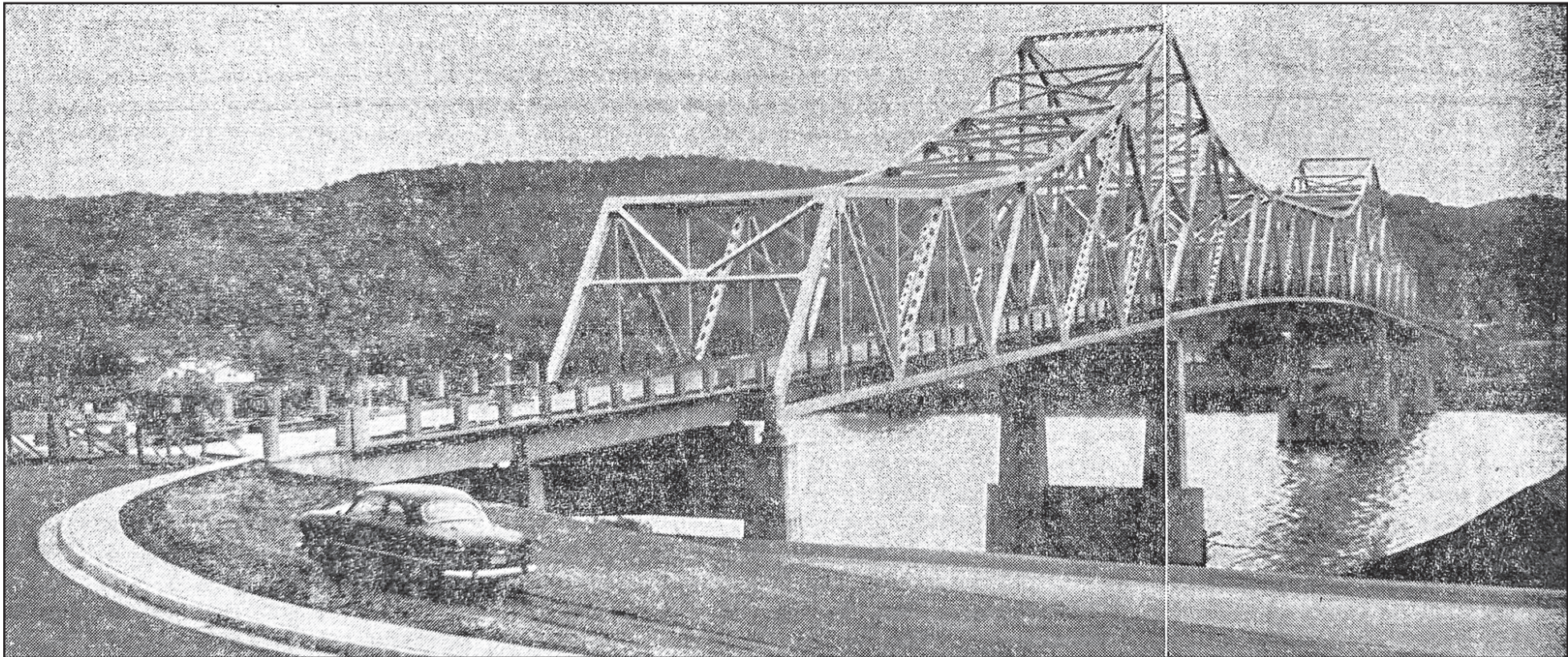

Most Putnam Primary Votes Will Count Twice

When this week’s Breeze went to press, not a single vote had been counted but one outcome was known. The turnout would be low. Primary Election turnout is always lower than that of General Elections. Low turnout means that a low vote total can produce a winner. Turnout for both the Primary and the General is always lower in non-Presidential elections. Voter interest is spurred by the names at the top of the ballot.

The National Ticket on Tuesday’s ballot featured one office, that of U.S. House of Representatives. Every candidate listed was new to Putnam voters. (Redistricting has moved Putnam into the 1st Congressional District which is currently represented by Carol Miller

of Huntington.)

The State Ticket did not feature a State Senate candidate from Putnam other than Eric Tarr who was unopposed.

The interest in Tuesday’s election was largely dependent upon selection of Republican candidates for County Commission and Circuit Clerk and the election of three candidates to the Board of Education.

