County Commission Ends Firearms Sales Restrictions

Sale of firearms within 300 feet of a school, church, or residence is now legally allowed in the zoned unincorporated areas of Putnam County.

The law was changed by the Putnam County Commission in a 2 to 1 vote on Thursday, September 30. Putnam's zoning ordinances continue to restrict the operation of a pawnshop within 300 feet of a school, church or residence.

The 2 to 1 vote came after the county commissioners heard from those opposed to and those in favor of removing firearms sales restrictions from the zoning ordinances.

Opponents of the change argued that the reason that the change was being made was to benefit one person — Glenn Yeager, II. Yeager, a member of the Putnam County Planning Commission, began selling firearms at Valley Outdoors at 3034 Mt. Vernon Road in Hurricane, a location situate to 15 residents and a daycare center.

David Crouch of Litchfield Estates stated, "Now, we're trying to go back and change all the ordinances to cover himself (Yeager). Crouch pointed out that the request to change the ordinance was initiated after Yeager's request for a special permit to sell firearms at Valley Outdoors was denied by the Board of Zoning Appeals on July 1st.

"There has been a lot of shadiness here, up to this point and here we are trying to clean it up," Crouch added. Crouch said that firearms restriction needed to remain in the ordinance to protect residents and the daycare center across the street from Valley Outdoors.

Robert Miller, a resident of Lexington Estates off Route U.S. 60 in Hurricane, spoke in favor of the amendment. Reading from his cell phone, Miller stated, "I'm in favor of the

proposed changes to the zoning ordinance (by the Planning Commission) that were made on the 21st of September that pertain to the retail sales of firearms."

John Williams, a resident of Marina Park, stated that the ordinance should not be acted upon until Judge Stowers rules on the request by Yeager to continue to sell firearms [the request cited by David Crouch].

Glenn Yeager spoke on behalf of himself. He stated that residents have not spoken out against the gun store because they are glad that we are there. Yeager added that he did not see where firearms sales were any different from any other retail sales.

Before approving changes to zoning ordinances, the county commission must determine if the change promotes the health, safety, and general welfare of the areas involved.

In addressing this criterion, Commissioner Andy Skidmore stated that he favored the change because his past opposition to firearms sales in C-1 zoned areas was the connection of firearms sales to pawnshops. Skidmore believes that pawnshops should be restricted.

Commissioner Brian Ellis, in addressing the health, safety, and general welfare criterion, asked if Yeager's case was before Judge Stowers. After being advised that it was, Ellis announced his no vote.

Commission President Ron Foster, in addressing the criterion, said that he would make the deciding vote. Foster stated that he did not believe that firearms restrictions in Putnam County should be greater than those of the state and federal governments.

"It happens that we have one business that is going to be affected immediately but we will have many affected later," Foster said. "I think that

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HURRICANE COUNCIL NEWS

Increase in Water Pollution Control Fee Proposed

The Hurricane City Council met on Monday, October 4, to conduct regular business and hear updates from the city manager and the police and fire departments.

New business included the first reading of an ordinance which will restructure the city's water pollution control fee schedule. If enacted at a second reading, individual user fees will double from \$1.50 to \$3.00 and the commercial rate will be lowered. The changes will result in an annual revenue increase of \$100,000. A public hearing will be held prior to any action by the

council.

In another first reading, council voted to extend the ordinance that prohibits firearms at City Park to include all parks within city limits. If approved at the second reading in November, firearms will be prohibited in both Valley Park and Hurricane Bridge Park.

In other new business, the council approved a zoning change recommended by the Hurricane Planning Commission for a parcel on Kanawha Avenue from R-1 single family to R-2 multi-family. The parcel involved is near the eastern end of the street.

Council granted Appalachian Power a right-of-way from Peach Ridge Road to its new powerline maintenance center behind St. Mary's Family Care and Willow Tree Apartments. The maintenance center is projected to be operational by year's end.

Council also gave City Manager Andy Skidmore the go ahead to pursue a tourism funding grant from a federal agency. Skidmore said that the city will be asking for \$2.5 million for recreational trail development. The proposal will include a trail which connects Hurricane Bridge Park to City Park via Water Tank Hill. Skidmore made it known that Hurricane will be in competition with other West Virginia cities and cities in neighboring states for a grant. If awarded the grant, Hurricane will need \$500,000 in matching funds. Skidmore said that the development plans at Bridge Park are not

dependent upon receiving the grant.

Skidmore informed council that the long-awaited-for pickleball courts should be open before the end of the month.

EMS Coordinator Ryan Lewis informed council that Hurricane has the promised new ambulance and that the second ambulance from the county is scheduled to have its new engine installed this week.

Police Chief Mike Mullins presented a summary of his department's activities for September. During the month, the HPD made twelve arrests charged to

HENRY SOVINE II

Chelsa Chen will be performing on the world class Harrah Symphonic Organ, Sunday, October 10, 2021, 3:00 p.m. at Forrest Burdette Memorial United Methodist Church, 2848 Putnam Avenue, Hurricane.

