

I do not download of the app's resources many apps for my phone, for I prefer to keep as much memory available your as possible for photos camera feature to and videos. However, I wanted to get an app which would allow me to identify wildflowers and other plants. After searching the Apple App Store for such a program, I found one called PictureThis -Plant Identifier. While the company that produced the app wants you to pay a

\$29.99 yearly fee, you can

still use PictureThis for

free, although some will not be available.

PictureThis smartphone's take photos of plants, which it then scans and shows a result in a matter of seconds. An internet connection is required to use the

instant scan feature, but users can also take photos of plants and then ask the app to scan them in areas where there is limited or no connection.

Most of the results I have

gotten from PictureThis seem to be spot on. Most entries feature a list of names for that species, although not every regional name will be listed. The

Civil War" will feature four dynamic Civil War historians and speakers: Christy Perry Tuohey, Dr. Billy Joe Peyton, Steve Cunningham and Dr. Phil Hatfield. 10-11 a.m. – Christy Perry Tuohey presents: "A Place of Rest for Our Gallant Boys: The U.S. Army Hospital at Gallipolis, Ohio, 1861-1865

Situated along the Ohio River at the mouth of the Great Kanawha River, Gallipolis, Ohio, was an ideal location for a U.S. Army hospital in the early moments of the Civil War. This is the account of both Civil War horrors and hope, of Army surgeons and civilians who risked their own lives while working tirelessly in the wards of the Gallipolis U.S. Army Hospital to heal sick and wounded soldiers from both sides of the conflict. The people who cared for the warriors came from all quarters: an Ohio school teacher, a New England surgeon, and a hospital steward who nursed his regimental comrade back from the brink of death. Native West Virginian and Marshall graduate Perry Tuohey, a veteran of newsrooms and classrooms, is an author and freelance writer. She worked as a TV news reporter and anchor in Charleston/Huntington; Charlotte, N.C.; and Columbus and Cleveland, Ohio. Her writing has been published in multiple print and online newspapers and magazines. A Place of Rest for Our Gallant Boys: The U.S. Army Hospital at Gallipolis, Ohio, 1861-1865 is her

The Union army is considered "one of the most remarkable military assemblages in history." President Lincoln believed there was scarcely one regiment from which could not be selected "a president, a cabinet, a congress, and perhaps a court." This prophetic statement was affirmed in the 23rd Ohio Volunteer Infantry case, as former officers included

several lawyers. Peyton, a public historian and retired Professor of History at West Virginia State University. earned his BA, MA, and Ph.D. from WVU. His 40-year public history career included work with public and private organizations. Peyton is the author of two books on Charleston history, chair of the Charleston Historic Landmarks Commission, and sits on the board of the WV Humanities Council.

Cunningham will present never-beforepublished information from his many years of research on the 7th West Virginia Cavalry regiment that was raised in the Kanawha Valley, concentrating on the colonels who commanded the unit, John Hunt Oley and Lucien Loeser. Cunningham has been conducting research on West Virginia and the Civil War for many years. The focus of his research has been on the 7th West Virginia Cavalry, a Union regiment raised in the Kanawha Valley. He is the president and owner of 35th Star Publishing and a descendant of four privates of the 7th WV Cavalry. A graduate of Virginia Tech and Marshall, he has authored or co-authored many articles about the Civil War and contributed research to many other authors' books on the subject. Steve will publish his upcoming history of the regiment tentatively titled, Loyalty They Always Had: The 7th West Virginia Cavalry in the U.S. Civil War.

2 – 3 p.m. – Dr. Phil Hatfield presents: "The Battle of Hurricane Bridge'

Тhе Battle at Hurricane Bridge is an often-overlooked Civil War action occurring at the small and otherwise quiet western Virginia village. For five hours the green Union troops of the 13th West Virginia Volunteer Infantry under the command of Capt. James Johnson fought to hold off the hardened Confederate veterans of the 8th and 16th Virginia Cavalry commanded by Brigadier General Albert Gallatin Jenkins. The victory at Hurricane Bridge directly contributed to the Union army maintaining control of the James River and Kanawha Turnpike, a key supply line, and enabled federal control of the Kanawha Valley for the remainder of the war. Hatfield, Ph.D., a member of the Company of Military Historians, earned a Ph.D. in psychology from Fielding University, a master's degree in psychology from Marshall, and a bachelor's degree in psychology and history from the University of Charleston. He is a veteran of the U.S. Air Force, served in Operation Iraqi Freedom, and author of five books

and numerous scholarly

articles related to the

Civil War.



