ELECTION WATCH 2024 Candidate Filing Period to Close on January 27

Come May 14th, the attention of Putnam County (and all other West Virginia) voters will be directed at individuals who are seeking free rent at 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue in Washington DC. The chance that a single vote will decide any election is exceedingly small — smaller for the Office of President than for any other office.
A single vote has a much greater chance of deciding a local election than a national one. Come May 14, county voters and county voters alone will elect a Circuit Court Judge (8-year term), a Family Court Judge (8-year term), three Magistrates (4-year terms), and two members to the Board of Education (4-year terms). Putnam voters will also select Republican and Democratic candidates to be listed on the November General Election

ballot. Voters will determine the candidates for County Commissioner, Assessor, Sheriff, Prosecuting Attorney, State Senate (4th and 8th Districts), and House of Delegates (19th, 20th and 21st Districts).
Each and every potential candidate has until midnight on January 27 to have his or her name placed on the May 14th ballot. There is a filing fee — in most cases 1 % of the annual salary. Filing for the House of Delegates is less, just \$100, and filing for the Board of Education is set at \$25.
Monday, January 8, was Day One of the filing period. Filing for local office with Putnam County Clerk Brian Wood were Andy Skidmore (R) for County Commission and Bobby Eggleton (R) for Sheriff.

Hurricane Water, Sewer Rates Set to Jump in February

The Hurricane City Council approved an ordinance increasing water and sewer rates to customers at its January 2nd meeting. All customers of the City of Hurricane utility will see their bills increase in three increments with the first in 45 days from the January 2nd meeting, which will be February 16, 2024 to be followed by a second and third increase in February of 2025 and 2026. In dollar amount, minimum bills (2,000 gallon water usage) will increase by \$5 each time for water. Minimum sewer bills will increase as follows: February 16, 2024 - \$3.28, February 2025 - \$3.30, and February 2026 -

\$3.00. There are 3,700 water customers served by the City of Hurricane. The monthly bill for all users will increase by the same percentage. Customers using twice the minimum 2,000 gallons will see bills reflecting increases which are twice the minimum increase.
Council acted after hearing from Michael Griffith who serves as a consultant to the city on financial matters. Griffith advised the council that the current rates are not in compliance with legal requirements. A city run utility is deemed to be out of compliance if its enacted rates cannot generate 12% reserve in revenue. A city utility is not eligible for

grants and cannot issue bonds unless it meets the reserve requirement.
In the near future, the water department will need to borrow money to finance a \$1 million replacement tank, a \$200,000 clarifier, and \$1 million in pipe replacement. The sewer department will require a \$2 million clarifier, a \$400,000 lift station, and \$1.2 million in replacement filters. If the City of Hurricane water and sewer systems were to fail to meet treatment standards, their operation would be assumed by a different utility. West Virginia American Water has assumed control of numerous systems

A roaring inferno at 200 Mary Street in Hurricane destroyed a two-story home in the early morning hours of Wednesday, January 3rd.
The alarm was called in around 4 a.m. by a neighbor who was awakened by the brightness of the flames

engulfing the structure. Hurricane Fire Chief Mike Hoffman said the residents were awakened by fire alarms and barely had time to escape before the fire blocked the stairwell from the second floor bedrooms.
"We preach working fire alarm safety. Here is a case

in which it saved lives," said Hoffman.
Hoffman did not have an estimate of the loss but homes in same neighborhood are valued at \$350,000 or greater.
Insurance investigators will attempt to determine the cause of the blaze.

"90 Years of the CCC in West Virginia" Exhibit at the Culture Center in Charleston

West Virginia Archives and History and the West Virginia Department of Arts, Culture and History is pleased to announce a new exhibit on the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) in West Virginia. The exhibit is currently on display in the Archives and History Library, located inside the Culture Center, State Capitol Complex, in Charleston. In honor of the 90th anniversary of the establishment of the CCC, the exhibit features many documents and photographs relating to CCC camps in West Virginia. The exhibit is free and open to the public.

The Civilian Conservation Corps was established on April 5, 1933, as part of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's First 100 Days. Single men, ages 18-25, from all over the nation enrolled

in the CCC. Paid \$30 per month, these young men mostly participated in work projects on state and federal lands and laid the foundation for hundreds of state parks around the country. The CCC had 65 camps in West Virginia between 1933 and 1942, the majority in the eastern portion of the state. The new library exhibit features photographs and documents from the Calvin White Collection, the Tillman Diamond Collection, the Civilian Conservation Corps Museum Collection, and several additional collections.

