## West Virginia's Lying Covid-19 Numbers Putnam County Library Sponsors 'Healthy Earth, Healthy You'

Purposely, misquoting the popular quotation — "There are three kinds of falsehoods, lies, damned lies and West Virginia Covid-19 statistics."

West Virginia's Covid numbers lie because they strongly suggest that vaccination against the disease is without value or worse, harmful.

On Tuesday, April 26, the DHHR reported 81 Covid hospitalizations statewide. More than half, 41, were listed as fully vaccinated. If this statistic is NOT a lie, vaccination against the disease is no better than not being vaccinated.

A closer look at the DHHR data reveals that 22 of the hospitalized were in ICU. Half (11) were fully vaccinated and half were not. If true, what is the value of having been vaccinated? The lying DHHR Covid number declares that there is no value.

An even closer look at Tuesday's DHHR numbers show that 12 individuals, statewide, were listed as being on ventilators. Of the 12 patients on vents, seven were fully vaccinated and five were not vaccinated. If these numbers are true, it is reasonable to conclude that vaccination is either worthless or,

worse, harmful.

The DHHR Covid number are correct and the numbers do not lie. That said, to suggest that vaccination against Covid-19 was worthless is a misuse of numbers.

Here's why. The Covid-19 that has 81 West Virginians receiving hospital care is not the Covid-19 that resulted in 6,845 deaths since the beginning of the pandemic. The Covid-19 strains which produced most deaths are no longer in circulation. The vaccine made it necessary for the virus to mutate or die out. The virus became more contagious but less harmful.

The DHHR Covid-19 numbers do, however, suggest that past and present vaccines are totally ineffective against the strains now in circulation. Currently (as of April 26 reporting), there are 36 active cases in Putnam County. This number is up from the 11 cases reported on March 26. Putnam's active case numbers hit a seasonal high of 477 during the first week of February.

The current numbers tell a different story than that which the numbers of six months ago told. Current numbers suggest that it is a lie to claim that vaccinations and booster shots have any value

## Meet Some of Hurricane's Oldest Families

In 1988, The Centennial History of Hurricane, WV was published to commemorate the town's 100th anniversary. Since the Centennial History is now out of print, the Breeze is reprinting articles from the book as space allows. This week's selection will be the 241st installment of the Centennial History.

On Sept. 16, 1824, not far from a stage coach stop at Hurricane Bridge on the James River Turnpike, John Wheeler married Margaret Paul and became the head of our Wheeler clan in Putnam County. John and Margaret settled at the mouth of Clymers Creek on Trace Fork River and opened a large farm on the banks of those streams. They were the parents of six children: Margaret (1827), Elias (1828), Noah (1830), Archibald Robinson (1832), Nancy (Continued to Page 3)

## Goldenseal Magazine Spring Issue Now Available

The Spring 2022 issue of GOLDENSEAL is now available. Since 1975, GOLDENSEAL has been West Virginia's Magazine of Traditional Life.

Much of this issue is dedicated to Pocahontas County, which is celebrating its bicentennial. Three West Virginia University Public History students contributed to the magazine. Elizabeth Satterfield takes us back to the timber ghost town of Spruce; Jennifer Mihal visits the historic Sharp's Country Store at Slaty Fork; and Kristen Bailey looks at timber-related folk songs. In addition, Louise Burner writes about her ancestral home at Cass, which is now a museum and art gallery. There are poems by her family's matriarch, Virginia Clark Burner, and by poet Kirk Judd, as well as a previously unpublished story by former state Poet Laureate Louise McNeill. This issue also includes a photo spread about Marlinton's Pioneer Days celebration in the 1970s, and Carl E. Feather visits with Bill Young, who preserves old apple varieties in Frost, W.Va.

In addition to the stories of Pocahontas County, Ivan M. Tribe and Jake Bapst examine the long country music career of Slim Lehart, known as "The Wheeling Cat." Candy Thompson profiles Howard Teets of Rowlesburg, Preston County; Tom Zielinsky details Zalia, a now-abandoned brick-making

community in Hancock County; Merle T. Cole looks at the history of Special Forces stationed in Beckley; Sherry Hill remembers former West Virginia State College (now University) Professor Zeona Haley, the stepmother of Roots author Alex Haley; and the Rev. O. Richard Bowyer recalls his time serving on the state Board of Medicine.