Chelsea Chen (born December 30, 1983, in San Deigo, California) is an internationally renowned young American organist and composer. She has been successful in establishing a concert career in North America, Europe and Asia. She has composed several original compositions, and has adapted music ranging from major classical repertoire to video game soundtracks to Taiwanese folk songs for the organ and other instruments.

Chelsea Chen's dynamic playing has taken her to the far corners of the world. Her solo concerts offer a unique mix of traditional organ repertoire along with piano/orchestral transcriptions and contemporary music. The Los Angeles Times has praised her "rare musicality" and "lovely lyrical grandeur," and a compositional style that is "charming" and "irresistible."

Ms. Chen studied under numerous renowned teachers including Paul Jacobs and John Weaver at

The Juilliard School in New York, where she received her Bachelor's and Master's degrees. She also won the John Erskine Prize for academic and artistic achievement, awarded to one graduate per year. After college, she moved to Taiwan under a Fulbright scholarship, whereupon she collected folk songs and wrote organ solo and chamber music. She returned to the U.S. to study with Thomas Murray at Yale University, where she earned an Artist Diploma. In 2009, Wayne Leupold Editions published her composition "Taiwanese Suite" to great acclaim.

From 2013-2017, Ms. Chen was Artist-in-Residence at Coral Ridge Presbyterian Church, where she performed and directed the Concert Series. At present, she serves as Artist-in-Residence at Emmanuel Presbyterian Church in Manhattan.

Chen has received praises from around the world and this concert of "pops" and classical music is sure to entertain the audience.

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the state and fourteen which were charged to the city. Four of the state arrests were DUI related. Others involved prohibited firearm possession, fleeing, and state warrants.

Two city arrests were drug related with one for possession of Meth and one for possession of marijuana. There were 7 arrests for shoplifting.

Mullins said that the HPD department issued 78 citations and 50 warnings while responding to 27 EMR calls, 18 alarm calls, 3 domestic violence calls,

21 suspicious person calls, 5 suspicious vehicle calls, 6 well-being checks, and 8 disturbance calls. The department took 15 accident reports during the month.

Riley's son, Howard Taft Sovine (1905-1941), married Thelma May Smith (1911), daughter of Charles Otis and Bertha Mae Scott Smith, on June 11, 1927. Carol Joyce Sovine Rowsey was born on April 14, 1933, the second of five children born to Howard and Thelma. She married Donald Ray Rowsey, the son of Virgil Lee (1899-1974) and Hattie Lunsford Rowsey (1904-1979) of Milton, WV. Donald was born on December 5, 1931, and graduated from Milton High School in 1949. He worked for Union Carbide Corporation as an operator and electrician. He retired in February of 1987 after 36 years of service. Donald enjoys blue grass music and is well known in the Hurricane area for his "fiddle" playing and wit. He spent several years playing with the group "The Teays Valley Boys" which was made up of mostly Hurricane talent. Carol has spent the majority of her life in Hurricane and has many memories of the community as well as the people who have contributed to it over the years. As a child growing up on Virginia Avenue, she can remember the first time the street was paved, and rare shopping trips to Huntington meant a ride on the train as few people owned cars. Carol graduated from Hurricane High School in 1951 and spent the early years of her married life at home being a housewife and mother of three children. She has been employed by Carter's Market in Hurricane for over twenty years as a cashier. She is very active in church and community functions and enjoys traveling and sporting events.

Carol and Donald became the parents of their first child, LaDonna Joyce, on April 3, 1952. "Donna" is now married to William Griffin Hammer and resides in St. Albans, WV. She was employed by Union Carbide for sixteen years. Howard Lee was the second child to be born to Donald and Carol. He was born on February 21, 1954, and graduated from Marshall University. it is going to be a positive thing for the county if our ordinances are clear and all that somebody needs

to worry about is following federal and state law."

With Foster's vote, unrestricted gun sales in the zoned unincorporated area of Putnam County was determined to

promote the health, safety and general welfare of the zoned areas.

After determining by a 2 to 1 vote that the ordinance change

satisfied other criteria, unrestricted firearms within 300 feet of schools, churches, and residences became the law of the land.



The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to

Oct. 7, 1747: Pioneer Ebenezer Zane, the founder of Wheeling, was born on the South Branch of the Potomac River near present Moorefield in Hardy County.

Oct. 7, 1900: Poet Roy Lee Harmon was born in Boone County. He was the founder of the West Virginia Poetry Society and served as the state's poet laureate for 38 years.

Oct. 7, 1957: Musician Michael W. Smith was born in Kenova. He has recorded 22 albums and written 10 books.

Oct. 8, 1993: The Rev. Bernard Coffindaffer died unexpectedly of a heart attack. Starting in 1984, Coffindaffer began erecting clusters of crosses in West Virginia and other states. He was buried in Nicholas

County, just across the highway from a set of his crosses.

Oct. 9, 1877: The Episcopal Church created the Diocese of West Virginia. The initial convention of the new diocese met at St. John's Episcopal in Charleston, with 14 clergy and 16 lay delegates.

