Putnam Grand Jury Returns 53 Indictments

Putnam County Prosecuting Attorney, Mark A. Sorsaia, reports that fifty-three indictments were returned by the July 2021 Term Putnam County Grand Jury alleging fifty-nine persons committed one hundred thirty felonies and sixty-five misdemeanors.

Drivers and pedestrians passing by the Hurricane reservoir on Teays Valley Road have been treated to an unexpected sight - people traveling across the water on paddle boards. Appalachian Boarding Company and the City of Hurricane have teamed up to offer this exciting new activity at the reservoir throughout the

summer.

Evan Young is the owner and founder of Appalachian Boarding Company. He first discovered paddleboarding while on vacation in Puerto Rico. He says that he was proposing to his wife at sunset one night, and then discovered paddleboarding the next day. "It was kind of like my first love and my second love," he says.

Young wanted to try paddleboarding on the rivers in West Virginia. However, he discovered that there was no place to rent paddle boards in the Huntington/Charleston area. He believes it was possible to rent them at Fayetteville and the Summersville Lake, but that was an almost two hour drive away.

"Since I couldn't rent one, I decided to buy one from a sporting goods

store and teach myself, and I have been paddling ever since," he says.

Young's wife, Brooke, also became involved in paddleboarding and is now a certified instructor as well. They have four daughters, ages 2 through 10, and all of them paddleboard. "The youngest learned to stand up paddle before her second birthday," he says proudly.

WVU President Responds to Putnam County Commission Resolution

At its July 13 meeting the Putnam County Commission unanimously approved a resolution to deny public funding to the teaching of Critical

Race Theory.

Critical Race Theory teaching is not currently part of any curriculum funded by the Commission but it is possible that it could become a future focus of the Putnam County 4-H

program. The Putnam County 4-H program is administered by West Virginia University. WVU recently established the School of Social Work and Anti-Racism which has a priority of sharing curriculum resources to promote the teaching of anti-racism, white privilege, white supremacy, equality and justice reform - the very elements of Critical Race Theory.

The purpose of the resolution was to put WVU on notice that future funding of the

WVU Extension Service would be at risk if CTR were to be taught.

News of the Commission's resolution prompted WVU President Gordon Gee to meet with Commissioners Ron Foster and Andy Skidmore on Wednesday, July 14. According to media reports, Gee told Foster and Skidmore that the university does not teach any doctrine or adopt any doctrine. Gee said that Critical Race Theory is not taught in WVU extension programs.

Blasting to Cause Daily I-64 Roadblocks

The West Virginia Department of Highways announced Friday, July 16, that eastbound motorists on I-64 can expect to see rolling roadblocks between mile posts 40 and 47.2 for blasting associated with the rebuilding of the St. Albans interchange. Blasting is scheduled one blast per day between noon and 2 p.m., Monday through Friday until the end of August.

Trucks will also be crossing the St. Albans

entrance and exit ramps from time to time during construction. Flaggers will be used to direct traffic.

Contractors set off the first explosive blast on Tuesday, July 20. Jason Hamilton, District 1 Area Engineer for Construction, said Tuesday's blast was to loosen up rock and dirt for a new road contour on the St. Albans exit ramp that ties in with WV 817. The blast went off without a hitch at 12:29 p.m.

Contractors closed St. Albans and Nitro interstate ramps for a few minutes before and after the blast for safety. West Virginia State Police, Putnam County sheriff's deputies and Nitro city police also instituted rolling roadblocks on the interstate.

In a rolling roadblock, law enforcement drives in front of traffic and slows the traffic stream down until safely past the construction work.

WVDA Helping to Protect Pets like Babydog

Everyone has had the opportunity to get to know West Virginia's unofficial pandemic mascot, Babydog. The one-year-old English bulldog has loaned her cuteness to the Governor as part of his campaign to convince folks to get vaccinated against COVID. This marketing tool works because it pulls at the heart strings of something we are all too familiar with, a beloved animal. From expensive toys to top notch care, most pet owners would do anything for their pet. This includes making sure they get quality nutrition from the food they eat. Ingredients listed on food labels guide us to understand if the pet food we buy is truly good for our animal. We can trust these labels because an entity has verified that these products are telling the whole truth. That trust falls to the West Virginia Department of Agriculture (WVDA) as part of our mission to protect our furry friends.

