

The only paving machine in the state of West Virginia wide enough to pave two lanes at the same time is currently in use on US 35 in Putnam County.

West Virginia Division of Highways' paving contractor, West Virginia Paving, Inc., is using the Roadtec paving machine on 15-mile section of US 35, the last section

of the highway between Interstate 64 and the West Virginia/Ohio state line to be upgraded from two lanes to four lanes.

"Instead of paving a lane that's 12 feet wide, we're paving a lane that's 28 feet wide," said Clif Farley, West Virginia Division of Highways project manager for the US 35 project. "It gets rid of the longitudinal joints."

been in use about two weeks. Construction of the last four-lane section of US 35 is on track to be finished sometime in the fall

Ordinarily when DOH paves or repaves a road, they're restricted to paving a 12-foot lane at a time. Work crews will typically shut down one lane of traffic, pave that lane, then shut down the other lane for paving.

The technique allows paving on roads that have traffic on them. But it also leaves a seam down the

middle of the road where water and salt can collect in winter, freezing and thawing and eventually leading to cracks or potholes.

The contractor's 28foot paving machine is ideal for paving new roads. It doesn't leave a seam, which should add up to longer pavement life in the long run.

"It's pretty cool," The 28-foot paver has Farley said. "I worked in resurfacing in the 1990s, and we were talking about it then, how we'd like to have a machine that could pave two lanes at once."

With work continuing in all 55 counties across the state, the West Division Virginia of Highways and the West Department Virginia Transportation of remind the public of the importance of keeping everyone safe in work zones by keeping "Heads up; phones down!"

On Monday, June 28, Hurricane Fire & Rescue answered a call from the 2600 block of Second Street, less than two blocks distant from the fire station on Main Street.

Three minutes later, the first units arrived on the scene to find a single-wide trailer fully engulfed in flame. The quick response prevented the fire from spreading to neighboring mobile home units.

Battling in severe heat, firefighters were able to bring the blaze under control in approximately 20 minutes. Two of the first responders, suffering from dehydration and heat exposure, were transported to St. Mary's Medical Center in Huntington where they

## **Donors Urgently Needed: Red Cross Still Facing Severe Blood** Shortage

The American Red Cross continues to experience a severe blood shortage that is negatively affecting blood product availability across the country. Donors of all blood types – especially type O – are urged to make an appointment to give now and help ensure hospital shelves are stocked with blood products over the Fourth of July holiday and beyond.

Right now, the Red Cross is working around the clock to provide blood products to hospitals responding to an unusually high number of traumas and emergency room visits, as well as overdoses and resulting transplants. As a result of the blood shortage, some hospitals are being forced to slow the pace of elective surgeries until the blood supply stabilizes, delaying crucial patient care.

In addition, while summer is traditionally a time when blood donations decline, this year is particularly challenging as many Americans receive their vaccinations and resume summer activities after more than a year of limited interactions and travel, leading to lower donor turnout. The need for blood doesn't take a holiday break - patients still depend on lifesaving transfusions.

Donors are needed now to prevent further delays to patient care. Schedule an appointment to give blood now by using the Red Cross Blood Donor App, visiting RedCrossBlood.

1923). They had one son, Gregory Lee (born 1954). In 1978 Gregory Lee married Diane Susan Schmidt (born 1952). They have two sons, Scott Gregory (born 1981) and Eric Lee (born 1983).

Gregory Nye attended local schools and at the age of seventeen enrolled in the Morris Telegraphy School of Indiana. Valparaiso, Upon graduation, he returned to West Virginia and went to work for  $\mathbf{the}$ Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad. Many of his forty-five years of service to that company were spent on the Guyan Valley line.

At the age of thirtythree, George Nye was ordained as a United Baptist minister. He was involved in evangelistic work throughout the region; at one point conducting services every night for six months while retaining secular employment. He also held pastorates in Cabell County.

In 1941, George Nye returned to Hurricane




### Just Not "Feeling It" By Velma Kitchens of Culloden

- 2 tablespoons sugar

Lemon Filling:

1/2 cup lemon curd

1/2 cup blueberries, raspberries or combination

powdered sugar, for dusting (optional)

To make mini pecan crusts: Preheat oven to 350 F. Line mini muffin tin with paper liners or spray with nonstick cooking spray.

In food processor, blend pecan pieces, butter and sugar until mixture forms coarse dough.

Scoop about 2 teaspoons pecan mixture in each muffin tin. Use back of wooden spoon or fingers to press mixture evenly along bottom and up sides of each muffin cup.

Bake 12 minutes, or until crusts are golden brown. Allow crusts to cool completely before removing from pan.

To assemble crusts: Spoon 1 teaspoon lemon curd into each mini pecan crust. Top with one raspberry or three small blueberries. Dust with powdered sugar, if desired.

