Local citizens are in a state of outrage over the unfortunate case of a dog that was wrongly euthanized at the Putnam County Animal Shelter.

When Eli, Taylor Withrow's 10-year-old lemon beagle, ran away on June 21, he was found by a driver who took him to Putnam County Animal Shelter in hopes that he would be reunited with his owner. The shelter is required by law to hold a stray animal for five business days, not including the day of impoundment.

Withrow says that she repeatedly checked the Putnam County Animal Shelter's Facebook page but no photo of Eli had ever been posted.

On June 26, Withrow went to the Putnam County Animal Shelter to inquire about Eli in person, but she was told that no dog matching his description had been brought into the shelter.

Later that day, Withrow was contacted by Tiffany Skaggs, the woman who had found Eli and brought him to the animal shelter. Skaggs had seen Withrow's Facebook posts about Eli's disappearance, and reached out to her about the missing dog.

From June 26 through June 29, Withrow continued to ask the shelter about Eli, while Skaggs contacted Putnam County

From June 26 through June 29, Withrow continued to ask the shelter about Eli, while Skaggs contacted Putnam County

Manager Jeremy Young  
about the matter.

On June 26, Withrow engaged in a Zoom call with Young, the county attorney, and the shelter's humane officer. It was then that she learned the tragic news: Eli's paperwork had been mixed up with that of another dog, and he had been euthanized. The condemned dog was a pit bull that had been brought to the shelter on June 15. Withrow was told that the reason why the two dogs were mixed up was because they had similar coloration, despite the fact that pit bulls and beagles are very different breeds.

The Putnam County Commission is currently conducting an internal

investigation of the animal shelter through a third party that is not connected to the county. According to County Manager Young, the director of the shelter has since been placed on administrative leave.

On June 30, the Putnam County Commission voted on the following

statement upon their Facebook page:

"The Putnam County Commission has been made aware of an incident involving a dog on stray hold that was mistakenly euthanized earlier this

Pollinator Week is now an international celebration, promoting the valuable ecosystem services provided by bees, birds, butterflies, bats, beetles, moths, wasps, and flies. The next National Pollinator Week is June 24-30, 2024.

Each individual has his or her own reason for coming to work at the PSC. Many make this their life’s work and retire after long years of service. The people who stay do so because we offer a safe and supportive work environment with great benefits. Employees have access to health insurance, including vision and dental; paid leave; a retirement program; an education reimbursement program; opportunities for advancement; and free parking at our downtown Charleston headquarters. The PSC is always looking for smart, energetic people who want to work with us. In our ranks you will find attorneys, accountants, engineers, gas pipeline safety inspectors, and computer programmer analysts. We even have our own law enforcement officers who patrol state highways to keep you safe

Most positions at the PSC are covered by the West Virginia Division of Personnel (DOP) Civil Service System. 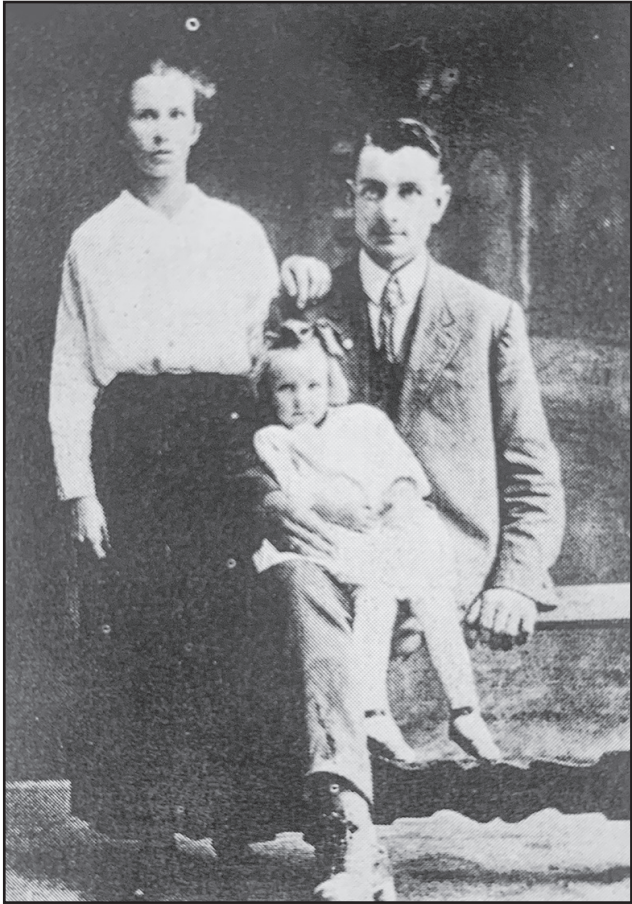