If a feed company wants to do business in the Mountain State, they must help fund the WVDA's consumer protection initiative. This is important as there are 473 companies selling 10,751 products. That requires a lot of oversight to protect the animals we all care deeply about. The fees these pet manufactures are paying are also helping non-profits and local government control feral populations. Passed in 2017 by the Legislature, an additional fee was added

for 10 years to provide grants for spay and neuter programs. These grants, administered by the Department of Agriculture, have been extremely successful, resulting in nearly 30,000 procedures to help control feral dogs and cats in West Virginia.

Our laboratories took it one step further during COVID by vigilantly looking for possible spreads of the virus to and from pets. As the public and media outlets tried to understand the potential spread to our pets, our staff conducted several investigations. This required working with local veterinarians as well as humane shelters to treat and verify results of potentially infected animals. The good news is we found no evidence there was spread to animals in West Virginia, but it was part of our mission to assist pandemic response and bring reassurance to the citizens of our state.

The Department also aids local law enforcement with animal welfare by either setting standards for livestock animal care or assisting with sensitive investigations. Even though authority to deal with animal welfare is left to law enforcement, most of the time these local departments do not have the resources to deal with large animal cases. Stretched budgets do not downplay the sensitivity or importance of cases and that is why law enforcement rely on the expertise of agencies such as the WVDA. Regardless of the size or breed of the animal, our staff is always ready to step in when animals are at risk.

West Virginia's pet and livestock owners, including the Governor, want the reassurance that someone is keeping pet food companies honest and our animals safe. We want to know that when we open the can or bag of pet food that our pets are getting all the nutrition claimed on the label. That is where your WVDA comes in. Our staff works endlessly to keep pet owners' minds at ease and our pets safe, regardless of whether it's verifying food labels or stepping in to assist law enforcement. The WVDA is not just about farms and livestock - our mission is to protect all domesticated animals in the Mountain State.

Travis R. Wilson (1975) of 247 Mt. Vernon Road, Hurricane - wanton endangerment and malicious wounding

Brittany S. Workman (1987) of 227 Harper Ridge Road, Liberty - fraudulent use of an unauthorized access device (11) and grand larceny

Further, pursuant to Rule 3.6(b)(6) of the West Virginia Rules of Professional Conduct governing attorneys, the fact that a defendant has been charged with a crime, is merely an accusation, and that the defendant is presumed innocent until and unless proven guilty.

"Lauf" was known for his fiddling and played for dances in the area. Karl and Curtis fiddled some but baseball was their favorite pastime. The entire family was interested in vocal music and all had some talent. The brothers especially enjoyed singing together.

As young people, Karl, Curtis and Annie found employment in Charleston. Karl married Margaret Kerr and brought her to Hurricane. Annie came back home and married Dallas Erwin. Curtis married Wilmoth Hanna and returned to the valley. Charles enlisted in the Army, Pete in the Navy and left to see the world.

After World War I, Charles came home and married Annie Coleman. Arnold found his mate in Milton, Marion Smith. Sometime later, Ethel married Nolan Sansom from Huntington.

It is quite remarkable that five of the six with their spouses celebrated golden wedding anniversaries, Arnold being the exception.

It is also worth noting that the family lived most of their lives in Hurricane. Charles went west but came back. Arnold served again in World War II, went west and came back. Ethel left the area and learned the bane and blessing of being wife of a Methodist minister.

With little formal education, these fiercely independent people established homes and

raised families. They provided by farming, carpentry, teaching, working on public works, journalism, serving in public office and preaching. The women were adept at conserving and preserving, painting, gardening - flowers and food, sewing and home-making. They produced a total of 22 children.

