

County Commission Approves Hurricane Annexation Request

4-H Horse Show Moves to Winfield

The City of Hurricane grew 24 acres on Tuesday, April 12, as the Putnam County Commission approved the annexation of the 13.31 acres located behind and adjacent to Wendy's on Teays Valley Road, 10.16 acres of Teays Valley Road right-of-way, and a 0.68 acre access road connecting Teays Valley Road to the 13.31-acre tract into the City of Hurricane.

Commission Andy Skidmore recused himself from voting because of his position as Hurricane City Manager.

AB Holding, the property owner of the 13.31 acres, petition to come into the city following purchasing the property last month. Courthouse records list a transfer of ownership from Valley Pointe Properties to AB Holdings for property valued at \$1.8 million on March 8.

The Hurricane City Council met in a special meeting on March 21 to hold the first reading on the petition for annexation from AB Holding and held the second reading at its regular monthly meeting on April 4. The annexation request

was submitted to the County Commission and placed on the agenda for Tuesday's meeting.

In other business, the Commission voted to enter into a communication tower ground lease arrangement with Gary and Tammy Kale. The arrangement covers a 20-year period at a \$9,000 per year cost. The \$9,000 price tag is subject to increases dependent upon changes in the consumer price index.

The Commission acted on nine cases submitted by the Dilapidated and Abandoned Enforcement Agency (DAEA). In Case No. 2019-04, the Commission voted to place a lien upon the property located at 67 Marina Park in Hurricane. The cases before the Commission included three properties for which the owners had failed to complete required improvements. The Commission voted to grant 30-day extensions for the properties located at 1495 Hurricane Creek Road and at 14925 Charleston Road in Red House. The Commission voted to fine property owner of 65 Second Avenue in Hometown at a rate of \$25 per day

with the stipulation that payment be waived if the specified corrections are made within 30 days.

The next regular commission meeting is scheduled for Thursday, April 28.

This is the first year that the event, which is part of the Putnam County Fair, has been held at this location. For the first two years of its existence, the show took place in late

June at the fairgrounds in Eleanor, prior to the fair itself. However, the fair board decided that this year the show would take place at the Winfield Riding Club,

which is a more suitable facility for showing horses. Unfortunately, the weather for the event was not the best, with drizzling rain and temperatures in

The Centennial History of Hurricane

Meet Some of Hurricane's Oldest Families

In 1988, The Centennial History of Hurricane, (1853-1936) and Eliza Melisky Welker (1864-1943) moved from Darwin, Meigs County, Ohio, to Putnam County, West Virginia, in 1893. They first lived on the James Mynes farm on the James River Turnpike (now Route 60), two miles east of Hurricane. Edward worked as a tenant farmer for Mr. Mynes until 1895 when he moved to Hodges Branch Road and began working for Jim Bailey, who ran a sawmill.

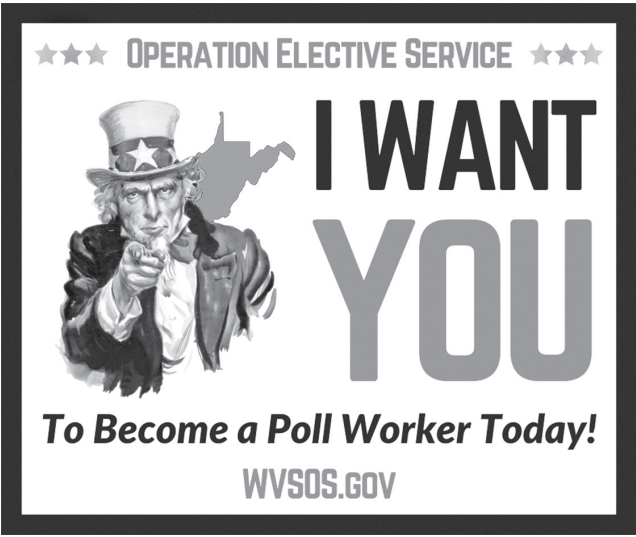

Warner Encourages Citizens To Sign Up To Be A Poll Worker For May 10 Primary Election



Plans are continuing to be finalized by the state's 55 county clerks for West Virginia's upcoming May 10 Primary Election. One of the most important responsibilities for each clerk is to fully staff voting precincts with trained poll workers.

"Poll workers play a critical role in providing fair and accessible elections for every voter," said WV Secretary of State Mac Warner.

"The most secure way of casting a ballot in an election is to do so at a safe and secure polling location managed by a group of trained and bipartisan poll workers where every voter is given the opportunity to cast a secret ballot without any influence or pressure from another individual," Warner said.

County clerks work closely with political party executive committees to recruit poll workers to ensure that both parties are represented in each precinct. According to Warner, with 1,699 voting precincts throughout the state, more than 8,500 poll workers are required for election day.

"We will always have a few poll workers who get sick or need to "call off" at the last minute from being a poll worker. That's why it is so important to have individuals trained and ready to serve as back-up or alternative poll

To be a poll worker in West Virginia, an individual must:

Be properly registered to vote

Be able to read and write in English

Attend a poll worker training program for which you will be paid

Poll workers are paid to attend a short Poll Worker Training Class. They are also paid for a full day's work on Election Day. Polling locations are open from 6:30 am to 7:30 pm for the May 10 Primary Election.