## Putnam County Animal Shelter Euthanization Draws Ire

Animal Shelter. The Commission finds this situation unacceptable and has ordered an internal investigation into the incident. Appropriate action will be taken at the conclusion of the investigation to ensure something this devastating never happens again.”

The response to Eli’s tragic and unnecessary death has created a storm of comments on both the Putnam County Commission’s and Putnam County Animal Shelter’s Facebook pages. Many allege that the animal shelter has been mismanaged for years, and blame the County Commission for not stepping in sooner. Others are concerned about growing negative attitudes towards the animal shelter, fearing that the public might boycott the facility, which would lead to the euthanasia of even more animals. Several posters expressed confusion that the dog was euthanized in the first place, claiming that they were told that the shelter is a no-kill shelter.

Unfortunately, a lot of people have the erroneous impression that Putnam’s shelter is a no-kill shelter. When the Putnam shelter moved to the Red House facility in 2013, it seems that many in the community believed that the larger, improved building would enable the facility to become a no-kill shelter. However, that was never the case.

Why is there such confusion about the kill/no-kill status of the Putnam County Animal Shelter?

Years ago, there was discussion among local animal rescue groups about creating a no-kill shelter that would be operated by a private organization, separate from the county government. However, these plans never came to fruition. Perhaps the

concept of a no-kill shelter in Putnam County became cemented in the public mind, and people assumed that the Putnam County Animal Shelter would halt euthanasia, except in cases of sick or violent animals. Again, this is a false conception.

According to the West Virginia Board of Veterinary Medicine’s Annual Report on Animal Euthanasia, a total of 39 dogs, 455 cats, and 2 other species were euthanized by the Putnam County Animal Shelter in 2020. In 2016, the numbers were even higher, with 1,495 cats and 803 dogs being euthanized. The year 2019 had somewhat better statistics, with 1,095 cats and 121 dogs being euthanized.

In memory of Eli, Withrow has created a petition on Change.org to turn the Putnam County Animal Shelter into a no-kill shelter. “I started this petition to ensure that nothing like this EVER happens again!” Withrow writes in the description of her proposal. “Please join me in fighting for Eli and all other animals without a voice!”

As of Monday, July 3, there have been 1,426 out of a goal of 1,500 signatures.

## America’s Independence Day inspires far-flung tributes

Every Fourth of July, millions of people all across the United States celebrate America’s Independence Day with fireworks, parades and cookouts. There are celebrations in other countries, too — not surprisingly in many democratic countries, each with its own distinct traditions and all with respect for the freedoms enshrined in the U.S. system.

Canada

Pyrotechnics are part of the International Freedom Festival, hosted each July by Windsor, Canada, and Michigan’s largest city, Detroit, to commemorate Canada Day on July 1 and the Fourth of July all at once. The event draws nearly 3.5 million visitors annually for special events and one of the biggest fireworks displays in North America.

There are other examples of far-flung places that pay tribute to U.S. heritage on the Fourth of July with American music, food and culture. Locals join with Americans (both visitors and expatriates) to celebrate the day.

Denmark

In northern Denmark, a small rural town named Rebild hosts a large Fourth of July celebration. How did the festival get its start? Many Rebild residents emigrated to the U.S. in the 19th century, and some returned years later, bringing back a custom of commemorating July Fourth.

Spread out over a long weekend, Rebildfest dates back well over 100 years and features fireworks, American music, American-style hot dogs and barbecued foods, plus Danish smørrebrød open-faced sandwiches and activities celebrating

both American and Danish culture.

