Five Companies Bid on Jim Ridge Waterline Extension

The Tuesday, April 25, Putnam County Commission meeting was bid-opening time for the Jim Ridge Phase 2 Waterline Extension Project. The Commission received bids from five companies, ranging from a high of \$3,421,539 to a low of \$2,590,755. The low bidder was Chojnacki Construction of Hamlin. Following a review of all documentation, the bid will be awarded at the next commission meeting on May 9.

The project will extend current waterlines by almost ten miles to about 70 homes. Construction is slated to begin before August 1st and to be completed before May of 2024.

The Commission acted upon and approved a request by the Albert T. Summers Family Trust to rezone 7.09 acres

from R-1 (single family residential) to C-2 (high density commercial use). The property is located on Liberty Park Drive in Scott Depot.

In other business, the Commission appointed Jason Baker to a term on the Putnam County Development Authority from April 25, 2023 to September 30, 2025. The Putnam County Development Authority (PCDA) is charged with attracting new businesses to the county and retaining existing businesses. Since 1961, the PCDA has increased the county's tax base by establishing business parks and creating development contracts for manufacturing and industrial companies.

The Putnam County Commission holds regular meetings at 9 a.m. on the second Tuesday of each month and at 5 p.m. on the last Tuesday.

Historic 1957 Nitro Explosion Memories Relived

William B. Parkins, Jr. discussed the 1957 Monsanto explosion in Nitro during the April 30 meeting of the Upper Vandalia Historical Society at the Bancroft Church of God Mission. An account of the explosion was also featured in this quarter's issue of the historical society's journal.

On April 16, 1957, at 4:38 p.m., a massive blast rocked Building 46 of the Monsanto plant, which was dedicated to producing an industrial pesticide called Niran. A 1000-gallon chlorination vessel containing 8,000 pounds of acid exploded, sending the lid of the chlorinator through the roof of the building. The actual chlorinator itself was driven into the first floor of the building, where it sank three feet into the ground.

Gasses released by the explosion caused severe third degree burns and respiratory inflammation which instantly killed three workers. The injured were taken to Thomas Hospital,

where doctors and nurses had difficulty treating them due to the fumes from the chemicals on their bodies. Five more workers died within hours or days from injuries, and numerous others were hurt by shrapnel or exposure to toxic chemicals.

No one had anticipated the events of that day sixty-

six years ago. The workers who had been closest to the blast zone were uncertain what had happened. Investigators had difficulty approaching the scene of the explosion due to fumes and peril from being injured by falling rubble. It was later determined that the chlorinator had overheated, resulting in an extreme build

up of pressure. The explosion rocked the city of Nitro, shaking the earth and blowing out the windows of surrounding buildings. Parkins related that the explosion drew crowds of worried family members and curious onlookers, whose safety could have been endangered by venturing too close to the hazardous zone.

Parkins was not an employee of Monsanto at the time of the explosion. He was stationed at Langley

The Hummingbirds Have Returned to Washington Hill Road

Linda faithfully reports the time of the return of her favorite bird to the Armstead residence each and every year.

The earliest that the nectar-loving hummers have returned was on April 8, 1993. The latest return date was April 25 in 2020 (a Covid delay?). This

year's first sighting was four days later than the historic average.

Linda's hummingbird report was the second of the season which the Breeze has received. The first report was called in to the Breeze on April 18 by Rick Ray. The Ray residence on Hurricane Creek Road is about three miles south of the Armstead homestead. This marks the first year that Rick has been visited by hummers before Linda.



Air Force Base. His father and uncle, however, were employed at the plant and worked in the Niran department. Parkins stated that his father had been so upset by news of the explosion that he could barely speak to him about it over the phone.



As a result of the 1957 Monsanto explosion in Nitro, the company put an emphasis upon redundant instrumentation to monitor temperature readings to reduce the possibility of future explosions. New safety procedures included personnel to be decontaminated before being transported to a hospital.

The tragedy resulted in the adaptation of heightened safety procedures throughout the chemical industry.

The Upper Vandalia Historical Society meets four times a year and publishes a quarterly journal. Their current meeting location is the Bancroft Church of God Mission. The next meeting will be on July 30.

The photograph was taken at the House on Putnam Avenue, which was built in the early 1900's by Bill Mac McCallister and occupied by their daughters, Helen and Annie and their sons, Cline and Clate.