This issue also looks back at the 2020 and 2021 Vandalia Award recipients and the 2021 award-winning quilts and wall hangings, sponsored by the State Museum. Finally, Sara Bragg Aikin writes about the Veterans Memorial Museum of Southern West Virginia in Hinton, Summers County.

(1836), and Charles (1838). Elias (married Elizabeth Harbour) and Noah (married Amanda Cooper) were farmer/merchants and owned stores in and around Hurricane. Nancy married James Nichols. Arch married Minerva Jane Wheeler on Oct. 1, 1857. Jane was born in Little Rock, Ark., the daughter of Alexander and Mary Wheeler, and was reputed to be of Cherokee Indian descent. She was born during the "Trail of Broken Tears" episode, so it is possible.

When the Civil War began, Noah enlisted immediately, but Arch enlisted a year later when Capt. Morris Kirtley came through Putnam County recruiting for a new company of Confederate cavalry. He was captured in late 1864 and spent the rest of the war as a prisoner at Ft. Delaware. Arch was a master stone mason, and after the war, he resumed working at this craft, moving often and traveling extensively about the state. Evidence of his skill can still be seen in the chimneys on old farm houses and perhaps on some stone bridges in the Charleston area.

Arch and Jane were the parents of five children: James (1858), Mary (1860), John (1864), Lee (1866), and Andrew (1870). James married Elizabeth Garrett and followed the craft of his father as a stone mason and farmer. They were the parents of nine children, including three sets of twins: William, Hezakiah, George, Jeff, Myrtle, Owen, Ola, Guy and Nye. James also had two sons by

a second marriage - Ernest, who lives in Milton, and Henry, who lives in Beckley. William, who married Neta McAbay, was perhaps the most prominent Wheeler to live in Hurricane. In 1925, he began operating a grocery store on Main Street that was later owned by Delmar Pullen. When water and sewer came to town in the early 1930's, Bill moved across the tracks to the old McCallister store building and opened a plumbing and hardware business. He plumbed most of the houses in town and wired many of them for electricity. He continued to operate the business until his death in 1962.

George married (1) Ollie Elkins and worked for the gas company. Their children were: Finley, Broad, Asa, Waldo, Arta, Arlie, Sherman and Fred. George married (2) Alice Johnson Campbell and their children were: Tom, who married Lois Hodge and lived in Hurricane; Lossee, who married Maria Steed and moved to Oregon, and are the parents of Michael, Mary Ann, Angela, Joseph and Elizabeth Jane; Jane, who married Okey Miller, lives in Hurricane and their children are Wayne, who married Robin Curtis and lives in Kentucky, and Sandy, who married Biff Larch and they are with the Army in Germany; and Charles, who married Marie Faulkner and lives in Hurricane. Their children are Rhonda, who attends Marshall University, and Tommy, who attends Hurricane High School. The Wheeler heritage lives on today.

present, and children were given instructions on how to deal with house fires and other emergencies.

Health Net landed a helicopter on the bank parking lot early in the day, and 96.1 Superstar Country did a live broadcast during the event.

There were also several obstacle courses for children, as well as a fire relay race where participants used real fire hoses to knock down fake flames. Fire departments

would allow gardeners to save money on supplies, as well as give new purpose to ordinary household garbage.

Bowen also discussed how table scraps could be used as compost to help improve garden soil. He suggested saving eggshells and grinding them up to add calcium to the soil. Coffee grounds also add nitrogen to the ground, helping tomatoes, potatoes, onions and roses grow. He also suggested keeping fruit and vegetable scraps away from the garden so that rabbits would eat the scraps instead of the garden.

During the workshop, Bowen demonstrated the proper way of using pre-made seed starter mix: by adding water to the mix before planting seeds, as the dry nature of these types of potting soils actually repel water at first. Gardeners can purchase biodegradable planters, or make their

own with cardboard egg containers or by drying wet newspapers in muffin tins to give them shape.

