Hurricane CIU Action **Results in \$215,000** Cash Seizure

Chief Mike Police informed Hurricane City Council its monthly meeting on June 7 that the FBI, acting on information provided by the HPD, seized \$215,000 in cash during a Columbus, Ohio drug arrest. Mullins stated that a portion of the cash seized by the FBI is distributed to participating enforcement agencies.

Mullins reported that $_{
m the}$ Hurricane Department has been selected to receive a portion of all cash seized by the FBI on the east coast of the United States.

Mullins stated that the Hurricane CIU unit seized 1.03 pounds of meth, 12.5 grams of heroin, 3 grams of crack cocaine and 25 Oxycodone pills during May. Mullins estimated the street value of the drugs to be slightly over \$12,000. The HPD seized \$12,743 in cash and 4 firearms while making the drug arrests.

HPD made 11 arrests which were charged to the state and 17 which were charged to the city. The city's arrests included 12 for first offense shoplifting and two for second offense shoplifting. The state arrests included one DUI related, one drug related, and one for domestic battery.

Mullins also reported that the HPD department issued 135 citations and 61 warnings while responding to complaints involving fraud, petit larceny, destruction of property, hit and run, fireworks, and ATVs.

The department also responded to 25 EMR calls, 25 911 hang up calls, 12 alarm calls, 9 disturbance calls, 14 suspicious vehicle calls, 2 fight calls, 3 noise complaints, 4 trespassing complaints, 10 domestic violence calls and 25 suspicious persons complaints. The department made 4 wellbeing checks while taking 20 accident reports during the month.

Twelve West Virginia Middle Schools Benefit from Save The Music Foundation Grants



The West Virginia Department of Arts, Culture and History (WVDACH) and Save The Music Foundation visited middle schools across the Mountain State on Thursday, May 6 and Friday, May 7, 2021, to celebrate Save The Music grants to middle school music programs.

The twelve schools chosen this year to receive the matching grants include: Baileysville Elementary and Middle School, Brenton, Wyoming County; Blennerhassett Middle School, Parkersburg, Wood County; Central Preston Middle School, Kingwood, Preston County; Edison Middle School, Parkersburg, Wood County; Hamilton Middle School, Parkersburg, Wood County; Hayes Middle School, St. Albans, Kanawha County; Huntington Vinson Middle School, Huntington, Wayne County; Philippi Middle School, Philippi, Barbour County; Pineville Middle School, Pineville, Wyoming County; Richwood Middle School, Richwood, Nicholas County; Short Line Middle School, Reader, Wetzel County; and Winfield Middle School, Winfield, Putnam

Governor Jim Justice stated, "I could not be more proud of West Virginia's partnership with the Save The Music Foundation. Making sure that our children have music as an outlet to express themselves is so important; it engages students, drives achievement, and brings off-the-charts goodness to our classrooms. I truly believe that music - and all the arts - are part of the fabric of who we are as a state, and I'm so happy that this partnership is providing more and more children with opportunities to find

their passion for music." The West Virginia

middle schools that have been awarded matching grants will receive an average value of \$40,000 in musical instruments and ongoing program management and materials through the program. In attendance was Randall Reid-Smith, curator of the Department of Arts, Culture and History, department staff, and Chiho Feindler, senior director of programs and policy for the Save The Music Foundation.

"We are very proud of our 11-year partnership with the Save The Music Foundation," said Curator Reid-Smith. "This partnership is an important tool for preserving and sustaining music programs for the state's youth, and we will continue to provide instruments to new

schools each year." The WVDACH, through a partnership with the Save The Music Foundation and matching monetary donors, is able to award grants for new musical instruments to any traditional West Virginia public elementary or middle school that has a certified music teacher and wants to build its instrumental music program. 

Mix honey and curry together to make a thick basting sauce. Spoon all over chicken and bake, baste with sauce several times during baking. Also good on turkey. Bake chicken at 350 degrees for 45 minutes, basting every 10 to 15 minutes with sauce. If chicken browns too quickly, cover loosely with aluminum foil. To make coriander rub: In airtight container, mix salt, black pepper, coriander seed and garlic together. Store until ready to use.

To make tenderloin and vegetables: Brush tenderloin with 1 tablespoon olive oil.

Evenly season both sides of pork with 1 tablespoon coriander rub and refrigerate 2 hours. Coat carrots, spring onions and asparagus with 2 tablespoons olive oil and season with 1 tablespoon coriander rub; refrigerate.

Remove tenderloin and vegetables from refrigerator and bring to room

temperature.

Heat grill to 400 F using direct grilling setup. Place lemon halves, cut sides down, over hot coals and cook approximately 5 minutes, or until lemon halves are charred. Remove to cool. Place seasoned pork tenderloin over hot coals and grill 3-5 minutes. Using

tongs, rotate meat every 3-5 minutes and cook until meat thermometer placed in thickest part of tenderloin reads 140 F (about 15 minutes). Remove tenderloin from heat and let rest 10 minutes.

Place seasoned carrots, onion and asparagus on hot grill. Cook 3-4 minutes then turn and cook another 3-4 minutes. Transfer to plate.

Toss salad greens in remaining olive oil, juice of 1 charred lemon half and 2

teaspoons coriander rub. Slice tenderloin into 1/4-inch medallions. Place grilled vegetables and medallions on platter; garnish with herbs and juice of remaining lemon half. Serve with spring greens salad.

eight bridges and a new interchange where US 35 meets WV 869. The project is a Public-

private partnership (3P) between the Division of Highways and Bizzack Construction Company of Lexington, Kentucky.