Of the 22, 19 graduated from Hurricane High School. The other three finished high school in other states. Several of these have pursued higher education. Not a doctor or lawyer among the clan, but this generation, mostly retired now, has made a difference in their communities. These cousins, their spouses and families are scattered all over but still in touch and each working toward his own goal. The family is well represented in churches, government, fraternal, educational and social organizations. Most of the cousins have those very special gifts, grandchildren, even more widely scattered but each one quite special.

One cousin served two terms as Mayor of Hurricane. His cousins are proud of that fact but prouder still that there are still enough Rumbaugh's around to make a difference.

Paddleboarding Comes to the City of Hurricane Reservoir

Young formed the Appalachian Boarding Company in 2016. At first, he taught paddleboarding lessons in Tornado, because of ease of access to the Coal River from Meadowood Lake. Beginners could learn on the lake, and then later graduate to the Coal River.

Later, the Appalachian Boarding Company started hosting lessons at the Tri-County YMCA in Scott Depot. Occasionally, they would use the Raymond City boat ramp or the Buffalo boat ramp.

When the City of Winfield and the DNR put in the new boat ramp in Winfield, Young was exhilarated. While Buffalo and Poca are both good locations, the river at Buffalo has more current, and the smokestacks at John Amos make some people nervous. According to Young, paddling in Winfield is like paddling on a lake, because it is above the locks and dam, and the river current is very slow there. Also,

this location provides great visibility, with many locations where spectators can watch the paddleboarders.

Appalachian Boarding Company has brought paddleboarding to yet another location in Putnam County: the Hurricane reservoir. Young says that he had considered the reservoir when he started paddleboarding, but he thought the water was too shallow and no one would let him paddle there. While running a 5K on Meeks Mountain Trails, he happened to meet Mayor Scott Edwards. He had met the mayor before at social events, and at a business expo in Huntington, Edwards won a prize for a free paddleboarding lesson.

Edwards jokingly asked Young why he was at the 5K, because there was no water. Then the mayor told him that he wanted to host paddleboarding events at the Hurricane reservoir, but only under the supervision of the Appalachian

Boarding Company. Young discovered that the reservoir ranges anywhere from 3.5 to 6 feet in most areas, which is deep enough, especially considering that it is possible to paddleboard at the YMCA's indoor swimming pool.

Lessons at the Hurricane reservoir started on July 6, and will be held every Tuesday until August 3. All ages and skill levels are welcome. The first session is from 5 to 6:30 p.m., and the second session is from 7 to 8:30 p.m. A single session costs \$25, while both sessions are \$35.

Appalachian Boarding Company will also be holding sessions on select Sundays - July 25, August 1, August 15, and August 29. The first session will be from 1 to 3 p.m. at the Hurricane reservoir, while the second session will be held from 4 to 6 p.m. at the Winfield boat ramp.

Appalachian Boarding provides paddle boards and life vests for participants. They also offer a tandem paddle

board that can hold two paddlers up to 460 pounds.

Young says that he likes paddleboarding because it is fun and easy on the body, providing a low impact workout. It also gets a person ready for surfing as well. "The board skills you need to surf you can learn on flat water on a paddle board and you can take that knowledge to learn how to surf," he says.

Although the best place to surf is at the ocean, Young says that it is possible to surf boat waves on the Kanawha River, or paddleboard during high winds and let the wind push you along, although these particular conditions are not common on the river. He has tried surfing the waves at the Wave Pool, and while it was fun and challenging, it was not an accurate simulation of real ocean surfing.

"Paddle boarding can be as much thrill as you want it to be, based on what you want to do," he says. "Like if you want

to chill out and float or go really fast, you really have options."

Paddleboarding also provides views which cannot be seen from the roads. "People don't realize how long the Hurricane reservoir is," Young says. "You can see more wild life and greenery, and you don't hear the road noises."

Young says that he would like to see Putnam County becoming the leader of paddleboarding activities in West Virginia. The sport has grown in popularity around the state, and Young would like to see the establishment of racing teams, especially among local youth.

