County Commission Rejects Fiber Optic Project Bid

The Putnam County Commission voted to reject all bids for installation of the planned fiber optic system at its December 13 meeting.

The Commission received bids or partial bids from three companies on October 11 but delayed taking action until consultant Jessie Parker of S& S Engineering reviewed the bids. Parker stated that the low bid of \$17,044,207 by Excel Utility Contractors was far in excess of the projected estimate of the \$12,123,000 which he had estimated on October 20 of last year and he recommended that all bids be rejected.

Both Commissioner Andy Skidmore and Commissioner Brian Ellis agreed. The project will be advertised for new bids.

Tim Hanna reported

that the county has been awarded a \$100,000 grant for Phase 2 for masonry restoration of the old courthouse.

The Commission approved the renewal of a non-exclusive Cable Franchise Agreement with Comcast for an additional term of five (5) years.

In other business, the Commission approved a series of Text Amendments which will clarify the language of ordinances governing residential and commercial developments.

The Commission also filled five vacancies on Putnam County Convention and Visitors Bureau Board (PCCVB). New members are Maggie Parsons, Angela Harding, Kathy Hess Crouse, Rob Sidenstricker and Joe Stevens.

The next Commission meeting will be Tuesday, January 10, 2023.







Eastern town, was reduced to a drive-thru event in 2020 and 2021 due to the COVID pandemic. For the first time since 2019, the village has been reopened to the public, allowing for the full Bethlehem experience.


"We are tickled to death to get back to the actual Walk Thru Bethlehem," said Darrell Moore, one of the event organizers.

Hometown Independent Mission's town of Bethlehem is enclosed within a wooden stockade and features booths built along the walls. Besides the infamous inn and its stables, the town has a large marketplace which serves to give the public a glimpse

of various trades that were common in Biblical days. Demonstrations of blacksmithing, carpentry, stone cutting, pottery, basket weaving, and other crafts were performed by volunteers. New this year was an olive press, in which large quantities of olives were crushed down into a paste. The paste was then put in a strainer, where the oil could either drip down into a basin, or be manually pressed to speed up the process. The olive oil that was made during the Walk Thru Bethlehem weekend cannot be used for cooking, however, because the olive press is for demonstration only and not crafted from food grade materials. Perhaps it can be used to light the lamps at next year's event.

Over 3,700 visitors came out to visit Hometown's Bethlehem the weekend of December 9 and 10, with some coming from as far away as Ohio, Kentucky, Virginia, and Maryland. Multiple church groups from around the area were in attendance, and long lines wrapped around the church. This was not a record-breaking year for the Hometown Independent Mission, however. In 2018, over 8,000 people attended the event. Prior to 2020, Walk Thru Bethlehem was spread out over four nights.


During the event, over 2,000 food items were donated to help out local food banks. The church also took monetary donations for community activities and mission work.

Karter Oaklynn Coleman Is Merry This Season









his dad, Samuel Lewis, were born on Eighteen Mile Creek, just northeast of Liberty. My great-grandpa was buried in the Brown Family Cemetery on the creek.


My grandpa, William Lewis, enlisted in the army during the Civil War when he was sixteen years old.

His neighbor, George gave him two hundred dollars to take his place. He told many stories of the hardships they had to endure during the war. He lived with our family twenty-three years. William was married to Sara Florence Buckalew. They had six children. My dad, Lightburn, was one of them.

Lightburn married Marinda Hughes on September 26, 1900. They had six children: Cloda, James, Delphia, Mary & Theda. Two brothers died in infancy and were laid to rest beside of my grandparents at the Emma Chapel Cemetery. My parents also raised a granddaughter, Emmadean Bailey who lives in Hurricane with her husband, Marion Smithers, and son, Eddie, a second son, David, and two grandchildren.

