Putnam County Commission Approves \$856,000 Radio Bid

The January 10th Putnam County Commission meeting was a first for Steve Deweese whose six-year term officially began on January 1st. Brian Ellis and Andy Skidmore also serve as county commissioners. Skidmore will be commission president throughout 2023. The commission, consisting of Skidmore and Ellis, met in an emergency meeting on December 30 a because decision needed to be made before the end of the calendar year to avoid a ten percent in the cost of replacement 911 radio consoles for those destroyed by a lightning strike earlier in the year. OES/911 Director Mikyle White received bids from Motorola for \$2,567,000.00 and from Zetron for \$855,727.60. Zetron informed White that its price would go up

ten percent on January 1, 2023. White recommended Zetron because it was lower and because the company had received a good report from Jackson County officials who utilize Zetron equipment. The commission approved the Zetron bid of \$855,727.60 and adjourned.

In action on January 10, the commission designated that the commission hold regular meetings on the second and last Tuesday of each month. The second Tuesday meeting will be at 9 a.m. and the last Tuesday meeting will be at 5 p.m.

Commission president Skidmore conducted a swearing in ceremony for newly hired Deputy Sheriffs Devin Conliff; Austin McKeown; and Austin Smith. Conliff and McKeown must graduate from the State Police Academy before assuming duties. Smith is a former Lincoln County deputy (Continued to Page 3)

Public Service Commission Paves Path for Nucor Plant

The Public Service Commission approved a request by Appalachian Power and Wheeling Power Companies to recover the cost of purchase and sales agreements for two renewable generation facilities. The PSC approval means that Appalachian and Wheeling will pass on the cost of a 4.875 MW solar facility in Amherst County, Virginia, and a

204 MW wind project in Logan County, Illinois, to customers. Appalachian and Wheeling argued that the agreements were necessary because Nucor's commitment to building in West Virginia requires that 20% of its energy sources come from renewables. The Nucor plant will be built in Mason County.

The 2023 Fairs and Festivals Pageant was a three day event held January 12-14 with activities conducted at the Marriott and the Charleston Civic Center. Contestants registered on Thursday. The judges conducted personal interviews on Friday and Saturday. Also on Saturday, each contestant was given 30 seconds to promote the event which she represented. The Evening Gown competition followed. The field of competitors was narrowed to 15 after the judges tallied points for interviews, event promotion, and evening gown competition.

In addition to pageant winner Bridgette Altizer, Miss Putnam County Fair Kayleigh Hayzlett of Eleanor and Miss Shanghai Parade Taylor Miller of Winfield finished in the top 15 and qualified for the final phase of competition, the on-stage interview. The judges then named Miss Altizer as the Fairs and Festivals Queen.

The Shanghai Parade which Miss Miller represented is a New Years parade which is held in Lewisburg.

Prior to the on-stage interviews, Krista Call Snodgrass was inducted into the Fairs and Festivals Hall of Fame. Snodgrass has served as the Association of Fairs and Festivals' secretary for ten years and has been instrumental in making the Association's convention successful year after year. Snodgrass also serves as president of the Putnam County Fair.

Winfield High is an Academic Showdown Regional Winner

The West Virginia Academic Showdown is a head-to-head competition in which teams from participating schools are tested in their knowledge of math, history, sports, fine arts and more. Teams are composed of students in grades 9 - 12.

On Saturday, January 14, fifteen teams from Cabell, Mason, Putnam, and Wayne counties competed at Marshall University's Joan C. Edwards Performing Arts Center for an opportunity

to advance. Huntington Team 1 and Winfield Team 1 defeated team after team in the double-elimination competition to finish first and second. Both teams will advance to the State finale at the West Virginia Culture Center in Charleston on March 31, 2023.

Hurricane Teams 1 & 2, Huntington Team 2, Poca, Point Pleasant Teams 1 & 2, Spring Valley Teams 1 & 2, Wahama Teams 1 & 2, and Wayne Teams 1 & 2 experienced second losses

and were eliminated.

Statewide, 71 teams from 40 high schools representing 26 counties registered to compete in the Academic Showdown. Last year, 20 teams competed.

The Academic Showdown is a partnership between the WVDE, the West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission, West Virginia Public Broadcasting and the West Virginia Department of Arts, Culture and History.

