Sheriff Deputies Seize \$71,000 Cash in Motorcycle Arrest

On August 12, Putnam County deputies arrested Shane Kelly Fulkerson, 43, of Charleston on charges of fleeing in a vehicle with reckless indifference, unlawfully carrying a firearm, operating a motorcycle without insurance and registration, and possession with intent. Also arrested was passenger Alexis Nichole Reidenour, 21, of Gallagher. Reidenour was charged with possession.

Fulkerson fled up Heizer Creek when a deputy attempted to stop him for a traffic violation in Poca. The chase continued onto Route 34 North and then toward Winfield. Pursuit ended when Fulkerson spun out of control in a yard while attempting to turn around.

Putnam County Commission News

The Putnam County Commission meeting of Tuesday, August 10, included hearing financial updates from Parks & Recreation, Libraries, Convention & Business Bureau, Development Authority, and Community Corrections.

Parks & Recreation Director Justin Williams reported a surplus for the fiscal year of \$162,000.

Williams reported that a surplus of \$90,000 had been projected. He said the added surplus resulted from grants and lower administrative costs resulting from replacing some full-time employees with part-timers. Williams stated that revenues were down for wedding bookings but were above expectations for baseball and soccer tournaments. He said the

Demand Exceeds Supply at Annual Back to School Blast

Putnam County

Schools' annual Back to School Blast held Friday, August 13, at the Putnam Career & Technical Center in Eleanor did not go as expected.

School officials were expecting a turnout of about 350 students and were prepared to handout as many as 400 backpacks. More than 900 students showed up expecting to receive a

free backpack and school supplies.

Elizabeth Hoh, Director of Elementary Education and Federal Programs, reported that school personnel gathered contact information after the backpack supply was exhausted. Hoh said that parents will be notified when the additional 500 backpacks become available.

The free backpacks and supplies are not exactly free. The School Board teams with businesses, churches, and others in the community to purchase the giveaways. Hoh stated that the cost is greatest for high school students and least for Pre-K and elementary. The cost of the backpack alone for older students

Lower Coach Road Residence Sustains Major Fire Damage

Hurricane Fire & Rescue, along with Teays Valley Fire Department and Culloden VFD, responded to a structure fire at the Kevin Bailey residence on 10 Lower Coach Road off of US Route 60 in Hurricane on Friday, August 13. The first units to arrive found the 2-story, single family dwelling engaged

in heavy fire on the first floor. Firefighters were able to attack the fire from inside the home and confine the blaze to the area involved. The remainder of the house sustained considerable smoke and water damage. Winfield VFD also assisted on the scene. The residents were not

home at the time of the fire. It is suspected that lightning may have cause the blaze.

Hurricane Fire Chief Deron Wilkes stated that insurance adjusters have yet to issue a report. Wilkes believes the loss will be more than half of the home's \$265,000 value.

The Centennial History of Hurricane

Meet Some of Hurricane's Oldest Families

In 1988, The Centennial History of Hurricane, WV was published to commemorate the town's 100th anniversary. Since the Centennial History is now out of print, the Breeze is reprinting articles from the book as space allows. This week's selection will be the 206th installment of the Centennial History.

Charles Otis Smith was born on February 9, 1887, in Putnam County, West Virginia, a son of William Austin Smith (1866-1928) and Edna Leadman Smith (1868-1916). His paternal grandparents were Daniel Pleasant Smith (1838-1929) and Virginia Jane Beckett Smith (1842-1912).

Charles Otis Smith had three brothers - Ernest died 1969; Clarence died in 1936; and Verner is also deceased. He had three sisters - Annie (1891-1912); Cora (1896-1914); and Edith Easter

Putnam County Schools to Provide Free Meals to All Students

Putnam County Schools will participate in the USDA Seamless Summer Option (SSO) and the Community Eligibility Provision for the current 2021-22 school year. These programs provide FREE breakfast and lunch to all students enrolled in Putnam County. Household applications are not required to receive free meals this school year. However, each school will distribute meal applications to collect household income data for other programs requiring this information or for families to become eligible for additional federal benefits that may be distributed this school year. If parents would instead use the online meal application process, they can access it at www.schoolcafe.com. The following schools are designated as CEP schools (Buffalo El, Hometown El, Poca El, Rock Branch El, and Lakeside El) which are not required to complete any household applications for eligible benefits.

All students will be served breakfast and lunch at no charge at all county schools. If your child is a virtual learning child interested in receiving free meals and would like to pre-order school meals for

When you look out the window of their huge house, you can see my condo... we live that close... and we all are happy that there is little running around in the car... Florida makes me happy... two little boys, who in the blink of an eye, will grow up so quickly...

