Scott Depot Resident Sentenced to Prison for Fentanyl Crime

Gregory Alan Haston, 40, of Scott Depot, was sentenced in federal court on Monday, December 18, to three years and nine months in prison, to be followed by three years of supervised release, for possession with intent to distribute fentanyl. According to court documents and statements made in court, on January 2, 2023, Haston was a passenger in a vehicle pulled over by a law enforcement officer in the St. Albans area. During a search of the vehicle, the officer seized

a bag that he found on the floor near Haston's feet. Haston admitted that the bag contained approximately 76 grams of fentanyl, which he possessed with the intent to distribute. United States Attorney Will Thompson commended the investigative work of the St. Albans Police Department. Senior United States District Judge John T. Copenhaver, Jr. imposed the sentence. Assistant United States Attorney Lesley C. Shamblin prosecuted the case.

County Commission News Jim Ridge Waterline Extension Update

The agenda for the December 12 meeting of the Putnam County Commission featured an update from Terry Martin of the Regional Intergovernmental Council (RIC) on the status of the Jim Ridge Waterline Extension Project Phase II. Martin informed the Commission that the project was 50 percent complete and on schedule. Martin said that Chojnacki Construction is expected to complete the project before the end of March. The completion of Phase II will include service to

Mud Lick residents. Martin reported that funding beyond that which has been approved and is available will be required to extend service to Custer Ridge. Funding for service to Custer Ridge is dependent upon a HUD Community Block Grant. Martin said RIC will consider Custer Ridge at its December 27th meeting.

Martin said that extension of service to Bowles Ridge cannot be funded through change orders because the cost would exceed the ten percent limit condition of the Jim Ridge grants. Martin is looking at other potential funding sources which may be available.

In other business, Debbie Deweese presented the Commission with a \$3,000 contribution to the Dog Fund from the Putnam County Republican Women. Deweese said the donation was made possible through the Christmas Tree fundraising event which was held at Valley Park.

The Commission approved the rezoning of Teays Valley Road frontage in Scott Depot from R-2 to C-1 which Pifer Properties requested. The Commission also approved

In 1988, The Centennial History of Hurricane, WV was published to commemorate the town's 100th anniversary. The publication included the histories of 7 Hurricane civic organization. This week's selection is the 7th and last of these histories which were published in 1988.

The Putnam Lodge I.O.O.F. 295 was instituted August 27, 1906. The trustees were: F.W. Pierce, D.W. Harbour, W.J. Matthews, R.H. Sumner, W.E. Pullen and T.E. Allen. The Lodge members purchased Lot #6 and building on From Street (Main Street) on March 10, 1921, from A.N. Sumner. The property

Baked Brie with Pecans and Cranberry Orange Chutney

Recipe courtesy of the American Pecan Promotion Board

Cook time: 24 minutes

Servings: 8

- 1 bag (12 ounces) fresh cranberries
- 1/2 cup maple syrup, plus 1 teaspoon for garnish, divided
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 orange, zest and juice only
- 1 teaspoon freshly chopped thyme, plus additional for garnish, divided
- 1 teaspoon freshly chopped rosemary
- 1 tablespoon bourbon (optional)
- 1 round brie (13.4 ounces)
- 1/2 cup roasted pecan pieces
- crackers
- toasted bread
- apple slices

Preheat oven to 350 F. Line baking sheet with parchment paper or silicone baking mat.

In medium saucepan over medium-high heat, bring cranberries (reserving some for garnish), 1/2 cup maple syrup and water to boil. Reduce heat to medium-low and cook, stirring occasionally, until cranberries pop and mixture thickens, 8-10 minutes.

Remove cranberry mixture from heat and stir in orange zest, orange juice, 1 teaspoon thyme, rosemary and bourbon, if desired.

Place brie on parchment-lined baking sheet. Bake 5-7 minutes, or until inside of cheese softens while outside remains intact.

Transfer brie to serving platter and top with chutney and toasted pecans. Drizzle remaining maple syrup over brie and garnish with remaining fresh thyme and reserved cranberries. Serve with crackers, toasted bread and apple slices.







