Rock Branch Teacher **A Veteran's Veteran — Remembering Don Kinnard**

Milken Award

Janna Hamrick, a fifth grade teacher at Rock Branch Elementary School in Nitro was surprised on Wednesday, November 1st, when she was presented with a Milken Educator Award at a seemingly routine all-school assembly. Cheers erupted from students, colleagues, dignitaries and media when Hamrick laid eyes on her oversized check, realizing she would be taking home a \$25,000 cash prize to be used however she chooses.

Milken Educator Awards Vice President Stephanie Bishop was joined by West Virginia Governor Jim Justice and State Superintendent of Schools Michele L. Blatt to present Hamrick with the honor. Hamrick was completely unaware that she was a candidate for the Award.

"Talented teachers hold high expectations while maintaining a high level of student engagement, passion and respect. Janna Hamrick executes this task flawlessly and serves as a role model for others," said Bishop, who is also a 2001 Virginia Milken Educator. "The Milken Educator Network will provide her with further opportunities to grow and will in turn benefit from her knowledge. Congratulations, Janna!"

Hamrick is the second and final West Virginia Milken Educator recipient this season, concluding the Milken Family Foundation's 2023-24 West Virginia tour. She joins Ashley Wilkins-

Franks who received her Award on October 31 in Petersburg (Grant County).

"Janna Hamrick epitomizes the important role educators play today," said State Superintendent of Schools Michele L. Blatt. "Her enthusiasm for learning is infectious and the relationships she builds with her students establish connections that strengthen their learning. She creates a safe learning environment and allows them to take risks and become more self-reliant. We are proud she has earned this stellar award."

There are 75 recipients across the country this school year who will receive awards as part of the Milken Family Foundation's Journey to the 3,000th Milken Educator. Milken Educator Award recipients are sought out while early to mid-career for what they have achieved — and for the promise of what they will accomplish given the resources and opportunities afforded by the Award.



Editor's Note:

The Donel C. Kinnard Memorial State Veterans Cemetery in Dunbar bears the name of a veteran's veteran. While he worked tirelessly to establish the cemetery as Chairman of the West Virginia Veterans Cemetery Committee in the years preceding his death, Don Kinnard was a veteran's veteran deserving of honor long before the movement to establish the cemetery was born. The following article, published in the November 10, 2005 issue of the Breeze tells the story of his service.

Don Kinnard A Veteran's Veteran

What does Veterans Day mean to a veteran's veteran? Just locate a veteran's veteran and ask him. That's what the Breeze did. We asked Don Kinnard of Hurricane.

Don did not begin his military career with the intent of becoming a veteran's veteran. He joined the Marine Corps on July 28, 1952, with one thing in mind — fighting. At the time, the Korean War was in full swing. He did serve in Korea, but not until 1954 when combat operations had largely ended.

What started as a fighting mission turned into a 22-year military career. After his tour with the Marines, Kinnard went into the Navy as a frogman. Shortly after the Navy Seals were commissioned in 1961, he became a member of this elite force.

As a member of Underwater Demolition Team 12 in Vietnam, Chief Kinnard saw plenty of action in the heat of enemy territory.

His job was to search out the enemy, locate his structures and supplies and assess his capabilities.

On one occasion, under the cover of darkness and accompanied by about twenty mercenaries, Chief Kinnard located two enemy sampans (flat bottom boats)

and opened fire, knocking out their motors and killing several men. Approximately

nine of the enemy escaped into the night as the disabled

sampans drifted downstream.

Chief Kinnard and his men were greeted by deadly gunfire. The larger of the two sampans started to drift away. Kinnard swam to it and tied the bowline to a stump on the shore. Automatic weapons

The Centennial History of Hurricane Hurricane Area Organizations



West Virginia Division of Forestry Reminds Residents to Use Caution During Fire Season

The West Virginia Division of Forestry (WV DOF) reminds residents that Fall fire season started on October 1 and continues

through December 31 and asks that West Virginians use caution at this time. In 2023 to date, West Virginia has experienced 916 fires,

burning approximately 11,340 acres, with 114 of those fires happening since October 1.

"Right now, we are asking West Virginia residents to refrain from calling local county emergency

services centers for smoke complaints in an effort to reduce false alarm calls that can pull resources away from local volunteer fire departments," said State Forester and Director of WV DOF, Jeremy Jones.

"However, if you see a fire or column of smoke rising from a specific place, please call 911 immediately."

Debris burning is the single most common cause of wildfires in West Virginia, averaging more than 35% of all wildfires over the past 10 years. WV DOF

reminds West Virginians to confine their outdoor burning to the hours of 5 p.m. to 7 a.m. according to the West Virginia State Code Chapter 20-3-5. Fires set during that time must be put out before 7 a.m.

Burning is banned during the day because even in fall, relative humidity typically increases in the evening.



Bourbon Bacon Pecan Pie

Recipe courtesy of Emily Caruso of "Jelly Toast" on behalf of the American Pecan Promotion Board

Prep time: 20 minutes
Cook time: 70 minutes
Servings: 10

1 pie dough (9 inches)
4 strips thick-cut bacon
1/2 cup dark corn syrup
1/2 cup light corn syrup
1 cup light brown sugar
2 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted
2 tablespoons bourbon
3 large eggs
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 1/2 cups raw pecan halves

Place baking sheet in oven. Preheat oven to 350 F.