ANN MATHEWS AND CHARLES JACKSON RIDDLE

Ann was the first child of record born to William and Lucinda Matthews. She was born in 1822, probably in Charlotte County, Virginia, where her parents were married and apparently lived at least for the next ten years. She married Charles "Jack" Riddle March 15, 1842. The ceremony was performed by James Mitchell, Jack was b. 1820, the son of George and Elizabeth Martin Riddle (Continued to Page 3)

THIS WEEK IN THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES

For the week ending Jan. 13, 2023

When members of the West Virginia House of Delegates took the oath of office Wednesday, Jan. 11, to kick off the first session of the 86th Legislature, it marked the first time in history the state will be represented by single-member House districts.

West Virginia Supreme Court Chief Justice Beth Walker administered the oath of office to all members after Secretary of State Mac Warner delivered the certified election results of November 2022, and members then elected Roger Hanshaw, R-Clay, to his third term as Speaker of the House.

"He is a man of faith; he is a man who is committed to his family; he is probably one of the most disciplined men I have ever seen, and he is a servant," Delegate David Kelly, R-Tyler, said in nominating Hanshaw. "He is humble. He doesn't boast about his status or his accomplishments, although he could. But he is more interested in boasting about our status and our accomplishments. He is a man of vision."

Speaker Hanshaw then addressed the members from the podium, thanking them for the honor and reminding them of the honor to occupy one of the

100 seats they collectively share in the House of Delegates representing 1.8 million West Virginians.

"This body, actions taken by this body have made it possible for over six billion dollars of investment to have been made in our state in the last five years," Hanshaw said. "We are talking about economy transforming jobs into communities across our state; we did that. We did that together."

Hanshaw revisited the goal he set as Speaker when he spoke to members as he assumed the position two years ago, saying it would be his priority to make West Virginia the easy choice.

"I am very proud to say the work we have done here has helped put us on the right path to make it easier to choose West Virginia," he said. "We have a lot more opportunity ahead of us, we have a lot more responsibility on our shoulders now that what we have done has been working, we simply now need to keep our foot on the accelerator."

Members then elected Stephen J. Harrison for another term as Clerk of the House, Marshall Clay as Sergeant-at-Arms and Robert Stewart as Doorkeeper.

The House welcomed Gov. Jim Justice to address

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who were married Oct. 25, 1808 in Franklin County, Virginia. Jack came to what is now Putnam County in the 1830's. He owned a large farm on Charley's Creek, just over the ridge from the first Matthews homestead near Hurricane Creek and that is perhaps where they first became acquainted.

Ann and Jack were the parents of four children: Mary Elizabeth, b. 1843; Lee Frances, b. 1845; William Franklin, b. Mar. 1847; Louella, b. 1850. Mary married A. Pratt Nov. 13, 1868. They were the parents of Laura (m. (1) James Henderson, (2) Woodville Riddle), and twins, Edith and Ada. It isn't known who Lee and Louella married. William Franklin married (1) Anna Olivia "Ollie" Rowan on Dec. 24, 1872. They were the parents of six children, only two (Ed and Bertha) lived to adulthood. Oliva died in 1883 (possibly in childbirth — last child born in March 1883) and Frank then married (2) Sarah "Sally" Garrett, daughter of Robert Garrett, Nov. 26 1884.

Sally was b. Feb. 1866, d. Mar. 8, 1909. They were the parents of: Woodville, b. Nov. 26, 1885, m. Laura Pratt Henderson; Mary Edith, b. Mar. 31, 1887, m. A Brooks; Edna Ellen, b. April 7, 1889, m. Marion Fizer; Buford Jackson, b. Aug 10, 1895, m. Sadie (Turley) Woodall, and their children were Kyle W., Clarice, Alma and Raleigh; Fitzhugh McKinley, b. July 4, 1898, m. Reva Inez Ashworth and their children were Cebert and Erma Jewel; and Evaline "Evie", who m. Walter Burton. Sadly, Ann Matthews Riddle died about 1851. Jack Riddle then married Mary Jane Powell in 1853 and they were the parents of at least 12 more children, including: Alice, Caroline E., James M., Flora J., Lucretia, Ann Eliza, Ellen W., Margaret Emma, Infant, Josephine, Virginia, and Charles.

The burial place of Ann Matthews is unknown, but Jack Riddle was buried in the Charley's Creek Cemetery just below his farm. Numerous descendants of Ann and Jack still live in the Hurricane area.