My grandgirls... the youngest is sixteen, and we are back to our Facetime Home School Thursdays, or as we call them, Thursdays with Nana... yesterday she was a toddler... today she is the age I was when I thought the world was before me... and time moved slowly... in the blink of an eye... the other two girls are seeking careers and/or finishing college... YESTERDAY, they were born...

Where did time go? Have we made the best of what time we have had on this earth? Have our years counted? Have our moments? Library Director Megan Tarbett reported that the library budget came in as expected. Tarbett presented a summary of activities conducted at the library and its branches. Tarbett outlined plans to obtain revenue through fundraisers and grants which would allow the library to expand its future offerings.

Vanessa Ervin reported that the Convention & Visitors Bureau was forced to cancel events which did not comply with health guidelines and, consequently, experienced a drop in event sponsorship revenue. Ervin said that while tourism is small, it results in a big impact by providing 440 jobs and \$10 million in personal

income. Ervin said that hotel occupancy in the first quarter of 2021 is up 50% over 2020. She stated that the CVB is in the process of identifying periods of low occupancy and recruiting events to boost occupancy.

Drew Dunlap provided the Commission an update of Development Authority finances. Dunlap said that the PCDA's goal is to become less dependent upon contributions from the county. Dunlap said that the Authority provides administrative tasks that do not qualify for funding. Dunlap informed the Commission that the Authority is seeking businesses at the Fraziers Bottom Business Park which have interest in entering into long-term lease agreements.

Jamey Hunt reported

that grant funding made it possible for Community Corrections and Day Report to operate at its projected budget for the fiscal year. Hunt said that judicial delays during the coronavirus crisis resulted in a drop in referrals but was now a thing of the past. Hunt stated that final numbers were not in but he expected that there would be some carryover from the 2020-2021 fiscal year.

The children born to this union are: Doyle Richard (1908) was the only one to die in infancy. Ruth Irene (1909-1985) married Albert Kinder and lived her later years in Hurricane. They had three children: Billy Ray lives in Ashland, Kentucky.

Both Gwendolyn Ruth "Bobbie" Burdette and Charles Albert live in Hurricane. Thelma Mae (born 1911) married Howard Taft Savine and had five children: Marion Agnes Howell lives in Vienna; Carol Joyce Rowsey lives in Hurricane; Lois Jean White lives in Huntington; Bruce Lynn died in infancy; and Riley Smith lives in Craig, Colorado. Thelma Mae married Paul Dennis Wise, Sr. in 1944, and two sons were born to them - Douglas Scott now lives in Salida, Colorado, and Timothy David lives in Los Angeles, California. Paul Dennis, Jr. "Denny" is a stepson and lives in Colorado Springs, Colorado. Basil Hobart (born 1916) married Mary Zetta Coyner. Both Charles and Bertha May Scott Smith are buried in Valley View Cemetery in Hurricane.

Putnam County Schools Sweep Screening

Putnam Count Schools conducts its annual screening program in the areas of hearing, vision, speech, and language.

Speech-Language Pathologists will screen Preschool and Kindergarten students not previously screened, students new to West Virginia, students who have no previous documentation of screening, and those students previously identified as high-risk in grades 1-5.

The School Health Nurses will conduct hearing and vision screenings on the following students that do not have previous screening results; new out-of-state enterers, preschool students and kindergarten students without documentation of vision and hearing screenings. Vision will also be screened for

students in 1st grade and hearing will be screened for students in 4th grade. Vision screenings for students in 6th grade will be completed in October by Putnam County Lions Club.

Please note these are only screenings not full comprehensive evaluations which are conducted by your health care provider. Further testing may be recommended to the parent.

The testing will be done as part of the regular school day with no special scheduling necessary.

Peter and John Preach Boldness

Acts 4:6-21

The scene before us is the morning after — the morning after Peter's and John's arrest. The two had been arrested for disturbing the peace. The peace which they had disturbed was that of the Sadducees. The Sadducees were upset because Peter and John taught the people and preached resurrection from the dead through Jesus (see v. 2).

This is not the first occasion on which the Sadducees were upset. They were much upset by that which had taken place approximately two months earlier. They were greatly upset when Jesus came into Jerusalem in the manner prophesied by Zechariah, riding upon the back of a young donkey (Zech. 9:9). Jesus, in so doing, proclaimed Himself to be the righteous King who possessed salvation. The Sadducees were upset with Jesus because they were the rulers of the roost. They saw Him as a threat to their rule.

Peter and John had been caught in the act of teaching and preaching in the temple area known as Solomon's porch (Acts 3:11). The Roman occupiers of Jerusalem had given Sadducees the right to manage all matters related to the Jewish religion. The Sadducees maintained total control of the temple area. Peter's and John's teaching and preaching was an unauthorized act which took place on temple grounds. Their teaching and preaching was preceded by a miracle which took place at the entrance to the temple, the healing of a man who had been cripple from birth.