Laura Jo's dress was made by her mother, Mrs. Irsil Neely, and was worn by Mary Moss in the 1960 100th Anniversary of the

Hurricane First Baptist Church.

Laura Jo is a direct descendant to two pioneer families, the Sovines and the Gibsons. John played the part of her great-grandfather, Joesph T. Sovine, a charter member Clerk for the organizational meeting of the Hurricane Baptist Church as depicted in the pageant. She is also a great-granddaughter of Calvary Gibson, well-known patriarch of the local Gibsons, who was killed at his home on Hurricane Creek Road by "bushwhackers" during the Civil War.

Appalachian Power Submits Expanded Net Energy Cost Adjustment Filing

Appalachian Power, along with Wheeling Power, today submitted its annual Expanded Net Energy Cost (ENEC) filing to the Public Service Commission of West Virginia (PSC), in which it requested a \$641.7 million increase to the current ENEC rate.

The ENEC is the mechanism for reimbursing the company for purchased power, and for the cost of coal and natural gas used to fuel power plants. The regularly filed cases present the opportunity to adjust the amount included in rates so that ongoing ENEC expenditures align with ENEC revenues.

As coal and natural gas prices rose dramatically in 2021 and remained high throughout 2022, the company paid far more for fuel and purchased power than the amount included in rates. In the twelve-month ENEC review period that ended February 28, 2023, unrecovered costs grew from \$216 million to almost \$553 million.

“Recovering these costs

over the traditional one-year period would place an enormous burden on our customers,” said Aaron Walker, Appalachian Power president and COO. “To that end, we are proposing two creative cost recovery solutions in this filing that will minimize rate impact.”

The first proposal would spread recovery over three years and raise residential rates by \$293.1 million, or 12.1 percent. The second proposal utilizes securitization of the under-recovery and other cost items, and would raise residential rates by 3.5 percent or \$88.8 million to align ongoing ENEC costs and revenues. The company requested that any approved adjustment take effect September 1, 2023.

Appalachian Power has 1 million customers in Virginia, West Virginia and Tennessee (as AEP Appalachian Power). It is part of American Electric Power, which is focused on powering a cleaner, brighter energy future for its customers

and communities. AEP’s approximately 17,000 employees operate and maintain the nation’s largest electricity transmission system and more than 224,000 miles of distribution lines to safely deliver reliable and affordable power to 5.6 million regulated customers in 11 states. AEP also is one of the nation’s largest electricity producers, with approximately 31,000 megawatts of diverse generating capacity, including more than 6,900 megawatts of renewable energy.

The Good Shepherd

John 10:7-18

In the first five verses of Chapter 10, Jesus spoke a parable which His listeners did not understand. The text before us is an explanation of the parable — an explanation which reveals hidden things concerning the door, the shepherd, the sheep, and the purpose for which the thieves and robbers came.

Jesus identifies Himself as "the door of the sheep" (v. 7). The physical image before us is a sheepfold (a pen) which has a door by which sheep must enter and exit. A sheepfold is a temporary dwelling place — a place lacking life-sustaining forage and water. It is not a place where sheep can live out a natural lifespan. The physical is an image of the spiritual. Jesus is the door through which sheep must pass to enter into life beyond the pen which encloses them.

The spiritual picture continues in verse 8. "All that ever came before me are thieves and robbers . . ." Jesus does not directly identify the thieves and robbers who have climbed into the sheepfold by some other way. Thieves and robbers come to steal, kill and destroy (v. 10). New Testament believers know that Jesus came to seek and to save (Lk. 19:10). The actions of thieves and robbers are completely opposite of seeking and saving.

Jesus is the door in that He is the means by which a man must enter in and be saved. Those who enter in through the door are saved and are pictured as sheep (believers dependent upon the shepherd). The sheep are led into and out of the sheepfold to find pasture. The sheep trust the shepherd, are dependent upon the shepherd, and are members of his fold.

In verse 8, Jesus states that all who came before Him are thieves and robbers. A thief attempts to gain access to the sheepfold through a means other than the door (Christ Jesus). A thief and a robber is neither a shepherd or a sheep. The thief and robber comes with the express purpose of preying upon the sheep (believers).