Connor Hodge









Prepare for Winter Storms

Public Service Commission Chairman Charlotte Lane

Old Man Winter is right around the corner. And while Jack Frost may be a whimsical character, winter storms are a serious reality and a hazard for West Virginians. Our state has the third-highest number of seniors of the 50 states. I don't want to cause panic, but predictions show the eastern states can expect below-average temperatures this winter with a good chance of higher-than-average amounts of snow.

Today, I'm going to step out from my normal duties as chairman of the Public Service Commission of West Virginia. I want to suggest what you should have handy in case a winter storm strikes.

If you lose power, you'll need a good source of high protein to eat. So, keep on hand a collection of energy and fruit bars that don't need refrigeration. Granola and peanut butter are essentials, too. And what many don't think about is to have non-perishable pasteurized milk.

Of course, the old standby is canned goods. You can't go wrong and they come in an infinite variety. According to the Federal Management Agency, canned nutritional foods, juices and soups are very important for the elderly. If you have babies or toddlers, consider their special needs. And, of

course, stockpile lots and lots of water.

Always, but especially when you hear a storm is coming, keep essential medicines and first aid supplies on hand. Have portable lights, a battery-powered radio, and plenty of batteries to run them. Make sure you have paper products, plates, bowls, plastic forks and spoons, plastic bags and containers. Get them now. You'll need them.

Think about your pets. They need essentials and will be boarded up with you. Keep some treats on hand for your buddies. They will be stressed by the storm, too.

Virtually every list I've studied recommends creating an emergency kit. This should be portable and kept near an exit. Critical to this is a three-day supply of water, a battery-powered radio and flashlight, extra batteries, matches in a waterproof container, sanitary items and a whistle. If possible, it should also include clothing, blankets, and sleeping bags. And again, remember to include pet supplies.

Fill your gas tank and keep it topped off if you hear a storm is coming. I hope you never need to use my emergency check list. But in case you do, it's always helpful to have your supplies ready to go.

WVU Medicine Children's Encourages Safe Holiday Travel

The holidays are a time to visit friends and family, which usually means travel. With more people on the roads, the WVU Medicine Children's Injury Prevention and Safety Program is reminding families to stay safe while out and about.

Before any holiday fun, families must arrive safely to their destination.

The Injury Prevention Team says to go by the rule of "everyone buckled, every ride, every time." That includes making sure children are in the appropriate car seats for their height and weight.

Those car seats should also be used on airplanes. As an added benefit, this will ensure that families have the proper car seat with them for any additional driving at their destination.

Before leaving home in the winter, prepare for any emergencies that could happen on the road. The Injury Prevention Team recommends packing extra blankets, food, diapers, and anything else that may be needed to care for children. Also make sure to keep cell phones fully charged.

While loading the car, also make sure that any hot foods, large packages, and anything that could fly around in a crash are secure in the trunk.

The final step to safe driving is being aware of the environment because roads and parking lots are busier during the holidays. Stay alert and avoid distractions. Don't use the phone or listen to loud music.

When arriving at the destination, there are a few more steps parents should take to make sure their children stay safe. Safe sleep should always be a priority, no matter where the family is traveling.

We want to thank all the parents, grandparents, aunts and uncles and cousins who have cooperated so wholeheartedly with us. We hope to have even more next year.

I cannot help but wonder at what kind of world in which these innocent little babes will grow up. What will this planet be like in twenty years? Will humanity be able to solve its problems? Will there be wars and rumors of wars? Will mankind still be struggling and competing for more deadly and devastating means by which to destroy and to mutilate? Will the hungry and the homeless millions still be walking the streets in big cities in tattered clothing, seeking wherever they can a bit of warmth and a meager meal?

Will drugs and alcohol still be stealing the minds and the bodies of promising young people? And will promiscuity and homosexuality still be in style? Will heartless lawmakers realize the inhumanity they evidence with their laws allowing the slaughter of unborn

innocents of the world – two million of which are preformed in our own country each year? Will the piranha-minded females continue to submit their babies to the instruments of the butcher-doctors, not accepting the fact that their babies are gifts from God and that they are sacrificing life's greatest treasures?

The new WVSU LPN to BSN Hybrid Bridge Program is designed as a pathway for working licensed practical nurses who desire to obtain a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree. The program will feature a combination of online and face-to-face classes to allow for greater flexibility

in addition to clinical rotations in acute care and community-based agencies.

The program is approved to admit 30 students per year and can be completed in three years of full-time study.

