County Commission Boosts Teays Valley Fire Dept./City of Hurricane Ambulance Service Start-Ups

Beginning August 1st, ambulance service for residents dwelling within the areas served by the Teays Valley Fire Department and Hurricane Fire Department will be provided by Teays Valley Fire Department and the City of Hurricane. TVFD will now be home to three ambulances which are fully equipped. The Hurricane Fire Station will house an ambulance that was formerly operated by the Putnam County and the ambulance which was gifted to the City by MVB Bank. At its May 11th meeting, Commissioners Brian Ellis and Ron Foster voted to supply two Ambulance Authority vehicles to Teays Valley and one to Hurricane. The Commissioners also voted to provide Hurricane Fire & Rescue with \$150,000 to meet start up cost. Teays Valley will receive \$200,000 for start up costs but is obligated to pay back \$50,000 at a date to be determined. Commissioner Andy

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Hurricane Bridge Park Adds 25 Acres

City Manager Andy Skidmore announced at the May 3 Hurricane Council meeting that Hurricane Bridge Park has expanded from 40 acres to 65 acres.

On April 28, the Hurricane Building Commission closed on the acreage at 2005 Cherry Street which lies between Richlin Estates and the park. The Building Commission purchased the property from the heirs of John Parsons for \$750,000. Improvements on the

section of Bridge Park adjacent to State Route 34 have been ongoing for more than a year. A playground was added in April. Lighting for the football field is expect to be completed within one week and the Pickle Ball courts are slated to ready for use by mid June.

Skidmore also announced that the Building Commission has purchased 2741 Second Street with the intent of demolishing the structure formerly owned by Ralph Jones. The property will be converted into a

customer parking lot for Main Street businesses. The cost of the lot was \$22,500.

In other business, the council approved Williams & Shriver as the architect for the new Hurricane Fire Station which will be built on five acres on State Route 34 near Hurricane Bridge Park.

Mayor Scott Edwards announced that Farley's will be sponsoring this year's 4th of July Hot Dog Eating Contest. The contest has been an annual event at Hurricane City Park in recent years. Police Chief Mike Mullins announced that the HPD Criminal Investigation Unit seized \$11,990 in cash while making city arrests and was part of a \$140,000 cash seizure by the FBI.

The next regular council meeting will be Monday, June 7, at 6:30 p.m.

Putnam County Covid Numbers Remain High

On Tuesday, May 11, the DHHR reported 390 active Covid-19 cases in Putnam County. The last time that active

cases exceeded 390 was February 22 when 422 cases were recorded.

In early January, active case numbers started to decline after reaching a high of 749.

The decline stopped on March 14 when a total of 268 cases were reported. There have been more than 300 active cases every day since April 4th.

The 10-19 year-old age group has been the largest contributor to the county's high numbers. Between April 4 and May 10, 195 of Putnam's 417 new cases (47%) were in this age group.

During the same period, only 6% of the Covid cases were in the age 70 and older group. Statewide, more than 80% of the 70 and older group are fully vaccinated. Covid vaccinations became available to children over 12 years of age last week. The low rate of cases among the 70 and up crowd is evidence of the effectiveness of the

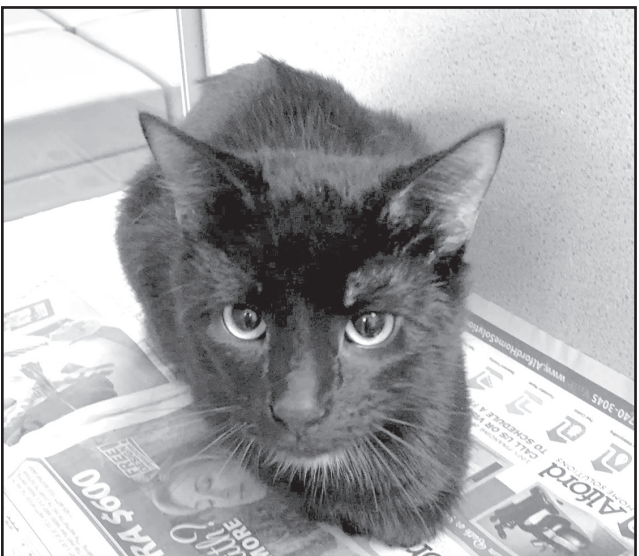

1954. He was employed by the Blenko Glass Company where his father was also employed. A month later, October 14, 1954, his father met a tragic death by a sandpit cave in. Lewis is now foreman over the Antique Shipping. He also teaches a class on stained glass at night on the Adult Education Program. He is now serving on the Board of Zoning Appeals for the City of Hurricane.

Lewis' hobby is old cars and he is now working on a 1939 and 1941 Ford and 1956 Dodge.

Phyllis Jean McHenry Powers was born July 6, 1939, to Robert Oirs McHenry and Thelma Mae Jenkins McHenry. He and his four brothers were selling honey from door to door when he met Thelma Jenkins. They were later married and came up with a "little honey" and called her Phyllis, believe it or not.

