

The Hummingbirds Have Arrived

No one enjoys hummingbirds any more than Linda Armstead of Washington Hill Road, north of Hurricane. Every spring, Linda fills a feeder with sugar water and has it waiting for early arrivals. On Friday, April 15th, her first hummingbird of 2022 arrived. Linda reports, "At 6:54 pm, I heard a little buzz and looked at the feeder and there was a little bird sipping at my delicatessen!" Her excitement was such that her mouth flew open and chills ran up and down her legs. Linda is always excited for the first hummingbird

sighting of the year. Her earliest sighting ever was on April 8, 1993. The latest arrival date was April 25, 2020. Surprisingly, the hummers are not influenced by fluctuations in temperatures or weather. Linda reports that the ground was totally covered with snow on one occasion. This year's April 15 date is close to the historical average at the Armstead residence. Linda documented Friday's arrival on video. She says that the little bird sat for a good while sipping, and that after it left, another one came. She is uncertain if it is the same bird or a different one.

Woodworth Dairy Farm Burns



Around 6:45 p.m. on Tuesday, April 19, police and EMS were dispatched to the old Woodworth farm on Main Street, Hurricane, for a structure fire. Mayor Scott Edwards arrived on scene first to find the Woodworth house to be fully involved.

The Woodworth Dairy Farm was the primary milk producer for the Hurricane area from 1929 until after World War II. In 1971, it became a beef cattle farm. The old farm house was a Sears, Roebuck and Company house — it was purchased from Sears, brought to Hurricane by

rail and put together at this site sometime around 1915-1920. The house had been empty for nearly 20 years. Clarence Woodworth, who grew up on the farm, arrived on scene minutes after Mayor Edwards did and watched the house burn to the ground. Firefighters from Hurricane, Culloden and

Teays Valley responded to this call. On March 22, 2013, the Woodworth farm was the site of an explosion which resulted in the destruction of the largest barn. No one knew what caused the explosion, but the resulting fire left the barn a ruin. Another part of a Hurricane landmark has been reduced to ashes.

The Centennial History of Hurricane

The Way We Were, The Way We Are

Scarlet Oaks Golf course. While each vehicle at the show has its own story, Billy Jeffers' 1972 International pickup's tale was like none other.

International pickups of any year or model are a rarity today. The last to roll off the assembly line was in 1975. While collectors seek to possess and show that which is different and scarce, Jeffers was moved by a thirty-year-plus memory to take on a restoration which is now in its third year.

"This is a 1310 model. It is the same model and year as the one in which I learned to drive and drove when I went for my driver's license, when I was 16 years old" Jeffers said. "I had always worked on cars and enjoyed car shows but never was part of one until I saw and bought this vehicle."

It is not Jeffers' goal to restore the pickup to its shiny newness of 1972. "I grew up out in the country. We kept our vehicles running by fixing them the best that we could. This truck is about those memories," he stated.

The front bumper of the International is unique. It consists of a menagerie of discarded tools and other items which the Jeffers family used to make do and keep equipment operational. Each saw blade, each wrench, each screwdriver is part of the past and has a story of its own.

"This vehicle is made up of many memories," Jeffers said, "I think of it as a tribute to my Dad."

The International is not Jeffers' only restoration project. "I am working on a 1980 Firebird. It was my Dad's favorite. My wife will be showing it at future shows," he added.

The Poca Car/Truck Show was the first of the season for Jeffers. It looks to be the first of many this year. Jeffers was a regular participant at area cruises during 2021.



Meringue Nests:

1 1/4 cups granulated sugar
6 large eggs
1 teaspoon cream of tartar
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
2 teaspoons cornstarch

Garnish:

1 cup heavy whipping cream
1 teaspoon granulated sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract (or 1 vanilla bean, scraped)
1/2 pint fresh strawberries, sliced

To make meringue nests: Preheat oven to 200 F. On parchment paper-
lined baking sheet, spread sugar evenly and bake 5-7 minutes to slightly heat.
Remove sugar from oven then increase oven temperature to 225 F.

Carefully separate egg whites from yolks completely. In bowl of hand or
stand mixer fitted with whip attachment, whisk egg whites on medium-low
speed until foamy about 1 minute.