The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www. wvencyclopedia.org.

July 1, 1861: Francis Pierpont, governor of the Reorganized Government of Virginia, called the legislature into session. The general assembly reestablished governmental functions, provided for the raising of military units, and elected new U.S. senators and representatives.

July 1, 1937: Watoga State Park was opened to the public. The park in Pocahontas County is the largest of the state parks and among the oldest.

July 1971: 1. Southern West Virginia Community College was formed by joining the University Marshall branch campuses at Logan and Williamson. In 1995, the name changed Southern West to Virginia Community and Technical College.

July 2, 1829: Potter and Mountain

businessman Alexander Polk Donaghho was born. He began a pottery operation in Parkersburg, creating hand-thrown, salt-glazed crocks, jars and other pottery that are avidly collected today.

July 3, 1863: At Gettysburg, Union troopers in the 1st West Virginia Cavalry took part in a fruitless cavalry charge against Confederate infantrymen during the waning moments of that great battle.

July 4, 1882: The steamboats Scioto and John Lomas collided on the Ohio River as they were returning from holiday excursions. The Scioto sank almost instantly, and 70 people drowned.

July 4, 1918: Poet Muriel Miller Dressler was born in Kanawha County. Her poem "Appalachia," published in 1970, was her signature piece.

July 4, 1928: West Virginia dedicated Droop Mountain Battlefield State Park. Droop Mountain was the site of one of the most important Civil War battles fought on West Virginia soil.

July 4, 1938: Musician Bill Withers Jr. was born into a miner's family of 13 children in Slab Fork, Raleigh County. In 1971, Withers released his first album, Just As I Am, including his first Grammy-winning song, "Ain't No Sunshine." In 2015 he was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.

July 5, 1896: Cartoonist Kendall Vintroux was born at Fraziers Bottom. He began his career with the Charleston Gazette when he submitted a cartoon about the town of Poca's first paved road. Many of his drawings are now in the collection of the University of Charleston.

July 5, 1950: Army Private Kenneth Shadrick of Wyoming County was the first U.S. serviceman killed in action in the Korean War.

July6,1806: Statesman Charles James Faulkner was born in Martinsburg. Faulkner served in the West Virginia legislature, U.S. Congress (1851–59), and as U.S. minister to France.

July 6, 1848: Historian Virgil A. Lewis was born

July 6, 1883: Judge "R. D." Bailey was born at Baileysville, Wyoming County. Bailey came into wide prominence as the judge of the Matewan Massacre trial in 1921.

July 7, 1928: The Madonna of the Trail monument was dedicated in Wheeling. It is one of the 12 such statues erected along the National Road to honor America's pioneering women.

at verse 17. Before the battle began, Abijah had announced that God would fight for Judah. Anyone can declare that the Lord will work for them but that does mean that it shall happen. God is not subject to the will of men. In I Samuel 4:5-14, Israel sought to make God work for them against the Philistines by carrying the ark of the covenant with them into battle. That battle plan failed. The children of Israel were defeated and the Philistines captured the ark.

In the text before us, the plan to use God worked. Why did God choose to fight for Judah on this occasion? The answer, in part, is found in the words which Abijah spoke to Jeroboam and all Israel.

Abijah declared that the Lord had made an everlasting covenant in which He gave the kingdom of Israel to David and the sons who would follow him. The kingdom which God gave David was divided because David's son, Solomon, turned away from God in his latter years (I Kings 11:33-35). God gave the northern ten tribes to Jeroboam. Jeroboam, however, did not acknowledge God. Fearing that his people would continue to worship in Jerusalem and eventually align themselves with the king of Judah, Jeroboam set up two worship centers in which he placed golden calves, which calves he declared to be the gods that led the children of Israel out of Egypt. Jeroboam also expelled the levitical priests from Israel. Abijah states in verse 8 that Jeroboam now thinks to overcome the kingdom of David through his great multitude coupled with support of the golden calves which he created. Abijah then declared that his kingdom (Judah) had not forsaken the Lord, that the priests, the sons of Aaron, continually kept every charge of the Lord our God.

Abijah's words are cause to believe that he was a strong defender of the Lord God. Other scripture reveals that this most certainly was not the case. Abijah had sinned in the same manner as his father Rehoboam who had allowed pagan worship to flourish in Judah and had turned a blind eye to the practice of sodomy (see I Kings 15:3 and 14:23-24).

Abijah's victory cannot be ascribed to any righteousness of Judah or of Abijah. The human author of this scripture, moved by the Holy Spirit, stated, ". . . the children of Judah prevailed, because they relied upon the Lord God of their fathers." The victory was given to them because they relied upon the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. The God of their fathers is the God who counts belief in His word as righteousness (see Gen. 15:6).

