The Bold Brave the Cold at the Hurricane Reservoir

Two members of the current Putnam County Board of Education, Christian Wells and Bruce Knell, were elected to 4-year terms in 2020 and are not up for reelection until 2024. Three members will be elected to the non-partisan Board in the May Primary. Two of the three could be current members Rob Cunningham and Wade Neal. Both of their names will be on ballot. Cunningham is running from Magisterial District 1 and Neal from District 2. Both will be reelected if they tally the most votes in their respective districts unless the top two vote counts for the Board are recorded by Board candidates who reside in Magisterial District 3. If such were to happen, only the higher of Cunningham or Neal would be elected. As of noon, January 18, no one from Magisterial District 3 has filed for the Board. The last day for filing is Saturday, January 29.

While filing may be slow for the Board of Education, such is not the case for

Republicans seeking the offices of Circuit Clerk and County Commissioner. No less than four candidates have forked over the \$620 filing fee for Circuit Clerk and three candidate the \$413 fee for County Commissioner. The four Circuit Court candidates are Stephanie Smith of Winfield, Mike Reynolds of Hometown, Donald Underwood of Hurricane, and Michael Thompson of Poca. Seeking candidacy for County Commission are Steve Deweese of Buffalo, Todd Dillon of Scott Depot, and incumbent Ron Foster of Winfield.

Putnam residents filing with the West Virginia Secretary of State for spots on the November ballot in House of Delegate races has swelled from two on the first day of filing to a total of six on January 18. Seeking Delegate candidacy are: Jesse Lovejoy (19th), Kathie Hess Crouse (19th), Geoff Foster (20th), Jacob Losh (20th), Michael Kidd (21st), and Jarred Cannon (21st). Incumbent State Senator Eric Tarr (R) filed for reelection in the 4th Senatorial District.

Putnam County Commission News

The Putnam County Commission held its first meeting of 2022 on Tuesday, January 11. The first order of business was partially undoing a precinct change that had been approved following the establishment of new Delegate district lines.

Last fall, the county commission approved changes that made Precinct 32 disappear. Voters in the northern portion of 32 would vote at Winfield High School in Precinct 3. Voters in the southern portion of

32 would join Precinct
31 voters and cast their
ballots at the Bethel
Baptist Church Activities
Building. That change
has been scrapped.

When voting time comes on May 12, all but a handful of voters in southern portion of the original Precinct 32 will vote as a somewhat smaller new Precinct 32 at Valley Park where they had previously voted. Only a small handful will join Precinct 31 voters at Bethel Baptist.

Governor's Arts Awards Nominations

The Governor's Arts Awards celebrate excellence in the arts in West Virginia by honoring individuals and organizations whose creative achievements and significant contributions to the arts enhance life in West Virginia. The awards will be presented during a ceremony in the theater at the Culture Center at 6:00pm on Tuesday evening, March 1, 2022.

Nominations must be received at the Culture Center by Friday, February 18, 2022. Nominees must be residents living in West Virginia or organizations (corporations, nonprofit organizations) based in or doing a majority of business in West Virginia. Other eligibility requirements are specified in the nomination packet. The written nomination must specify the significance of the nominee's contributions to the arts as defined by the award category for which the nominee is entered.

Award winners will be chosen by a selection committee that may include West Virginia Department of Arts, Culture and History staff, members of the West Virginia Commission on the Arts, and arts representatives from around the state. The selection committee may choose to give more than one award or no award in any category. The committee will recommend three top-scoring nominees for the Governor's Arts Award for Lifetime Achievement to the Governor who will select the awardee.

Award winners and those who nominated them will be notified by February 25, 2022 of the selections



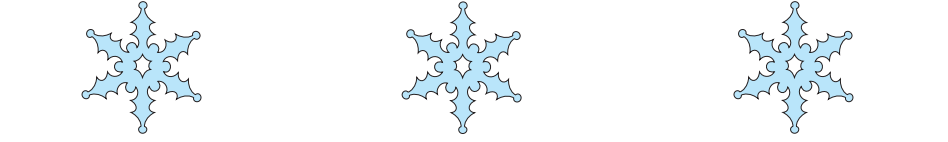

Jesus' Prayer for His Disciples

John 17:6-19

Before us is a portion of the prayer which Jesus prayed just prior to crossing over the brook Cedron and entering into the garden of Gethsemane. In John 17, Jesus requests: (1) that He be glorified, (2) that His disciples have the same relationship as exists between the Son and the Father, and (3) that all who would ever believe on the Son be one as the Father and Son are one. Verses 6 through 19 is that which Jesus asked for His disciples.