My mother's grandpa, James Hughes, was a Cavalryman during the Civil War. He married Marinda Stanley and they had ten children. David, my grandpa, was one of them. He often told us stories about his great, great, grandpa, Thomas Hughes, who was an Indian scout. David married Liza Pfoestalwaite and they had four children. My Mother was one (Liza died when my mother was eight). They lived on the ridge behind Arbuckle close to Putnam County.

I married Arnold Ray Baldwin on December 7, 1940, in Kentucky. It was a very rainy day and we had to detour through Hurricane as Route 60 was under construction. I remember crossing over the railroad bridge on Main Street and buying gas at a station nearby. Arnold grew up in Sissonville and worked for Libbey-Owens-Ford Glass Company for thirty-five years. He was in the Navy during World War II. We had four children: Zinda Lewis, Marinda Kay, Arnold Ray II and Timothy Dwight. They all graduated from Hurricane High School and all but Tim graduated from Business College.

Tim was in the Navy four years.

Zinda married Charles (Chuck) Huff, lifelong resident of Hurricane, who graduated from Hurricane High, was in the Army for three years and attended West Virginia State College. They have two sons, Charles II and Matthew. Will drugs and alcohol still be stealing the minds and the bodies of promising young people? And will promiscuity and homosexuality still be in style? Birth of the Savior

Luke 2:1-17

The text before us references a decree made by Caesar Augustus that all the world should be taxed. Cyrenius was governor of Syria when this taxing took place. The Holy Spirit moved Luke to write what he wrote such that we might believe with confidence that Jesus is the promised Messiah (Lk. 1:4).

At the time in which Luke wrote, there would have been many who, like Joseph and Mary, undertook long journeys to comply with the decree. Luke's account of Christ's birth would not have made reference to this disruption of lives unless it was commonly known.

The prophet Micah prophesied seven hundred years earlier that the Messiah would be born in Bethlehem. God spoke to both Joseph and Mary through the angel Gabriel. God could have directly instructed them to go to Bethlehem. Instead, God moved the heart of Caesar to issue a decree which required them to journey there. God, not men, chooses the manner in which His prophecies shall be realized. In this instance, God moved the emperor of the Roman Empire to issue an order which would result in the literal fulfillment of His word.

The Savior was wrapped in swaddling clothes and placed in a manger. There is no scripture given by any prophet which would have required that Jesus be born in a stable. Isaiah stated that there would be nothing special about the Messiah that would attract men to Him (Isa. 53:2). Birth in a stable qualifies to the lowly state of the Lord's birth.

The appearance of the angel of the Lord to the shepherds is significant. Search the Bible. The appearances of angels before men is an uncommon event. The angel's message was "Fear not: for, behold, I bring good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, which is Christ the Lord." The shepherds were told that they would find a baby wrapped in swaddling clothes.

The angelic host appeared and proclaimed "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." Two thousand years have passed and some men ask where is this peace. Either the peace has never come or it was so fleeting that no one noticed.

What is the explanation of this peace that seems to have escaped us? The physical peace and glory of which the angel speaks is promised by the prophet Isaiah. This shall be when the Messiah rules for one thousand years from the throne of David as the king of kings. This fact is revealed to us in the 20th chapter of the Revelation.

Knowledge of something which is two thousand years in the future hardly lends itself to establishing the certainty of things most certainly believed. But there is a peace and a glory which has reigned within men from the cross onward. This peace and glory is unknown to them who are without Christ. Men without knowledge of God struggle. Some struggle hoping that their efforts will result in pleasantness in the afterlife. Others, frustrated with failure, struggle hoping that they shall find mercy. Still others live without thought for the hereafter hoping that the present accounts for all existence. All men without Christ struggle.

Men of the first century and men of today who know Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior have a spiritual peace. That peace came when they gave up all hope based upon their own works and placed their trust in the work of the Lord Jesus Christ. Every born again heart experiences joy and glory with the reunification of each lost soul with God. This is the glory to God and peace on earth and good will toward men which the angelic host proclaimed. The angelic message to the shepherds also affirms that the Savior was born in Bethlehem.

