## Putnam County Commission Rejects Fiberoptic Bid

The agenda for the August 30th Putnam County Commission meeting listed a bid opening that did not happen. Jessie Parker informed the commission that S & S Engineers had received one bid for the county's Fiberoptic Project. (S & S Engineers was selected to oversee the project.) The commission rejected the bid without opening it after Parker said that the bidder had notified him that the bid did not cover an amendment to bid requirements. Parker stated that another company told him that they had prepared a bid but the bid was not submitted because Fed Ex failed to show up. The commission directed S & S Engineers to advertise the rebidding of the project.

The commission issued a proclamation designating September 10, 2022 as First Responders Day in Putnam County. E-911

Advisory Board member Rich Pullin said that an event showing appreciation for all law enforcement, EMS, Fire Departments and dispatchers in the county will be held at the FMS Sportsmens Club from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. on September 10. Pullin stated that the cost of the event is being footed by private sponsors and the City of Hurricane.

The commission heard financial updates from the Development Authority, Health Department, Libraries, and Convention & Business Bureau.

Morganne Tenney, Executive Director of the Putnam County Development Authority (PCDA), stated that PCDA has been restructured and is in position to receive more community support and funding. Tenney reported that the Development Authority has reduced overhead costs. The Authority sold donated equipment

## Ribbon Cutting Held for Huntington Federal Shelter at Meeks Mountain Trails

The City of Hurricane hosted a ribbon cutting ceremony for the new Huntington Federal Shelter at Meeks Mountain Trails at Hurricane City Park on Wednesday, September 7th. A significant donation by zzhuntington Federal made construction of the shelter possible.

The shelter and "bowl" area of Meeks Mountain Trails will serve as the premier event venue for the trails on Saturday, September 10 — the first ever Hurricane 100K, and the ONLY 100K, trail run in West Virginia.

The Hurricane Hundred 100K Trail Race and Relay will be run on 62 glorious miles on the Meeks Mountain Trails behind City Park.

A total of \$7,500 will be awarded in prizes — \$1500 for 1st place male and female, \$750 for second place male and female, and \$375 for third place male and female. Top coed, female, and male relay teams also get \$750 to split

between the three runners.

The race will start at 6 a.m. First finishers are expected to complete the course in approximately 10 hours. The course is 100% single track mountain loops. Solo runners will see

their crew between each of the 6 laps.

All runners receive a zip up sweatshirt jacket, finisher's stainless-steel pint along with a tote and various swag from sponsors. All 100k solo

## September is National Voter Registration Month

Since 2002, the National Association of Secretaries of State (NASS) has recognized September as National Voter Registration Month to encourage eligible Americans to register to vote or to update their voter registration information. The WV Secretary of State's Office is proud to join NASS in this annual effort.

West Virginia has a long and proud history with voter registration. The Mountain State played a key role in the passage of the 19th Amendment in 1920 which guaranteed women the right to vote. In addition, after a 29-year effort led by our late United States Senator Jennings Randolph, in 1971 Congress passed and the states ratified the 26th Amendment that reduced the voting age from 21 to 18.

Since taking office in January 2017, West Virginia has gained national attention in our effort to refine our voter registration file to be more representative of the actual eligible voting population in the history of our state. Working with all 55 county clerks, we've been able to eliminate more than 345,000 deceased, duplicate, out-of-state, outdated, and currently under conviction felon voter files from our voter registration list of just over 1.1 million registered voters.

Our office will use the entire month of September to work with County Clerks and high schools to encourage eligible West Virginians to register to vote. Our Field Representatives will be working with county clerks to host numerous public events and school visits during the month. September is also a good time before the November 8 General Election to encourage those already registered to be sure that their voter registration is accurate.

Voting is a right guaranteed to every eligible citizen. But

you must be properly registered. In West Virginia, we're making it easy, safe and secure to register online and in person.

Over the last six years with my administration working closely with the state's County Clerks, more than 297,000 eligible West Virginians have been registered to vote. That number includes more than 85,000 high school students.

Those are incredible numbers given the small size of our state. Our efforts to make it easy to register and easy to vote in West Virginia have been recognized throughout the nation.

Today, eligible voters can register online anytime by going to the WV Secretary of State's safe and secure website at [www.GoVoteWV.com](http://www.GoVoteWV.com). Eligible voters can also register to vote in person by going to their local County Clerk's office.

Or, you can call your County Clerk to request that a paper Voter Registration Form be mailed to you. You can also find a County Clerk's Directory at [www.GoVoteWV.com](http://www.GoVoteWV.com).

National Voter Registration Day is Tuesday, September 20. My office is working with many of our County Clerks to host a voter registration drive outside of their courthouse that day to bring awareness to National Voter Registration Month.

We want every eligible West Virginian to be registered and ready for the upcoming November General Election.

businesses to make tax deductible donations. Tenney said that Protec has collected more donations in the last 60 days than the combined total of the last five years.