Barring a dramatic shift in voter sentiment, the Republican candidate selected Tuesday will be elected in November. When the General Election rolls around, Putnam voters will rubber stamp the vote of all who participated in the Primary. The turnout in November is likely to be much higher than it was on Tuesday but, with little exception, only Republican

The Rivers to Ridges Heritage Trail, a 501(c) (3) nonprofit, will be sponsoring a Bridge to Bridge bike race from the Bartow Jones Bridge in Pt. Pleasant to the Ross Booth Memorial Bridge in Winfield on June 11.

Lowell Wilks, project coordinator for River to Ridges Heritage Trail reports that interest in the trail has increased since

the COVID-19 pandemic began in 2020. The race is one of several which the organization is sponsoring this summer.

There are three main Heritage Trail routes with the primary route beginning in Nitro and running to Point Pleasant. The Ohio River bend excursion loop goes from Point Pleasant to Leon, while the Mary Ingles excursion loop extends through Putnam County

on the south side of the Kanawha.

Historic sites on the trail system include the Nitro Wars Museum; the Hoge House in Winfield; the Winfield Bridge; the Point Pleasant Floodwall Mural; the Buffalo Historic Town Square; and Buffalo Academy. There are currently 22 historic stops on the primary and excursion loops.

The Winfield Bridge,

completed in 1957, was the first bridge in the county over the Kanawha River. Prior to 1957, motorists had the choice of driving to St. Albans and crossing the Nitro Bridge or waiting on the ferry at Winfield for transport.

The Winfield Bridge was a toll bridge from 1957 until 1984.

The West Virginia State Farm Museum, located four miles north of Point Pleasant, held its first Steam and Gas Show since the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic.

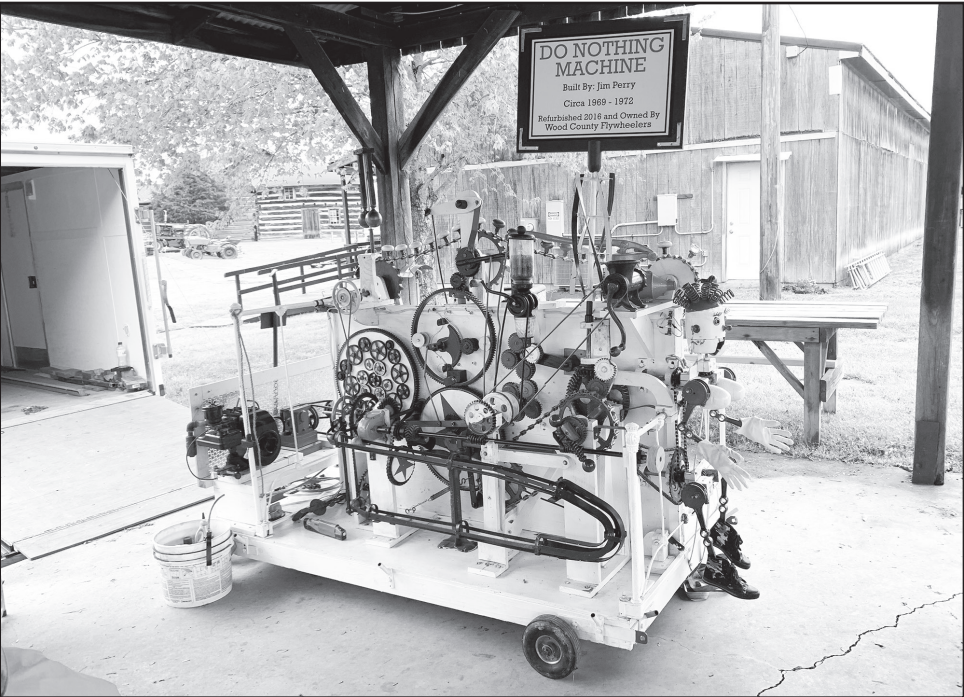
The show provides hobbyists the opportunity to show their treasures from bygone eras.

The Wood County Flywheelers from Parkersburg had the “Do Nothing Machine” on display. While the machine uses gas to power too many wheels, chains, and gizmos to count, its only practical output is smiles upon the faces of onlookers.

