WVDA Helping to Protect Pets like Babydog

Everyone has had the opportunity to get to know West Virginia's unofficial pandemic mascot, Babydog. The one-year-old English bulldog has loaned her cuteness to the Governor as part of his campaign to convince folks to get vaccinated against COVID. This marketing tool works because it pulls at the heart strings of something we are all too familiar with, a beloved animal. From expensive toys to top notch care, most pet owners would do anything for their pet. This includes making sure they get quality nutrition from the food they eat. Ingredients listed on food labels guide us to understand if the pet food we buy is truly good for our animal. We can trust these labels because an entity has verified that these products are telling the whole truth. That trust falls to the West Virginia Department of Agriculture (WVDA) as part of our mission to

protect our furry friends. If a feed company wants to do business in the Mountain State, they must help fund the WVDA's consumer protection initiative. This is important as there are 473 companies selling 10,751 products. That requires a lot of oversight to protect the animals we all care deeply about. The fees these pet manufactures are paying are also helping non-profits and local government control feral populations. Passed in 2017 by the Legislature, an additional fee was added

for 10 years to provide grants for spay and neuter programs. These grants, administered by the Department of Agriculture, have been extremely successful, resulting in nearly 30,000 procedures to help control feral dogs and cats in

West Virginia.

Our laboratories took it one step further during COVID by vigilantly looking for possible spreads of the virus to and from pets. As the public and media outlets tried to understand the potential spread to our pets, our staff conducted several investigations. This required working with local veterinarians as well as humane shelters to treat and verify results of potentially infected animals. The good news is we found no evidence there was spread to animals in West Virginia, but it was part of our mission to assist pandemic response and bring reassurance to the citizens of our state.

The Department also aids local law enforcement with animal welfare by either setting standards for livestock animal care or assisting with sensitive investigations. Even though authority to deal with animal welfare is left to law enforcement, most of the time these local departments do not have the resources to deal with large animal cases. Stretched budgets do not downplay the sensitivity or importance of cases and that is why law enforcement rely on the expertise of agencies such as the WVDA. Regardless of the size or breed of the animal, our staff is always ready to step in when animals are at risk.

West Virginia's pet and livestock owners, including the Governor, want the reassurance that someone is keeping pet food companies honest and our animals safe. We want to know that when we open the can or bag of pet food that our pets are getting all the nutrition claimed on the label. That is where your WVDA comes in. Our staff works endlessly to keep pet owners' minds at ease and our pets safe, regardless of whether it's verifying food labels or stepping in to assist law enforcement. The WVDA is not just about farms and livestock - our mission is to protect all domesticated animals in the Mountain State.

"Lauf" was known for his fiddling and played for dances in the area. Karl and Curtis fiddled some but baseball was their favorite pastime. The entire family was interested in vocal music and all had some talent. The brothers especially enjoyed singing together. young people,

Karl, Curtis and Annie found employment in Charleston. Karl married Margaret Kerr and brought her to Hurricane. Annie came back home and married Dallas Erwin. Curtis married Wilmoth Hanna and returned to the valley. Charles enlisted in the Army, Pete in the Navy and left to see the world.

After World War I, Charles came home and married Annie Coleman. Arnold found his mate in Milton, Marion Smith. Sometime later, Ethel married Nolan Sansom from Huntington.

It is quite remarkable that five of the six with their spouses celebrated wedding golden anniversaries, being the exception.

It is also worth noting that the family lived most of their lives in Hurricane. Charles went west but came back. Arnold served again in World War II, went west and came back. Ethel left the area and learned the bane and blessing of being wife of a

Methodist minister. With little formal education, these fiercely independent people established homes and

raised families. They provided by farming, teaching, carpentry, working on public works, serving journalism, in public office and preaching. The women were adept at conserving and preserving, painting, gardening - flowers and food, sewing and homemaking. They produced a total of 22 children.

