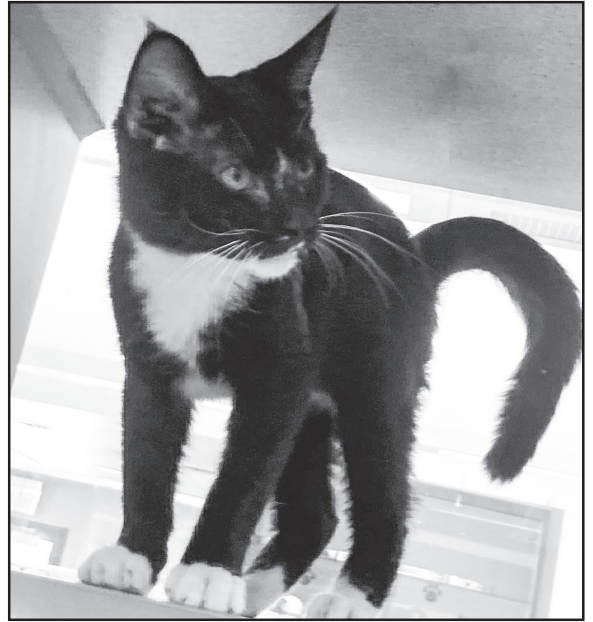
Available Pets at the Putnam County Animal Shelter

Mondays were wash days at our house. A wringer washer was used, year round. In the good weather, clothes were hung outside; in the bad weather, clothes adorned the inside of the house. I can picture Mother and Mama with the clothespin bag on the line, hanging our clothes, sheets, towels, all of the wash, outside. When they spring/fall cleaned, out came the curtains, starched and hung on the line or on special stretcher like things. Amazing... the work...

There was nothing like getting into bed and smelling the fresh aroma of clean sheets. Awww... I still absolutely love getting into bed with fresh sheets. Just a simple pleasure but awww....

Everything was ironed. Many items were starched. Tuesday was ironing day. I learned to iron early on. I enjoyed doing it. However, it was obvious that I would burn something I ironed or myself. Usually...

sometimes... most times. I must admit that Mother liked doing most of the chores herself... she did them right.

The character in the book was just a teenager, but she was responsible for the laundry and cleaning because the mother in the book had too many children to do everything. Back in those days, the kids grew up quickly, and they did not mind it. They did not complain because that is the way it was. They lived on a farm, so the boys worked outside.

When we were growing up, in the 50's and 60's, in town, we had no idea what real work was. Some of my friends lived on farms, and some of my relatives also... they worked in the tobacco fields long hours. They worked in the vegetable gardens and took care of the animals. One of my friends was up early milking cows. I cannot imagine what that was like.

I got up, grabbed a bite, and left for school. I came home, talked on the phone to my friends, and did my homework. I spent hours and hours reading... working on a farm... doing the laundry or cleaning... no way. I was blessed I guess.

Remembering Mother and Mama standing outside, wearing housedresses, hanging out the clothes... running to get them in when the rain came... if I was home, I helped, of course... they did chores as if they were loving what they were doing. I could not imagine... that is the way life was.

We have washers and dryers, dishwashers, microwaves... we have much less to do than our ancestors did. We have more leisure time... however, I must add here that when I was young, few women worked outside the home... my generation seems to be the one when women started keeping house, raising children, and going outside the home to work... doing it all... and smiling the whole time.

One thing that has made me wonder... when a couple retires... the man seems to retire... the woman keeps on keeping on with the house, meals, and everything else expected... alas... that is life... Just as the clothesline is a thing of the past... the wringer washer only seen in antique shops... the starched curtains long gone... things change... they get better or not... because the way we were is the way we are... seeing in our minds those wonderful women, we loved so much, working daily to make our lives better... perhaps, one day, we will forget what it was like growing up... for now, I am blessed to have had those two women in my life... they taught me much... and the clothesline... I have not seen one in years. Would I use it if I had one? Not on your life... I am not lugging wet clothes outside... alas... such is life... we progress and move on. I am sure some of my readers probably still hang out their clothes... I admire them...