We're told to not flush something as trivial as a dead goldfish, but the abortion lobby is sending women home to kill and dispose of their preborn children in our sewage systems — we're demanding answers from these unchecked policies that impact public water supply."

WASHINGTON, D.C. (01-17-2023) — Students for Life Action (SFLAction) and Students for Life of America (SFLA) have been on the forefront of calling out the risks of Chemical Abortion Pills for women and the preborn, but this year the organization has

expanded its scope of research on the effects that the drugs impose on the environment. SFLA has launched a petition and nation-wide awareness campaign calling for Red Bag Medical Waste regulation of dealing with dead bodies after an abortion. Due to the horror stories of babies' bodies ground up in garbage disposals, frozen in bags awaiting retrieval, and stashed away in old cars, SFLAction was eager to incorporate Red Bag Medical Waste language into a bill with State Senator Patricia Rucker of West Virginia.

Defined in Senator Rucker's legislation, West Virginia Chemical Abortion Prohibition Act (SB 153), the term "medical waste bag" means a red biohazardous waste container made to contain medical or biohazardous waste. The legislation includes guidance with warning labels including the clear identification of "BIOHAZARD." Furthermore, the container must be of a fluorescent orange or orange-red color and would be applicable to

an "Unborn child, means an individual organism of the species homosapiens, beginning at fertilization, until the point of being born alive."

"This is a natural next step after our bill this summer to prohibit abortions except for rape and incest which I wasn't wholeheartedly happy with. I hope this bill will address some of the things which were left out of previous legislation regarding care of the baby and ensuring proper disposal of chemicals which endanger our water supply," said Senator Rucker.

The West Virginia Chemical Abortion Prohibition Act also:

Places penalties on physicians who distribute the drugs, in cases other than saving the life of a mother, with a \$1,000 fine or imprisoned not more than three years, or both.

Prohibits the prosecution of women.

Distinguishes the difference of ectopic pregnancy treatment.

Penalizes manufacturers of any abortion drug who does not properly dispose of discarded abortion

drugs. Including, if abortion drugs are found in wastewater, the pill manufacturer company shall be responsible for cleanup, remediation, and further preventative measures. A violation of this provision is punishable by a fine of \$20,000 per violation.

As SFLAction educates women on the risks of injury, infertility, and even death as well as the Chemical Abortion antidote that could help reverse the beginning of a medical abortion, the organization is highlighting the lack of environmental studies prior to the Food and Drug Administration's approval of the Chemical Abortion Pill.

SFLAction is hopeful with Senator Rucker's legislation more states will take up this issue as we press federal agencies to test and investigate the effect of our water supply with potent chemicals. As Chemical Abortion Pills continue to rise as the most common method of direction abortion, it remains highly unsafe and destructive.

a joint session of the Legislature for his State of the State address and to present his budget, which proposes a 50% reduction in the personal income tax to take place in three phases over three years. The legislation to carry out that plan, House Bill 2526, advanced from the House Finance Committee Thursday, Jan. 12, after members made a change that included the Personal Income Tax Reserve Fund in the bill.

"You are touching every wage earner in the state of West Virginia with this bill," said House Finance Committee Chairman Vernon Criss.

The measure would begin with a 30% reduction in state personal income tax rates beginning with the 2023 tax year, and then reduce the original rates by another 10% the following year, and another 10% the year after that.

The newly elevated House Technology and Infrastructure Committee reported out two bills this week, HB 2218, a potential expansion and modernization of current distracted driving laws, and HB 2310, which would allow the West Virginia Division of Motor Vehicles to develop an "antique fleet" program to utilize a single registration

plate for a person to rotate among multiple antique motor vehicles.

The House Health and Human Resources Committee also advanced two measures this week: HB 2016, which would allow specific information to be shared among child agencies or facilities when making referrals or providing services on behalf of the child, while still keeping the information private; and HB 2002, which would increase support for families through several methods, including increasing the adoption tax credit and allowing adopted children of West Virginia residents to participate in the Department of Health and Human Resources' early intervention services for children with developmental delays.

"We know this bill will require more work and fine-tuning, but this House is committed to supporting life and supporting families, so I'm happy we were able to get it moving early to allow for all those discussions," said House Health Committee Chair Amy Summers, R-Taylor.

