Putnam County \$856,000 Radio Bid

The January 10th Putnam County Commission meeting was a first for Steve Deweese whose sixyear term officially began on January 1st. Brian Ellis and Andy Skidmore also serve as county commissioners. Skidmore will be commission president throughout 2023. commission,

consisting of Skidmore and Ellis, met in an emergency meeting on December 30 a because decision needed to be made before the end of the calendar year to avoid a ten percent in the cost of replacement 911 radio consoles for those destroyed by a lightning strike earlier in the year. OES/911 Director Mikyle White received bids from Motorola for \$2,567,000.00 and from Zetron for \$855,727.60. Zetron informed White

that its price would go up

ten percent on January 1, 2023. White recommended Zetron because it was lower and because the company had received a good report from Jackson County officials who utilize Zetron equipment. The commission approved the Zetron bid of \$855,727.60 and adjourned.

In action on January 10, the commission designated that the commission hold regular meetings on the second and last Tuesday of each month. The second Tuesday meeting will be at 9 a.m. and the last Tuesday meeting will be at 5 p.m.



West Virginia House of Delegates took the oath of office Wednesday, Jan. 11, to kick off the first session of the 86th Legislature, it marked the first time in history the state will be represented by single-member House districts.

West Virginia Supreme Court Chief Justice Beth Walker administered the oath of office to all members after Secretary of State Mac Warner delivered the certified election results of November 2022, and members then elected Roger Hanshaw, R-Clay, to his third term as Speaker of the

who were married Oct. 25, 1808 in Franklin County, Virginia. Jack came to what is now Putnam County in the 1830's. He owned a large farm on Charley's Creek, just over the ridge from the first Matthews homestead near Hurricane Creek and that is perhaps where they first became

acquainted. Ann and Jack were the parents of four children: Mary Elizabeth, b. 1843; Lee Frances, b. 1845, William Franklin, b. Mar. 1847; Louella, b. 1850. Mary married A. Pratt Nov. 13, 1868. They were the parents of Laura (m. (1) James Henderson, (2) Woodville Riddle), and twins, Edith and Ada. It isn't known who Lee and Louella married. William Franklin married (1) Anna Olivia "Ollie" Rowan on Dec. 24, 1872. They were the parents of six children, only two (Ed and Bertha) lived to adulthood. Oliva died in 1883 (possibly in childbirth — last child

Jack Riddle then married Mary Jane Powell in 1853 and they were the parents of at least 12 more children, including: Alice, Caroline E., James M., Flora J., Lucretia, Ann Eliza, Ellen Margaret Emma, Infant, Josephine, Virginia, and Charles. The burial place of Ann

Matthews is unknown, but Jack Riddle was buried in the Charley's Creek Cemetery just below his farm. Numerous descendants of Ann and Jack still live in the

Hurricane area.

A total of 548 bills have been introduced in the House, and the 60-day, regular legislative session ends at midnight March 11.

"This is a natural next step after our bill this summer to prohibit abortions except for rape and incest which I wasn't wholeheartedly happy with. I hope this bill will address some of the things which were left out of previous legislation regarding care of the baby and ensuring disposal proper chemicals which endanger our water supply," said Senator Rucker.

The West Virginia Chemical Abortion Prohibition Act also:

Places penalties physicians who distribute the drugs, in cases other than saving the life of a mother, with a \$1,000 fine or imprisoned not more than three years, or both.

Prohibits prosecution of women.

Distinguishes difference ectopic pregnancy treatment.

Penalizes manufacturers of any abortion drug who does not properly dispose discarded

drugs. abortion drugs are found in wastewater, the pill manufacturer company shall be responsible for cleanup, remediation, and further preventative measures. A violation of this provision is punishable by a fine of \$20,000 per violation.

As SFLAction educates women on the risks of injury, infertility, and even death as well as the Chemical Abortion antidote that could help reverse the beginning of a medical abortion, the organization is highlighting the lack of environmental studies prior to the Food and Drug Administration's approval of the Chemical

Abortion Pill. SFLAction is hopeful with Senator Rucker's legislation more states will take up this issue as we press federal agencies to test and investigate the effect of our water supply with potent chemicals. 