As part of the hands-on portion of the demonstration, Bowen led both children and parents in mixing up seed starter and planting

parsley and cilantro seeds to take home. He also led his audience in making hummingbird and butterfly seed bombs which can be dropped on the ground and planted anywhere. These seed bombs are made by combining wet potting

soil, air dried clay, and seed mixture, and then rolling the dough-like concoction into balls. The seeds begin to germinate within the balls and the rain will wash the soil away, leaving the seedlings behind.

Bowen is a nutrition educator and registered dietician who gives healthy living presentations in area schools through the K-2nd nutrition education grant through the USDA. "The Marshall University Nutrition Education Program encourages healthy lifestyle changes early in life," he says. "We like to engage the entire county through community events, and appreciate the library for partnering with us to help make sustainable changes."

The "Healthy Earth, Health You!" presentation was part of the Putnam County Library's Earth Week celebration.

Pour cream cheese mixture into 1 1/2-quart ice cream freezer. Freeze according to manufacturer's directions.





**Rules of the game: Pickleball**

Pickleball is a racquet sport that combines elements of tennis, table tennis and badminton. It is played on a court that measures the same as a doubles badminton court and uses a ball similar to, but smaller and harder than, a wiffle ball. The game can be played indoors or outdoors. The National Senior Games pickleball courts are inside the Cleveland Convention Center daily through Thursday.



**Official ball:**  
Hard plastic white, yellow or orange  
2 3/4 inches diameter (actual size)



**Paddles:**  
Hard-surface paddles may be made of wood, metal or graphite. The hitting surface must be noncompressible or not have holes or textures to increase the speed or spin of the ball. Paddles and grips must conform to size standards.

**Like tennis in slow motion:**  
The pickleball flies about one-third as fast as a tennis ball, on a court that is about one-third as large as a tennis court.

**Divisions:**  
Senior Games will have men's and women's singles, doubles and mixed doubles, by age.

**Scoring:**  
Serves are made underhand from behind the baseline, diagonally to the opponent's service court, alternating from the right and left. The serve and the service return must bounce once before striking the ball. After that, returns can include volleys.

The server scores when the opponent fails to return the ball over the net.

A game is when a player or team has 11 points and leads the opponent by at least two points. Matches are two out of three games.

### Glory of the New Covenant

II Corinthians 3:7-18

Paul was moved by the Holy Spirit to write to the Corinthians concerning the difference between God's relationship with believers under the law and under the new covenant. The Apostle introduces the difference by announcing that the Corinthians are an epistle written, not with ink, but, with and by the Spirit of the living God upon fleshy tablets of the heart (v. 3).

In verse 6, Paul states that God "hath made us able ministers of the new testament." He, further, declares that God did this, not by letter, but, by the Spirit. In the closing words of the verse Paul reveals why God chose to make "us able ministers" by the Spirit — "... the letter killeth, but the spirit giveth life."

All that Paul wrote was given to him by God for God's purposes. God desires that all believers know and act upon that the Spirit has done.

In verse 7 and 8, Paul refers to the law which God gave Moses as the ministration of death and the new covenant as the ministration of the Spirit.

Why does Paul label the law as the ministration of death? In Romans 7:10, the Apostle states, "The commandment which was ordained to life, I found to be unto death." Man cannot join himself to God by keeping the law because no man can undo his sin. To keep the law one must be as God. In Genesis 3:5, Satan told Eve that she could be as God by disobeying God. Eve believed Satan's lie and disobeyed. One cannot be as God by disobeying God. God gave the law to men such that we might know that we are separated from Him. Hence, the law which was ordained to life was found to be unto death because all have sinned.

The law, the ministration of death, was written upon stones. The law was glorious — too glorious for the children of Israel to look upon the face of Moses (see Ex. 34:29-35). The veil upon Moses' face prevented the children of Israel from seeing the glory which God bestowed upon Moses. The new covenant is the ministration of the Spirit (v. 8). The glory of the new covenant is greater than the glory of the law because Jesus fulfilled the law (see Matt. 5:17). The new covenant was not revealed until Jesus removed the veil by fulfilling all righteousness. The glory of the ministration of the Spirit is magnitude upon magnitude greater than the glory of the law because the Spirit reveals that which the law masks.