Oct. 9, 2014: Following court rulings and announcements by the governor and the attorney general, same-sex marriage was effectively legalized in West Virginia.

Oct. 10, 1774: Shawnee warriors led by Cornstalk were defeated at the Battle of Point Pleasant. It was the only major engagement of Dunmore's War and the most important battle ever fought in present West Virginia.

Oct. 10, 1872: Architect Rus Warne was born in Parkersburg. Warne designed many notable buildings in Charleston, including City Hall and the Masonic Temple.

Oct. 10, 1878: Blanche Lazzell was born in Maidsville, Monongalia County. She was one of West Virginia's most notable artists and is recognized as one

of America's leading abstract painters and print makers.

Oct. 10, 1948: During a boat-racing event in Charleston, Chuck Yeager flew a Lockheed P-80 Shooting Star up the river and under the South Side Bridge, surprising boaters, audience and news media at the event.

Oct. 11, 1811: State founder and U.S. Senator Waitman Thomas Willey was born near Farmington. Willey proposed the West Virginia Statehood Bill in the Senate and saw to its passage and later signing by President Lincoln. He was then elected as one of West Virginia's first two U.S. senators and served from 1863 to 1871.

Oct. 12, 1877: Howard Mason Gore was born in Harrison County. He served as U.S. secretary of agriculture and the 14th governor of West Virginia.

Oct. 13, 1863: The Battle of Bulltown took place. The location was valuable during the Civil War because the Weston & Gauley Bridge Turnpike crossed the Little Kanawha River on a covered bridge at this site.



God Sends Quail and Plague

Numbers 11:24-35

"And Moses went out, and told the people the words of the Lord" (v. 24). The words which Moses delivered to the people are recorded in verses 18-20. Moses told them to prepare for tomorrow because the Lord would give them flesh to eat for one full month. Moses told them that the flesh would be loathsome to them because they had despised the Lord and wept before Him, saying, Why came we forth out of Egypt?

In verse 25, the Lord did with the elders that which He said that He would do in verse 17. He spoke to Moses while the elders were present. The Lord came down in a cloud and placed the spirit that was on Moses upon the elders. The location of the cloud was above the tabernacle. The physical location of the cloud should be noted because that which follows in verses 26 through 29.

Two men, Eldad and Medad, who were of the elders remained in the camp. The cloud did not hover above Eldad and Medad but the spirit rested upon them and they prophesied in the camp. Their prophesying was reported to Moses. Joshua, one of Moses' young men, thought it improper that Eldad and Medad should prophesy. Moses rebuked Joshua, saying, "Enviest thou for my sake?" It was Moses' desire that the Lord would place His spirit upon all of His people. Moses recognized that Eldad's and Medad's prophesying was because they had been moved by His spirit. The spirit of prophesying comes upon all whom God chooses.

The names, Eldad and Medad, mean "beloved of God" and "beloved." The picture before us is that of the Lord placing His spirit upon all whom He loves. Is this not a picture of that which the Lord places upon all New Testament believers?

In verse 31, the word which the Lord spoke to Moses came to pass. The Lord supplied the flesh which would feed all Israel for thirty days. Moses told the people that this would happen in verse 25. That which was prophesied came to pass.

A wind from the Lord deposited quail from the sea round about the camp. The sea would have been the Red Sea. The Lord gathered up the quail from a distance of more than 20 miles away and caused them to fall and pile up to a height of three feet (2 cubits) about the camp. The people gathered quail for two days and one night. There were six hundred thousand men of military age who gathered up the birds (see v. 21). The least that any gathered was ten homers. The volume of an homer, depending upon the source, is somewhere between two quarts and a gallon. The number of birds gathered would have been in excess of 25 million.

While the flesh of the birds was yet between their teeth (flesh was between their teeth for thirty days), the wrath of the Lord was kindled and He smote them with a great plague. This wrath is not the wrath of verse 10. The wrath of the Lord in verse 10 was kindled by the complaints of the people. The wrath of verse 33 was kindled by the actions of the people.

New Testament believers know the Lord to be long-suffering and slow to anger. The Lord, figuratively, turned His cheek in verse 10. In verse 33, the Lord did not turn His cheek. Those who lusted for the flesh perished and were buried at that place Kibroth-hattaavah which literally means Graves of the Craving.

New Testament believers know the Lord to be a God of second chances. "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (1 Jn. 1:9). There are no second chances for them who do not come to repentance. Second chances ended for all of them at Kibroth-hattaavah who still desired flesh after thirty days. They were buried in the wilderness. All who found the flesh to be loathsome journeyed to Hazeroth, a place of second chances.

Israel buried its dead and moved on. Believers are to do the same. When we confess our sins, we find forgiveness because Christ is lets His blood be our covering.

New Testament believers, like the children of Israel, sin both knowingly and unknowingly. We ever need to confess and be forgiven. We cannot cleanse ourselves.

The Apostle Paul's instruction to believers at the church in Thessolonica holds for today. We are to pray without ceasing and to give thanks to God in all things. It is the will of God that we so do.