The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www. wvencyclopedia.org.

Jan. 19, 1818: The Virginia General Assembly established Preston County from part of Monongalia County. The new county was named for James Patton Preston, then governor of Virginia.

Jan. 19, 1820: Fairmont was established by the Virginia legislature on the farm of Boaz Fleming. The original name of Middletown was changed to Fairmont in 1843.

Jan. 19, 1844: The Virginia General Assembly established Taylor County from parts of Barbour, Harrison and Marion counties. The county was named in honor of U.S. Sen. John Taylor, a soldierstatesman from Caroline County, Virginia.

Jan. 19, 1848: Wirt County was created by the General Assembly of Virginia from portions of Wood and Jackson counties. It was named William

Virginia statesman and a presidential candidate in

Ian. 19, 1894: Railroad worker John Hardy was hanged for killing a man in a drunken gambling dispute. The episode inspired the widely popular ballad "John Hardy."

Jan. 20-21, 1824: West Virginia's most famous soldier, Thomas Jonathan Jackson, was born near midnight in Clarksburg. When Virginia left the Union in 1861, Jackson went with his native state. He commanded the strategically important post at Harpers Ferry until being appointed a brigadier general of infantry. In the opening battle at Manassas on July 21, 1861, he won the name "Stonewall" for steadfastness at a critical point in the engagement.

overnight snowstorm paralyzed Charleston. Unusual in that more snow fell in the capital city than in Randolph County, total snow depth in Charleston averaged 24 inches, the deepest on record for the city. January 1978 became the snowiest month for both Huntington and Wirt, Charleston, and extended

Jan. 19-20, 1978: An

cold kept the snow cover on the ground into March, the longest known continuous snow cover for most towns in West Virginia.

Jan. 21, 1906: The first passenger train ran from Elkins to Charleston following completion of the Coal & Coke Railway. The new railroad, a project of former senator Henry Gassaway Davis, provided a much-needed northsouth route through the heart of West Virginia.

Jan. 22, 1927: Confederate General John McCausland died. After the fall of the Confederacy, McCausland fled country. He returned in 1867 and spent the remainder of his life on his large farm in Mason County.

Jan. 23, 1850: Raleigh County was established by an act of the Virginia General Assembly. The county's founder, Alfred Beckley, named it after Sir Walter Raleigh.

Jan. 23, 1888: Union leader Fred Mooney was born in a log cabin on Davis Creek in Kanawha County. He was secretary-treasurer of United Mine Workers of America District 17 from 1917 to 1924 and was a radical leader in the West Virginia Mine Wars.

Jan. 23, 1890: The United Mine Workers was organized at a meeting in Columbus, Ohio, with John B. Rae, a Scottish immigrant, as the first president. Just three months later, in Wheeling, UMWA District 17, encompassing most of West Virginia, held its first meeting, elected M. F. Moran as district president and immediately launched what became a struggle of more than 40 years to unionize the state's coal

Jan. 24, 1968: Mary Lou Retton was born in Fairmont. She made history at the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles when, at 16, she became the first American woman ever to win a

gold medal in gymnastics and the first native West Lenna Lowe Yost was Virginia woman to win a gold medal in Olympic competition.

Harrison Pierpont was born near Morgantown. On June 20, 1861, Pierpont was unanimously elected as governor of the unionist Reorganized Government of Virginia, which sat at Wheeling until West Virginia entered the Union two years later.

Jan. 25, 1878: Activist born in Basnettville in Marion County. She held key leadership roles Jan. 25, 1814: Francis in the woman's suffrage movement and the temperance movement.

Jan. 25, 1889: Anna Johnson Gates was born in Kanawha County. The state's first female state legislator, Gates was elected to the House of Delegates in 1922 and served a single term.