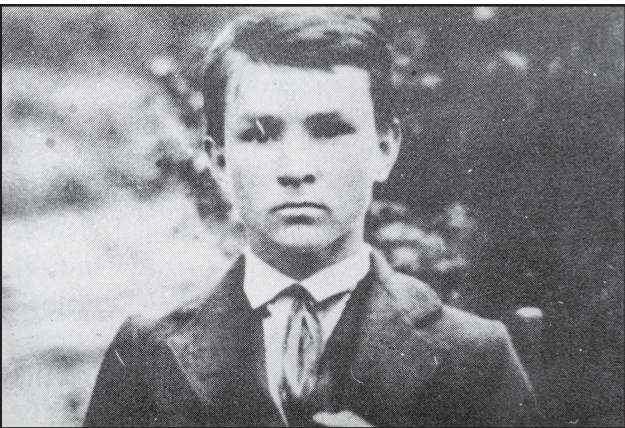

Celebrating Town of Buffalo's History

Clark, married Benjamin A. Craig from Augusta County, Virginia, and her father presented her with a 100 acre "Buffalo Farm" as a wedding gift. This led to the birth of what we now know as the town of Buffalo.

Benjamin K. Craig and his new wife Mary became the first inhabitants of the area. In 1833, Benjamin secured the services of his brother James, a surveyor, and laid out the town. Four years later, the town was officially incorporated by the Virginia Legislature on April 2, 1837. Benjamin K. Craig was elected the first mayor of the town he founded just a few years earlier.

The town quickly began to be a major hub on the Kanawha River due to its location between Point Pleasant and Charleston. Known as a riverboat town, it quickly became a stop for travelers and visitors. Two packet boats made daily stops from Gallipolis and Charleston. Weekly boats would run from Cincinnati and Pittsburg. The first boat built in Buffalo was the Osceola, a small packet boat built in 1843.

Columbus Bronough and Benjamin Craig opened the first general store. You could find anything you needed and you could sell or trade at the location. If you needed nails, horse shoes, or any other metal items you could visit Ervin McCoy, the first blacksmith in town. Farmers would take grain out 18 Mile Creek to the Oldaker Mill built in 1836. However, by the 1840's, two French migrants named Pitrat had made it to the town and built a three story mill along the Kanawha River.

If you were visiting the town and needed a place to stay, Katherine Deem had the first hotel in town. If you were not feeling well, Dr. Henry B. Harvey was the first practicing physician, soon followed by Dr. Owen Sebrill. William Murray built the first house in town, and the first postmaster was Sam McCoy.

Most farmers "home schooled" their own children. However, Buffalo also had a village school that was located at Dryden Springs, the farm of Mary

and Benjamin Craig, in 1835. The school was later moved to the first church building in town, which was the Methodist church founded in 1833. The first town cemetery was located beside this first church building, which was located in the low land behind the present United Methodist Church building.

There is some controversy on how the town received the name Buffalo. One legend has that it was named for large herds of bison that roamed the area. However, out of the 80,000 bone and bone fragments collected during the excavation of the Native American village during the 1960's, no buffalo bone was found. Another legend claims that George Washington shot a buffalo here. Although in his journal he does claim to have killed a buffalo in his travels up the Kanawha River, Washington never made it to the current site of Buffalo. The most likely explanation for the naming of the town is that the post office, which sat at Little Buffalo Creek, near Midway, was moved here soon after the establishment of the town.

Today we celebrate the town of Buffalo's 186th birthday. Our town is the most historic place in Putnam County. It is also the 12th anniversary of the founding of our group, the Friends of Buffalo WV History.