Ireland

The Irish seem to embrace the Fourth of July as much as Americans enjoy St. Patrick’s Day.

One of Ireland’s biggest Fourth of July celebrations is held in the town of New Ross, where President John F. Kennedy’s great-grandfather grew up. The town kicks off several days of festivities with a public reading of the U.S. Declaration of Independence and attendees can watch a reenactment of the Boston Tea Party, when in 1773, colonists threw tea belonging to the British into the Boston Harbor to protest “taxation without representation.”

Norway

The Norwegian capital of Oslo has held a Fourth of July celebration for more than 30 years, offering live music, parades, American

food, baseball and softball games, and a fireworks display. Crowds gather in Frogner Park, where the American Coordinating Council of Norway organizes the activities popular with locals and American expats alike.

Elsewhere, the city of Lillestrøm marks the occasion with a parade of vintage American cars, live music and American food. And the country’s southern district of Lister puts on a four-day American Festival in late June each year.

Australia

American expats, along with Aussies, gather in cities like Sydney to celebrate the Fourth of July each year. In fact, Sydney hosts the largest Fourth of July celebration in the Southern Hemisphere, concentrated in the Darling Harbour area. Huge crowds wear red, white and blue (the colors of both the U.S. and Australian flags).

(“Altice”) violated state consumer protection laws when it advertised and promised a particular flat monthly rate for its broadband internet and television services under its Optimum and Suddenlink Communications brands but then charged customers certain additional fees. Specifically, the consumers who filed the lawsuit (the “Plaintiffs”) argue that internet customers were charged a Network Enhancement Fee or Network Access Surcharge (“Network Fee”), and TV customers were charged a Broadcast Station Programming Surcharge and/or a Sports Programming Surcharge (“TV Fees”). Plaintiffs say that these fees were inadequately disclosed and improperly raised customers’ rates, even during promised fixed-rate promotional periods or contracts. The defendants in the case (Altice, Cebridge Telecom CA, LLC d/b/a Suddenlink Communications and Optimum, and CSC Holdings, LLC d/b/a Optimum) deny any liability

or wrongdoing. The court has not decided the case or whether the plaintiffs or the defendants are right.

WHO IS INCLUDED?

If you received this notice, Altice’s records indicate you likely are a Class Member who is eligible for a cash payment under the Settlement. You are eligible if you subscribed to Optimum or Suddenlink broadband Internet service and/or television service between July 27, 2018 and May 5, 2023 and paid a Network Fee and/or a TV Fee.

WHAT DOES THE SETTLEMENT PROVIDE? If approved by the court, the Settlement releases the claims of all Class Members related to the lawsuit and Class Members acknowledge that Altice can continue to charge and adjust the amounts of the Network Fee and TV Fees going forward. 1/4 cup, plus 2 teaspoons, extra-virgin olive oil or pecan oil, divided  
1/4 cup white wine vinegar  
1 teaspoon Dijon mustard  
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder  
1/8 teaspoon kosher salt  
pepper, to taste  
2 large peaches, halved and pits removed  
6 cups mixed baby greens (such as arugula, spring mix and spinach)  
4 ounces soft goat cheese

To make spiced pecans: Preheat oven to 275 F. Line rimmed baking sheet with parchment paper and set aside.

In medium bowl, whisk egg white, brown sugar, cinnamon, cayenne pepper and salt until well combined. Fold in pecans and mix until evenly coated in mixture. Spread in single layer on prepared baking sheet.

Bake 45-50 minutes, stirring occasionally until pecans are fragrant and golden brown. Allow to cool completely.

To make salad: Heat grill to medium-high heat.

In small bowl, whisk 1/4 cup olive oil, white wine vinegar, Dijon mustard, garlic powder, salt and pepper, to taste. Set aside.

Brush cut sides of peach halves with remaining olive oil and grill until grill lines appear and peaches become tender, 3-5 minutes. Remove peaches and cut into slices.