A total of 548 bills have been introduced in the House, and the 60-day, regular legislative session ends at midnight March 11.

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


Chicken:

- 3 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh dill
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh oregano
- 2 cloves garlic, peeled and minced
- 3 tablespoons freshly squeezed lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/2 teaspoon black pepper
- 2 pounds boneless, skinless chicken breasts

Yogurt Sauce:

- 1 1/2 cups plain, whole-milk yogurt
- 1 1/2 tablespoons freshly squeezed lemon juice
- 1/2 cup diced cucumber
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh dill
- 1 clove garlic, peeled and minced
- 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/8 teaspoon black pepper

- 3-4 small loaves whole-wheat pita bread, halved lengthwise
- 1 cup thinly sliced tomatoes
- 1/2 cup thinly sliced red onion

To make chicken: Place melted butter, dill, oregano, garlic, lemon juice, salt and pepper in gallon-size zip-top freezer bag. Seal bag and shake contents to combine. Add chicken. Seal bag, pressing air out of bag. Shake chicken to coat with marinade. Refrigerate chicken in marinade 30 minutes.

To make yogurt sauce: Stir yogurt, lemon juice, diced cucumber, dill, garlic, salt and pepper. Cover sauce and refrigerate.

Heat grill to medium heat.

Grill chicken over direct heat, about 10 minutes per side, until cooked through. Transfer chicken to cutting board and rest 10 minutes. Thinly slice chicken across grain.

Serve chicken on pita bread with tomatoes, red onion and yogurt sauce.

The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

Jan. 19, 1818: The Virginia General Assembly established Preston County from part of Monongalia County. The new county was named for James Patton Preston, then governor of Virginia.

Jan. 19, 1820: Fairmont was established by the Virginia legislature on the farm of Boaz Fleming. The original name of Middletown was changed to Fairmont in 1843.

Jan. 19, 1844: The Virginia General Assembly established Taylor County from parts of Barbour, Harrison and Marion counties. The county was named in honor of U.S. Sen. John Taylor, a soldier-statesman from Caroline County, Virginia.

Jan. 19, 1848: Wirt County was created by the General Assembly of Virginia from portions of Wood and Jackson counties. It was named for William Wirt,

Virginia statesman and a presidential candidate in 1832.

Jan. 19, 1894: Railroad worker John Hardy was hanged for killing a man in a drunken gambling dispute. The episode inspired the widely popular ballad "John Hardy."

Jan. 20-21, 1824: West Virginia's most famous soldier, Thomas Jonathan Jackson, was born near midnight in Clarksburg. When Virginia left the Union in 1861, Jackson went with his native state. He commanded the strategically important post at Harpers Ferry until being appointed a brigadier general of infantry. In the opening battle at Manassas on July 21, 1861, he won the name "Stonewall" for steadfastness at a critical point in the engagement.

Jan. 19-20, 1978: An overnight snowstorm paralyzed Charleston. Unusual in that more snow fell in the capital city than in Randolph County, total snow depth in Charleston averaged 24 inches, the deepest on record for the city. January 1978 became the snowiest month for both Huntington and Charleston, and extended

cold kept the snow cover on the ground into March, the longest known continuous snow cover for most towns in West Virginia.

Jan. 21, 1906: The first passenger train ran from Elkins to Charleston following completion of the Coal & Coke Railway. The new railroad, a project of former senator Henry Gassaway Davis, provided a much-needed north-south route through the heart of West Virginia.

Jan. 22, 1927: Confederate General John McCausland died. After the fall of the Confederacy, McCausland fled the country. He returned in 1867 and spent the remainder of his life on his large farm in Mason County.

Jan. 23, 1850: Raleigh County was established by an act of the Virginia General Assembly. The county's founder, Alfred Beckley, named it after Sir Walter Raleigh.

Jan. 23, 1888: Union leader Fred Mooney was born in a log cabin on Davis Creek in Kanawha County. He was secretary-treasurer of United Mine Workers of America District 17 from 1917 to 1924 and was a radical leader in the West Virginia Mine Wars.

Jan. 23, 1890: The United Mine Workers was organized at a meeting in Columbus, Ohio, with John B. Rae, a Scottish immigrant, as the first president. Just three months later, in Wheeling, UMW District 17, encompassing most

of West Virginia, held its first meeting, elected M. F. Moran as district president and immediately launched what became a struggle of more than 40 years to unionize the state's coal mines.