The Appalachian Boarding Company has established a paddleboarding club at Teays Valley Christian School. "We wanted to give the kids another option for a healthy after school activity, especially if they don't play other sports," says Young. He attended Teays Valley Christian, graduating in

2002, so the school means a lot to him. He says some of the kids who learned how to paddleboard are now racing paddle boards and kayaks at a beginner level.

"I would let people know that any age is a good age to paddleboard or do any athletic ability," Young says. "We really have everyone from age 4 to 94 come out and paddleboard. It is our favorite thing to do as a family."

Young would like to express his gratitude to Mayor Scott Edwards of Hurricane and Mayor Randy Barrett of Winfield for supporting the Appalachian Boarding Company.

 July 29, 1918: Novelist Mary Lee Settle was born in Charleston. Her

literary reputation rests on the "Beulah Quintet," a sequence of five historical novels spanning four centuries.
 July 30, 1973: The Frederick Hotel in downtown Huntington closed to transient trade. After it was built in 1905, it was touted as the most elegant hotel between Pittsburgh and Cincinnati.
 July 31, 1932: Actor Theodore Crawford "Ted" Cassidy was born in Pittsburgh but was raised in Philippi. He was best known for his role as Lurch on "The Addams Family."
 Aug. 1, 1921: Baldwin-Felts detectives shot and killed Sid Hatfield and

Blasting to Cause Daily I-64 Roadblocks

 Hamilton said the rolling roadblocks began at Cross Lanes for westbound traffic and at Scott Depot for traffic heading east. Rolling roadblocks kept contractors from having to close the interstate completely during the blast.
 "Traffic was affected very little," Hamilton said.
 Between the first ramp closures and the time the ramps reopened and rolling roadblocks stopped after the blast was about 12 minutes, Hamilton said.
 The construction is part of the \$224 million widening project on Interstate 64 between Nitro and the US 35 interchange at Scott Depot. The project

includes a new Nitro-St. Albans Bridge to serve westbound traffic.
 "We're updating and upgrading our facilities to reduce traffic congestion and to increase safety on this very busy section of Interstate 64," said DOH Deputy State Highway Engineer Ryland Musick. The bridge and widening project is part of a larger series of road projects under Gov. Jim Justice's Roads to Prosperity highway program to improve traffic flow on Interstate 64 between Charleston and Huntington.
 Work on the bridges and widening project is expected to be complete in October 2023. The project is part of a much larger Interstate 64 improvement project funded through Roads to Prosperity.

A \$61.6 million project to completely reconstruct Interstate 64 between Milton and the US 35 interchange was finished in November 2018.
 Another piece of the total picture, the upgrading Interstate 64 to six lanes between the Barboursville exit and the 29th Street exit, is scheduled for completion in August 2024. This \$103.8 million project also includes replacing several bridges.
 "We're continuing the widening on I-64 through the Huntington area to reduce congestion and improve safety," Musick said.
 The West Virginia DOH reminds the public of the importance of keeping everyone safe in work zones by keeping "Heads up; phones down!"

Esther Goes Before the King

Esther 4:6 - 5:2

"So Hatach went forth to Mordecai . . ." (v. 6). Hatach was a servant assigned to attend to whatever commands that Esther, queen and wife of Ahasuerus, might make. Esther had dispatched Hatach to Mordecai to find out why he had refused a change of clothing which Esther had sent to him. Esther had learned from others that Mordecai, her uncle, was wearing sackcloth and ashes but did not know for what reason. She, as queen, lived in isolation from the general populace of which Mordecai was a member.

Mordecai told Hatach all that had happened. He told him all that is recorded in the third chapter of Esther. He told Hatach that he had refused to bow before Haman and to give him reverence. Bowing entailed giving homage as one would give homage to a divine being.

Haman had been appointed to oversee all of the other princes (3:1). Mordecai, in refusing to bow to Haman, refused to honor any man as one would honor the Lord God.

Mordecai told Hatach that Haman sought to destroy all Jews throughout the empire because they, like Mordecai, refused to bow to as had been decreed that they should. Mordecai told Hatach that Haman promised to deliver ten thousand talents of silver to the king's treasuries upon destroying the Jews (ch. 3:9-12).