Jesus spoke to the Father saying: "I have manifested thy name unto the men which thou gavest me out of the world" (v. 6). Jesus had delivered the words which the Father had given Him to the disciples (v. 8). Jesus, however, had not yet made the love of the Father fully known to them. Full manifestation of the Father's love would wait until the only begotten Son should give Himself upon the cross as the sin payment for whosoever should believe in Him (Jn. 3:16).

In verse 11, Jesus, using the present tense, stated: "And now I am no more in the world." The disciples heard these words when Jesus was present with them.

In verse 12, Jesus, continuing to address the Father, said, "While I was with them in the world, I kept them in thy name." Again, the disciples heard these words when Jesus was in the flesh and was present among them.

We know and the disciples knew that Jesus was physically present among them when He spoke these words. Through His prayer, however, we see Jesus in the presence of the Father. We hear Jesus pray the words of a high priest. We see Jesus interceding for the disciples.

The passage of scripture before us reveals that which the disciples heard and when they heard it. Our understanding of the picture before us is dependent upon the teaching of the Holy Spirit. The disciples saw that which the Father intended. They saw Jesus pray to the Father on their behalf. Their full understanding of that which they saw, however, would wait until Pentecost (Acts 2:1-4) when the Father would send the Holy Spirit to teach them all things and cause them to remember all the words which Jesus had spoken (Jn. 14:26).

Believers know the Father through the Son. The Son reveals the Father in this prayer. In verse 6, Jesus identifies the disciples as men which the Father gave to Him. Those which the Father gave to the Son heard Jesus say "Follow me" (see Matthew 4, Mark 1, Luke 5, and John 1). Whom did the Father give to the Son? The Father gave them who would hear the Son and follow Him. The Father gave those who would keep the Father's word (v. 6). The Father knew the disciples before they knew Him. It is through the Son that we know the omniscience of the Father.

The Father would give to the Son them who would come to know with certainty that all that Jesus said and did were of God the Father (v. 7). The Father would give them who would surely know that Jesus came from God the Father and that God the Father had sent Jesus (v. 8). Through Jesus' prayer, we know the Father chooses them who shall hear and obey.

Through Jesus' prayer, we know that those who belong to the Son belong to the Father and those who belong to Father belong to the Son (v. 10). Through Jesus' prayer, we know the oneness of the Father and the Son. The Father chooses them who shall glorify the Son (v. 10).

In His prayer, Jesus makes the Father's will known to the disciples (and us). Because the Father and the Son are one, the will of the Father is the will of the Son and vice versa. It is the will of the Father that the disciples be one "as we are" (v. 11). The Father and the Son exist in perfect harmony. It is the will of the Father that the disciples (and all believers) be of one accord.

In v. 13, Jesus makes the reason known to the eleven why that He goes to the Father. Jesus would have the fulfillment of His joy be realized in them. The fulfillment of His joy is dependent upon the Son going to the Father. The fulfillment of His joy is dependent upon Jesus' sending the Comforter. The Comforter (the Holy Spirit) will not come except Jesus be with the Father (see Jn. 16:7). Without the presence of the Holy Spirit, the disciples (and all believers) cannot have oneness with Christ. Oneness with Christ is the fulfillment of His joy.

Believers are in the world but are one with the Son who is in heaven with the Father. The disciples and all believers are made one through and by the Holy Spirit. Believers are no longer of the world and become as Jesus by the Holy Spirit (v. 16).

The world "hath hated" (past tense) [v. 14] the disciples because they are (present tense) not of the world as Jesus is not of this world. The rules of the earth do not apply to them who are born of the Son.

Jesus, in the very presence of the Father, asks Him to protect the disciples from the evil one (v. 15). Jesus asks the Father to sanctify them through thy truth (v. 17).

Would that all men hear the truth that the Comforter teaches.