Tenney announced that funds from the settlement of the gas line access through the Fraziers Bottom Business Park will be used to finance utility upgrades along U.S. 35. She reported that interest from businesses in locating in Putnam County along U.S. 35 is being spurred by Nucor's decision to locate a steel mill in Mason County. Tenney said that Nucor talent wants to live in Putnam County.

Tenney also announced that Protec will be holding a dinner fundraiser on September 22nd.

Health Department Director Dr. Crystal Moberly informed the commissioners that the department is in-budget and has a positive cash balance. Moberly said

the Health Department is moving into a post-Covid mode that is seeing an uptick in services. Moberly expects an increase of \$28,000 in revenue during the current fiscal year generated by a fee increase. Moberly said that the new fee schedule aligns Putnam with State-approved maximums.

Megan Tarbett, Putnam County Library Director, announced that Libraries has received approval for a federal grant which will allow the Library to provide a digital services program offering. Tarbett also announced that county libraries are now fine free. There will be no late fees. Charges for lost or damaged books will remain in effect. Tarbett said that fine-free policies have resulted in increased library usage nationally.

Convention and Business Director Kelli Steele reported that hotel occupancy in Putnam has rebounded and is now 3% above pre-pandemic level.

In other business, the

commission approved a text amendment to county ordinances which clarifies the difference between change of land use and change of business use. The commission also approved text changes to ordinances governing court-ordered land divisions. The text amendments spell out the intent of the ordinances involved.

Also in other business, the commission filled vacancies on the Putnam County Development Authority Board. Zack Crede, Jack McLane, Allen Noffsinger, Joletta Raynes, and Doug Tate were appointed to the Board.

The next county commission meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, September 13.

# Businesses Advocate Amendment 2 as Part of Solution for Job Creation

"West Virginia has no problems that more jobs won't solve, and Amendment 2 will help us get there."

Day-three of the West Virginia Chamber Annual Meeting and Business Summit at the Greenbrier Resort featured a panel-discussion regarding the proposal of Amendment 2 to the state's constitution. The panel - consisting of both business leaders and lawmakers - was moderated by W.Va. Chamber Vice President of Policy & Advocacy Brian Dayton.

Amendment 2 will be a referendum on the November general election ballot to be adopted or rejected by West Virginia voters.

According to the text of the proposed amendment, its intention is to grant the "Legislature authority to exempt tangible machinery, equipment, and inventory directly used in business activity and personal property tax on motor vehicles." It should be noted, however, that while the passage of Amendment 2 would endow the legislature with power to grant certain personal property tax exemptions, it would not result in an immediate

"across the board" repeal of personal property taxes.

After complimenting the audience for being part of the largest attendance ever for the annual business summit, W.Va. Chamber President and CEO Steve Roberts said, "Amendment 2 will help us continue the progress. This is a once in a lifetime opportunity to change a 19-year-old provision of our constitution. We need to do this."

Roberts added that "West Virginia has no problems that more jobs won't solve, and Amendment 2 will help us get there."

Rebecca McPhail, President of the W.Va. Manufacturers Association was next to offer her thoughts, saying, "What we're really looking at now is an industry that has retracted over the last several decades. Certainly our tax structure in West Virginia is the reason for that."

"We're in a situation where we're not just competing in a global economy - we're competing in our own companies for where we invest critical capital dollars," McPhail further explained. "West Virginia is out of step with the rest of the country when it comes to that."

McPhail noted that states such as Indiana, Ohio, and Michigan benefit from tax structures which are "more friendly to manufacturing and investment, and less punitive to the capital requirements of running a strong manufacturing economy."

"Amendment 2 is the only way to open the door for serious policy discussion," McPhail added.

A counter argument for Amendment Number 2, as Dayton explained, is that its passage will deprive schools, police departments, and emergency services of necessary financial resources, and that it would "bankrupt our counties." House Speaker Roger Hanshaw, R-Clay, disagreed.

"Passage of the amendment does nothing but give the Legislature the power to start considering some tax reform," Hanshaw

told those in attendance. "It costs not a dime."

"I have two children in the public school system," Hanshaw continued. "I defy anyone to say that I want to defund the public schools. My wife teaches in the public school system - I want that school system to be funded very well for as long as it exists."

"My home is served by two volunteer fire departments," Hanshaw added. "I want them to come to my home if my house is on fire. To think that I'm going to take action that defunds local services is frankly ridiculous."

Senate President Craig Blair, R-Berkeley, then spoke about how the Legislature could move forward if Amendment 2 is adopted by voters.

"The voters have expectations come November," Blair began. "We're in our fourth year of a flat-line budget. It's \$136 million a year of controlled growth. That money is sitting there. We've been using it for one-time expenditures. But it's there, year after year, as long as you control the growth in government."

"We're in our fourth year, ladies and gentlemen," Blair noted. "That oughta be in Ripley's Believe it or Not."

