Hurricane Speeders to Be Flashed State Champion Red Hot and Heat Wave Show Choirs Honored

Hurricane city council chambers were filled on Monday, April 4, as the Calvary Baptist Academy boys basketball team and Hurricane High's Show Choirs were honored for bringing State Championship trophies home to their schools.

The crowd did not witness the business meeting and updates from city administrators which followed because the chamber emptied following the recognition proceedings.

The Police Department has acquired two flashing notification signs which instantly inform motorists of their speed. The signs are programmed to keep a record all speeding information. The information does not include pictures of license plates. Mayor Scott Edwards said that the signs will allow the city to identify areas in which motorists are regularly exceeding the speed limit. The city

has recently reduced the speed limit to 15 mph in some residential areas.

Edwards announced that officer Brett Johnson has been recognized for making a high number of DUI arrests. Only one other officer in the state, a member of the Huntington Police Department, has made more DUI arrests this year. Johnson has been with the Hurricane PD for seven months.

City Manager Andy Skidmore announced that the pickle-ball courts at Bridge Park will officially open on Monday, April 18. Skidmore also announced that Hurricane will be obtaining two generators at no cost to the city. Funding will be through FEMA grant money which became available after the June 2012 Dorecheo which left Hurricane without electricity for close to a week. The State of West Virginia will provide the required 25% match for the grant.

Skidmore informed council that the new

The West Virginia State Show Choir Festival was extra sweet for Hurricane High School. This year marks the 30th year of Show Choir competition for Hurricane. Both the Red Hot (mixed Division) and Heat Wave (Womens Division) registered first place finishes and were named Overall Grand Champions.

This year, the Red Hot competed in Ohio, West Virginia, and Indiana and won 5 Overall Grand Championships. Their victories include the Homestead Invitational in Indiana which is the largest show choir competition in the Country. The Red Hot also swept the Winfield Classic, Poca MusicFest, and Teays Valley Classic, along with

the WV State Show Choir Festival.

In total, the Red Hot has won 14 WV State Titles. This year's win marks the 7th consecutive State show choir title.

During this year's competition, the Red Hot

won their 52nd Overall Grand Championship. Thirty of the Overall Grand Championship have been within the last seven years.

The Heat Wave also competed in Ohio, West Virginia, and Indiana.

They swept the single Gender Division at the Teays Valley Classic in Ohio and the West Virginia State Show Choir Festival taking all awards in their division.

They also placed 1st

Brush Fire Destroys Home, Auto, Outbuilding

Wednesday, March 30, was a bad day for fires in Putnam County. Two brush fires roared out of control, one on Scott Depot Road in Hurricane and the other in Liberty. The Liberty fire burned a 53-acre tract while the Hurricane blaze scorched 15 acres.

The Scott Depot Road

fire near Fletcher Road destroyed one residence, a utility building and an automobile. The blaze also damaged three other residences. Quick response by Teays Valley Fire Department limited the losses.

The winds kept firefighters engaged well into Wednesday evening. Fire departments

Five Putnam Students Are National Merit Scholarship Finalists

Five Putnam County high school seniors have been named Finalists in the 67th Annual National Merit Scholarship Program for the 2021-22 school year.

As finalists, Yimin Cai, Connor Stonestreet, Allison Edwards, Matthew Olivero and Carter Leadmon will join

approximately 15,000 other finalists who have advanced from semifinalist status. All five of Putnam's finalists are Hurricane High seniors.

National Merit Finalists represent less than 1 percent of U.S. high school seniors. Finalists will compete to earn three different types of

scholarships worth nearly \$30 million. Scholarships will be awarded this spring and include 2,500 National Merit Scholarships awarded on a state representational basis worth \$2,500, 1,000 corporate-sponsored Merit Scholarship, and 4,000 college-sponsored Merit Scholarship.

JAMES MONROE WALLACE (1886-1966)

James Monroe Wallace, better known as "Jim," was born at Winfield, West Virginia. He was a well-known figure in Hurricane from the early 1900's until his death. He was a tall stately man of Scotch-Irish-German descent, and had many friends in the Hurricane area.