BASIC BIBLE

Gideon Destroys Baal's Altar Judges 6:25-32

"And it came to pass the same night . . . " (v. 25). That night was

the night following the day in which the angel of Lord appeared to Gideon and told him that he (Gideon) would save Israel from the hand of the Midianites (v. 14). It was the night following the angel's telling Gideon "Surely I will be with thee" (v. 16).

On that, the same night, the Lord instructed Gideon to tear down the altar of Baal which belonged to his father and to cut down the grove beside it, and to erect an altar to the Lord and to offer a burnt offering upon it.

Verse 27 states that Gideon did as he was instructed but that he did so by night because he feared his father's household and the men of the city. Verse 27 does not state that Gideon tore down the altar and cut down the grove on the same night that the Lord instructed him to do it. The text, also, does not state that Gideon waited until the following night to do as the Lord instructed. Gideon's fear may have been cause to wait until the following night or it may have been cause to act immediately.

Gideon put his fear of his father's household aside and with the assistance of ten men servants did as the Lord instructed. Early in the morning following Gideon's act, the men of the city discovered that the altar of Baal was cast down and the grove adjacent to it was cut down (v. 28). The scene which greeted the men of the city was an altar of unhewn stone (see Ex. 20:25) and a burnt bullock offering upon it.

The text does not state when Joash, Gideon's father, viewed this same scene but it is reasonable to assume that Joash's knowledge of Gideon's act was known to him before it was known to the men of the city. It is also reasonable to assume that Joash asked Gideon why that he had torn down the altar, cut the grove, and built an altar to the Lord and offered a burnt offering upon it. The sight of the destroyed altar to Baal and the cut-down grove should not have required an explanation. The children of Israel had been given instruction by God to tear down pagan altars and cut down their groves but had failed to do so upon entering into the land. Joash should have realized that Gideon had done that which God had instructed Israel to do.

Gideon's fear of the men of the city was justified. They sought to take his life (v. 30). There is nothing in the text before us which would suggest that Gideon's fear of his father's household was justified. Joash stood firm against the men of the city (v. 31). Joash challenged the existence of Baal and any power that Baal might possess. Joash said if Baal be a god, he knows who has done this, and is able to avenge himself on him who did it. Joash challenged Baal to plead his own cause by bringing death upon the one who had done this thing.

Joash had been a worshipper of Baal. His words to the men of the city, however, suggest that this was no longer the case. The scripture before us does not reveal the reason for his about-face. Joash's turnaround may have been prompted by learning that Gideon had been called by the Lord to deliver Israel from the Midianites or triggered by the realization that he and Israel had turned from God.

Joash's turnaround is preserved in scripture for God's purposes. Joash's departure from Baal worship happened because one man, Gideon, did that which the Lord told him to do. The angel of the Lord told Gideon that he would smite the Midianites as one man (v. 16). The destruction of Baal's altar was a necessary first step by one man in ridding Israel of Midianite oppression.

God is a jealous God. He does marvelous and wonderful things. Before He brought Israel into the land, while still at Sinai, the Lord said, "But ye shall destroy their altars, break their images, and cut down their groves" (Ex. 34:13). He will not allow false gods as Baal to be credited with that which He does. Not one soul would credit Gideon's victory, recorded in Judges 7:20-23,

to a false god. All credit for the defeat of the Midianites is given to the Lord God. Gideon's act, that of one man, is not lost upon New Testament believers. It is by the obedience of one man, Jesus Christ, that many are made righteous (Rom. 5:19). As Israel was delivered by the obedience of one, all believers are delivered and made free

from sin by Him who sinned not. Let us declare Christ Jesus to all who will hear and believe.

By Recommended Decision dated July 2, 2019 (Final July 22, 2019), the Commission granted the Culloden Public Service District (District) a certificate of convenience and necessity to make improvements in its system, including the demolition of an abandoned wastewater treatment plant, the replacement and relocation of the Sovine Lift Station, and construction of approximately 7,500 feet of gravity sewers and 400 feet of force main (Project).

The Commission approved new rates and charges for the District in Case No. 20-0570-PSD-19A by a recommended Decision dated February 12, 2021 (Final March 4, 2021), and as amended by Commission Order dated April 23, 2021. The approved Step-2 rates were effective upon certification of substantial completion of the Project. On May 6, 2021, the District

On May 6, 2021, the District filed a petition to modify its tariff to allow its Step-2 rates to become effective at the end of May 2021 to provide for commencement of the Project debt service. The 2020A Bond Issue related to the Project requires debt service payments to be deposited beginning July 1, 2021. The District initially anticipated substantial completion of the Project in June 2021, however, the Project was prolonged by ninety days. The District stated that it needed to have its Project rates in effect for its billings sent to customers at the end of May in order to have sufficient funds to pay the initial debt service.

On Tuesday, June 1, the Hurricane Fire & Rescue, Putnam County EMS and Hurricane Police Department responded to a multi-vehicle accident near the I-64 eastbound rest area in Hurricane.

The first unit on the accident scene found five vehicles (three passenger cars and two commercial vehicles) and six injured

individuals. One accident victim succumbed to injuries on the scene. Four additional patients were transported to area hospitals by PCEMS. One accident victim refused treatment. One of the injured had to be freed from the twisted remains of his vehicle with hydraulic rescue tools.