Gently line pie pan with rolled out pie dough. Press into edges and up sides.

Use fingers or fork to create decorative edge. Set aside.

In skillet, fry bacon until crisp. Remove from pan and drain on paper towels then chop into small pieces and set aside. Reserve 1/4 cup bacon grease.

In large bowl, whisk dark corn syrup, light corn syrup, brown sugar, reserved bacon grease, butter and bourbon. Add eggs and salt; whisk until mixture is even.

Fold in pecan halves and chopped bacon.

Pour mixture into pie crust and spread evenly with spatula. Gently cover edges of pie crust with aluminum foil. Place pie on preheated baking sheet and bake 60-70 minutes, or until pie is set in center.

Remove pie from oven and cool completely before serving or chilling.

Notes: Pie can be made 1 day ahead and refrigerated overnight. Allow pie to come to room temperature before serving.




Sarah Margaret Gillman, 80, of Hurricane, passed away on November 7, 2023 at OSU James Cancer Center Columbus, Ohio.



A Rebuke from the Lord

Amos 5:14-15, 18-27

Amos prophesied to the northern kingdom of Israel more than 2,700 years ago. His ministry to the northern kingdom was predicated by ministries of Elijah, Elisha, Micaiah and Jonah.

"Seek good, and not evil, that ye may live . . ." (v. 14). The call for Israel to seek good and resist evil is from God. God directed Amos to deliver this message because Israel was far, far from Him. Amos was a herdsman and a native of the southern kingdom of Judah. God called him to prophesy at a time in which Jeroboam ruled over Israel and Uzziah reigned over Judah. Scholars have determined the historic date to be between 760 and 750 B.C. This would have been approximately 30 years prior to the fall of the northern kingdom of which fall Amos prophesied.

II Kings 14:23-29 paints a picture of the time. Jeroboam did evil in the sight of the Lord. Jeroboam's evil, however, was not cause for God to shorten his reign. The Lord used Jeroboam to restore lands to Israel that had been lost to the Syrians. The nature of Israel's evil ways is revealed in verses 11-13. The nation of Israel was guilty of oppressing its poor, afflicting the just, taking bribes, and ignoring needs of its impoverished. Israel was blind to its transgressions against God. The spiritual leaders falsely claimed that God was with them (v. 14b).

"Woe unto you that desire the day of the Lord . . ." (v. 18). The leaders did not fear the day of the Lord. They thought they were exempt from the judgment to come. Amos makes it clear that this is not the case. They could not escape judgment to come. One fleeing from a lion shall be met by a bear. One seeking refuge in a house shall be bitten by an unseen serpent (v. 19). The day of the Lord shall be darkness; there shall be no light.

In verses 21-23, the Lord makes it known that He is provoked by their insincere acts of worship. His judgment would pour forth like an overflowing river because Israel, while making claim to worshiping Him the Lord, had actually served a god of their own creation (v. 26).

Amos states that God will cause "...you to go into captivity beyond Damascus" (v. 27). Beyond Damascus was Assyria. This prophecy was fulfilled according to all that the Lord had said in less than a forty-year time period.

These things have been preserved by scripture for God's purposes. They are written for our admonition (see I Cor. 10:11). Through the fulfillment of this prophecy, all New Testament believers are put on notice that all which God has said shall come to pass.

We know that our Lord shall return and that we need be ready for that day. We know that we shall stand in judgment before Him. We do not want to be like the Israel of Amos' day.

We note that Israel of that day had two problems. First, Israel did not do as God had commanded. They looked to themselves for deliverance. Second, they did not see themselves as God saw them. Their wretchedness was hidden from them.

New Testament believers most certainly look to God for deliverance. We know with absolute certainty that it is by His grace through faith that we are saved from the great white throne judgment to come (Rev. 20:11). That certainty does not, however, preclude our erring as Israel erred. We err when we do not do as He has commanded and when we do not see ourselves as He sees us. While believers shall not stand in the judgment that awaits all who have rejected Christ, we all shall stand before the judgment seat of Christ (II Cor. 5:10) where we shall be judged according to our works. It will be a time in which every believer's works shall be tried by fire. Some shall receive a reward; others shall suffer loss (I Cor. 3:13-15).

Some expecting reward shall suffer loss because they, like Israel, have not done as the Lord has commanded. Jesus has told us to love one another as He has loved us and Jesus also has told us to reach out to the world and declare His truth to all men and to teach them His ways. There is no substitutionary action. Every work that is not built upon Christ Jesus shall be consumed by fire.

The Lord has told us these things because He does not want us to suffer loss. He sees us as we are. He has called us to seek good, and not evil, such that we might cast a crown at His feet. The day shall come when some shall have nothing but ashes alone.

Let us buy of Him gold tried in fire and white raiment and eye salve (Rev. 3:18) that we might be ready for that day. Let us do as He has commanded.


