himself to us through His instruction to Moses. He told Moses to take the rod in his hand, to gather the people, and, then with Aaron, speak to the rock such that the rock would bring forth his water so that the congregation and their beasts might drink.

The people had repeatedly disobeyed the Lord. The people had no understanding of the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob who led them up out of Egypt. Who is the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob? He is One who causes life-giving water to gush from the rock such that men may know Him. He is the God who responds to the words of them whom He has chosen. The God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob is the God which New Testament believers know.

Because of that which followed in verses 10 and 11, the people did not see the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. They did not see the God which New Testament believers know. Moses did not speak to the rock. Moses spoke to the people, in anger, saying, "Hear now, ye rebels; must we fetch you water out of this rock?" In anger, Moses struck the rock. The people saw anger. Because of Moses' actions, the people did not see the God who "... commendeth his love to us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us" (Rom. 5:8). They did not see the God who is gracious to whom He will be gracious and will show mercy on whom He will show mercy (Ex. 33:19).

Moses suffered loss because he did not do as the Lord had directed him. Moses would see, but, would not be allowed to enter into the promised land. Moses is listed in Faith's Hall of Fame (Hebrews 11). Moses knew the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. On numerous occasions, Moses made the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob (the God that he knew) known to the children of Israel. On this occasion, however, he disobeyed the Lord. Consequently, he suffered loss.

New Testament believers know to do good but do always do good. "... him that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is sin" (James 4:17). New Testament believers have an advocate with the Father who is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness when we confess our sins (1 Jn. 1:9).

Moses suffered loss because he did not do as the Lord directed him to do. New Testament believers are instructed to make the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob known to all people. We have been commanded to go, to teach, and to baptize in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. We know to do good. Let us not suffer loss.

The scene in Numbers 20:2 is amazingly similar to a scene that took place forty years earlier at Rephidim (Ex. 17:1-7). The people chided Moses on both occasions because there was no water. On both occasions, Moses smote the rock and life-giving waters issued forth and the people drank. On both occasions, the people saw water come forth from the rock. On both occasions, the people drank and were filled.

The Lord, both at Rephidim and in the text before us, was faithful to provide for His people. The Lord is so good. The Lord was not hindered by the sin of Moses in doing good.

The sin of Moses prevented the children of Israel from seeing God's goodness. The Lord wanted the people to see Moses hold the rod in his hand and speak to the rock. The rod was the same rod which the people saw Moses stretch over the sea and the waters divided. The rod was the same rod which the people saw Moses strike the rock forty years earlier. At the crossing through the sea and at Rephidim, Moses used the rod (symbolic of power) as He was directed.

The Lord was sanctified at the sea and at Rephidim because Moses obeyed. The Lord will be sanctified in them who hear and obey. May we hear what the Spirit speaks.

Traditional Holiday Concert At Forrest Burdette United Methodist Church in Hurricane

Back by popular demand, master organist Rodney L. Barbour will return for a traditional holiday concert on the Harrah Symphonic Organ at Forrest Burdette United Methodist Church on Sunday, November 28th.

A native of Huntington and a graduate of Marshall University, Barbour earned a Master of Music degree at the University of Cincinnati College Conservatory of Music.

His concerts combine classic, traditional and popular selections in symphonic style with the world class Harrah instrument. There is often audience participation in Christmas numbers when Barbour may be temporarily replaced at the keyboards by Santa Claus himself as a surprise guest.

Barbour always includes a surprise or two, and he mixes an informed and humorous narrative into the program.

At Crestview Presbyterian Church in West Chester, Ohio, as director of worship and arts, he conducts a 45-voice chancel choir, a hand bell choir and worship and brass bands.

When not directing and conducting, he divides his playing time among a pipe organ, a digital organ, a grand piano, a keyboard, a Hammond B-3, and sometimes, for a

bit of variety, a personal accordion.

Barbour has published in several music periodicals and organ music collections. He has also conducted workshops in 42 states and all Canadian provinces. He has performed at least ten times on the Harrah Symphonic in Hurricane.

The Harrah Symphonic, at its dedication in 2003, was the largest six manual draw knob console in the world. The instrument has 2,600 actual pipes and 20,000 digital notes, supported by 148 speaker systems with 10,400 watts of power.

Other concerts on the Harrah Symphonic for the 2021-22 season include "Silent Movie Night" on February 18, 2022, and a return by Rodney Barbour on May 15 in a program of hymns and spiritual songs.

In recognition of the community support for the concert series, there is no admission charge for the concert on Monday, November 28. The program will begin at 3:00 in the afternoon.
