## Hypocrite's Choice Putnam County Fair in Full Swing

Delegate Joe Jeffries has been caught in the very act of hypocrisy. When he ran for office, he touted family values. His reported behavior at the Capitol in Charleston and on social media are inconsistent with those values.

His accusers include members of both the Republican and Democratic parties and Gov. Justice.

John Findlay, Executive Director of the Republican Party said, "Through his poor judgment and actions, Delegate Jeffries has brought shame to himself, his office, his constituents, and our Party." Findlay stated that West Virginia Republican Party leadership has reached out directly to Delegate Jeffries and demanded that, at the very least, he publicly apologize for his lewd conduct.

Gov. Justice said, "I am calling on Joe to immediately resign from the House of Delegates."


State Minority Leaders, Senator Stephen Baldwin and Delegate Doug Skaff, Jr. said, "It is time for Joe Jeffries to resign, as Governor Justice rightly said."

The Charleston Gazette-Mail in an editorial titled "Joe Jeffries: a hypocrite judged by hypocrites" stated that if Jeffries were to apologize, it should be because he realizes his behavior is inappropriate, unbecoming of a legislator and an embarrassment to himself and the state.

What Jeffries has done he cannot undo. He is guilty of that which he is guilty. An apology does not erase that which is past. Nor would his resignation.

An apology is no more than a statement of regret for one's actions or failures. An apology which is not followed by a change in behavior is meaningless.

Jeffries has a choice. He can rise above his failure to represent the people of the 22nd Delegate District with honor.

Each and every day, the fair offers a plentiful variety of good eats,



CURTIS MELVIN RUMBAUGH Submitted by Laeuna R. Erwin Curtis Melvin Rumbaugh (1892-1970)

married Wilmoth Jane Hanna (1895-1970) in Charleston on October 30, 1916. They continued working in Charleston for a couple of years, then moved to the valley before their first daughter, Laeuna Margaret, was born in August 1918.

The family followed thus: stillborn son in March 1920, Lucy Jane in March 1921, Virginia Ann in August 1924 and Wilmoth Curtis in August 1937.

Wilmoth "Biltz" was kept busy caring for the family. She was

Kimberly W. Riddle has been sworn in as president of Putnam Rotary for the coming year by assistant district governor Cindy Farley and outgoing club president Brandon Porter

"It's been a tough year," Porter told club members. "We've been through a pandemic, and we have changed our meeting schedules.

Porter came into his term as club leader several months early in time to catch the start of the COVID crisis when Jarrod Dean resigned to take a position in another part of the state.

Porter balanced the weekly meetings with roundtable discussion groups. The club met virtually through the Zoom Meeting internet software, and sometimes as a "hybrid" group meeting both in person and by internet simultaneously.

The past year was also the first for a new district organization, pushing the number of local clubs to 55 and 2,000 members across the state.

And the club once again gave scholarship grants to Putnam high school graduates, while working with the Parks Board and AmeriCorps volunteers to develop the Walter Nature Park near Red House.

New president Kim Riddle had taken part in several Rotary projects when she was inducted into the club three years ago, sponsored by Ashley Glance.

She had been active in the community as development director for United Way of Central West Virginia.

The West Virginia Department of Arts, Culture and History (WVDACH) is still seeking entries for its 22nd biennial West Virginia Juried Exhibition. The show will be on display at the Culture Center in Charleston. Since 1979, the exhibition has celebrated the exceptional talents and creativity of Mountain State artists. Submissions for the exhibit in the form of digital images on CD or USB flash drive will be accepted until Monday, Aug. 2, 2021.

Artists may submit two pieces for the exhibition with a limit of three digital images per entry. Entry forms and properly identified images must be accompanied by a non-refundable fee of \$20 per piece. Make check payable to West Virginia Department of Arts, Culture and History. Digital images can be mailed to WVDACH, West Virginia Juried Exhibition (WVJE) 2021, The Culture Center, 1900 Kanawha Blvd., E., Charleston, W.Va. 25305-0300, or hand-delivered to the Culture Center at the State Capitol Complex. An option to email images will be available this year by first contacting Cailin Howe, exhibits coordinator, to ensure your images are submitted properly. Image file sizes must be small enough to be received through email, an entry form must be included, and entry fee will still need to be mailed to the department.

Eligible entries include works created in the past two years in the areas of painting, sculpture, printmaking, drawing, photography, digital art, mixed media and crafts.

Entrants must be over the age of 18 and must be residents of or maintain a permanent residence in West Virginia.