The museum is home to a replica of an early rural community. The museum has grown

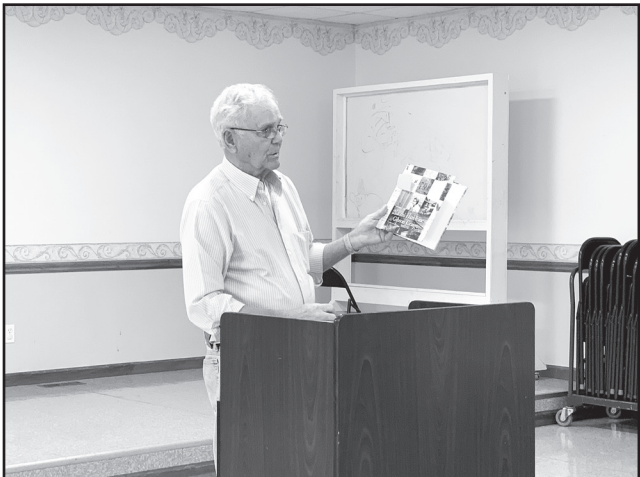

Better Business Bureau Warns Of Secret Shopper Scams

Better Business Bureau serving Canton Region and Greater West Virginia offer tips and advice for consumers to avoid fraudulent practices.

The secret shopper job sounds cool, but it's a scam

You've been invited to check out a favorite retailer to secretly shop their store and evaluate the quality of service, product availability, and the best part - keep the items plus earn a paycheck. It does sound like too good to be a true opportunity, however, such a job does exist and is sanctioned by the Mystery Shopping Providers Association (MSPA). Naturally, for every good opportunity, there is a scam behind it.

The Fake Ads Are Out There

Newspaper ads, email solicitations, and online popup ads create the impression that mystery shopping jobs are the path to personal wealth and a high-paying job with reputable companies.

Fake websites are created where people can register to become a mystery shopper but first, and here's where the scam begins, you have to pay a fee for a certification program, directory of mystery shopping companies, or a guarantee of a mystery shopping job.

The other key giveaway is the direct solicitation that is received by email stating the recipient has been hired by a company as a secret shopper. The first assignment is to evaluate a wire transfer service. If they respond to it, they'll get a check in the mail with instructions to deposit it into their account, withdraw a certain amount in cash, and wire it to a third party. It's never a good idea to deposit a check from someone you don't know and then wire money back or to another address. You'll be responsible for the bank fees and unintended consequences afterward.

Legitimate Shopping Opportunities are Free

Legitimate companies don't charge people to work for them - they pay people to work for them. It's certainly worth taking a few minutes to conduct internet research for reviews and comments about mystery shopping companies that are accepting applications online. Just be sure to go past the home page and look at the company itself on bbb.org to see what other people are saying about them.

Use the Source
Visit the MSPA directly to search a database of mystery shopping assignments, how to apply for them, and what the benefits are. Take note, the Association does offer certifications for a fee, but they aren't required to look or apply for assignments in its database.

See a Scam, Report It
Avoid doing business with mystery shopping promoters who advertise in a newspaper help-wanted section or by direct email, require payment for certification or charge additional fees or sell directories of companies that hire mystery shoppers. If you suspect a Secret or Mystery Shopper Scam, report it to the Federal Trade Commission, State Attorney General's Office, or BBB's Scam Tracker.

worked at a clothespin factory in Richwood and is descended from the Goffs, Carpenters and McCourrs, who have been in the Webster County area since the 1700's.

With the closing of the paper mill my father took a job with American Viscose Corporation in Nitro, West Virginia. We lived there for about a year. My mother did not like Nitro so in the evening we would drive throughout the surrounding area looking for a town that we liked. The first time we saw Hurricane we all wanted to move here. Everything was so clean and so peaceful and quiet. We moved to a large white house on Main Street (known as the McCann house). It was not really as large inside as it appeared to be. It had a large front porch completely across the front of the house. The house stood where George's Dry Cleaners now stands. The front yard had large trees and what a great place to watch trains - which seemed to be the best thing in the world to do. Most of my childhood was spent there. I remember World War II as I lived there, watching the troop trains and living through the air raid drills. During that period my mother did volunteer work for the office of price control. My father was active in civil defense, police and volunteer fire departments. Later we moved to the Taylor

addition where I lived while attending Hurricane High School, which was torn down several years ago. Some of my favorite memories are of the lake, enclosed by a white fence. It was located where Happy Times apartments are now standing. This was a nice place to walk with your boyfriend in the evening always winding up at the drugstore or Sovine's Dairy Bar.