Jim is descended from Benjamin Wallace, Sr., born 1760, and Benjamin's son, Benjamin, Jr. (1790-1861), who married Lettie Wilkes (1796-1887) in 1813 in Luenburg

Since the program's inception in 1988, state citizens have cleaned up close to 70,000 miles of state highways and roads during annual spring and fall Adopt-A-Highway events.

Individuals, families, churches, businesses, schools, civic organizations, government agencies and communities can register to pick up trash on almost any state-maintained road, back road or main route. Private roads and interstate highways cannot be adopted.

The Adopt-A-Highway program provides garbage bags, work gloves and safety vests to volunteers, and takes care of disposing of collected trash. Volunteers must be at least 12 years old to participate. One-time cleanups are encouraged but must be registered.

Groups must register in advance by April 15th and inform their county DOH garage if they need supplies. Due to COVID-19, each group must designate a person to do a curbside pickup of the supplies at their garage.

To register, call 1-800-322-5530 or send an email to dep.aah@wv.gov. If you reach the REAP voicemail, please leave your name, phone number, group name, date of cleanup, number of participants, and the county where your adopted road is located.

The 2021 Adopt-A-Highway spring cleanup saw over 3,500 volunteers from over 400 groups and removed 240,000 pounds of litter from over 1,000 miles of roadway.

REAP, whose motto is 'Keeping WV Clean and Green,' was created in 2005 and strives to clean up West Virginia and rid the state of litter. The program empowers citizens to take ownership of their communities by providing technical, financial, and resource assistance in cleanup and recycling efforts. When I pick up the grandsons, two or three days a week from school, one while the other one goes to Spanish, the younger grandson always wants to tell me the good and bad of his day... week. He is in first grade... kindergarten was virtual. (His brother is fourth grade, and his third grade was online daily with teacher.)

Younger grandson explains what happened... what he liked... what he did not... and Nana says, "Now, we move on... get over it..." He chuckles...

My thirty year journey, since my life changed drastically, was a life of ups and downs. I don't need to write about the downs... they were glitches in the days of my journey... they are over and finished... we move on... the good times are too, too many to write about. It would take a book. I know I will repeat myself in this column... but I want to stress the great opportunities I had after becoming a teacher...

One of my first great memories was receiving my second degree, the bachelor's... education... Language Arts 5-12, Psychology... and on and on... (One was receiving my Master's also... Humanities with a specialty in reading and one in writing.) One in 1994 and the other 2007... that doctorate, although I took tons of classes, eluded me.

I digress.

I remember walking into my first classroom in South Carolina... teachers had a dress code, despite the hot, humid weather. I wore suits with heels and/or dressy dresses with heels... I had a grade book... a classroom... a desk. I was so, so excited... and then those seventh graders won my heart. They chose the song, "Keeper of the Stars" as our theme, and when I left, they wrote me letters addressed as such. I was a teacher.

When I went to Marlboro County High, South Carolina, I had a huge classroom... with many students. Remember, in South Carolina, our classes were bigger, the salaries were

less, fewer benefits, and often no prep period... that never bothered me... I was happy.

They told me at MCHS that I was to be the leader of a club, and they chose the dance club for me. That was a fit... I love dancing... we had a good time learning all the oldies and newer dances...

One experience that changed my life was in 1996 when I was one of thirty teachers, nationwide, to attend the month long Folger's Institute Shakespeare for teachers in D.C. That month changed my teaching... I flew to D.C. We stayed in the dorm at Georgetown where we took a class... we worked at the Folger's with professionals... learning strategies that worked with more than Shakespeare... I fell in love with the man/ the subject forever... a teacher who was fearful of getting in front of the class blossomed... that month changed my life forever and those of my students.

We had the first Shakespeare Festival at MCHS... what an experience... it was magnificent... the students were wonderful... we took those same strategies and performed skits and songs for the Band/Choir Concert also.