Of the 22, 19 graduated from Hurricane High School. The other three finished high school in other states. Several of these have pursued higher education. Not a doctor or lawyer among the clan, but this generation, mostly retired now, has made a difference in their communities. These cousins, their spouses and families are scattered all over but still in touch and each working toward his own goal. The family is well represented in government, churches. fraternal, educational and social organizations. Most of the cousins have those very special gifts, grandchildren, even more widely scattered but each

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

Esther Goes Before the King Esther 4:6 - 5:2

"So Hatach went forth to Mordecai . . . " (v. 6). Hatach was a servant assigned to attend to whatever commands that Esther, queen and wife of Ahasuerus, might make. Esther had dispatched Hatach to Mordecai to find out why he had refused a change of clothing which Esther had sent to him. Esther had learned from others that Mordecai, her uncle, was wearing sackcloth and ashes but did not know for what reason. She, as queen, lived in isolation from the general populace of which Mordecai was a member.

Mordecai told Hatach all that had happened. He told him all that is recorded in the third chapter of Esther. He told Hatach that he had refused to bow before Haman and to give him reverence. Bowing entailed giving homage as one would give homage to a divine being.

Haman had been appointed to oversee all of the other princes (3:1). Mordecai, in refusing to bow to Haman, refused to honor any man as one would honor the Lord God.

Mordecai told Hatach that Haman sought to destroy all Jews throughout the empire because they, like Mordecai, refused to bow to as had been decreed that they should. Mordecai told Hatach that Haman promised to deliver ten thousand talents of silver to the king's treasuries upon destroying the Jews (ch. 3:9-12).

It was Haman's plan to seize all the property which the dead Jews had possessed. He would deliver ten thousand talents of silver to the treasury and keep the remainder plunder for services rendered.

He told Hatach the date on which the Jews were to be killed and he provided him a copy of the king's decree to present to Esther. It is of note that Haman had astrologers and magicians cast lots to determine the day of the year in which he should bring destruction to Israel (3:7). The date, eleven months to the future, was provided by God (see Prov. 16:33). It provided time for Mordecai and all Jews to take counter-measures.

Mordecai instructed Hatach to tell Esther to present herself before the king and make supplication and to request that her people (the

Before this time, Esther had concealed the fact from all in the king's court that she was a Jew. Prior to this time, Mordecai had instructed her not to reveal her Jewish lineage. She was to reveal that she was a Jew and subject to the king's decree.

Hatach told Esther all that Mordecai had said. Esther hesitated to do as Mordecai had asked because she feared for her life. To bring a request before the king, she would have to enter into the inner court. Anyone entering the inner court who had not been summoned was subject to death. All coming, not being summoned, would be executed unless the king would "hold out the golden scepter, that he might live" (v. 11). Esther was hesitant. She knew the king. She knew that he was unpredictable. She knew that Ahasuerus had deposed the queen before her (Vashti) because she did not please him. Hatach relayed Esther's words to Mordecai.

Mordecai's answer is recorded in verses 13 and 14. Mordecai told Esther that being part of the king's house did not change the fact that she was a Jew. To Mordecai and other Jews, being a Jew meant being chosen for God's purposes. He argued that she, like all other Jews, shared the same fate. Mordecai stated that if Esther were not to step forward that God would provide a different means to deliver His people and, Esther and her father's would be destroyed for her

failure to act. His final argument is phrased as a question: Who knows that it was not for this very purpose that she (Esather) was made queen that she might intercede for her people?

Esther's answer was ". . . so will I go in unto the king, which is not according to the law" (v. 16). Esther asked that Mordecai have all Jews in Shushan fast for her for three days. She, too, would fast. Then, she would go to the king in the inner chamber. If she would

perish, she would perish believing that God would save her people. Mordecai did as Esther had said and on the third day, she went before the king. The king saw her and reached out to her with the

golden scepter. From that which followed, all believers know that Esther was made queen such that the Jews might not perish. The promised Messiah, a Jew born of the lineage of David, would not come until more than four hundred years after Esther was queen, but God used her because she let Him use her. New Testament

believers know that God is true to His promises. We know that God will use those who seek His will. Might we have ears to hear when His Spirit speaks. Might we let

His will be done in us.

There, he found joy in serving as an usher and assistant basketball coach for the Upward Basketball youth program. It was during this time that the YMCA became an essential outlet for physical fitness. He found a new passion for aquatics, and could seen almost daily swimming laps in the pool. He shared this same sentiment for the beach. Our family holds many fond memories of annual vacations during which he would most often be seen boogie boarding, jumping waves, swimming the shoreline, building sandcastles with his nieces and nephew, and playing beach games such as skipping mega ball with his dad.