My grandfather, John H. McHenry and my grandmother, Iva Melvin McHenry operated and owned a Honey Business alone, until the four boys, Edson, Harold, Donald and my father, Robert, were old enough to share and work in the business.

The entire family was staunch Seventh Day Adventists. Grandpa McHenry was an Elder in the local church and was in charge of all conferences in the Tri-State Region. My father sang at all the church tent meetings.

I was only three years old when my father died on July 13, 1942. I was raised by my maternal grandparents, John Anderson Jenkins and Bertha Alma Cooper Jenkins. I was never lonely because my cousin, Bertha Pauline Short, lived with my grandparents also. Soon we were like sisters.

My grandparents had seven children, namely: Tennessee Jenkins Holton, Thelma Jenkins McHenry Pons, Della Marie Jenkins Jackson, Milford Jenkins, Harry Jenkins and two deceased children: Melvie and Betty Jenkins.

I also have a half sister and brother, Sandra Lee Hudkins and John Williams Nicklas.

I graduated from Milton High School, May 28, 1957, but not as Phyllis McHenry because on May 25, I changed my name to Mrs. Lewis

Powers. After we were married more than a year, Lewis' cousins, Arlie Powers, died, leaving a baby boy, Claude Franklin Powers, who we took into our home to love and care for. In February, 1960, we legally adopted him. September 30, 1960, Lewis Edward Powers, Jr. was born.

Soon after Eddie's birth, we moved to 2508 Virginia Avenue, Hurricane, West Virginia. Here we lived four years, then bought a home at 2466 Virginia Avenue. Here Eddie started to school.

While living here, we became foster parents to two children: Richard Lee Graley and Caroline Graley. Later a cousin, Ronald Lee Jackson, came to live with us. We loved them because they were ours and still are. After Caroline was married and the two boys went into the service, we moved back to Milton for five years, but kept our rental property in Hurricane on Virginia.

One Saturday when we weren't working, we returned to Hurricane to inspect our rental property on Virginia Avenue. While driving up the Avenue, we observed a For Sale sign in the yard of the old Wade Kirtley property. A few months later, we purchased it and were kept busy for years restoring the old cherry wood to its original

vaccine.

As of May 10, 19,186 Putnam residents were fully vaccinated and 23,602 were partially vaccinated. On April 10, the numbers were 11,393 fully vaccinated and 20,417 partially.

New Covid case numbers are expected to dramatically drop when at least 50% of

Skidmore who serves as Hurricane City Manager recused himself from voting and was not present during the discussion.

When the transfer of service is complete, Teays Valley will employ 18 EMTs to provide

24-7 service (2 EMTs per ambulance) and Hurricane will employ 7 EMTs.

The administration of the two departments will be separate with Teays Valley hiring three administrators and Hurricane one.

A total of 35,000 county residents will be served by the two departments.

May 14, 1878: Photographer Rufus "Red" Ribble was born in Blacksburg, Virginia. For nearly 40 years he traveled the coalfields making panoramic photographs of miners, towns, family reunions, church congregations and school groups.

May 14, 1943: Alan Mollohan was born in Fairmont. Mollohan served in the U.S. Congress from 1982 to 2010.

May 15, 1880: The state's first telephone

exchange was placed in service in Wheeling with about 25 subscribers.

May 15, 1886: Minnie Buckingham Harper was born in Winfield. She was the first African-American woman to serve as a member of a state legislative body in the United States. She was appointed by Governor Howard Gore on January 10, 1928, to fill the unexpired term of her husband, E. Howard Harper.

May 15, 1893: Albert Sidney "Sid" Hatfield, controversial police chief of Matewan and martyred hero to union coal miners,

was born near Matewan, on the Kentucky side of Tug Fork.

May 15, 1953: George Brett, the Hall of Fame third baseman for the Kansas City Royals, was born in Glen Dale in Marshall County. He is one of only four players in baseball history to accumulate 3,000 hits, 300 home runs and a career batting average of .300.

May 17, 1862: The Battle of Pigeon Roost took place in Princeton during the Civil War. Union soldiers were noisily approaching Princeton from the southeast, unaware that the Confederates were lying in ambush. The attack left an estimated 18 federal troops killed and 38 wounded.



Saved by Faith

Romans 10:1-10

In the text before us, Paul states his desire that Israel be saved, why Israel is not saved, and what must happen for one to receive salvation. Paul wrote the things that he wrote such that believers in Rome might become established in God's word and build upon the foundation which is Jesus Christ.

Israel lacked knowledge (v. 2). Israel was ignorant of God's righteousness (v. 3).

At one time, Paul lacked knowledge and was ignorant of God's righteousness. The apostle makes reference to this fact in verse 2 when he states that he bears record of their zeal for God. Before Paul came to know God's righteousness, he zealously sought to strike down all who proclaimed that Jesus satisfied the demands of the law. Paul had studied the scriptures under the most noted scholar of his day but Paul was ignorant of God's righteousness.