It was Haman's plan to seize all the property which the dead Jews had possessed. He would deliver ten thousand talents of silver to the treasury and keep the remainder plunder for services rendered.

He told Hatach the date on which the Jews were to be killed and he provided him a copy of the king's decree to present to Esther. It is of note that Haman had astrologers and magicians cast lots to determine the day of the year in which he should bring destruction to Israel (3:7). The date, eleven months to the future, was provided by God (see Prov. 16:33). It provided time for Mordecai and all Jews to take counter-measures.

Mordecai instructed Hatach to tell Esther to present herself before the king and make supplication and to request that her people (the Jews) be spared.

Before this time, Esther had concealed the fact from all in the king's court that she was a Jew. Prior to this time, Mordecai had instructed her not to reveal her Jewish lineage. She was to reveal that she was a Jew and subject to the king's decree.

Hatach told Esther all that Mordecai had said. Esther hesitated to do as Mordecai had asked because she feared for her life. To bring a request before the king, she would have to enter into the inner court. Anyone entering the inner court who had not been summoned was subject to death. All coming, not being summoned, would be executed unless the king would "hold out the golden scepter, that he might live" (v. 11). Esther was hesitant. She knew the king. She knew that he was unpredictable. She knew that Ahasuerus had deposed the queen before her (Vashti) because she did not please him. Hatach relayed Esther's words to Mordecai.

Mordecai's answer is recorded in verses 13 and 14. Mordecai told Esther that being part of the king's house did not change the fact that she was a Jew. To Mordecai and other Jews, being a Jew meant being chosen for God's purposes. He argued that she, like all other Jews, shared the same fate. Mordecai stated that if Esther were not to step forward that God would provide a different means to deliver His people and, Esther and her father's would be destroyed for her failure to act.

His final argument is phrased as a question: Who knows that it was not for this very purpose that she (Esther) was made queen that she might intercede for her people?

Esther's answer was ". . . so will I go in unto the king, which is not according to the law" (v. 16). Esther asked that Mordecai have all Jews in Shushan fast for her for three days. She, too, would fast. Then, she would go to the king in the inner chamber. If she would perish, she would perish believing that God would save her people.

Mordecai did as Esther had said and on the third day, she went before the king. The king saw her and reached out to her with the golden scepter. From that which followed, all believers know that Esther was made queen such that the Jews might not perish.

The promised Messiah, a Jew born of the lineage of David, would not come until more than four hundred years after Esther was queen, but God used her because she let Him use her. New Testament believers know that God is true to His promises. We know that God will use those who seek His will.

Might we have ears to hear when His Spirit speaks. Might we let His will be done in us.

MARTIN ARTHUR PAYNE

I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing. (2 Timothy 4: 7-8)

Martin Arthur Payne, 38, of Hurricane, entered into eternal rest on Monday, July 12, 2021 while enjoying his passion for swimming. Although he was an experienced swimmer, he fell victim to a phenomenon called shallow water blackout which tragically and quickly led to unintentional drowning. We encourage each of you to visit www.shallowwaterblackoutprevention.org to educate yourself and your loved ones, as this can affect even the most advanced swimmers.

Born July 11, 1983, Martin was cherished for his vivacious, funny, and cheerful personality. This spunk attracted many friends, and teachers and coaches often commented that he was a pleasure to instruct. His parents echo that same sentiment; he was a delight to raise in his early years. Additionally, Martin was a very bright student, earning accolades in county and regional Math Field Day contests and participating in the local gifted art program. As a child, he had a variety of athletic interests, notably Taekwondo, basketball, and golf. Though Martin was initially placed into karate at an early age to increase his physical strength and toughness given his small size, he also gained a strong sense of discipline that he would carry with him throughout the remainder of his life.