This program has been provisionally approved by the West Virginia Registered Nursing Board.

The Light of Christmas

John 1:1-5; Ephesians 5:1-2, 6-14

Thumbing through the scriptures, one will not find the words: "Jesus is the reason for the season." What one will find is the real meaning of Christmas.

Where is this found in the scriptures? It found in the Books of Moses, in the word of the prophets, and throughout the New Testament.

The gospel of John opens with the declaration: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God." The Word is capitalized because it signifies the divine expression of God the Father which is made known to all through Christ Jesus, God the Son. The Word existed before the beginning. The reason for men to celebrate Christmas existed before the Word became flesh and dwelt among men. The Word created all things (v. 3) and in Him was life and He was the light of men (v. 4).

Christmas is cause of celebration because it marks the anniversary of the coming of the pre-existent Son, the coming of the light to men. The birth, by itself, that took place in a stable in the village of Bethlehem more than two thousand years ago is not what Christians celebrate. The cause which believers celebrate is the life and light which the Son has bestowed upon us. Believers celebrate Christmas because we are no longer in darkness (v. 5). Believers delight in the physical birth of the Son because it marks the beginning of the fulfillment of God's promise to send His righteous servant who would justify many (Isa. 53:11). It marks the birth of the seed of woman which would bruise the serpent's head (Gen. 3:15).

Not Moses, the prophets, the apostles, nor any of the human authors of the New Testament, none of them celebrated a holiday or festival that marked the physical coming of God's only begotten. The human authors of the scriptures proclaimed the light that was made known to them by the Holy Spirit. Believers celebrate because we have received the promised light.

When the Word dwelt among men, He kept every festival put forth in the law. He partook of the festival that foreshadowed His perfect sacrifice (the passover requires the sacrifice of a lamb without blemish). While He walked among men He proclaimed that He must work while it is day: "the night cometh, when no man can work" (John 9:4). He delivered His light to men.

While believers have cause to celebrate, we are commanded to let His light shine before men. In the text before us, we are instructed upon the way that we are make His light known to all men. We are to live in His light by putting off the old and putting on the new (Eph. 4:22-24). The Apostle Paul directs believers to live in His light (Eph. 5:2). The Apostle states that we are to "... walk in love, as Christ also hath loved us, and given himself for us an offering and a sacrifice to God for a sweet-smelling savor." Simply put, we are to walk in love as Jesus walked. We are to be an expression of God's love. We are called to reveal Him who is in us.

And by what manner are Christians to live? In verse 6, Paul implores us not to be deceived by vain words. What are vain words? Vain words are empty words. They are unproductive words — words which can cause believers to walk in ways contrary to God's word. They are like the words the serpent spoke to Eve in the Garden of Eden. Believers are not to partner nor party with the ungodly at any time.

In verse 8, Paul states that we are children of light and are to walk as children of light. As the adopted sons of God, we are to be the producers of goodness, righteousness and truth. We are to be standard-bearers of that which is acceptable to God (v. 10). It should not be necessary to remind Christians to act like Christians, but this is exactly what Paul does. Not only are we not to indulge in sin (works of darkness), we are to reprove (speak out against) darkness. We are not called to make sinners feel good about sin; we are called to bring the light that we have received to sinners.

In verse 14, the Apostle instructs us to reach out to sinners with the same invitation that the prophet Isaiah issued to Israel (see Isa. 60:1). The promised light has come. The true light of Christmas gives life to all who shall hear His call and awake.

Let us celebrate Christmas each and every day letting the light that we have received brightly shine.

When his health declined in the last few years and his travels were restricted, he enjoyed spending time sitting on his covered deck with Nellie on his lap watching the wildlife in his back yard, including the birds for whom he made sure his bird feeder was always full.

Cole was born on May 30, 1935 in Bronx NY to Donald and Gertrude Zulauf, who preceded his passing.

He is survived by his sons, John Barry Zulauf, and wife Suzanne of Lexington KY, Charles Andrew Zulauf and his wife Christy of Scott Depot, Jonathan Cole Zulauf of Scott Depot, brother David Zulauf and wife Pat of Brick, NJ and his three grandchildren who he adored – Mary Eliza Zulauf, Andrew Cole Zulauf and Jackson Wyatt Zulauf, along with countless friends in the hearing and deaf communities.