I feel I had a very happy childhood in Hurricane, most of which I have written into short stories for the amusement of my children. We had so many hours in the day, time to spend selling Kool-Aid where the A to Z parking lot now stands, having music shows in our back yard, going to the movies on Main Street (I was in the theater two times when it caught fire.) One time I believe they were showing "Trail of the Lonesome Pine."

Some of the things I remember about Hurricane would be quiet shady streets, hazy hot summer days when the blacktop streets would be hot enough to melt and the always present train whistles reminding us that Hurricane is a town built around the railroad.

New 3 Million Dollar Bridge To Be Dedicated

Agricultural Leaders Head to the Mountain State for SASDA

Commissioners, Directors and Secretaries of Agriculture from 16 southern states and territories will gather in West Virginia next month to hold their annual meeting and tour some of the State's agriculture industries. This will be the first time in 15 years that the Southern Association of State Departments of Agriculture (SASDA) has held their meeting in the Mountain State. The event will take place at Canaan Valley Resort, June 4-8.

"Given supply chain issues, the war in Ukraine, inflation and the pandemic, it is clear we must create robust policies that put American industries first. During SASDA, we hope to discuss ways to foster economic growth, through agriculture, in order to create resiliency within our food systems. We can no longer rely so heavily on foreign sources of energy and food," West Virginia Commissioner of Agriculture Kent Leonhardt said.

Commissioner Leonhardt, who was elected President of SASDA during last year's annual meeting, chose West Virginia to host the 2022 event. He will be joined by agriculture leaders from Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, North Carolina, Puerto Rico, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia and the Virgin Islands. The theme for the five-day event will be "Rooted in the Mountain State" and focus on conservation, local agriculture and how to further develop food systems within the United States.

During their stay, the agriculture leaders will hold business meetings, conduct policy discussions and tour farms and agribusinesses in the Potomac highlands. Those include a fish hatchery, WVU's Reymann Memorial Farm, Allegheny Wood Products, Misty Mountain

Primary Votes Will Count Twice

produced winners on Tuesday effectively will count twice because no Democratic Party candidate can win in November. A candidate received 51% or more of the Republican vote for Circuit Clerk on Tuesday will be unopposed in November. If Tuesday's turnout was in the 20 to 25% range, 15% or less of registered voters has effectively elected the next Circuit Clerk. Since four Republicans were seeking the nomination, less than 10% of Putnam's eligible voters may have determined November's winner.

Republican dominance in Putnam County is a relatively new development. Fifty years ago, registered Democrats vastly outnumbered the Republican. Despite that advantage, Putnam

Republicans were often elected to county office. Republican candidates were not elected in the General Election because they were Republicans. Republicans were elected because many Democrat losers in the Primary and their supporters in that era chose to vote Republican in November.

A similar switch in allegiance is unlikely to happen in 2022 because there is only one Democratic candidate whose name will be on the November ballot. That candidate is Jim Withrow who is seeking a seat on the County Commission. Withrow is unlikely to be elected in November because the factions which existed in the Democratic Party of fifty years ago are not present in the Republican Party of today.

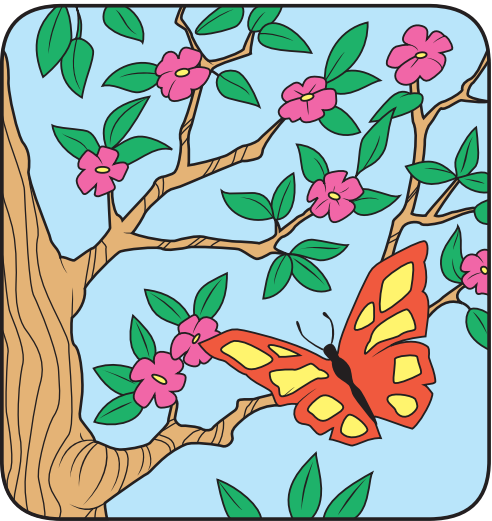

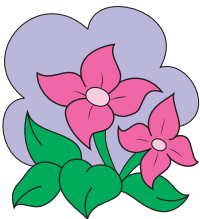

- 1 1/4 teaspoons lemon juice, divided
- 1 dash salt
- 1/3 cup blueberry, raspberry, cherry, strawberry, peach or apricot fruit spread