This program is specifically designed for trainees who have a passion for space exploration. Nathaniel spent the week training with a team that flew a simulated space mission to the International Space Station (ISS), the Moon or Mars. The crew participated in experiments and successfully completed an extra-vehicular activity (EVA), or spacewalk. Nathaniel and crew returned to earth in time to graduate with honors.

Space Camp uses astronaut training techniques to engage trainees in real-world applications of STEM

subjects. Students sleep in quarters designed to resemble the ISS and train in simulators like those used by NASA.

Almost one million trainees have graduated from a Space Camp program since its inception in 1982, including European Space Agency astronaut, Samantha Cristoforetti and NASA astronauts

Dottie Metcalf-Lindenburger, Dr. Kate Rubins, Dr. Serena Auñón-Chancellor and Christina Koch, who set the record for the longest duration space flight by a female. Children and teachers from all 50 states and almost 150 international locations have attended a Space Camp program.

conservative of necessity. Often garments were made of feed sacks or from hand-me-downs. She was a nutritionist before we knew what the word meant. Curtis was a good gardener and fruit grower. After all, he had four daughters to pick strawberries and vegetables.

In addition to farming, Curtis worked at various jobs until he went to work at Carbide in 1934. He worked there until his retirement in 1957.

First Baptist Church was an important activity for the Rumbaugh family. At one time Curtis was the custodian. He served several offices in the church, perhaps best remembered as teacher of a Sunday School class for young men. Wilmoth was an active participant in the women's work. That activity is still important to the family, down to great grandchildren. Curtis and Wilmoth spent several winters in Florida after his retirement. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in 1966.

The four daughters graduated from Hurricane High School. They participated in music, drama, speech, school newspaper - you name it. They could always count on parental support.

Laeuna married her neighbor, Wayne Erwin. They lived in McDowell County, Wayne's post as a West Virginia Trooper. After three years in the Navy during WW II, the

family, now with Wayne Jr. and Lucy Joanna, returned to McDowell County. In 1948 Wayne was employed at Carbide so they came back home. He worked there until 1975 then enjoyed his hobbies until his death in 1983.

In 1960 Laeuna began a 24 year career in library work. She is now enjoying her hobbies.

Lucy Jane was teaching school on Big Creek when she met John Settle from Hamlin. They were married in 1943. John's Navy career took him to the South Pacific. Lucy worked at Carbide while John was away. On return, he worked at Viscose.

Their family is: Jane Hanna, John Clayton, Valerie Jean and James Curtis. After raising her family, Lucy completed her degree and resumed teaching until retirement. John retired from Carbide and they now spend their winters in Florida.

Virginia Ann began making music with Jesse Lazear in Hurricane High School Band. They were married in 1946. Jess has served in the Army during WW II so he and "Ginny" both worked at Carbide until their daughters were born. They are Anna Christine, Amy Curtis and Margaret Jane.

Jess' career at Carbide has taken him all over Europe. Ginny's career has kept her making music, beautiful hand work and travelling with Jess. Even in retirement, both are busy with their varied interests.

We had a good day and got home late. The next morning, however, I passed out and went to the ER. Doctors ran tests—I was admitted—was dehydrated. I was given IV fluids throughout the night. I had never been in a hospital overnight since my kids were born which was forty years ago. I was so tired and exhausted, I slept all night! The lesson I learned—don't overdo it! But in reality if I had known the hike was that difficult, I would have stayed home. You must hydrate and drink something other than water, which I did not. Be careful out there, young or older, as anyone could end up in the ER.

## Joint Committee on Redistricting Public Hearing Dates Set

The West Virginia Constitution requires Congressional and Legislative boundary lines to be drawn every 10 years utilizing U.S. Census data to indicate changes in population. Despite Census delays at the federal level, public hearings throughout the state will allow residents to weigh in on the process.

The Legislature's Joint Committee on Redistricting will host 12 in-person public hearings and three virtual public hearings, with each taking place

from 6 to 8 p.m. House Rule 84 governs public hearings and allows the Joint Committee on Redistricting Chairmen to limit the time allowed for public comments at each hearing based on total number of participants. Senate rules govern standing committees and will be followed in the actions and proceedings of this committee as applicable.

A hearing is scheduled for July 27 at the Putnam County Judicial Building in Winfield.

## Morrissey Targets Google in Antitrust Lawsuit

West Virginia Attorney General Patrick Morrissey joined a coalition of 37 attorneys general in filing suit against Google alleging the tech giant engaged in unlawful conduct relating to the Google Play Store for Android mobile devices and Google Billing.