Before Jesus revealed Himself to Paul upon the road to Damascus, Paul lacked knowledge of God's righteousness. One of superior intellect can read and study the books of Moses and of the prophets but not hear God's voice. One does not hear God through his own efforts. Paul did not know that he was ignorant of God's righteousness until Jesus revealed Himself to Paul. After that experience, Paul read the scriptures anew. He heard God speak through the books of Moses and the prophets for the first time. Paul shares his knowledge with the believers at Rome (and with us) in verses 5-8 as he quotes from Leviticus 18:5 and Deuteronomy 30:12-14 .

Before God revealed His righteousness to him, Paul sought to achieve righteousness through his own efforts. God's righteous requirements, while clearly stated in the law, are hidden from those who do not keep every requirement of the law. It is hidden from them who are dead. Moses stated that the man who does the things of the law shall live by them. Dead men erroneously believe that righteousness is earned through doing the works of the law. God has revealed to all who are alive (second born) that Jesus alone has done that which the law requires. Believers pass from death unto life, not by keeping the law, but, by believing upon the only One who satisfied God's righteous requirements. We are made righteous by Him.

In verse 3, the apostle states that Israel, in seeking to establish their own righteousness, has not submitted themselves to God's righteousness. Verse 4 states that which God has revealed: Christ is the end of the law to everyone who believes. Christ is the only man which lives because He did the works of the law (v. 5, Lev. 18:5).


In verses 6-8, Paul quotes and comments on Deuteronomy 30:12-14. To fully understand the context from which Paul speaks, we need first review Deuteronomy 30. God told the children of Israel that He would gather them from all the nations to which He had scattered them. After gathering them, the Lord said that He would circumcise their hearts "to love the Lord thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, that thou mayest live" (Deut. 30:6). Israel was to hearken unto the voice of the Lord thy God, to keep the law of Moses, and turn to the Lord thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul (Deut. 30:10). In Deuteronomy 30:11, God said: "For this commandment which I command this day, it is not hidden from thee, neither is it far off." The manner in which believers should read these words is stated in Deuteronomy 29:29. It is by revelation of God that "we may do all the words of this law." It has been revealed to all believers that Christ Jesus has satisfied all the words of the law.

In Romans 10:6-8, Paul expounds upon the righteousness which is by faith. The righteousness which is by faith is the same as that which is stated in Deuteronomy 30:12-14. Righteousness by faith does not require one to reach up to heaven or to search faraway places. Righteousness by faith is found in Christ Jesus. Righteousness by faith is as close as one's mouth and heart. Righteousness by faith is revealed to all by God. The righteousness by faith which Paul preached is that which God reveals.

"That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved" (v. 9). If one believes in one's heart that Jesus was raised by God from the dead, one has discovered that which is near. One has discovered the faith which God gives to all who will believe. One is saved by faith which God counts as righteousness.

In verse 10, the apostle states that belief is counted for righteousness and that "with the mouth confession is made unto salvation." When one confesses with his mouth, one is declaring that which God has done. When one confesses with his mouth, one is declaring that which God wants all men to know — that salvation is found in Him alone.

Believers are called to declare the love of Him who first loved us.

District Governor Visits With Putnam Rotarians

The new Rotary District 7545 took in most of West Virginia in mid-2019, and the COVID crisis hit ahead of the time for the district conference six months later, Sean Sawyer told Putnam club members on the morning of Tuesday, May 4.

Sawyer, a Fairmont attorney, is Rotary District Governor for the current year. Despite the pandemic, he was determined to move forward with the traditional annual conference this spring, and his leadership team succeeded beyond all expectations.

The meeting on the weekend of April 30 through May 2 included entertainment, planning sessions and training for club members representing 43 local clubs in the state. "We had 13 speakers from nine states and three countries." Sawyer told the Putnam group "We even had a virtual visit with Rotary founder Paul Harris (1868-1949)," he added.

The conference was conducted through the internet on Zoom meeting software and Facebook. There was no charge for attendance, and no costs for lodging or travel. The sessions were all recorded

PSC Demands Correction Plan for Suddenlink Customer Service Problems

Public Service Commission Chairman Charlotte Lane directed Suddenlink Communications to file with the Commission by June 7, a plan to correct insufficiencies in customer service.

Chairman Lane held a meeting yesterday with Suddenlink representatives and Commission Staff to discuss a long list of complaints customers are experiencing. At the conclusion of the meeting Chairman Lane directed Suddenlink to file a plan that includes (i) how and when the company will open a call center in West Virginia; (ii) how and when the company will hire technicians and various other employees in West Virginia to service West Virginia customers; (iii) how the company will fix problems with incorrect 911 fees being billed to customers; (iv) how the company will accurately and timely process payments and credits to customer accounts; (v) how the company will fix billing errors; (vi) how the company will ensure late fees are accurately assessed; and (vii) identify who is doing the billing for the company.

"The recurring problems with Suddenlink's telephone and cable television service have gone on long enough," said Chairman Lane. "Customers deserve to receive the service they are paying for."

The Commission has received nearly 1,900 complaints from West Virginia customers regarding Suddenlink's telephone and cable television service since 2019.

Suddenlink is the second largest telephone provider and one of the five largest cable television companies in the state, serving up to 350,000 customers in 31 counties in West Virginia.