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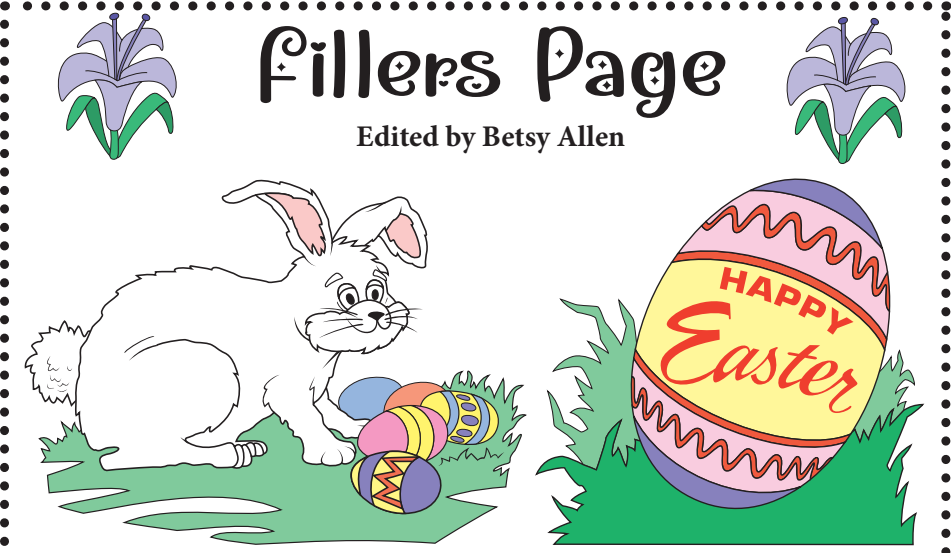

1/4 pound fresh plum tomatoes, cored and diced
2 tablespoons red onion, peeled and minced
2 tablespoons fresh basil leaves, thinly sliced
1 teaspoon olive oil
1/4 teaspoon kosher salt
1 pinch ground black pepper
1 pinch fresh garlic, peeled and finely minced

1 pound fresh portobello mushrooms, cleaned, stems removed, sliced thin
3 tablespoons olive oil
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
1/4 teaspoon kosher salt
1/8 teaspoon ground black pepper
1/4 cup mayonnaise
2 1/2 tablespoons prepared basil pesto
4 ciabatta rolls (4-by-4 inches), split in half
4 ounces fresh mozzarella cheese, sliced small
4 ounces tomato bruschetta topping
2 ounces fresh baby arugula
1/4 cup balsamic glaze

To make tomato bruschetta topping: In bowl, combine tomatoes, onion, basil, olive oil, salt, pepper and garlic. Set aside.
To make sandwiches: Preheat grill pan or grill to medium heat.
Toss sliced mushrooms with olive oil, garlic powder, salt and pepper.
Grill mushrooms until fork-tender, 3-4 minutes on each side. Let cool.
Mix mayonnaise with pesto until combined. Spread 2 tablespoons pesto mayonnaise on cut sides of each roll.
For each sandwich, layer 1/4 of grilled mushrooms, mozzarella slices, tomato bruschetta topping, arugula and balsamic glaze.
Top with other roll halves. Cut diagonally in half to serve.

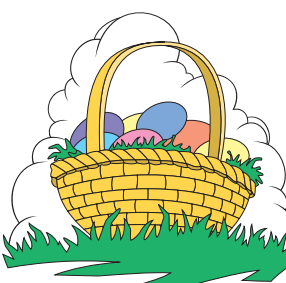

When you’re true to yourself, and you don’t allow others’ opinions and judgments to dictate your life, life flows.

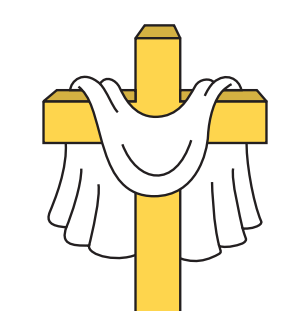

by members who were steelworkers. The dedication to serving the community was not limited to fighting fires. “We decided we needed an EMT group,” McMillion said. “In 1975, we started an EMT class. We needed an ambulance. Putnam County did not have any stationed in Hurricane. We bought an old Chevy van and turned it into an ambulance. We worked shifts. I worked Tuesday nights. Manny, many ambulance calls were run out of that station.” Mayor Edwards reported that some members of the department co-signed the loan for the ambulance vehicle. “They put their

homes on the line,” Edwards said. Edwards served as a member of the HVFD while in his teens and recalls that many of his age spent more time together at the fire station with each other than with their families. Edwards recognized HVFD Ladies Auxiliary head Karen Stover for her service. Edwards said that there was always a meal waiting when he and others returned from fighting a fire, no matter the hour. Representatives of both United States Senators Manchin and Capito read messages of support for first responders and congratulated the city for completion of the project. The facility can be utilized as a training for all first

responders in this part of the state. State Senator Eric Tarr, City Manager and County Commissioner Andy Skidmore, and Fire Chief Mike Hoffman also addressed the audience.