He quickly progressed through the belt levels, ultimately attaining a brown belt status. During this period, he won the 1990 8 and Under State Championship in kumite, the trophy from which was taller than he. In elementary school, Martin was selected by Coach Greg White to participate in the basketball handling talent group known as White's Wizards; one of the highlights of this experience was performing during half time at the annual Marshall vs WVU basketball game at the Charleston Civic Center. He spent many summers thereafter playing in AAU and YBOA basketball tournaments. In total, he was on three state championship teams, the latter of which his dad coached. On the golf course, Martin participated in the Top Flight Junior Tour series. One of his greatest golf accomplishments was winning the West Virginia Golf Association's Junior Amateur 12 and Under State Championship at the age of 11 in a playoff at Glade Springs. What takes many golfers a lifetime to achieve, he had the remarkable feat of scoring not one but two hole-in-ones, the first of which was witnessed by his parents.

Martin was a graduate of Hurricane High School (Class of 2002), where he was remembered by his classmates and teachers as being a friend to all with a kind and gentle heart. In addition to lettering in 4 sports—basketball, golf, soccer, and cross country, Martin continued his academic legacy during secondary school. He was inducted into Mu Alpha Theta, and received a Promise Scholarship. He also participated in many extracurricular clubs, including Key Club and Teenage Republicans. All of these achievements helped to earn him nominations for the Most Valuable Redskin award as well as the Wendy's High School Heisman award for student-athletes.

Martin's life path that had seemed so promising was abruptly altered during his late teenage years, when he was diagnosed with schizoaffective disorder (a combination of schizophrenia and bipolar disorder). Between the progression of the disease itself and the medicines required to control it, there was a vast change in his personality, intellect, and physical abilities. Independent living and many other life goals became unattainable, and family support became essential to his stability. As a family, we grieved the cruel tragedy that he had lost his then-life to this devastating mental illness, and much of his life thereafter was defined by the quiet suffering from its unending grip and persistent ups and downs.

But, there was light in the darkness. In his young 20s, Martin accepted Jesus Christ as his Savior and became a member of First Baptist Church of Hurricane. There, he found joy in serving as an usher and assistant basketball coach for the Upward Basketball youth program. It was during this time that the YMCA became an essential outlet for physical fitness. He found a new passion for aquatics, and could be seen almost daily swimming laps in the pool. He shared this same sentiment for the beach. Our family holds many fond memories of annual vacations during which he would most often be seen boogie boarding, jumping waves, swimming the shoreline, building sandcastles with his nieces and nephew, and playing beach games such as skipping mega ball with his dad.

In more recent years, Martin was treasured in his role as uncle, where seldom seen glimpses of his previous personality would pierce through the devastating effects of his mental illness. He was always welcomed with much enthusiasm during visits with his nieces and nephew, because he would happily spend hours coloring, playing hide and go seek, making crafts, playing video games, and participating in a variety of sports. It was this patience and attention to their whims and wishes that gained him the title of Funcler (fun uncle) Martin.

Our family would like to extend our sincere appreciation to owner, Greg Darby, and the employees of Little General, where Martin was employed. Their dedication to providing him with meaningful employment and steadfast acceptance of his limitations provided him (and us) with a valuable sense of respect and dignity. We would also like to thank Doctors Fink, Stephen Durrenberger (who developed the medicine combination

that provided him with the most stability), and John Hutton for the compassionate care, expertise, and guidance they provided, which allowed Martin the best quality of life possible.

Martin was preceded in death by his grandparents, Ruth and Harold Vessey and Catherine and Raymond Payne; aunt, Joyce Vessey Swanson; and uncles, Terrance Lively, Sr. and Charles Harrison.

Those left to cherish and honor his memory include his parents, Phyllis and Harold; sister, Grace (Justin) Dixon; nieces and nephew, Mary Payne, Blythe, and Hayden; aunts and uncles, Adele (Charles Jaeger III) Vessey, Nancy Lively, Calvin Swanson, and Cathy (Stephen) Fox; cousins, Pedro (Stacie) Dejneka, Brandon (Alicia) Vessey, Terrance Lively, Jr., Charlotte (Chris) Renner, Julie (Jonathan) Hiatt, Stephanie (Michael) Page, and many extended family members.