Slowly add sugar 2-3 tablespoons at a time and mix on medium speed 2
minutes between each addition. Sugar needs completely mixed into egg whites
to ensure success. Continue mixing on medium until mixed through and
meringue does not feel gritty.

Add cream of tartar, vanilla extract and cornstarch. Increase to high speed
and beat until stiff peaks form.

On two parchment paper-lined baking sheets, pipe or spread meringue with
spoon into six 4-inch circular "nests."

Bake 1 hour, 15 minutes then turn off oven and let meringues cool without
opening oven for at least 4 hours or overnight. The USDA recommends egg
dishes be cooked to 160 F.

To make garnish: When ready to serve, in clean mixing bowl fitted with whip
attachment, whip heavy whipping cream on medium speed. Slowly add sugar
and vanilla. Continue mixing on high speed 2-3 minutes until stiff peaks form.

Dollop whipped cream on meringue nests and top with sliced strawberries.




God's Comfort in Trouble

II Corinthians 1:1-11

There is a gap in time of approximately one year between the writing of Paul's two epistles to the church at Corinth. The two epistles were written from different cities. II Corinthians was written from somewhere in Macedonia while I Corinthians was written from Ephesus. It is apparent from the content and tone of the second epistle that the church had received and had responded to the things that the apostle had addressed in his first epistle.

In verse 3, Paul praises God as the Father of mercies and as the God of all comfort. This is the only epistle of the thirteen which Paul is known to have written that opens with these descriptive terms of God. There is a reason that the Apostle Paul uses "Father of mercies" and "God of all comfort" in this address. That reason is revealed in verse 4 and further elaborated upon in verses 8 and 9. Paul and those with him were the focus of a major civil disturbance in Ephesus in which the worshippers of the goddess Diana were ready to do them harm because Paul taught that there were no gods that are made by the hands of men. Paul's reference to tribulation is rooted in that which occurred in Ephesus.

What happened to Paul and those in his company was life-threatening. Miraculously, the out of control mob was quieted and dispersed peacefully. Paul did not experience fear, he experienced the comfort of God. In the text before us he was moved by the Holy Spirit to praise God for His comfort and to state the reason that God had given it.

God gave His comfort to Paul and those with him for the express purpose that it be shared: "... that we may be able to comfort them which are in any trouble, by the comfort wherewith we ourselves are comforted of God" (v. 4). Paul knew what God wants all men to know. Paul knew that God wants believers to share all that with He gives to them. God gives us His love such that we might declare it and share it.

In verse 5, Paul shares with the Corinthians (and with us) something else which God wants men to know of His comfort. The apostle states that as one's suffering for the sake of Christ abounds, the consolation (comfort) one has in Christ also abounds. God gives that which is needed in the measure that fulfills that need.

The apostle makes what seems to be a counter intuitive statement in verse 6. He states that both the affliction and the comfort which he and others experience is for their (the Corinthians) benefit. The affliction and the comfort of which the apostle speaks are poles apart. From a perspective common to man, affliction is bad and comfort is good. Paul writes from God's perspective. With God all things are possible. "All things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose" (Rom. 8:28). The apostle explains a manner in which his suffering is beneficial: it can be helpful to others who find themselves in similar situations. The manner in which believers deal with affliction bears witness of a power and strength that is given to us by God. We bear witness of that which He has given.

Paul's statement can be extended to those who suffer for the sake of Christ in every era, including today. Today, the Apostle Paul writes on behalf of suffering Christian minorities which live under the threat of death in nations dominated by Islamic jihad. Their suffering, like the suffering that Paul endured, is of benefit to fellow Christians. Their suffering produces a testimony of strength to other believers who are or will be tested in like manner. Their suffering is notice to those who do not suffer that it is by His grace and grace alone that they are spared from affliction.

In verse 9, the apostle identifies God as the source of his comfort: "... that we should not trust in ourselves, but in God which raised the dead." Paul does not minimize the despair which he experienced (see v. 8). It was beyond his strength to overcome. Paul, in facing death, found comfort because his trust was in Him who raised up the dead.