The WV Secretary of State's Office has made it easy to go online to volunteer to become a poll worker. Go to the secure website GoVoteWV.com and then click on the box that reads "Become a Poll Worker." Complete the application and then the WVSOS Elections Division will then share that information with the individual's county clerk. Citizens can also contact their county clerk to volunteer.

"Being a poll worker is a very patriotic service to your county, state and country. I want to encourage all citizens to consider becoming a poll worker to actively participate in the free, fair and secure election process we have here in West Virginia," Warner said.

the 40’s.

The horse show was open to both children and teens involved in the 4-H program as well as members of the community, and featured a total of thirty-nine classes. Crowd-pleasing classes included competing against on stick horses and attempting to balance an egg on a spoon while riding horseback. The event also featured a pet show to begin the competition.

The 2021 Putnam County Fair Queen, Alisa Grady of Buffalo, presented ribbons to the winners.

“It is important for the youth to come out to these shows,” said Andrew Parsons, vice president of the fair board. “It shows responsibility on their part to take care of the animals.”

The show was named in honor of Derek Casto, who was a former president of the Putnam County Fair board. Casto, who was very involved in the local horse scene, passed away in 2018.

and Coleman (1897-1898).

Edward was a large man for those days, standing 6-ft., 1 in., and weighing 200 pounds. He had lost the sight of one eye while working on the railroad in Ohio, and eventually he became totally blind. However, that didn’t deter him from turning his 40-acre farm into one of the most productive in the area.

With his team of horses, he cultivated the garden near the road and raised an orchard on the hills above the house. He prided himself on the large variety of fruits and berries he grew. Because his farming was so successful, there was always produce to sell, and Eliza handled those duties.

She was a familiar sight in Hurricane, dressed all in black and sitting ramrod straight as she drove her buggy up and down the dirt streets offering the high-quality fruit and vegetables the townspeople had learned to expect from the Welkers. She was often helped in these duties by her grandson, Howard Doyle Welker (1911-?), who she and her husband raised.

Eliza was a charter

Witnesses to Resurrection

I Corinthians 15:1-11

In the text before us, Paul gives the Corinthians a refresher course in that which he preached during his ministry in their city. Paul was moved to write that which he had preached (and the Corinthians had received) because he received reports that some within the church were saying that there was no resurrection from the dead (see v. 12).

Earlier in this epistle, Paul stated that he had come to Corinth to declare the testimony of God (I Cor. 2:1). In chapter 2, Paul said that he was determined to know nothing among them except Christ and Him crucified. Paul preached much more than Christ crucified. He preached Christ crucified, resurrected, sitting at the right hand of the Father making intercession for all who believe and Christ coming again. Paul had preached these things, yet, there were some who said that there be no resurrection of the dead.

In verse 1, Paul stated that the Corinthians had received that which he preached. They had taken hold of the gospel (the good news from God) which he had delivered to them.

In verse 2, Paul wrote that the gospel which he preached is the gospel “By which also ye are saved”. Verse 2 does not end with the word, saved. Attached is the condition that one must hold in memory or must hold fast to that which Paul preached. There are some who take this condition to mean that one can lose his or her salvation. The closing words of verse 2 say something different.

The closing words, “unless you have believed in vain”, constitute something which is not possible. One cannot believe the word of God without effect (in vain). Believing God changes everything forever. One cannot fail to hold fast to the word of God which Paul preached unless one never believed that which God said.

In verses 3 and 4, Paul stated that he had delivered that which he had received. The scriptures are the word of God. The scriptures declare that “my righteous servant” shall justify many because he shall bear their iniquities (Isa. 53:11). The psalmist declared, “neither wilt thou suffer thine Holy One to see corruption (Ps. 16:11) and “Thou hast ascended on high” (Ps. 68:18). Paul preached that which the scriptures declare. Paul preached the death and resurrection of the Lord. If the Corinthians received the gospel which Paul preached, they believed that Christ rose from the dead.

There were some in the church who only believed part of the good news which Paul had delivered to them. In verse 2, Paul directly addressed those who only believed part of that which he preached. They believed that Christ died for them but not that He rose on the third day. One cannot have certainty of salvation if one does not believe the entire testimony of God which the gospel proclaims.

The believers in the church at Corinth, unlike the vast majority of present day believers, were not reared in a culture that was acceptant of the resurrection. The view of resurrection of the dead in the Greek culture is seen in Acts 17:32 — “ . . . some mocked: and others said, We will hear thee again of this matter.”

In verses 4-8, Paul lists those who saw the resurrected Christ. Peter (Cephas) saw Him (Lk. 24:34); the twelve saw Him. There were more than five hundred in all who witnessed the resurrected Jesus. Jesus was seen by James (likely the author of the epistle of James). Last of all, Paul experienced the resurrected Christ on the Damascus road.

The Greeks viewed resurrection of the dead as an impossible thing. All of the witnesses which Paul listed witnessed the impossible. Paul did not believe until he witnessed the impossible. Paul did not know God until he saw the impossible.