Martin's final act which embodied his belief in eternal life was the gift of organ and tissue donation. He will also contribute to the body of science regarding schizophrenia and other similar mental illnesses through a posthumous study with the Center for Organ Recovery & Education at the University of Pittsburgh.

A memorial service was held on Tuesday, July 20, at First Baptist Church of Hurricane.

Fresh Produce, And More, at Gritt's Farm



"I was there in April and filled up my car with bedding plants and hanging baskets. My flower garden in Raleigh, NC was beautiful." -- Susan Davis Jeffreys

Visitors in growing numbers from every state and many countries are drawn to Gritt's Farm in Buffalo.

The farm, now in its fourth generation of Gritt family management, has expanded from basic agriculture to a variety of related interests for all ages.

"We want to be a four-season operation with things happening all the time," Alexandria Pfof (pronounced POST) told Putnam Rotarians at a recent meeting.

A recent graduate in business & marketing at Marshall University, Pfof serves as "agritourism" manager for the Gritt operation, called by some in her Rotary audience as Putnam's "Disney World" of farming.

Gritt's Farm reaches out to the community with a variety of markets, and draws visitors in with farm-to-table dinners (about six each year), gardening workshops, and a "fun farm" with some thirty attractions.

The fun farm includes corn mazes, wagon rides, zip lines, apple cannons and pumpkin bowling. The farm has been opening one or two new attractions every year.

"Yesterday morning, we went to the Sissonville Academy," Pfof said. "We had about six groups of kids for thirty minutes each. We talked to them about growing vegetables with hydroponics.

"We gave them a few vegetables to take home. We try to get them to try something new. Like kale. Many elementary schoolers have never tried kale before.

"The Capitol Market in downtown Charleston is a permanent market location that we have every spring to fall," said Pfof, "but we have mobile markets too. Some are on a regular schedule and some are more pop up style.

"On Saturday mornings during the summer we usually set up at the Bridge Cafe & Bistro in Hurricane, and we usually have a location in St. Albans as well.

"We're looking this summer to add more mobile markets. Usually in parking lots. They are unannounced. We go door to door. Some businesses invite us in.

"They want to know when the 'Strawberry Lady' will be around. If you have a business that would like for us to pop up on any given day, then let us know."

The farm-to-table dinners in the farm pavilion are usually sold out far ahead of the event. The next dinner is planned for Saturday, July 31st.

"We work with a head chef, Jeffrey Lyons, from Coco's in downtown Charleston," Pfof

explained. "We send him a list of the fresh produce that we're going to have in season, and he dreams up great menus.

"It's a great opportunity for people to eat a fresh meal, and they know where they're getting it from. But also the there's the atmosphere of being on a farm in a place where they have an outdoor pavilion.

"If it's cool or raining, we have it in a greenhouse."

A growing favorite for Gritt's Farm fans is the Gourmet CSA program, or Community Supported Agriculture.

CSA customers sign up for preferences, and customized boxes are prepared each week based on the current harvest.

Subscribers may edit box contents each week before pickup day. This cuts waste and makes meals easier to plan. Extra items added mean fewer trips to the grocery store.

"It's a way for people to get fresh local produce delivered right to them or at one of our pickup locations that we have throughout the Kanawha Valley," said Pfof. "Our team spends a couple of days a week putting together orders for fresh produce in season.

"We try to take care of what people get, based on their preferences, and it's somewhat randomized as well. It depends on what we've got on the farm. And we work with other local farms and businesses to provide things like mushrooms, honey, eggs -- things we don't have at Gritt's," she added.

"We're coffee fans, too," she said. "So we reached out to the Coal River Coffee Company in St. Albans. And now we sell Bob's Breakfast Brew at Gritt's Farm.

"We planted Christmas trees this year at Gritt's Farm. In five to seven years, you will be able to cut-your-own Christmas tree at the farm.

"But in the next year or two, we will try to present Christmas events -- kiddie rides, hot chocolate, maybe even Santa."

Gritt's Farm now keeps 400 acres in cultivation, the site at Buffalo and 100 acres at Leon.