The apostle makes it known in verse 10 that the God who delivered him and those with him from death "doth deliver" (present tense) and "will yet deliver" (future tense). What God has done in the past is evidence of that which He does in the present and what that He shall do in the future. God is faithful to His every promise. Our trust is in the God who raises up the dead. Death has no hold upon them who trust.

While Paul recognized that his delivery from death was of God whom he (and those with him) trusted, the apostle also cites the power of the prayers that were offered on his behalf. The "helping together by prayer" were prayers of support for Paul's ministry. Prayers of support make one part of that for which prayer is offered. Paul's delivery from death is the result of answered prayer and is the cause for many prayers of thanks.

The words of this epistle were preserved as scripture for the benefit of all who would ever read them. God is faithful to them who trust in Him and faithful to answer the prayers of them who call upon Him for need.

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When It Comes to New Vehicle Technology, Practice Doesn't Make Perfect

Owners of new vehicles equipped with driving assistance technology may understand it better after six months of use, but the depth of their knowledge is limited. New AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety research found motorists who used the "learn as you go" approach did not understand the technology as well as another group of motorists who participated in brief, intensive hands-on training. Also, researchers became aware of a small, overconfident group of motorists who falsely believed their time behind the wheel gave them expertise with the system. "Our research finds that motorists who are learning how to use driver-assistance systems in new vehicles need more than a simple 'self-taught' approach," said Theresa Podguski, director of legislative affairs, AAA East Central. "But the study also shows that motorists who have been given the proper training are much better equipped to use the vehicle's technology."

AAA recommends that researchers, automakers, and government agencies work together to better understand motorist performance, behavior, and interactions in vehicles with advanced technologies.

Advanced driver-assistance systems are now common with features such as acceleration, braking, and steering in support

of vehicle operations. The Foundation has previously documented gaps in motorists' understanding of these technologies and the resulting safety implications. Less is known about how a motorist's grasp of new technology develops and changes over time, which is the focus of this new report.

For this study, the Foundation looked at one of the most prevalent advanced driver-assistance systems found in new vehicles, adaptive cruise control (ACC). This type of cruise control assists with acceleration and braking to help maintain a driver-selected distance from the car in front. The Foundation examined how the understanding and use of ACC changed over the first six months of ownership for new vehicle owners unfamiliar with the technology.

The study found the following results:

During the first six months of new vehicle ownership, many motorists demonstrated an improved understanding of the ACC system's limitations.

Despite learning more about ACC through regular use, the motorists failed to achieve the same level of understanding as another group that received short but extensive instruction on the system.

A potentially dangerous sub-group of overconfident motorists emerged who failed to understand ACC yet were highly self-assured

in their knowledge. This development demands future study.

Some of the gaps in understanding include the following:

Falsely believing that the system will react to stationary objects in their lane, such as construction cones or other obstacles.

Falsely believing that the system will provide steering input to keep the vehicle in its lane.

Falsely believing that the system can operate in all weather conditions.

AAA recommends that new vehicle owners follow this PLAN:

- **Purpose**—Learn the purpose of driving assistance technology by requesting hands-on training at the dealership, reading the vehicle's owner's manual and visiting the manufacturer's website.

- **Limitations**—Do not make any assumptions about what the technology can and cannot do. A driving assistance system should not be confused with a self-driving one.

- **Allow Time For Practice**—Allow time for safe on-road practice so motorists know exactly how this technology works in real driving situations.

- **Never Rely On It**—Do not rely on this technology; instead, act as if the vehicle does not have it so the motorist is always prepared to retake control

if needed.

For this research, 39 experienced motorists between 25 and 65 were recruited. Each participant had purchased a vehicle equipped with ACC within the previous six weeks and it was not present on any vehicle they previously owned. Each motorist was assessed at the start of the study and several times during the first six months. Please refer to the full report for methodology details.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulation which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. We treat our water according to EPA's regulations. Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

Our water system has an estimated population of 8248 and is required to test a minimum of 9 samples per month in accordance with the Total Coliform Rule microbiological contaminants. Coliform bacteria are usually harmless, but their presence in water can be an indication of disease-causing bacteria. When coliform bacteria are found, special follow-up tests are done to determine if harmful bacteria are present in the water supply. If the limit is exceeded, the water supplier must notify the public.