In verse 9, Paul uses new names to refer to the law and to the new covenant. The ministration of death is the ministration of condemnation and the ministration of the Spirit is the ministration of righteousness. These new names declare the difference between the glory of the law and the glory of the new testament. The glory of condemnation is pale and weak and does not compare to the glory of righteousness.

"For if that which is done away was glorious, much more that which remaineth is glorious" (v. 11). The glory of condemnation has been replaced by the glory of righteousness. The glory of righteousness is seen in Him who was without sin. Jesus came, not to destroy the law, but to fulfill it. Jesus replaced the glory of condemnation with the glory of righteousness.

Paul was God's messenger to the Corinthians and us. God wants us to know that we are bathed in the glory of His righteousness — a righteousness that is without veil.

Because there is no veil, we see that which the children of Israel could not. In verse 14, the Apostle states that the veil remains before the eyes of Israel and Israel is unable to hear when Moses is read (v. 15). The blindness of Israel remains, even now, almost two thousand years after Paul wrote this epistle.

There is, however, good news for Israel. The veil shall be removed when Israel turns to the Lord (v. 16). Believing God changes one's relationship with God from condemnation to that of righteousness.

In verse 17, Paul states, "Now the Lord is that Spirit." That Spirit is of righteousness. Christ is the righteousness who satisfied the law and has made us free of the law. In Him, we have liberty. The condemnation of the law is put to no effect.

In the closing verse, Paul state that "we all" —all believers— are changed into the same image from glory to glory by the Spirit of the Lord. His righteousness has been given to us. The image that we behold in a mirror is that which God sees. The Father sees that which the Son has done. We see His glory, the glory of life everlasting, life with Him.

Let us share that which we have received.

WVDA Issues Consumer Warning Regarding Illegal Hemp and Marijuana Products

The West Virginia Department of Agriculture (WVDA) has issued a consumer protection warning regarding illegal hemp products being sold in West Virginia retail stores. Recently, the WVDA has become aware of illegal products containing non-naturally occurring cannabinoids, as well as counterfeit recreational marijuana. The Department is urging consumers not to purchase these products as the WVDA works with law enforcement to immediately remove all illicit and counterfeit products.

"Other states have issued similar warnings about these illegal cannabis-infused edibles packaged as popular food and candy products. The actors we have seen in West Virginia are hiding marijuana labeling with stickers or claiming their products are Delta-8," said Commissioner of Agriculture Kent Leonhardt. "The products are unsafe and present a risk to public health and safety. We hope to tackle this issue with the assistance of law enforcement."

The WVDA regulates all hemp products and/or hemp derived cannabinoids entering West Virginia's retail supply chain. Under West Virginia law, contaminant/potency testing, product registration and retail cooperation has been designed to ensure hemp products are safe for human consumption.

Children who may ingest these products could experience a variety

of delayed symptoms upon ingesting cannabis edibles, including, but not limited to difficulty breathing, lethargy, dizziness, nausea and loss of coordination. Products found in West Virginia retail locations have affixed legal Delta-8-THC stickers over both the California recreational marijuana symbol and the controlled substance government warning.

"The WVDA issued a non-naturally occurring cannabinoid product notice in October 2021. The WVDA has great concern that the contents pose great risk to the consumer and urge the public to not purchase them," said Amie Minor, the WVDA Director of Regulatory and Environmental Affairs.

The WVDA's notice stated the Department had become aware of non-naturally occurring cannabinoid products entering the West Virginia retail supply chain. Products that contain non-naturally occurring cannabinoids, such as "Tetrahydrocannabinol acetate (THC-O, ATHC, THC-X, Delta 8-O)" are not under the regulatory authority of the WVDA and cannot be registered for sale with the WVDA. Any non-naturally occurring cannabinoid products must be removed from retail sale immediately and are considered a controlled substance.