Jan. 24, 1968: Mary Lou Retton was born in Fairmont. She made history at the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles when, at 16, she became the first American woman ever to win a

gold medal in gymnastics and the first native West Virginia woman to win a gold medal in Olympic competition.

Jan. 25, 1814: Francis Harrison Pierpont was born near Morgantown. On June 20, 1861, Pierpont was unanimously elected as governor of the unionist Reorganized Government of Virginia, which sat at Wheeling until West Virginia entered the Union two years later.

Jan. 25, 1878: Activist Lenna Lowe Yost was born in Basnettville in Marion County. She held key leadership roles in the woman's suffrage movement and the temperance movement.

Jan. 25, 1889: Anna Johnson Gates was born in Kanawha County. The state's first female state legislator, Gates was elected to the House of Delegates in 1922 and served a single term.

In verse 4, Paul states that anyone who attempts to justify themselves by keeping the law is fallen from grace. Grace is not found in the law.

The Apostle asserted in verse 2 that the liberty that one has through Christ is not related in any way to circumcision. As New Testament believers, we recognize that we are beneficiaries of the promise made to Abraham (Genesis 12). We note that circumcision was an outward sign on the part of Abraham and his seed of God's contract to be their God and to give them the land of Canaan forever (Gen. 17:8). The terms of that contract involved more than physical circumcision. In Genesis 17:1, God placed the requirement upon Abraham that he "walk before me, and be thou perfect." More than six hundred years passed before God spelled out His terms of perfection in the law of Moses. The blessing which God promised to all families of the earth through Abraham (Gen. 12:3) predates the covenant of circumcision.

In verse 3, Paul flatly states that circumcision makes one a debtor to the whole law — one must be perfect. If one could walk in the perfection which Christ walked, Christ's perfection is of no effect. The act of circumcision is no less than a pledge to keep the entire law.

It is through the Spirit (revelation by the Comforter, the Holy Spirit) [v. 5] that we eagerly receive the righteousness of Christ which is the gift of grace by faith (Eph. 2:8-9). Paul identifies that which matters with Christ as "faith which worketh by love." Neither circumcision or uncircumcision has spiritual merit with Christ. Faith that testifies of God's love is the spiritual response that matters. God counts believing Him as righteousness. Evidence of belief is manifested by all who testify of His love.

"Ye did run well" (v. 7) refers to the manner in which the Galatians had responded to God's love. Something happened. God's love did not change. Christ did not change. Truth did not change. The Galatians had changed. They had stopped testifying of His love. What caused this change? False teachers had convinced them that God's love alone was not enough. False teachers had persuaded them to embrace legalism. Believers, Galatians included, cannot embrace both grace and the law. To do so is to declare God's love to be both sufficient and insufficient. One who embraces righteousness by works (the law) rejects righteousness by faith. Righteousness by works is spiritual leaven which infects the entire lump (v. 9). It destroys the testimony of His love.

Paul was born a Jew and was circumcised under the law but he did not remain under the law. He threw out the leaven. He embraced Christ and Him alone. The specific leaven that had infected the lump in the church at Galatia was the requirement of circumcision (v. 3, 4 and 11). It is apparent that some of the Judaizers argued that Paul continued to preach circumcision. Paul did have Timothy circumcised (Acts 16:3). The reason, however, was not to keep the law. Timothy's circumcision was a demonstration of love in that Paul might gain them who are under the law (I Cor. 9:20). The apostle argues that the persecution which he suffers at the hands of Judaizers is because he teaches the sufficiency of the cross alone.

In verse 13, Paul makes it clear that freedom from the law is not a license to sin. The law requires one to love his neighbor as himself. Freedom from the law allows believers to serve one another by love. Love cannot be legislated. One cannot fulfill the love requirement of the law unless one is made free from the law.

Through Christ, we can walk in the Spirit. The law is of the flesh and is contrary to the Spirit (v. 17). One cannot walk in two different directions at the same time. The flesh and the Spirit lead in opposite directions.

Judaizers were enemies of the Galatians because they would have the flesh rule over the Spirit. Christians of today face like challenges in that legalists would not have us walk in love (the way of the Spirit) but walk in duty (bondage).

Christ has made us free such that His love may be seen in us. Let us consider that which He has done and then love one another as He has loved us. We are free in Him who is the full expression of God's love.