The bipartisan, antitrust lawsuit sets forth allegations of anticompetitive and unfair business practices. It accuses Google of using its dominance to unfairly restrict competition with the Google Play Store. The action harmed consumers by limiting choice and driving up app prices.

to foster innovation and ensure that consumers pay a fair price. Likewise, our nation loses when one company can use unlawful means to monopolize a particular market. We must feverishly oppose such tactics."

The lawsuit centers on Google's alleged exclusionary conduct, which substantially shuts out competing app distribution channels. The attorneys general allege Google unlawfully requires app developers that offer their app through the Google Play Store to use Google Billing as a middleman. Such an arrangement forces app consumers to pay Google's commission – up to 30 percent – on in-app purchases of digital content the consumers create through apps that are distributed via the Google Play Store.

### Nehemiah Combats Derision and Danger

Nehemiah 4:1-9

The text before us is an account told by Nehemiah about the difficulties that he encountered in rebuilding the walls of Jerusalem.

Nehemiah had not been assigned to the position of project manager for rebuilding the walls by anyone. When Nehemiah learned of the condition of the city of Jerusalem and its walls he was distressed and went to the Lord in prayer (Neh. 1:4). Nehemiah prayed to God asking that God would restore the remnant of the children of Israel to Himself and would remember His covenant with Abraham, Isaac and Jacob (Deut. 4:31). Nehemiah asked God to grant him mercy in the sight of Artaxerxes, king of the Persian Empire. God granted Nehemiah's request and Nehemiah was fully convinced that his mission and the restoration of the remnant was in full accord with the will of God.

The favor that Nehemiah requested of the king was that he be given leave to rebuild the walls of Jerusalem and given the resources needed to do the job. The resources that he requested and received included letters of authority bearing the king's seal. When Sanballat (governor of Samaria) learned of Nehemiah's mission, he was distressed that one had come to "seek the welfare of the children of Israel" (ch. 2, v. 10).

Speaking before the army of Samaria, Sanballat mocked Nehemiah. Sanballat suggested that the Jews were foolish because they sought to fortify themselves with burnt stones buried in heaps of rubbish; they sought to offer sacrifices to their God; and they sought to do in a day that which would require months and maybe years. Tobiah the Ammonite joined Sanballat in chorus saying that any wall that the Jews would build would be so weak that a fox brushing against it would cause it to fall.

When Nehemiah learned of their words, he went to the Lord in prayer (v. 4). Nehemiah did not ask the Lord for help in rebuilding the wall. He asked God to bring His wrath upon Sanballat and his allies because they stood in opposition to that which God would have him do — rebuild Jerusalem.

"So built we the wall; and all the wall joined together unto the half thereof: for the people had a mind to work" (v. 6). Building the wall was more than building the wall of a city. It was an expression of a changed heart. They were returning, as a people, to the Lord their God. Their mission was to lift up the Lord God of their fathers. The ridicule of Sanballat and Tobiah would be of no effect.

Sanballat's and Tobiah's words of ridicule were directed at the builders of the wall who were the heirs of Abraham according to the flesh. Their belittlement of the builders was directed at Abraham to whom the Lord said: ". . . I will bless them that bless thee, and curse him that curseth thee" (Gen. 12:3). The words of Sanballat and Tobiah were spoken against the Lord God of all creation.

When Sanballat and his allies heard that the walls were being restored and the gaps were being closed, they were angry and conspired to fight against Jerusalem. This was no small conspiracy. They knew that Nehemiah had come in the full authority of the king of the Persian Empire. Nehemiah had presented them with letters from the king stating that which Nehemiah was to do. While not explicitly stated in scripture, it would seem that Sanballat intended to use small bands of raiders to disrupt the building such that he might portray the attacks as that of renegades.

The alliance against Nehemiah consisted of Sanballat of Samaria (north of Jerusalem), the Arabians (south of Jerusalem), the Ammonites (east of Jerusalem), and Ashdodites (west of Jerusalem). Jerusalem was opposed on every side.

When Nehemiah learned of their conspiracy, he and Jerusalem with him prayed. Nehemiah set a watch against the would be attackers day and night (v. 9). Nehemiah assigned half of his workforce to defensive positions on the wall. Using a divided workforce, he was able to complete the wall in a period of 52 days (see Neh. 6:15).

The building of the wall was accomplished because the hearts of the people were turned to God and they sought to do His will. God strengthened Nehemiah and the remnant in Jerusalem to do the impossible. Nehemiah prayed and the impossible followed.

New Testament believers, likewise, are strengthened to do the impossible by the Lord. Our Lord and Savior has given us the sure promise: "And whatsoever ye shall ask in my name, that will I do, that the Father may be glorified in the Son" (Jn. 14:13). Let us love one another as He loves us.