Risen from the Dead! (Easter)

John 20:1-10, 19-20

The text before us consists of two eye witness accounts which document the resurrection. The first took place early on Easter morning; the second on Easter evening.

Mary Magdalene was the first to witness the empty tomb. It was not what she and the women with her expected to find. They came expecting to find a sealed tomb. She came hoping that there might be some men present who could roll back the stone so she and those with her could anoint the dead body of Jesus. The lateness of the hour in which the dead body of Jesus was taken down from the cross precluded any possibility of anointing His body before the sabbath. The law of Moses did not allow the dead to be anointed upon the sabbath day. Mary and those with her came in the early hours of the first day of the week. The sabbath had passed.

The unsealed and empty tomb gave Mary Magdalene cause to believe that the body of Jesus had been removed by some unknown party. Magdalene, formerly possessed by seven devils, had directly experienced the miraculous healing power of the Lord. She had listened to His words and she believed Him to be the promised Messiah. She, however, did not realize that He should rise from the dead.

Mary ran from the sepulchre until she came to Simon Peter and John, the human author of this gospel. John always refers to himself as the other disciple or as the disciple whom Jesus loved. Mary reported the body of Jesus was missing, whereabouts unknown. Peter and John both ran to the sepulchre with John arriving first. Why did they run? Peter and John had to confirm what Mary had told them. They had to make sure that there was no mistake, that Mary’s report was accurate.

Upon arriving at the scene, the first thing that John noted was that the burial clothes that covered the body were present. This is not what one would expect to find if the body of Jesus had been stolen. When Simon Peter arrived, he, too, made note of the presence of the burial clothes. The only reason for burial clothes to be on the scene is that they were no longer needed. The clothes were found at the spot where the need for them disappeared.

John also noted that the burial cloth that was about the head was wrapped together in a place by itself. What John witnessed was, not head wrappings unwound, but the wrappings intertwined together in the same fashion as they were when placed upon the dead body. The wrappings were not removed; they were left behind! The wrappings were found separate from the linen in which Jesus was buried such that John and others would know that the body was not taken by a supposed grave robber.

Peter and John saw these things and believed (v. 8). Believed what? They believed that Christ had risen from the dead! They did not believe that He had risen because the scriptures required such (see v. 9). They believed that He had risen because of the physical evidence which they beheld. Later, the disciples would understand the scriptures, and know that His resurrection had been declared by Isaiah (Isa. 53:10). The disciples’ understanding of scripture would not come until they were empowered by the Holy Spirit (Jn. 14:26).

The second eye witness account which John recorded occurred on the evening of the first Easter. Since the setting of the sun marks the end of a day, this event occurred just before sun set.

The doors were shut because the disciples were afraid that the Jewish leaders would do them harm. The shut-up doors, however, were no barrier to the resurrected Jesus who appeared in their presence.

Jesus’ first words were: “Peace be unto you.” While these words can be an expression of good will, coming from one raised from the dead, the words are clearly a directive to fear not. Jesus then showed them His hands and His side. Why? The Lord wanted them to witness His bruises. They had seen Him upon bruised upon the cross and now they beheld His bruises. They beheld the One who was bruised for their iniquities (Isa. 53:5). Jesus showed them His hands and His side so that they might know Him in a new way. They had known Him as one possessing knowledge uncommon to men, as a doer of miracles, but, now, for the first time, they beheld Him who was bruised for them, bruised in accordance with the scriptures (Ps. 22:16).

There are many in this world who know of Jesus. One can know of Him as a teacher, a prophet and as a selfless individual, but one cannot truly know Jesus unless one believes that Jesus is risen and has given Himself upon the cross to satisfy sin’s debt.

Appalachian Power Files For Approval Of Renewable Energy Resources

In a filing made today with the Public Service Commission of West Virginia (PSC), Appalachian Power, along with Wheeling Power, is requesting approval for recovery of costs associated with multiple renewable energy projects.

The filing includes a 143 megawatt (MW) wind facility in Ohio, to be acquired through a purchase and sale agreement (PSA). Also included are seven solar facilities, capable of producing a combined 204 MW, from which the company would purchase renewable energy using power purchase agreements (PPAs). The facilities are expected to begin operation between 2024 and 2026.

"Having renewable power generation available is critical to attracting new