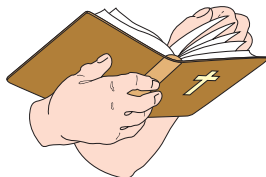

### Accept God’s Invitation

Luke 14:7-11, 15-24

All that is recorded in the text before us occurs on the sabbath day at the house of a chief Pharisee. Jesus had entered into the house to eat bread upon an invitation that only the owner of the house could issue (see v. 1). Despite the fact that Jesus had issued numerous criticisms of the scribes and Pharisees, He was not universally rejected by them. In Luke 13:31, one of the Pharisees (perhaps several of them) warned Him that He would be in danger in Jerusalem. It appears that Jesus, on this occasion, was the guest of honor of the chief Pharisee who hosted the dinner. Some commentators theorize that the Jesus was being set up (to do that which was unlawful on the sabbath) rather than being honored. When the dining area was opened to guests, Jesus witnessed a rush to occupy seats of honor (seats close to the table of the host).

Jesus took note of this behavior and commented upon that which would take place at a different setting. Seating at a marriage feast is not first come, first served. It is determined by the host. If a guest were to take an undeserved seat of high honor, the host would direct him to move. Likewise, if a guest were to seat himself at a table that the host deemed to be much below that of what he thought deserved, the host would direct him to a table of honor. Anyone asked to move to a seat of less honor would be humiliated. On the other hand if one were to be singled out to move from a seat of low esteem to a seat of high esteem, all present would recognize the honor extended to him by the host.

The custom of seating at a marriage feast was not anything which Jesus’ listeners did not know and some may have wondered why Jesus directed their attention to marriage feast protocol. Born again Christians of every era do not wonder. All who have accepted God’s saving grace know that Jesus was using the figure of a marriage feast to illustrate what shall transpire at His marriage feast when He shall be united with the church. On that occasion the first shall be last and the last shall be first. At Jesus’ marriage feast, all present are seated by grace; the self-exalted shall be made low and the humble shall be exalted.

Jesus then turned to the host of the feast and announced that a blessing is reserved for one who hosts a feast without thought of recompense. The poor, the maimed and the blind cannot reciprocate, but those who honor the poor, the maimed and the blind will be recompensed at the resurrection of the just. Jesus’ words may or may not have been lost by the host. New Testament believers know that all believers shall stand before the Son at the resurrection of the just.

The term resurrection of the just was not a mystery to the scribes and Pharisees present. Pharisees believed in the resurrection of the dead. One individual who was seated at the head table with Jesus stated: “Blessed is he that shall eat bread in the kingdom of God.” This particular individual recognized that all who were part of the resurrection of the just would eat bread in the kingdom of God. Pharisees believed that one was made just by keeping the law of Moses. New Testament Christians know better. We know that one is not saved by works. We know that we have no cause for which to boast. We know that we have been given that which we have not earned and that which we do not deserve.

The one who stated “Blessed is he that shall eat bread in the kingdom of God” realized that the wedding feast of which Jesus spoke was the kingdom of God, but had a mistaken idea of those who would participate in the feast.

Jesus responded to the man’s words with the parable of the great supper in which the guests at the wedding feast are identified. The host of the great supper is the same as the host of the wedding feast. The host first extended an invitation to many who were near about. When they without exception offered up excuses for being unable to accept the invitation, the master of the house instructed his servant to go out into the city and bring in the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. When it was done, the house was not yet full. The master then instructed his servant to go out beyond the city into the highways and hedges and compel them whom he found to come also so that the house might be full. The master of the house vowed that all who refused the invitation would not so much as taste his supper.

Those who will eat bread in the kingdom of God are those who accept the Lord’s invitation. The parable is given to all who have the ears to hear. Unfortunately, those who do not accept His invitation lack hearing. Those who accept the invitation need note that Jesus did not single out any one individual to occupy a place of honor. There is, however, one who places himself below all others. It is the servant. The servant hears and obeys the voice of the master but is last to eat. The servant is late because he is about his master’s business. The servant is the honored guest to whom the self-exalted must give up his place.

Let us remember that the host and master of the house thought it not above Himself to give His life for the lowest of us all. He made Himself the servant of all. May all believers hear and obey His call.