The shepherds acted upon the words of the angel; they came and they found Mary and Joseph and the babe in swaddling clothes in the manger. And having witnessed it, they made it known that the angel had appeared to them and that the Savior had been born.

The birth of Jesus was good news for them in Judea who waited upon God and it is good news today for all who will believe that Jesus paid their sin debt.

The Holy Spirit moved Luke to record the Lord's birth such that we may know with certainty that Christ Jesus is the Promised One. All who know Him are called to proclaim that certainty to all men in every season.

The holiday season is here. Unfortunately, for many that only adds to the burden of trying to make ends meet in this difficult economy. Many of us like to make charitable contributions this time of year to benefit the less fortunate. Should you be so inclined, I would like you to consider a contribution to the Dollar Energy Fund.

Dollar Energy Fund is a non-profit organization founded in 1983 in Pennsylvania to provide assistance to those struggling to afford their gas, water and electric bills. In 2008, Dollar Energy Fund expanded its services and established the West Virginia Utility Assistance Program to provide comprehensive utility assistance to low-income West Virginians.

Dollar Energy assists limited-income customers with their gas, electric and water bills. Eligible customers receive a one-time grant applied directly to their utility bill. The program is a fund of last resort as it goes above and beyond what is available through federal, state and other programs by providing grants to qualified customers on a first come, first serve basis while funding is available. Participating utility companies include Appalachian and Wheeling Power Companies, Hope Gas, Mon Power, Potomac Edison, Mountaineer Gas, Peoples Gas Company and

West Virginia American Water.

Over the last 15 years, the program has provided \$30 million in utility assistance to more than 95,000 West Virginia households. The need for utility assistance continues to grow. According to the National Energy Assistance Directors Association, the average household will pay about 17% more this winter to heat their property. Currently, more than 20 million families are behind on their utility bills and 20% of U.S. households have missed or made a late payment on their utility bill in the last month.

The efforts of Dollar Energy would not be possible without individual donations. Those wishing to make a donation can do so by adding a dollar or more to their monthly utility payment by checking the box on your bill, visiting www.dollarenergy.org/donate and submitting a donation online via credit card or mailing a gift to P.O. Attorney General Morrissey Warns Veterans of PACT Act Scams

West Virginia Attorney General Patrick Morrissey is urging veterans to be on the lookout for potential scams targeting those who are eligible for benefits under the Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT) Act.

The PACT Act expands health care and benefits to an estimated five million veterans exposed to toxins such as Agent Orange or burn pits during the Vietnam, Gulf War and post-9/11 eras. The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs indicated the target of the scams usually are older veterans.

"These scammers are stooping to a new low by focusing their schemes on our veterans, our men and women who have served and sacrificed for our country," Attorney General Morrissey said. "These fraudsters will stop at nothing to earn a buck, and my office will not leave any stones unturned to go after these criminals. Those who defraud veterans must be held accountable to the full extent of the law."

The scams being reported by the VA include phishing (email), vishing (phone) and social media—scammers use these methods to contact veterans and claim to be

representing the VA.

The scam would then shift to offers of rapidly facilitating the extra benefits for a fee. There are also reported instances of identity theft as a result of the fraudulent contacts.

The VA offers these tips:

Do not provide personal, benefits, medical or financial details online or over the phone. Federal agencies will not contact you unless you make a request.

Do not click on online ads or engage with social media that seem suspicious.

Check for "https://" at the start of website addresses.

Enable multi-factor authentication on all accounts.

Work with Veteran service providers you already know.

Submit any suspected fraud to ftc.gov.

WVDEP Accepting Applications for Environmental Teacher of the Year Awards

The West Virginia Department of Environmental Protection (WVDEP) is accepting applications for the 2023 Make It Shine Environmental Teacher of the Year awards. The deadline to apply is February 14, 2023.