"Seventy percent of the jobs that are created in this state are created by West Virginia businesses that are already here," Blair explained. "They're the ones that have been carrying the load on the personal property tax. This is about not just bringing new businesses to the State of West Virginia - it's about making it so businesses already in West Virginia can succeed."

Tax Attorney Michael E. Carly was the final member of the panel to offer his thoughts, saying, "We need a system that works and encourages investment in West Virginia, so I strongly support this amendment."

At the conclusion of the panel-discussion, Hanshaw noted, "Our moral commitment as a Legislature is to not be irresponsible with the resources that we're entrusted to manage."

Election Day in West Virginia is Nov. 8.



from a game of football by a fireball streaking across the sky. The fireball fell to earth just beyond a hillside at Flatwoods. This sighting led to the legend of the Braxton County Monster.

Sept. 14, 1898: Okey L. Patteson was born in Mingo County. Patteson, called the "Great Persuader," tackled difficult decisions as West Virginia's 23rd governor from 1949 to 1953.

### Obedient to Remember

Exodus 12:1-14

The passover is recorded in Exodus 12:29. The death angel came at midnight and smote the first born of man and beast in the land of Egypt. The children of Israel were spared because the angel saw the blood upon the lintel and door posts and passed over. In Exodus 12:3-11, God issued instruction detailing the preparation that the children of Israel would need take if their first born were to live. New Testament believers, through the Holy Spirit, know that the passover preparation is a picture of the means by which we have been spared from the judgment that shall fall upon all who do not know Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior. Let us consider the details that the Lord has placed before us.

#### The Time Frame

In verse 2, we note that the passover marks a new beginning. The month of its occurrence is the "beginning of months." God states: "it shall be the first month of the year to you." The new beginning for the children of Israel required each household to take a lamb on the tenth day of the month. The lamb was to be kept separate from sheep and goats of the flock from which it was removed for a period of three full days and on the evening of the fourth day it was to be killed and its blood applied to the lintel and doorposts. The length of time that the lamb would dwell in close proximity with each household was approximately three and a half days.

While God issued this instruction to Moses and Aaron, God also presents to New Testament believers a portrait of the three and one half years which His only begotten Son should dwell among men. The Lamb of God revealed Himself to men for three and a half years and then was slain.

#### The Death of the First Born

The death angel took the life of the first born of both man and beast in Egypt. When the angel came to the homes of the children of Israel, he found that the life of the first born of the sheep of Israel had been taken and the blood of the first born applied to the entrance to every home. Death could not touch the first born of the flocks of Israel because their first born was already dead. The covering blood of the first born lamb was counted to be the blood of the first born of every household.

New Testament believers, like the first born of the sheep of the flocks of Israel, are already dead to judgment. The blood of the Lamb is counted to be our blood.

#### The Lamb Without Blemish

The lamb which was to be slain was to be a one-year-old male without blemish. A year old sheep is fully mature. The sacrificial lamb was to be perfect in every way. The Lamb of God was without blemish. Christ Jesus was without sin. His body was not broken when He died upon the cross.

In verses 8-10, the Lord issued the manner in which the body of the lamb was to be prepared for eating and the remnants were to be disposed. All that was not consumed was to be totally burned by fire. The instruction for the passover lamb is a picture of the instruction which the Lord would issue for peace offerings. New Testament believers know the Lord Jesus as their peace offering.

The roasted lamb was to be eaten with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. The unleavened bread represented the purity the new life which was ahead. The bitter herbs were in memory of the pain and oppression of slavery.

God gave specific instructions to leave no remnants of the past, as His people were made free. In the same manner, New Testament believers are to lay aside any weight or sin that so easily besets us and look to the Lord Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith (see Heb. 12:1-2). The Lord instructed the children of Israel to be alert and ready to move, knowing that soon after the death of the first born marked the time of departure. The Lord told them to eat fully dressed — "loins girded," "shoes on your feet," and "staff in your hand" (Ex. 12:11)—in order to make a hasty exit.

As God's judgment was released upon the land of Egypt, the blood of the sacrificed lamb served as the mark that sealed the Israelite homes and provided protection from the destroyer. The Lord told Israel that when He saw the blood, He would "pass over" that home. Although they were in Egypt, they were spared from the coming destruction. In a similar manner, as Christians, we are in the world but not of the world. When we accept the gift of salvation purchased by the blood of Jesus, we are sealed unto the day of redemption (Eph. 1:7, 4:30).

The passover celebration is a memorial of God's great deliverance of His people. The children of Israel were to leave behind their former way of living in servitude among the Egyptians and accept their true status as God's chosen people. The passover is also a picture of the promise to come. All who accept Christ Jesus as Savior are covered by His blood and delivered from the judgment to come. Born again Christians, like the children of Israel, are called to be ready for quick departure. Let us ever be ready as God has instructed.