At 2 years old, he contracted meningitis and

lost his hearing. This would be the catalyst for a lifelong journey to advocate and champion for the deaf and hard of hearing.

He attended public school in NYC, traveling the subway to and from school, learning how to speak and lip read with his classmates both deaf and hearing.

Cole graduated from Clark University and was a member of Phi Alpha fraternity. He was an outstanding athlete in his youth, especially basketball. He was a lifelong New York Giants football fan, cheered on the Kentucky Wildcats and Marshall Thundering Herd.

He married his beautiful bride, Mary Susan Grever from Louisville KY on May 28, 1960. His bride finally said “yes” after several proposals, a testament to his tenacity. They embarked on a life journey together that would last over fifty years. He soon found a job in Newton NJ where he and Susan started their family. After seven years in NJ, he took a job with Purcell & Associates, an engineering

firm in CT. After spending a year in Hartford CT, Cole moved his family to Enfield CT. There the Zulauf’s enjoyed playing all kinds of sports, hosting neighborhood events for the kids, having a cold lemonade for the mailman in the summer, and going to Wilton Pond. Cole was always involved in his boys’ sports events, and he took his family with him to many deaf athletic events. He allowed his boys to play basketball during halftime, which entertained the crowd. We cherished our time in Enfield.

In 1977, Cole took a job with GRW Consulting Engineers in Lexington KY and moved the family to KY. We were so fortunate to become part of the GRW family. The deep and lasting memories and friendships we built at GRW will help carry us through this difficult time. Cole retired from GRW after 25 years of service, but he could not “retire”. He went to work for prominent deaf-owned company in South Dakota for several years

before returning to his beloved wife, family, and KY deaf community to join KCDHH as the project coordinator for the Telecommunications Access Program until he finally retired at age 84. In 2022, Cole moved to West Virginia to be with his two sons, daughter-in-law, and grandchildren. He so loved this period of his life, building memories and relationships with his grandchildren.

Since his youth, Cole was involved in the deaf community and volunteering to advocate for the deaf and hard of hearing. He was the Team Director for the USA Team in the World Games for the Deaf, traveling to Japan, Romania, and Venezuela to represent the USA. In 1975, he was the Vice Chairman for USOC World Games for the Deaf at the Lake Placid, NY. We made lifelong memories from the trip.

Cole continued to champion and serve the deaf community after his tenure at USOC for the Deaf. Cole was one of the founding

fathers of the Kentucky Commission on the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (KCDHH) where he advocated for discounts with phone carriers for the deaf, helped pass the Telecommunications Access Program for KY and many other initiatives. He received many awards for his contributions. 1978 Gallaudet College Community Leadership Award, 1988 recipient of the Art Kruger Memorial award, Kentucky Education, Arts and Humanity Service award to name a few.

He served in many leadership roles, including President of the Kentucky Association of the Deaf, Chairman of the Kentucky Commission on the Deaf and Hard of Hearing, Vice Chairman of the USOC for the Deaf, President of the New England Athletic Association of the Deaf, and President of the Eastern Athletic Association of the Deaf.

Cole had the honorary distinction of being a Kentucky Colonel. He was inducted into several Hall of Fames – 1988 “47” Alumni Association of the Deaf, 1989 Eastern Athletic Association of the Deaf Hall of Fame, 1989 Kentucky School for the Deaf Alumni Hall of Fame, 1995 New England Athletic Association of the Deaf Hall of Fame, and 1995 American Athletic Association for the Deaf Hall of Fame. He was an inspiration to everyone who had the good fortune to meet him. His selfless attitude, dedication and commitment to his community and family, and refusal to let his disability affect his work and life will have a lasting legacy on everyone who knew him. all of Fames – Hall

Cole was a remarkable, personable, loving man. He was quick with a smile, had a great sense of humor, was intellectually curious, devoted to his bride, family, and friends. He deeply cared about his deaf community and lived a servant life. He also had a famous saying when the dinner menu did not meet his son’s appetite – “you don’t like what is for dinner, go out and eat the grass!” We will miss his smile, his laugh, his hugs, and his infectious personality. We will forever miss our dad, PaPa, friend, and hero.

On December 10th, we lost an incredible man, and heaven welcomed a beautiful soul into his kingdom, where he can hug his bride, hear the sounds of our voices, and watch over his family and friends.