Water Quality Data

The following tables list all of the drinking water contaminants which were detected during the 2020 calendar year. The presence of these contaminants does not necessarily indicate the water poses a health risk. Unless noted, the data presented in this table is from the testing done January 1 - December 31, 2020. NOTICE OF FILING AND HEARING

On January 26, 2022, Appalachian Power Company (APCo) and Wheeling Power Company (WPCo) (together, the Companies) filed a petition seeking the recovery of costs associated with APCo's agreements to acquire the Amherst solar facility, Firefly solar facility, and Top Hat wind facility and APCo's agreements to purchase renewable energy products from the Dogwood, Horsepen, and Sun Ridge solar facilities. The Companies' application is on file with and available for public inspection at the Public Service Commission, 201 Brooks Street, Charleston, WV 25301.

The acquisition of the aforementioned renewable energy generation facilities and the purchase of the aforementioned renewable energy products can be expected to have an ultimate impact on the Companies' West Virginia retail rates at some point in the future. The Companies do not expect these transactions to lead to any significant increase in customer rates. Rather, the Companies project that the transactions will reduce customer rates over the lives of the solar and wind facilities.

The Companies have proposed a Renewable Power Plus (RPP) Tariff to be offered on a voluntary basis to all customers in addition to the Companies' standard tariff offerings. A copy of the RPP Tariff is on file with the Commission. It is anticipated that, over time, the costs of the Amherst, Firefly, and Top Hat facilities will be paid by the customers subscribing to the RPP Tariff and offset by the cost of service benefits produced by those facilities, including the sale of renewable energy certificates. The costs of the renewable energy products purchased from the Dogwood, Horsepen, and Sun Ridge facilities are proposed to be recovered in expanded net energy charge (ENEC) rates.

The only facility projected to be in service during the first rate year is the Amherst solar facility. The gross costs of Amherst will be recovered through the Companies' construction surcharge. For that surcharge, the Companies propose to increase rates in Year 1 by \$412,731, as shown in the table below. However, the costs being paid for by subscribing customers through the RPP Tariff and the other cost of service benefits produced by the Amherst solar facility will be credited back to all customers through the proposed West Virginia Solar Rider and the Companies' ENEC, resulting in a much smaller net increase. On January 26, 2022, Appalachian Power Company (APCo) and Wheeling Power Company (WPCo) (together, the Companies) filed a petition seeking the recovery of costs associated with APCo's agreements to acquire the Amherst solar facility, Firefly solar facility, and Top Hat wind facility and APCo's agreements to purchase renewable energy products from the Dogwood, Horsepen, and Sun Ridge solar facilities. The Companies' application is on file with and available for public inspection at the Public Service Commission, 201 Brooks Street, Charleston, WV 25301.

The acquisition of the aforementioned renewable energy generation facilities and the purchase of the aforementioned renewable energy products can be expected to have an ultimate impact on the Companies' West Virginia retail rates at some point in the future. The Companies do not expect these transactions to lead to any significant increase in customer rates. Rather, the Companies project that the transactions will reduce customer rates over the lives of the solar and wind facilities.

The Companies have proposed a Renewable Power Plus (RPP) Tariff to be offered on a voluntary basis to all customers in addition to the Companies' standard tariff offerings. A copy of the RPP Tariff is on file with the Commission. It is anticipated that, over time, the costs of the Amherst, Firefly, and Top Hat facilities will be paid by the customers subscribing to the RPP Tariff and offset by the cost of service benefits produced by those facilities, including the sale of renewable energy certificates. The costs of the renewable energy products purchased from the Dogwood, Horsepen, and Sun Ridge facilities are proposed to be recovered in expanded net energy charge (ENEC) rates.

The only facility projected to be in service during the first rate year is the Amherst solar facility. The gross costs of Amherst will be recovered through the Companies' construction surcharge. For that surcharge, the Companies propose to increase rates in Year 1 by \$412,731, as shown in the table below.