In large mixer bowl of electric mixer, beat cream cheese and sugar on medium speed until fluffy. Add sour cream, half-and-half, vanilla, 1 teaspoon lemon juice and salt. Beat on low speed until combined then beat on medium speed until smooth. Cover and refrigerate 2-24 hours, or until cold.

Pour cream cheese mixture into 1 1/2-quart ice cream freezer. Freeze according to manufacturer’s directions.

In small bowl, stir fruit spread and remaining lemon juice.

May 16, 1928: Minister Robert Graetz Jr. was born in Clarksburg. He helped organize the Montgomery bus boycott, and was the only White minister in the highly segregated Alabama city to support the boycott publicly.

May 17, 1854: A violent windstorm swept up the Ohio River and severely damaged the Wheeling Suspension Bridge.

May 17, 1862: The Battle of Pigeon Roost took place in Princeton during the Civil War. Union soldiers were noisily approaching Princeton from the southeast, unaware that the Confederates were lying in ambush. The attack left an estimated 18 federal troops killed and 38 wounded.

May 18, 2012: Ice Mountain in Hampshire County was named a National Natural Landmark by the U.S. Department of the Interior at a ceremony to mark the 50th anniversary of the program.

May 12–14, 1921: Bullets peppered down on about a dozen mining towns in the Matewan-Williamson area, and nonunion miners fired back, in what became known as the Battle of the Tug. Three people were shot and killed.

May 13, 1962: Editorial cartoonist Henry Payne was born in Charleston. In 1989, Payne was the first editorial cartoonist in the country to make his work available via computer.

May 15, 1886: Minnie Buckingham Harper was born in Winfield. She was the first African-American woman to serve as a member of a state legislative body in the United States. She was appointed by Governor Howard Gore on January 10, 1928, to fill the unexpired term of her husband, E. Howard Harper.

May 16, 1778: About 300 Wyandot and Mingo Indians attacked Fort Randolph at Point Pleasant. Unable to take the fort, the Indians proceeded up the Kanawha River toward other settlements.

BASIC BIBLE

Ambassadors for Christ

II Corinthians 5:11-21

The text before us does not mention the judgment seat of Christ. That said, it is all about the judgment seat of Christ.

“Knowing therefore . . .” (v. 11). Therefore refers to back to verse 10 and the fact that all must appear before the judgment seat of Christ. Knowing the terror (fear) of the Lord that believers shall experience, Paul and all in his ministry persuade men.

In verse 18, Paul describes his ministry of persuasion as the ministry of reconciliation. In the close of verse 11 and following, Paul makes the reason for his ministry known. The reason is not because Paul fears to appear before Christ (Paul does not fear because he and those in his ministry are made manifest to God). Paul’s ministry is powered by his desire that believers at Corinth should have a partial answer to them which glory in appearance, and not in heart.

At the judgment seat of Christ, believers which glory in appearance but not in heart shall be found naked. Paul trusts that his ministry of persuasion will be fruitful, that it will be manifested in the consciences of the Corinthians (v. 11). Paul ministers because he cares. He desires that all believers should care as he cares. The partial answer to them which glory not in heart is to become part of Paul’s ministry of caring and make one’s desires known to all. Paul’s ministry is that of them who glory in heart. It is a ministry of loving one another as Jesus loves us. Loving one another as Jesus loves us is contagious. The early church produced a pandemic which spread throughout the Roman Empire. The answer to them which glory only in appearance is to reveal the love of Jesus to others.

Paul reveals the method which he employs to persuade men in verse 13. He does so by expressing unthrottled emotion to God for that which God has done and by explaining God’s plan of salvation in a manner which is sober (cool, calm and collected).

In verse 14, Paul is cool, calm and collected as he explains the power that drives his ministry. It is the power of the love of Christ who submitted Himself to death that men might live, live not to themselves but to Him who died and rose again (v. 15).