program will even tell you if the plant is sickly although this feature can also be triggered if you are attempting to identify a plant in low light conditions. While the app can identify the species of a plant, it cannot tell you the specific variety. For instance, you could use PictureThis to scan a zinnia, and it would correctly identify the flower, but it wouldn't be able to tell you the name of that particular variety.

I have gotten some incorrect results while scanning tree bark patterns - the program confused a pine tree for a maple. The app also had an extremely difficult time correctly identifying a Japanese Lantern plant. The fruits of this particular plant have a bright orange husk which resemble paper lanterns. Some of the possibilities were Coral Lily (the app confused the husk for a flower), Virginia Groundcherry, and Carolina Horsenettle (scan was of leaves alone). A search for Japanese Lantern on Wikipedia suggests that the plant might be Officinarum, Alkekengi which is also known as Chinese Lantern, Japanese Lantern, Bladder Cherry, Strawberry Groundcherry, or Winter Cherry. Japanese Lanterns are in the

family, and several of the possible matches were also in this family, so possibly this is where the confusion lies. So far, this plant continues to mystify PictureThis.

Out of morbid curiosity, I have used the app to scan photos in which no plants were present, just to see what it would say. The program's AI will usually tell you that it could find no identifiable plants, but a scan of a cat's white paws did suggest that the image in the photo might be a white fungus that grows in forests. I will admit that this particular fungus does resemble the shape of a cat's paw, so I can understand how the AI misunderstood

Speaking of fungus, PictureThis does warn the user whenever it is used to identify mushrooms or fungi. It is not safe to use this app to identify edible species, and PictureThis advises users not to touch or eat any mushroom. Foraging for mushrooms and fungi can be very dangerous, as many species have a similar appearance, and it is easy for an amateur to confuse a poisonous mushroom for an edible one. This is a case when it is best to have an expert's advice. PictureThis also warns users not to eat wild berries unless it can be confirmed without a doubt that the plant or bush in

question is non-toxic. I have used PictureThis


Elizabeth died about 1830 in Cabell County.

had been adopted by a family who lived on a farm, but when the dog killed one of the family's chickens, they returned him to the shelter. A sign saying "Don't Like Chickens" was attached to his cage as a warning to prospective adoptees.

Many people came out to view Wilson's work, including an art instructor from Hurricane High School, who purchased several of her paintings to use as teaching aids for his students. Wishing to share her love of art with young students, Wilson plans to donate two paintings to the art departments at Hurricane High School, Winfield High School, and St. Albans High School.

to identify many of the wildflowers which grow in fields and along roadsides in late summer and early autumn. Right now, there is still a lot of Giant Ironweed, Yellow Ironweed, Late Boneset, Bearded Beggarticks, Goldenrod, and Orange Jewelweed growing, although these plants are starting to die back for the season. I have also discovered a lot of vary fragrant wildflowers, such as Bearded Beggarticks. These strangely named plants look like Yellow Ironweed from a distance and yellow Cosmos close up, and have a beautiful scent that smells just like honey. A friend of mine who has anosmia (loss of smell) claimed that he thought they smelled like graham crackers.

PictureThis also keeps a record of all of the plants that you have identified. This feature can be found under the Snap History section of the app. I do not know if this list will continue to grow as pictures are taken, or if the older photos will eventually be deleted to make room for new ones.







BASIC BIBLE

Obedience in Worshipping God Alone Exodus 20:1-11

The text before us consists of the first five commandments which God gave Moses upon the arrival of the children of Israel at Mount Sinai. Jesus provided commentary on all of the commandments when He answered the question, "Master, which is the greatest commandment of the law?" (Matt. 22:36-40). The Lord quoted Deuteronomy 6:5. To keep the greatest commandment, one must keep the first five in their entirety.