In more recent years, Martin was treasured in his role as uncle, where seldom seen glimpses of his previous personality would pierce through the devastating effects of his mental illness. He was always welcomed with much enthusiasm during visits with his nieces and nephew, because he would happily spend hours coloring, playing hide and go seek, making crafts, playing video games, and participating in a variety of sports. It was this patience and attention to their whims and wishes that gained him the title of Funcle (fun uncle) Martin.

Our family would like to extend our sincere appreciation to owner, Greg Darby, and the employees of Little General, where Martin was employed. Fresh Produce, And More, at Gritt's Farm

numbers from every state and many countries are drawn to Gritt's Farm in Buffalo.

The farm, now in its fourth generation of Gritt family management, has expanded from basic agriculture to a variety of related interests for all ages.

"We want to be a fourseason operation with things happening all the time," Alexandria Pfost (pronounced POST) told Putnam Rotarians at a recent meeting.

A recent graduate in business & marketing at Marshall University, Pfost serves as "agritourism" manager for the Gritt operation, called by some in her Rotary audience as Putnam's "Disney World" of farming.

Gritt's Farm reaches out to the community with a variety of markets, gardening workshops, and a "fun farm" with some thirty attractions.

The fun farm includes corn mazes, wagon rides, and pumpkin bowling. The farm has been opening one or two new attractions every year.

"Yesterday morning, we went to the Sissonville Academy," Pfost said. "We had about six groups of kids for thirty minutes about growing vegetables with hydroponics.

"We gave them a few vegetables to take home. We try to get them to try something new. Like kale. Many elementary schoolers have never tried kale before.

"The Capitol Market in downtown Charleston is a permanent market location that we have every spring to fall," said Pfost,:but we have mobile markets too. Some are on a regular schedule and some are more pop up style. " O n Saturday

mornings during the summer we usually set up at the Bridge Cafe & Bistro in Hurricane, and we usually have a location in St. Albans as "We're looking this

summer to add more mobile markets. Usually in parking lots. They are unannounced. We go door to door. Some businesses invite us in. "They want to know

when the 'Strawberry Lady' will be around. If you have a business that Buffalo Alumni would like for us to pop up on any given day, then let us know."

The farm-to-table dinners in the farm pavilion are usually sold out far ahead of the event. The next dinner is planned for Saturday, July 31st.

'We work with a head chef, Jeffrey Lyons, from Coco's in downtown 25070. Charleston," Pfost

Visitors in growing explained. "We send him a list of the fresh produce that we're going to have in season, and he dreams up great menus.

"It's a great opportunity for people to eat a fresh meal, and they know where they're getting it from. But also the there's the atmosphere of being on a farm in a place where they have an outdoor pavilion.

"If it's cool or raining, we have it in a greenhouse."

A growing favorite for Gritt's Farm fans is the Gourmet CSA program, or Community Supported Agriculture.

CSA customers sign

up for preferences, and customized boxes are prepared each week based on the current harvest. Subscribers may edit

box contents each week before pickup day. This cuts waste and makes and draws visitors in with meals easier to plan. farm-to-table dinners Extra items added mean (about six each year), fewer trips to the grocery "It's a way for people

to get fresh local produce delivered right to them or at one of our pickup zip lines, apple cannons locations that we have throughout the Kanawha Valley," said Pfost. "Our team spends a couple of days a week putting together orders for fresh produce in season.

"We try to take care of what people get, based on their preferences, and it's each. We talked to them somewhat randomized as well. It depends on what we've got on the farm. And we work with other local farms and businesses to provide things like mushrooms, honey, eggs -- things we don't have at Gritt's," she

> added. "We're coffee fans, too," she said. "So we reached out to the Coal River Coffee Company in St. Albans. And now we sell Bob's Breakfast Brew at Gritt's Farm.

> "We planted Christmas trees this year at Gritt's Farm. In five to seven years, you will be able to cut-your-own Christmas tree at the farm. "But in the next year

or two, we will try to present Christmas events -- kiddie rides, hot chocolate, maybe even Santa." Gritt's Farm now keeps