Believing in the resurrected Christ changed him. Saul became Paul. Saul persecuted the church of God; Paul labored to build the church of God. In verse 9, Paul stated that he was not worthy to be called an apostle. Paul was an apostle because he was appointed by Christ to deliver the gospel to the Gentiles. Paul considered himself unworthy because he had zealously persecuted the church. Paul was appointed by Christ (Acts 9:15). Paul was qualified, not by any works (he had none). Paul was qualified by the grace of God (v. 10). Powered by grace, and grace alone, Paul labored more abundantly than all the other apostles. Paul stated, “ . . . not I, but the grace of God which was with me.”

Paul preached Christ died for our sins according to the scriptures and that He rose again according to the scriptures. Paul, powered by the grace of God, preached and the Corinthians believed. God reveals Christ and Him resurrected to all who will believe. By grace, we hear, and by grace we believe.

Let us, by grace, declare that which we have received.

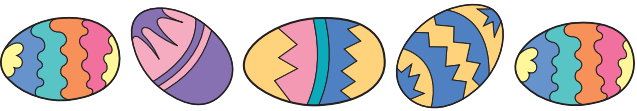

Serves: 24

- 16 ounces frozen spinach, thawed
- 8 ounces cream cheese
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon onion powder
- 1/4 teaspoon chili powder
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 teaspoon Italian seasoning
- 1 cup shredded Parmesan cheese
- 1 1/2 cups shredded mozzarella cheese, divided
- 2 crescent roll tubes (8 ounces each)

Heat oven to 375 F.
In skillet, over medium heat, cook spinach, cream cheese and garlic 3-4 minutes until cream cheese is melted. Stir in mayonnaise, salt, onion powder, chili powder, pepper and Italian seasoning. Stir in Parmesan cheese and 1/2 cup mozzarella cheese. Cook until cheese is melted. Keep skillet on burner over low heat.
Remove dough from tubes. Leaving dough intact, roll and stretch into 18-inch ropes. Cut each rope into 12 pieces for 24 total.
On baking sheet with parchment paper, form bunny head by placing one piece of dough in middle then surrounding it with six more pieces. Use 13 pieces to form round body. Use remaining pieces to form ears on top of head.
Scoop hot spinach dip into center. Spoon small portions on each ear. Sprinkle ears and belly with remaining mozzarella cheese.
Bake 18 minutes, or until crescent dough is golden brown and thoroughly cooked.

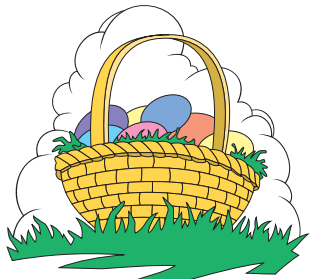

April 14, 1774: Surveyors met at the mouth of the Kanawha River to establish military bounty claims in Kentucky. They became involved in several skirmishes with Indians in the region. This was the start of Dunmore’s War, the name given to the conflict in the Ohio Valley in the spring of 1774.

April 15, 1872: Peter Godwin Van Winkle died in Parkersburg. Van Winkle was a member of the Governor’s Council of the Reorganized Government of Virginia, 1861–63, under Gov. Francis Pierpont. On August 4, 1863, Van Winkle was elected as one of the first two U.S. senators from the new state of West Virginia.

April 16, 1829: Jacob Beeson Jackson was born in Parkersburg. In 1880, he became West Virginia’s sixth governor.

April 16, 1923: Arch Moore was born at Moundsville. He was the first governor in 100 years to serve a second term, and he returned later for a third.

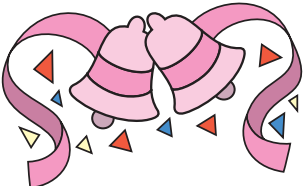

West Virginia State University’s (WVSU) Counseling Services and Department of Health and Human Performance are sponsoring a Health Expo and Out of the Darkness Walk on Thursday, April 21. The Health Expo is from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. inside the James C. Wilson University Union. The Out of the Darkness Walk will begin with an opening ceremony at 12:45 p.m.

The Out of the Darkness Walk is a partnership with WVSU Counseling Services and the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention (AFSP). Anyone can register to walk as an individual or with a team. The walks are the AFSP’s signature student fundraising series, designed to engage youth and young adults in the fight to prevent suicide. Participants can walk to support a friend, a loved one, or themselves.

“Suicide is a leading cause of death among college-age students,” said Kellie Toledo, director of Counseling

Services at WVSU. “The purpose of this walk is to raise awareness of suicide, prevention, as well as mental health issues. We want to make sure students know the resources available to them and that help is available.”

The AFSP says depression, bipolar, anxiety disorder, and other mental health conditions will affect 1 in 4 people and too often the illnesses go untreated. In the United States alone, someone attempts suicide every minute.

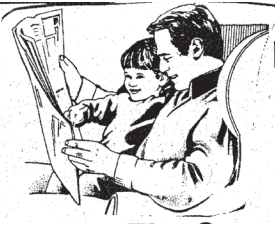