When Jesus states that all who came before Him are thieves and robbers, He is not speaking of Abraham or the prophets or other Old Testament believers. Old Testament believers are sheep who heard the voice of the pre-incarnate Christ and followed Him. All who preceded Jesus were those who would take sheep from the shepherd. The scribes and Pharisees fit the bill in that they would lead men to green pastures by scaling the walls of the sheepfold on strength of their works. These religious leaders sought positions of power and honor. They sought to achieve righteousness by works. They did not submit themselves to God. They climbed the walls of the sheepfold by keeping a form of the law and sought to impose that same form upon the sheep. Their quest was to steal the shepherd's sheep. They sought to take that which belongs to God.

Jesus stated that the sheep do not hear the voice of thieves and robbers. That is not to say that sheep are unaware of the presence of thieves and robbers. Sheep may or may not be aware of a predator in their midst, but they do know the voice of the shepherd and they follow Him. Believers are led of God and are not deceived by pretenders who esteem themselves to be shepherds of the flock.

Jesus Christ is not a pretender. He is the Good Shepherd. The picture of the Lord Jesus Christ as the Good Shepherd is presented to us by David in Psalm 23, and then by Isaiah (Isa. 40:11) and by Jeremiah (Jer. 31:10).

The difference between the Good Shepherd and the hireling (a pretender) is that the Good Shepherd gives His life for the sheep. The measure of a shepherd is the love which he bestows upon the flock. A hireling's measure is material gain. For scribes and Pharisees, the gain was power and prestige.

In verse 15, Jesus prophesies His crucifixion. The Son knows the Father (He knows the Father's love of the world — a love so great that the Father gave His only begotten Son). The Son is the Good Shepherd who gave His life for the sheep (all who believe in Him) so that the sheep may be brought into the pasture of everlasting life.

The other sheep (v. 16) are of the Gentiles. They are sheep because they shall hear and recognize the voice of the Good Shepherd. God told Abram (Abraham) that all families of the earth would be blessed through him (Gen. 12:3). The Son (the Good Shepherd) is the means chosen by the Father to fulfill His promise to Abraham.

In verse 17, His prophesies both His crucifixion and His resurrection, and, in verse 18, states that He possesses the power to resurrect from the dead. The Son was given the mission to lay down His life and take it up again by the Father.

The Good Shepherd willingly laid down His life for all the sheep such that they might receive the gift of life eternal. He is the door that one must enter into the pasture of life eternal. Hear His voice (the voice of the one shepherd) and enter in to the pasture and be blessed. Believe and receive. He died that men might live.

Shepherd University senior political science major Chloe Bailey of Buffalo, West Virginia, will get about a three-month break after graduating on May 6. Then she flies off to Germany for new adventures through the Congress-Bundestag Youth Exchange (CBYX) for Young Professionals.

Bailey is one of 75 U.S. students between the ages of 18½ and 24 selected to participate in the fellowship funded by the German Bundestag and U.S. Department of State. CBYX provides the opportunity for American and German young professionals to spend one year in each other's country studying, interning, and experiencing cultural immersion.

"I decided to accept this fellowship because I would never get this opportunity again and it's going to be really cool to be able to immerse myself into a completely different culture that is so different from what I've always known," Bailey said. "I think it will be very challenging but also a great opportunity for me to grow as an individual and as a young professional."

Bailey plans to pursue a career in public service, so she's hoping to find an internship with a government agency or a nongovernmental organization.

Among Bailey's accomplishments during her college career were interning at the West Virginia State Capitol for the Senate Judiciary Committee and Secretary of State's Office. She is the first Shepherd student to earn the Judith A. Herndon Fellowship to intern at the West Virginia State Capitol, which she did during the spring 2022 semester. She also interned in West Virginia U.S. Sen. Shelley Moore Capito's Washington, D.C., office and was a 2023 Truman Scholarship finalist.

Dr. Samuel Greene, chair of the Department of Political Science, Global Studies, and Geography and coordinator of the Welch Distinguished Awards Program, encouraged Bailey to apply for the fellowship in Germany.

"Chloe's selection for the CBYX program is a well-deserved reflection of her academic and professional accomplishments at Shepherd and beyond," Greene said. "I am excited for Chloe's opportunity to spend a year in Germany learning the German language, getting a grounding in the country's public policy and politics, and adding a cross-cultural internship to her extensive experience in West Virginia and Washington, D.C."