In 1997, the Lake City High group convinced me to return; they sent me to Hyannis Port for a week to study and learn to teach Cooperative Learning. I went; I enjoyed; I learned more and more. Those strategies were useful in the classroom, and I aided other teachers in using them.

The Board of Education in South Carolina, in both districts, encouraged (and paid for) their teachers to get more education... it was fantastic.

I sat on the writing board of a college in SC... enjoyed doing that; I learned even more... Eventually, I was chosen as one of the Elite Eleven Shakespeare Teachers... my readers can tell it was a subject that was and is dear to my heart...

One school system sent me to Hilton Head for a week to work on other projects... just going and going and learning... my degrees did not give me all that I needed, but they, of course, gave me the opportunity to teach... One summer, I worked in Columbia for the government... helping to write the state test... all students had to pass a test to graduate... it was NOT an easy test...

So many activities... one summer, I taught summer academy in the south... those kids were so excited to get to go to school in the summer... unusual but true... memories of learning... teaching... having fun while doing it. I met so many teachers from across the nation; we emailed and shared ideas... I loved it...

Good things... great opportunities... wonderful times... wonderful people... caring, deserving students... eager to learn... leaving South Carolina was difficult... but because the way we were is the way we are... I went home to Almost Heaven, WV... more in the next segment of my journey.

County, Virginia. Lettie was the daughter of Minor Wikes, Jr. (1761-1802) and Phoebe (White) (1770-1820). Minor, Jr. was a Baptist preacher and a Revolutionary War Veteran.

Benjamin and Lettie were the parents of thirteen children, all of whom were born in Luenburg County, Virginia. It was sometime before the Civil War that the family moved to Teays Valley. They made their home on Mill Creek where Benjamin was killed when a tree, he and his son Hugh were felling, crushed him. Both Benjamin and Lettie are buried in the Wallace Cemetery back of Milton.

Jessie Wallace (1825-1911), the seventh child and fifth of seven sons, born to Benjamin and Lettie, married Sara Margaret Crowder (1844-1915) in 1870. Sara was born in Fayette County, daughter of Henry Crowder and Delilah Likens. After the birth of their sixth child, they went to Nebraska, but later returned to West Virginia. They lived in the present site of the Estes' homestead. Both are buried in the old Pete Lunsford Cemetery.

They were the parents of ten children: Henry Benjamin (1871) married Louvenia Dunn; David Alexander (1872) married Ora Sovine; Sarah Isobel (1874) married George Daniels; Mary Delilah (1876) married Andy Roach; Cora (1878) married John Long; William Addison (1880) married Grace Queen; Ada Eliza (1883) married Kelly Bess; James Monroe (1886) married May Bell Switzer (Gilfilen); Christine (1889) married William Laten Long; Argelia Mae

(1890) married Pearl Edgar Call.

"Jim" and May were married July 1908. May was born 1878, Cheshire, Ohio; the daughter of Lucy Curtis Chappelle and Americus Valentine Switzer. She was the widow of James Gilfilen with two children; Edward George and Lucy Frances. May died in 1963 at Hurricane.

May and Jim were the parents of six children and one adopted son: Ina Margaret (1909-1909); Cleo Burton (1910-1923); Virginia May (1913) married Jesse Edward Estep, Sr.; Dana Monroe (1915-1940) married Evah Mae Rowsey, (three children); Aura Ida Lenora (1918) married Harold Burton Banks (four children); Arthur David Odell (1920) married Beulah Delilah Estep (three children); James Donald (1927- 1973) (adopted), married Alberta Jeffers (two adopted daughters).

May and Jim faced many heartaches. Their firstborn, Ina, died as an infant. Burton died at age thirteen of pneumonia. Virginia faced life without her hearing after an operation at age thirteen. Dana was asphyxiated by gas while working with his father for United Fuel Gas Company. It was his daughter Jeanette's third birthday and his brother David's first day of work for the gas company.

During Jim and May's marriage, they first lived at Sugar Camp in the Gilfilen property. After a move to Gallipolis, Ohio, where Jim worked in a furniture factory, a move to Cincinnati, Ohio, back to Sugar Camp before 1918. Then in 1919 they moved to Hurricane, and Jim began his work with the United Fuel. He bought

Fire Station adjacent to Bridge Park is still slated for a December 9, 2022 completion.