The severity of Peter's and John's offense was such that it stirred Annas the high priest and Caiaphas, the ex-high priest and patriarch of the ruling family to summon the two disciples to come before them. They asked, "By what power, or by what name, have ye done this?" (v. 7).

The power by which Annas and Caiaphas asked their question was by that of Rome. The power by which Peter and John did "this" was not of Rome.

Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, supplied an answer which focused on the healing of the lame man. "This" was done in the name of Jesus of Nazareth. This was done in the name of the one whom the Sadducees had crucified. This was done in the name of Jesus whom God raised from the dead. This was done in the name of the stone which the builders (the Sadducees) rejected. This was done in the name of the only name under heaven by which men can be saved (v. 12).

The Sadducees were caught off guard by the boldness of Peter and John. That which Peter declared to the council was the very thing that he had declared to the people in the temple (see 3:12-16). Both the religious leaders and the people had rejected Jesus. The people did so out of ignorance; the Sadducees did so out of unbelief, fearing that they would lose their power over the people.

Evidence of the power by which Peter and John had spoken stood before them in the form of the formerly crippled man. They had no answer. They marveled (v. 13). What they saw should not be but it was. What they heard was without explanation. Peter and John, uneducated men, had just cited and applied a scripture with which learned rabbis struggle. The only explanation was that the two had been with Jesus.

After considering possible actions that they might take against Peter and John, they commanded the two not to speak or teach in the name of Jesus. Peter and John answered them saying, "Whether it be right in the sight of God to hearken unto you more than unto God, judge ye."

It was by the direction of the Holy Spirit that Peter and John spoke these words. Through these two disciples, God reached out to the erring Sadducees and told them that their command was contrary to His will. The Sadducees listened not; they repeated their threats and released them.

Verse 21 states that the Sadducees released them after not finding any offense that would justify punishment. This, however, is not the reason for their decision to release Peter and John. They released Peter and John because of the people. It was a political decision. The people had knowledge of the miracle and were praising God for the healing of the man. The Sadducees released Peter and John out of fear — they feared that they might lose control of the people. If such were to happen, the Roman rulers over Judea would remove the Sadducees from their positions of power.

Peter and John knew that they stood before the council who found Jesus guilty, the people responsible for His crucifixion but they were not afraid. They were not afraid because the power by which they spoke was not their own. They were empowered by the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit came upon them at Pentecost and empowered them to speak to every man in his native tongue. The Holy Spirit empowered them to heal the lame man and to teach and to preach to the people. In the text before us the Holy Spirit empowered them to declare the plan of salvation to the Sadducees. The Holy Spirit empowered them to say, "For we cannot but speak the things which we have seen and heard."

Fear flees when believers speak that which we have seen and heard. Let us be bold. Let us not squelch the Spirit.

The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

Aug. 19, 1863: Union cavalry under Brig. Gen. William Woods Averell destroyed the Confederate saltpeter works near Franklin.

Aug. 19, 1997: Fiddler Curly Ray Cline died. Born in Logan County, Cline was a member of the Lonesome Pine Fiddlers and Ralph Stanley's Clinch Mountain Boys.

Aug. 20, 1851: The oldest statue in West Virginia, a nine-foot wood carving of Patrick Henry, was dedicated at the county courthouse in Morgantown.

Aug. 21, 1861: Confederate troops under Gen. John B. Floyd crossed the Gauley River at Carnifex Ferry, Nicholas County, and began to entrench their position. It was the beginning of what became known as the Battle of Keslers Cross Lanes.

Aug. 22, 1872: Following the Constitutional Convention of 1872, the West Virginia electorate ratified a new state constitution by a vote of 42,344 to 37,777. In the same election, the voters rejected a controversial convention proposition that would have restricted office-holding to whites.

Aug. 23, 1970: The Mormon Church established its first "stake," or congregation, in West Virginia. The stake was organized in Charleston with a membership of nearly 4,000 people.

Aug. 24, 1918: Louis Bennett Jr. died of injuries sustained when his plane was shot down by German anti-aircraft fire. Bennett, with 12 combat kills, was West Virginia's only World War I fighter ace.

August 25, 1903: Soprano Susanne Fisher was born in Sutton.

Fisher was the first West Virginian to sing at the Metropolitan Opera.

Aug. 25, 1921: Miners began to arrive at Blair Mountain near the border of Logan and Boone counties. Sheriff Don Chafin, a hated symbol of anti-unionism in southern West Virginia, met them with a combined force of deputies, mine guards, civilian volunteers, and others.

Aug. 25, 2000: The Robert C. Byrd Green Bank Telescope was dedicated. It is the world's largest fully steerable radio telescope.