"And God spake all these words . . ." (v. 1). The setting is at Mount Sinai. The children of Israel arrived at and camped before the mount in the third month (Ex. 19:1). The Lord spoke these words approximately two and a half months following the exodus from Egypt. In the interim, the children of Israel had seen the Lord cause the waters of the sea to part before them, the bitterness of the water of Marah to disappear, manna to fall from heaven, and water to rush forth from the rock at Rephidim. The children of Israel had seen all these things but they still did not know the God who had done them.

New Testament believers know God. We know that the Lord gave His commandments to the children of Israel such that they might know Him. Exodus 19:16 records that all the people of the camp trembled when a thick cloud and thunderings and lightnings came upon the mount. After the thunderings and lightnings, Moses went upon the mount. Upon his return, he delivered the words by which His people should know God.

In verse 2, the Lord speaks directly to Israel, the people whom He brought out of slavery in Egypt. With these same words, the Lord speaks to New Testament believers in that He has made us free from the power of sin (Rom. 6:22). New Testament believers are to live by the commandments of Him who has made us free as Israel was to live by the commandments set before them in Exodus 20.

'Thou shalt have no other gods before me" (v. 3). Some scholars suggest that "before me" means "in addition to Me." This view is consistent with "thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thine heart" (Deut. 6:5). If one loves the Lord with all one's heart, there is no room for any other.

"Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image . . ." (v. 4). A graven image is a representation of a god. God created man in His image (Gen. 1:26). Any graven image includes images of God which men might construct. A graven image of a human is not an image of God; it is an image of self. To worship self is to become as Lucifer who said, "I will be like the most High" (Isa. 14:14).

"... I the Lord thy God am a jealous God, visiting the iniquities of the fathers upon the children unto the third and fourth generation of them that hate me" (v. 5). God demands faithfulness and exclusive worship.

Visiting the iniquities of the fathers upon the children means that the wrongs of the past have consequences that extend to the third and fourth generations. This most certainly was the case for the nation of Judah following the Babylonian conquest. Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego were innocent of the transgressions of their fathers but never dwelt in the land of their birth as adults. The Lord does not punish the sons for the transgressions of the fathers (see Deut. 24:16, Jer. 31:29-30, Ezek. 18:1-32).

"... showing mercy ..." (v. 6). The Lord's mercy far exceeds His judgment for those who love Him and keep His commandments. Again, the scriptures document His mercy which spared Daniel and Mordecai and lifted them to positions of prominence.

"Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain . . ." (v. 7). Taking the Lord's name in vain is more, much more, than cursing. Taking the Lord's name in vain is any misuse of His name. Misuse includes using God to affirm that which is false (perjury), to express surprise, or to use His name when there is no clear purpose for doing so. God has called His people to lift up His name. Lifting up His name and misusing His name are as distant as west from east.

In verses 8 through 11, God tells His people to keep the sabbath day and why. The sabbath day is to be a day of rest. The Lord first instructed the children of Israel concerning the sabbath when He told Moses that He would cause bread to fall from heaven. God would provide a double portion of manna on the sixth day and none on the sabbath (Ex. 16:5). God rested on the seventh day. Israel was to rest from gathering on the seventh day. The instruction to keep the sabbath given at Sinai is part of Israel's covenantal agreement. Israel was to be a nation of priests who would declare God to all people through keeping the

In keeping the sabbath, Israel would loudly declare the Lord God who "made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that in them" (v. 11). Israel was to declare the Lord who "blessed the sabbath day, and hallowed it." The Lord raised up a

people to declare His righteousness to all peoples. Worship requires obedience. New Testament believers have a better covenant than Israel in that Christ has fulfilled the law which no man can keep. Our better covenant is conditional upon believing upon Christ Jesus. Obedience to the Lord's commandments is proof of belief. Jesus has commanded us to love one another as He loves us. Jesus commanded believers to go and to teach and to baptize. We are to teach all people to do as Jesus has said. He has given Himself as our sin payment. "If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the

truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (I Jn. 1:8-9).

He is not willing that any should perish but that all should come to Him in repentance.