Marketing and Development Manager Amanda Ramey announced that the merry-go-round at City Park has been restored and is back in operation for the joy of all. The merry-go-round has been part of City Park since initial construction on the park was completed in the early 1970's.

Ramey told council that Hurricane's Main Street Spring Festival will be Saturday, May 7, from 1-5 p.m. May will also see the return of Food Truck Fridays at the Gazebo.

The sign-in sheet for council meetings seldom has more than one or two who wish to address the council. There were

four names at Monday's meeting. All were candidates for political office who wished to introduce themselves and make their priorities known.

First to speak was Michael Kidd, candidate for the House of Delegates, 21st District (the City of Hurricane and immediate areas north of Hurricane and all area south of Hurricane make up the 21st District). Kidd is a private investigator whose services is available to insurance companies and corporations. Kidd listed service to his church and community and family values as factors which voters should consider.

Next up was Michael Thompson, a candidate for Circuit Clerk. Thompson currently serves as the City of Hurricane's municipal judge. He cited church and community service along with experience in the judicial system as things which voters should know.

Incumbent County Commissioner Ron Foster is seeking reelection. Foster touted savings to the county which resulted from his knowledge of the construction industry. He said it was not time to change horses. Foster is the owner of Foster Supply which is a supplier for developers and utilities.

Todd Dillon, also seeking election to the County Commission, informed council of his career choice (financial management) and his service to church and community. Dillon stated that his priorities included protection of family interests.

In other business, council held the second reading of an ordinance approving two annexation by petition requests. The properties involved are the 13.31 acres behind Wendy's on Teays Valley and the access road to the 13.31-acre property.

Council also granted Mayor Edwards authority to sign a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). The MOU will qualify the city to receive opioid settlement funds. The funds must be used by police departments for specific purposes. Final guidelines have yet to be established but funding for PRO officers in public schools (something that Hurricane currently does) is expected to be an approved use.

The next regular council meeting will be Monday, May 2, at 6:30 p.m. The Putnam County Commission

Republicans Introduce Real Emergency Declaration Bill





Thoughts on the Lord's Supper

I Corinthians 11:20-34

Throughout much of his first epistle to the church at Corinth, Paul identifies numerous shortcomings of believers and issues corrective instructions. In the text before us, Paul lets the church know that it was observing the Lord's supper in a most inappropriate manner. Members were partaking of food from home and eating a meal. In some instances it was a meal fitting for a celebratory banquet (v. 21).

In verse 23, the Apostle states that he delivered instruction which he has received from the Lord. All Bible-believing Christians know that all scripture is given by the Holy Spirit who teaches us all things and brings the words of the Lord Jesus into remembrance (Jn. 14:26). Paul's teaching concerning the Lord's supper was revealed to Paul directly from the Lord. It is by the Holy Spirit that we know the intimacy of the Lord's supper. Failure to do as Jesus instructed Paul is an act of utter disregard of His love.

The bread which we eat is symbolic of His body which was broken for us (v. 24). In eating the bread and drinking of the cup, we are engaging in a physical act which testifies of our acceptance of the Father's gift (John 3:16).

The cup which we drink is symbolic of the new covenant —new relationship— which relationship is made possible by His shed blood (v. 25). Again, we are engaging in a physical act which is a testimony. In drinking the cup, we declare the new covenant — a new relationship with God the Father in which the Son sits at His right hand and intercedes for us. Declaration establishes the intent of the declarer. With it, we solemnly acknowledge that all access to the Father is through the Son.

We are to partake of both the bread and the cup in remembrance of Him. While the eating of the bread and drinking of the cup are symbolic, His broken body and shed blood are not. They are literal realities which satisfied our sin debt and made way for our new relationship with God the Father.