“Wherefore . . .” (v. 16). Because Christ died and rose again, we know no man according to the flesh. The flesh died with Jesus. We know men, not by Him who died in the flesh but, by Him who rose again. We know the new man who rose with Christ.

We know our brothers and sisters as new creatures in Christ. We see that which is new. We see that which is of Christ. We see God because we are reconciled to the Father by the Son.


Paul states that God “hath given to us the ministry of reconciliation” (v. 18). The ministry of reconciliation is a gift given by God to them who are reconciled by Him. It is a gift given to the new creature in whom all things are new.

In verse 19, Paul states that God through Christ reconciled the world to Himself. We are reconciled because our trespasses are not imputed to us. We are reconciled because our trespasses were imputed to Him who knew no sin. We are reconciled to Him because He who was without sin was raised from the dead to sit at the right hand of the Father. We are reconciled to God because Christ did for us that which we could not do for ourselves. Christ fulfilled the law which condemned all men.

The church at Corinth was a result of Paul’s ministry but Paul did not reconcile a single person. The ministry of reconciliation is not to reconcile; it is to declare what God has done and to persuade men to call upon the only name by which men may be saved. Paul was not a reconciliator; Paul was an envoy of Him who reconciled the world. Paul delivered the word of reconciliation. What is the word of reconciliation? It is notice that God has given His only begotten Son such that whosoever believeth on Him shall enter into a new relationship with God which relationship shall endure forever.

In verses 20-21, Paul says, “. . . we pray you in Christ’s stead, be ye reconciled to God. For he hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be the righteousness of God in him.” Salvation and reconciliation are not the same thing. Calling upon the name of the Lord believing is an acknowledgment that one is dependent upon the righteousness of Christ. Calling upon the name of the Lord believing guarantees that one shall appear before the judgment seat of Christ. All who come before Christ shall be clothed. Some shall be clothed in wood, hay and stubble. Some shall be clothed in gold, silver and precious stones. Paul, in calling out for the Corinthians to reconciled to God, is pleading that they should buy gold, silver and precious stones of Him who loves them beyond measure.

Paul was made an ambassador for Christ because he was reconciled to God. All who glory in the heart are made ambassadors. Paul would have all men transformed as he was transformed. Might all men glory in him who knew no sin.

Visitors to the Gathering can enjoy fiddle, banjo, mandolin and guitar contests outside during the day, and concerts in the State Theater in the evenings. Keep your ears open!

From mountain flatfooting to Celtic dancing, the Vandalia Gathering brings to life the international heritage of West Virginia dance. The Gathering features demonstrations of Irish, Scottish, Morris, Swiss, Croatian and Appalachian dancing in the Great Hall, with the audience invited to learn and join. Native Americans present their dance and music outdoors on the Capitol grounds. Square dancing and flatfooting takes place at the Dance Stage outdoors all afternoon for public participation. Put on your dancing shoes!

The Vandalia Gathering exhibits the traditions and many influences of West Virginia folklife. Ethnic and (very) American foods are served at the many food booths operated by area non-profits. The Craft Circle brings to one location a wide assortment of West Virginia artists and their works. From wood-fired pottery and Raku to folk toys and glass, over twenty craftspeople will be on hand to demonstrate and sell their works. The Old-Time for Young'uns area will give children the chance to experience some of the life, work and play of the early days of this state.

Vandalia was a proposed colony, originating in the land speculations of politically influential Englishmen and prominent Colonial Americans. In 1768 Benjamin Franklin was one of the organizers of the Great Ohio Company, which proposed the creation of Vandalia as the 14th colony. It would have included almost all of present West Virginia, except for the Eastern Panhandle, and much of Kentucky. The name was a gesture to Queen Charlotte, wife of George III, who proudly claimed descent from the Vandals through her birth to German nobility. The plan almost came to fruition in 1772-74, until the deteriorating American political situation made the British government back off.

The word Vandalia is rich in West Virginia heritage, synonymous with the desire for a free government in the mountains. And today, Vandalia is a place every Memorial Day weekend, at the Capitol Complex in Charleston, West Virginia, where the Vandalia Gathering presents traditional music, dance, crafts and food to keep the old ways alive in young minds.
