Looking Through the Rearview Mirror at Covid

On June 22, 2020, the DHHR reported that a total of 43 Putnam residents had contracted Covid-19 since the onset of the pandemic. Three hundred and sixty-five days later, the county total was 5,319. On June 22, 2020, there were 17 active Covid cases and no deaths in the county. One year later, the active case number was 52 and 93 Covid deaths.

These numbers alone are not a reason to say that Covid is less severe than it was 12 months ago. There is, however, good reason to believe that Covid is going away. Putnam's highest active case number was 1,033 on December 6, 2020. The decline in active cases is, in part, due to the effectiveness of the Fizer and Moderna vaccines. As of June 22, 41.4% of county residents were fully vaccinated and another 6.8% had received the first shot only. Putnam fully vaccinated rate is 2.9% higher than the state average. The county single shot rate is 4.5% higher than statewide.

The vaccination rate, coupled with the five thousand-plus individuals who have

contracted the disease and recovered, means that Putnam is closing in on numbers needed for herd immunity. The Spanish Flu pandemic of 1918 died out in 1920 when 60% of the population had developed antibodies to the disease.

While it is still possible for the coronavirus to return when the days begin to shorten in the fall, fear of the disease is in the rearview mirror. Fear of the unknown closed public schools in 2020. Knowledge of the severity among school age children was cause to reopen the schools in 2021. If government officials had known in 2020 of the low risk of Covid to the below 20 year-old group, most states would have never closed schools.

Scare talk of the Delta strain of Covid-19 is scare talk. The vaccine is equally effective on all Covid strains. Those who have developed coronavirus antibodies to other strains are better equipped to defeat Delta.

The worst is most definitely past. While it is impossible to know the unknown, closing schools made a bad situation worse. We now see that through the rearview mirror.

There was good news for Jim Ridge residents at the June 15 meeting of the Putnam County Commission.

Terry Martin of the Regional Governmental Council informed the commission that the \$1.5 million grant announced by Gov. Justice on June

7 for Phase II of the Jim Ridge Waterline Extension will fully fund the project which has been years in waiting.

Martin stated that the design is 50% complete and that there will be an implementation meeting on June 24 where contracts will be presented for signing. Martin said that it will be necessary to get

a waiver from the Public Service Commission to get design approval. While no time table is etched in stone, Martin believes all authorizations will be complete by October or November and that bids will be opened in January.

Construction is slated to begin in February or March of 2022. The project will result in public water to more than 70 homes. Martin could not supply an exact number of homes. He said that there are a number of homes under construction and that there will be a lot more. There is no tap fee for residents who sign up now.

In other business, the commission approved the rezoning of a 1.96-acre parcel in Fraziers Bottom from R-2 to C-1. The zoning change will make it possible for FLSmidth to expand its operations.

Acting on recommendations made by the DAEA Board, the commission voted to impose daily fines upon the property owner of 2987 McLane Pike in Red House for failure to comply with an order to clean up the property.

W. Va. Maple Syrup Production

For the 2021 season, West Virginia produced a totaled 13,000 gallons of maple syrup, down 3,000 gallons from the previous year. Yield per tap correlated with the overall decrease in production as taps on average produced 0.169 gallon, down from the 2020 yield of 0.213 gallon per tap. Despite production levels falling, the total number of taps increased by 2,000 for a total of 77,000 taps. On average, the maple syrup season opened on February 13, 2021 and closed on March 16 for an average season length of 31 days. The first date sap was collected in West Virginia was on January 12, 2021 with the last date for sap collection on April 6.

"Weather remains a key factor for how successful our maple seasons end up. If it is too warm, it can severely hinder the sap's flow resulting in lower production levels," said Commissioner of Agriculture Kent Leonhardt. "An optimistic note is we continue to see more taps placed in trees which will only lead to positive results for the industry."

The average price per gallon for sales in 2020 was \$30.20, a 27 percent decrease. Bulk prices for 2020 were \$1.90 per pound, down from \$2.10 per pound from the previous year. Although, bulk price per gallon increased by \$1 to \$21.00. Bulk sales dominated the market with 83 percent of sales followed by retail sales at 11 percent and wholesale at 6 percent.

Maple syrup production in the United States saw a decrease of 17 percent for a total of 3.42 million gallons. The number of taps totaled 13.3 million, up 2 percent from 2020. Yield per tap was 0.257 gallon, down 0.057 gallon from the previous season. On average, the United States maple season lasted 27 days, compared with 34 days in 2020. The total value of the U.S. maple production came in at \$132 million for 2020.

instead of my patio where the critters (Oh yes, I have rabbits, squirrels, and those dratted little lizards) could get into it.

Attorney General Morrissey Warns Consumers About Grandparent Scam

West Virginia Attorney General Patrick Morrissey urges residents to be wary of calls claiming grandchildren need help. Scammers have been known to call senior citizens pretending to be their grandchild. Others claim to be law enforcement with news about a loved one. They often indicate the grandchild in question is in another state or country and in dire need of money due to an emergency.

"Most grandparents would do anything to help a grandchild in trouble because they are incredibly generous to family members in need," Attorney General Morrissey said. "That's why it's so important to exercise caution when receiving such calls. Think carefully before handing over money in this situation."

The Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division recently received reports of the scam circulating in the state. Word of the scam often surfaces during vacation season and as students head off to college. Scammers rely on the goodwill of grandparents to shield grandchildren from potential punishment. This may result in those receiving such calls deciding not to check with the child's parents.

Consumers can follow these tips to avoid becoming a victim:

- Stay calm and don't react out of immediacy.
- Get a call back number.
- Call the grandchild's

known number or other family members to see if there really is an emergency.

• Ask a question that only the grandchild would know the answer to such as a pet's name, the child's nickname or where they attended school.

• Never give bank routing numbers or credit card numbers to anyone

via phone. • Be skeptical of any request for a wire transfer or to use a pre-paid debit card, regardless of who the requestor says they are.

Anyone who believes they have been the victim of such a scam should contact the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division at 1-800-368-8808.

Build a Better Sandwich

(Family Features) Fad diets come and go, and as many Americans find, so do the pounds they lose. Most experts agree that eliminating, or drastically reducing, major food groups from your diet can be detrimental to your health and prevent you from achieving long-term healthy eating goals.

Rethink the Ingredients

Elijah Rebukes King Ahab

I Kings 21:17-29

The account before us is filled with detail. Before us are the specific instructions which God issued to Elijah, the very words which Elijah spoke, King Ahab's response to those words, and the Lord's response to Ahab's response. These details have been preserved in scripture for God's purposes. The Lord is perfect in all His ways. Let us look upon the word He has given us.

"And the word of the Lord came to Elijah the Tishbite . . ." (v. 17). The Lord told Elijah to go to King Ahab, where he would find him, and instructed him to say, "Thus saith the Lord, Hast thou killed, and also taken possession?" (v. 19a). This question reads as an accusation. It is not. It is a pronouncement of the verdict. God has found King Ahab guilty of both the murder of Naboth and the theft of his vineyard (see v. 1-16). Ahab's evil doings were not secret from the Lord.

This marks the third time which the Lord sent Elijah to Ahab. On the first occasion, the Lord sent Elijah to Ahab with the message that God would withhold rain from the land because the king had built an altar to Baal and caused the people to sin (see I Kings 17). In the text before us, Elijah was instructed to inform Ahab of the price that he would required to pay for his doings. Dogs would lick his blood in the same place where dogs had licked the blood of Naboth (v. 19b).

When Elijah came to Ahab, the king addressed him as "mine enemy" and asked him why he had come (v. 20). Ahab's words are revealing; he regarded Elijah as his enemy. He saw Elijah as an opponent. He did not recognize Elijah as a messenger from God.

Ahab's wrong view was short lived. Elijah delivered God's message: God would take away Ahab's posterity. God would make an end to Ahab's rule over men, both the enslaved and free of Israel (v. 21). God would do the same to Ahab as God had done to the kings before him who had caused Israel to sin (v. 22). God would cause dogs to eat the body of Ahab's wife, Jezebel (v. 23). God would cause all who followed Ahab to die untimely deaths (v. 24).

Verses 25 and 26 are not words spoken by Elijah. The two verses are a commentary on King Ahab and his evil ways penned by the human author of this scripture. The Holy Spirit would have us realize that Ahab's evil was of the same magnitude as that of the Amorites whom God removed from the land of Canaan. When Joshua entered the land, he immediately executed the Amorite kings (see Josh. 6:21, 8:29 and 10:26).

Would it be the mind of the Lord to do likewise to Ahab? This question is answered in verse 29. The Lord delayed to do to Ahab that which He had done to the Amorite kings. Why? God delayed in ending Ahab's life and reign because Ahab humbled himself before the Lord.

Verse 27 states that when Ahab heard God's message issued from Elijah, "that he rent his clothes, and put on sackcloth upon his flesh, and fasted, and lay in sackcloth, and went softly." Ahab did these things, not because he heard the words of "mine enemy." He did these things because he heard the voice of God. He did these things because saw himself guilty and deserving of death.

Ahab heard and believed. Renting his clothing, fasting, and putting on sackcloth were an outward testimony of that which was in his heart. God, looking upon Ahab's heart, spoke to Elijah saying, "Seest how Ahab humbleth himself before me? because he humbleth himself before me, I will not bring the evil in his days" (v. 29).

The evil that the Lord would not bring in Ahab's lifetime is that which Elijah announced verse 21-24. All that which God said should take place happened after Ahab was killed in battle more than three years later (see I Kings 22). Dogs even licked the blood of Ahab as they had licked the blood of Naboth as God had said (see v. 19 and 22:38).

God, in His mercy, delayed Ahab's death and the end of his kingdom. God did not change Ahab's sentence — just the scheduled time.

New Testament believers of today have reason to believe that we are living in the end times. Israel has been regathered as God said would be. We observe that many have fallen from the faith as God said there would be. The end shall come as God has said it will. Knowing that the Lord is not willing that any should perish and delays in His coming, let us reach out to the lost while it is still day.

Knowing these things, let us ever fill our lamps with oil that we may be ready for that day.