In verse 26, the Apostle states that eating of the bread and drinking of the cup declares the Lord's death until He returns. In Matthew 26:29, the Lord informed His disciples that He would not drink of the fruit of the vine again until He drank it new with them in "My Father's kingdom." When we partake of the Lord's supper in remembrance of Him and the things which He taught, we look to the day when He shall come and drink.

This is what Paul received of the Lord and it is what he delivered to the Corinthians that they should do. Many in the church at Corinth were not eating of the bread and drinking of the cup in this manner. They were not doing this in remembrance of Him. They were not testifying of His death for their sins, His presence with the Father as their intercessor, and of His promise come again. The manner in which they observed the Lord's supper made light of what He has done, is doing and shall do. They were guilty of dishonoring the Lord. They were guilty of the body and blood of Christ Jesus.

All believers are called to place God first, others second and self last. When we fail to do as we know to do, we dishonor His body and His blood. Our testimony is lost. Because we fail, we need heed Paul's message to the church at Corinth. We must judge ourselves such that we not be judged and found unworthy (see v. 31).

In the church at Corinth, the Lord's supper had become a time to fill one's belly with bread and to drink wine in excess (see v. 21). Believers are instructed to do this [eating and drinking] in remembrance of Jesus. The failure of the church to judge themselves resulted in God's judgment. Consequently, many were sick and weak and numerous ones had perished (v. 30).

In verse 32, Paul states, "But when we are judged . . ." Being judged is not an "if"; it is a certainty. The Lord desires that we should judge ourselves and right our ways. If we fail to judge ourselves, the Lord will do the judging. His judgment is right and fair. His judgment is merciful. Without His chastening, one is condemned with the world and all that is in the world.

In his closing words concerning the Lord's supper, the Apostle urges the brethren to wait for one another before partaking. In verse 34, he instructs them to eat at home such that physical hunger does not cause them to come together in condemnation. Remembrance of the Lord and filling one's stomach are incompatible. The Lord did not give Himself for us such that we may fill our stomachs. He died that men might know of the Father's loving grace.

In eating and drinking in remembrance of Him, we testify of the past (He died for us); the present (He intercedes for us); and the future (He shall come again). We know that He has reached out to us and desires that all should come to Him in repentance. Let us do that which we know is right to do.

e-WV The West Virginia Encyclopedia

The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

April 7, 1927: A. James Manchin was born in Farmington. In 1984, Manchin ran for state treasurer, but he fell into trouble once elected. With a stock market downturn in 1987, Manchin bore much of the blame when the state lost nearly \$300 million in investments.

April 7, 1947: Medal of Honor recipient Thomas W. Bennett was born in Morgantown. Believing it was wrong to evade the draft while others had to serve in Vietnam, he volunteered as a noncombatant medic. He was killed by gunfire while trying to drag a wounded soldier to safety.

April 8, 1891: The town of Paw Paw was incorporated. Strategically located on the Potomac River, the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad and the C&O Canal, Paw Paw was named for the banana-like pawpaw fruit that grows in the area.

April 8, 1951: An Air National Guard transport

plane crashed near Kanawha (now Yeager) Airport, killing 21.

April 9, 1900: Physician Margaret Byrnside "Dr. Maggie" Ballard was born. She actively pursued her interest in genealogy and local history and was one of the founders of the Monroe County Historical Society.

April 10, 1848: John Kenna was born in Kanawha County. In 1883, the state legislature elected him to the U.S. Senate, unseating the powerful Henry Gassaway Davis. Kenna is one of two West Virginians memorialized by a statue in the U.S. Capitol.

April 10, 1932: Entertainer Blaze Starr was born as Fanny Belle Fleming in Wayne County. The owner of a burlesque club rechristened her "Blaze Starr." She became known as "Queen of the Strippers."

April 11, 1821: Congressman Jacob Beeson Blair was born in Parkersburg. Blair was the first West Virginian to be told by President Abraham Lincoln of Lincoln's support of the admission of West Virginia into the United States.

April 11, 1909: Writer

Hubert Skidmore was born at Laurel Mountain in Webster County. In his novels, Skidmore depicted stoic endurance by mountain people in

the face of misfortune and economic exploitation by outside interests.