The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at [www.wvencyclopedia.org](http://www.wvencyclopedia.org).

July 6, 1806: Statesman Charles James Faulkner was born in Martinsburg. Faulkner served in the West Virginia legislature, U.S. Congress (1851–59, 1875-77), and as U.S. minister to France.

July 6, 1848: Historian Virgil A. Lewis was born in Mason County. In 1905, Governor Dawson appointed Lewis as the first director of the Bureau of Archives and History.

July 6, 1883: Judge “R. D.” Bailey was born at Baileysville, Wyoming County. Bailey came into wide prominence as the judge of the Matewan Massacre trial in 1921.

July 7, 1928: The Madonna of the Trail monument was dedicated in Wheeling. It is one of 12 such statues erected along the National Road to honor America’s pioneering women.

July 8, 1894: Walter Aegerter was born in Helvetia. An amateur photographer, Aegerter built both a studio and darkroom on his farm and photographed portraits, families, celebrations and everyday scenes of the German Swiss settlement. The glass plate negatives survive today in several archived collections.

July 8, 1924: Rock ‘n’ roll pioneer Johnnie Johnson was born in Fairmont. Johnson collaborated with Chuck Berry on songs such as “Roll Over, Beethoven.” Berry’s hit “Johnny B. Goode” was supposedly written as a tribute to Johnson.

July 8, 1961: Sutton Dam was dedicated by Governor Wally Barron. The Army Corps of Engineers operates the dam for purposes of flood control, low-flow augmentation and recreation.

July 9, 1942: An explosion at the Pursglove No. 2 Mine at Scotts Run near Morgantown killed 20 men. It was one of three fatal accidents at the mining operation in an eight-month period.

July 9, 1989: Treasurer A. James Manchin resigned after being impeached. With a stock market downturn in 1987, Manchin bore much of the blame when the state lost nearly \$300 million in investments for which he was responsible.

July 10, 1769: Physician Jesse Bennet was born. He performed the first successful caesarian section in America in 1794, on his own wife and without proper equipment and with no antiseptics. He later established a large practice in Mason County and served as an Army surgeon in the War of 1812.

July 10, 1936: The temperature in Martinsburg reached 112 degrees. It tied the record for the

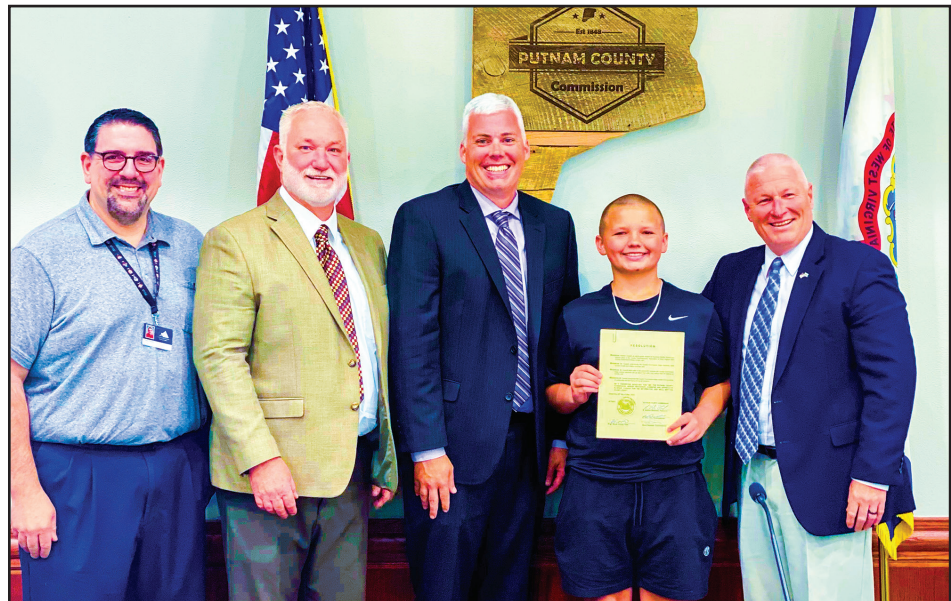