BASIC BIBLE

Blessing of Liberty in Christ Galatians 5:1-17

In verse 1, Paul urges the Galatians to stand fast in the liberty which is realized through Christ and not to be entangled "with the yoke of bondage." Before being made free by Christ, both Jew and Gentile were under the law. Because Christ fulfilled the law, believers are made free of the law through Him. The Good Shepherd gave His life for the sheep such that they (all believers) have life and have it more abundantly (Jn. 10:10-

The Galatians and we (believers of every age) are called to testify of the freedom from the law which Christ has purchased. One who remains under the law does not testify of the liberty which Christ has purchased. In verse 4, Paul states that anyone who attempts to justify themselves by keeping the law is fallen from grace. Grace is not found in the law.

The Apostle asserted in verse 2 that the liberty that one has through Christ is not related in any way to circumcision. As New Testament believers, we recognize that we are beneficiaries of the promise made to Abraham (Genesis 12). We note that circumcision was an outward sign on the part of Abraham and his seed of God's contract to be their God and to give them the land of Canaan forever (Gen. 17:8). The terms of that contract involved more than physical circumcision. In Genesis 17:1, God placed the requirement upon Abraham that he "walk before me, and be thou perfect." More than six hundred years passed before God spelled out His terms of perfection in the law of Moses. The blessing which God promised to all families of the earth through Abraham (Gen. 12:3) predates the covenant of circumcision.

In verse 3, Paul flatly states that circumcision makes one a debtor to the whole law — one must be perfect. If one could walk in the perfection which Christ walked, Christ's perfection is of no effect. The act of circumcision is no less than a pledge to keep the entire law.

It is through the Spirit (revelation by the Comforter, the Holy Spirit) [v. 5] that we eagerly receive the righteousness of Christ which is the gift of grace by faith (Eph. 2:8-9). Paul identifies that which matters with Christ as "faith which worketh by love." Neither circumcision or uncircumcision has spiritual merit with Christ. Faith that testifies of God's love is the spiritual response that matters. God counts believing Him as righteousness. Evidence of belief is manifested by all who testify of His love.

"Ye did run well" (v. 7) refers to the manner in which the Galatians had responded to God's love. Something happened. God's love did not change. Christ did not change. Truth did not change. The Galatians had changed. They had stopped testifying of His love. What caused this change? False teachers had convinced them that God's love alone was not enough. False teachers had persuaded them to embrace legalism. Believers, Galatians included, cannot embrace both grace and the law. To do so is to declare God's love to be both sufficient and insufficient. One who embraces righteousness by works (the law) rejects righteousness by faith. Righteousness by works is spiritual leaven which infects the entire lump (v. 9). It destroys the testimony of His love.

Paul was born a Jew and was circumcised under the law but he did not remain under the law, He threw out the leaven. He embraced Christ and Him alone. The specific leaven that had infected the lump in the church at Galatia was the requirement of circumcision (v. 3, 4 and 11). It is apparent that some of the Judaizers argued that Paul continued to preach circumcision. Paul did have Timothy circumcised (Acts 16:3). The reason, however, was not to keep the law. Timothy's circumcision was a demonstration of love in that Paul might gain them who are under the law (I Cor. 9:20). The apostle argues that the persecution which he suffers at the hands of Judaizers is because he teaches the sufficiency of the cross

In verse 13, Paul makes it clear that freedom from the law is not a license to sin. The law requires one to love his neighbor as himself. Freedom from the law allows believers to serve one another by love. Love cannot be legislated. One cannot fulfill the love requirement of the law unless one is

made free from the law. Through Christ, we can walk in the Spirit. The law is of the flesh and is

contrary to the Spirit (v. 17). One cannot walk in two different directions at the same time. The flesh and the Spirit lead in opposite directions. Judaizers were enemies of the Galatians because they would have the

flesh rule over the Spirit. Christians of today face like challenges in that legalists would not have us walk in love (the way of the Spirit) but walk in

Christ has made us free such that His love may be seen in us. Let us consider that which He has done and then love one another as He has

loved us. We are free in Him who is the full expression of God's love.

Joe Swann Celebrates 90th Birthday