Returning to verse 14. The surprised men of Judah cried unto the Lord. The priests sounded their trumpets. The sounding trumpets were notice to all that the Lord God, whom Abijah declared to be Judah's captain, was joining the battle. The priests of Levi called out to the Lord with their trumpets. The Lord joined the battle and the impossible happened. The much smaller force of Judah totally defeated the overwhelming numbers of Israel.

That which took place on the battlefield happened because Judah called upon the Lord. New Testament believers know that the impossible happens when one calls upon the name of Jesus. We know that our sins are wiped away, covered by His blood. This we know because the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob counts our belief for righteousness.

This notice applies to the Public Assistance (PA) and Hazard Mitigation Grant (HMGP) programs implemented under the authority of the Robert T. Stafford Relief and Emergency Disaster Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 5121-5206.

Under major disaster declaration (FEMA-4603-DR-WV) signed by the President on May 13, 2021, the following counties have been designated adversely affected by the disaster and eligible for PA: Cabell, Lincoln, Mason, Putnam, and Wayne. Additional counties may be designated at a later date. All counties in the State of West Virginia are eligible for HMGP.

This public notice concerns activities that may affect historic properties, activities that are located in or affect wetland areas or the 100year floodplain, and critical actions within the 500-year floodplain. Such activities may adversely affect the historic property, floodplain or wetland, or may result in continuing vulnerability to flood damage.

Presidential Executive Orders 11988 and 11990 require that all federal actions in or affecting the floodplain or wetlands be reviewed for opportunities to relocate, and evaluated for social. economic. historical, environmental, legal and safety considerations. Where there is no opportunity to relocate, FEMA is required to undertake a detailed review to determine what measures can be taken to minimize future The public is invited damages. to participate in the process of identifying alternatives and analyzing their impacts.

FEMA has determined that for certain types of facilities there normally no alternatives to restoration in the floodplain/wetland. These are facilities that meet all of the following criteria: 1) FEMA's estimate of the cost of repairs is less than 50% of the cost to replace the entire facility, and is less than \$100,000; 2) the facility is not located in a floodway; 3) the facility has not sustained major structural damage in a previous Presidentially declared flooding disaster or emergency; and 4) the facility is not critical (e.g., the facility is not a hospital, generating plant, emergency operations center, or a facility that contains dangerous materials). FEMA intends to provide assistance for the restoration of these facilities to their pre-disaster condition, except that certain measures to mitigate the effects of future flooding or other hazards may be included in the work. For example, a bridge or culvert restoration may include a larger waterway opening to decrease the risk of future washouts.

For routine activities, this will be the only public notice provided. Other activities and those involving facilities that do not meet the four criteria are required to undergo more detailed review, including study of alternate locations. Subsequent public notices regarding such projects will be published if necessary, as more specific information becomes available

In many cases, an applicant may have started facility restoration before federal involvement. Even if the facility must undergo detailed review and analysis of alternate locations, FEMA will fund eligible restoration at the original location if the facility is functionally dependent its floodplain location (e.g., bridges and flood control facilities), or e project facilitates an open spac use, or the facility is an integral part of a larger network that is impractical or uneconomical to relocate, such as a road. In such cases, FEMA must also examine the possible effects of not restoring the facility, minimize floodplain/wetland impacts, and determine both that an overriding public need for the facility clearly outweighs the Executive Order requirements to avoid the floodplain/ wetland, and that the site is the only practicable alternative. State of West Virginia and local officials will confirm to FEMA that proposed actions comply with all applicable State and local floodplain management and wetland protection requirements. FEMA also intends to provide HMGP funding to the State of West Virginia to mitigate future disaster These projects may damages. include construction of new facilities, modification of existing, undamaged facilities, relocation of facilities out of floodplains, demolition of structures, or other types of projects to mitigate future disaster damages. In the course of developing project proposals, subsequent public notices will be published if necessary, as more specific information becomes available. Petition for review of Vegetation Management Program and Update of VMP Surcharge

#### NOTICE OF FILING AND HEARING

On April 16, 2021, Appalachian Power Company and Wheeling Power Company (ointly Companies) filed a petition for Commission review of their regetation management program (VMP) and true-up of the VMP Surcharge. The Companies are not asking for an increase in the VMP Surcharge, but are requesting a change to the residential VMP rate design. The change would shift the charge from the current 1.111 cents per kWh to a monthly charge of \$12.45 per residential customer. The impact of the requested monthly charge, if approved, would be that residential customer bills for less than 1,121 kWh would increase while residential customer bills for more than 1,121 kWh would decrease. Examples of the range of increases and decreases at various usage levels are shown in the following chart.