Hurricane Police Chief Mike Mullins presented council with a summary of his department's activities for the calendar year 2023 in addition to his December report. Mullins stated that in 2023, HPD made 183 arrests charged to the State, 128 arrests charged to the City, responded to 232 EMR calls, took 319 accident reports, issued 653 citations and 1,747 warnings, and seized \$54,952 in cash with \$19,550 being forfeited to the department. Drug seizures for the year were 477.8 grams of Meth, over 19 pounds of Marijuana, 32

- 10 ounces day-old crusty bread, such as ciabatta, cut into 1-inch cubes
- 2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil, plus additional for drizzling (optional)
- 2 medium shallots or 1 small yellow onion, peeled and chopped
- 3 cloves garlic, peeled and chopped
- 1 can (15 1/2 ounces) cannellini beans, drained and rinsed
- 1 can (28 ounces) diced tomatoes
- 3 cans (14 1/2 ounces each) low-sodium chicken broth (about 6 cups)
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 1/2 cup small pasta, such as ditalini, uncooked
- 2 cups frozen cut leaf spinach or chopped fresh spinach
- 2 jars (15 1/2 ounces each) Aunt Nellie's 3 Bean Salad, drained
- 1 tablespoon lemon zest (optional)

Preheat oven to 375 F. Place bread cubes in single layer on large baking pan. Bake until bread cubes are lightly browned, 8-12 minutes. Set aside.

Open Letter to Governor Justice

Dear Governor Justice,

As a resident of Putnam County in the Fraisers Bottom area myself and my neighbors are turning to our governor for help. It has recently come to our attention that a piece of property totaling 36 acres in a beautiful, residential, and historic area of Fraisers Bottom is being rezoned to C2 from RR. Once we became area of the designs on this property by our County Commissioners we mobilized hundreds of residents to attend the rezoning hearing to voice our opposition. Although more than 300 residents attended (with very little notice given of the meeting) and 42 spoke passionately against this rezoning it was to no avail. The express wishes of the people were callously ignored.

The purpose of the rezoning is purportedly an Amazon Distribution Center. These centers are notorious for their destructive effect on the communities in which they are placed. It is estimated 400-800 trucks will be coming and going, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The area will be brightly lit and totally paved. The noise and pollution will be tremendous. This area is in a 100-year flood plain and the danger to the surrounding historical buildings and structures is great, as well as the residences in the surrounding area. The roads connecting to this facility are inadequate to handle this traffic and the area is already well known for continuous truck accidents on Rt 35. Imagine another 800 trucks in that area. With that increased traffic, the damage to the roadways, the danger to the residents, and the increased traffic congestion will effectively destroy the community. And to add insult to injury, very few if any, jobs will be created as Amazon facilities are fully automated and very little taxes are realized but a TIF has been already arranged. A 10 million dollar sewer extension has already been planned to service this area, 8 million of which is a grant. The

people of WV will be paying for everything with no benefit accruing to us. Amazon disavows responsibility for the vehicles it uses for delivery as they are almost all independent contractors, thereby skirting the expense of the damages caused and forcing the citizens to deal with hundreds of different companies instead of one. A short search on the internet of communities with these facilities will confirm all I have said. In addition, there have been no archaeological surveys, hydrological studies, ecological studies, or traffic impact studies. There seems to be a rush to get this rezoned and many meetings were held covertly, between parties who have a financial incentive to proceed with undue haste. Unbelievably, at the public hearing one of the parties (the owner of the property) offered to meet privately with the commissioners instead of speaking at the hearing.

I do not wish to weary you with a litany of violations that have plagued this situation, but it is clear to us all that the spirit of the law was trampled on. This goes back many years. We have had to fight for our community more than once. People have even had their farms "spot rezoned" without their knowledge! Hundreds of families will be impacted and none for the better. Many people including a law enforcement officer specializing in child crime testified to the destructive danger of this situation, and a professional trucker testified to the inevitable destruction of the roadways. Our commissioners do not care, one going so far as to say we were ungrateful for the 10 million dollar road (Rt. 35) as though it was built by the county expressly for us! It is our understanding the bulk of that project was state and federal monies. It certainly wasn't built for the benefit of the residents of Fraisers Bottom.

Governor Justice, your record as an innovative and fiscally responsible governor is admirable. The jobs you have brought to our state have been a credit to you. This project is the exact opposite of the kind of project we need or want in this state. Having no other place to turn, and being at the mercy of a system in this county in which the recourse to appeal is to the same people who passed this rezoning in the first place, we are turning to you. Please help us stop this rezoning effort. You will gain the undying gratitude of the good citizens of Fraisers Bottom and the blessing of knowing you helped a worthy cause.

The Household of God

Ephesians 2:11-21

In verse 11, the Apostle Paul directs the Gentile Christians in the church at Ephesus to remember the time prior to when they became a new creation in Jesus Christ. It was a time in which Jews referred to them as the Uncircumcision. It was not a complimentary term. The Jews were considered to be of the Circumcision because they had inherited the promise given to Abraham. They were God's chosen people — a people chosen by God through which all families of the earth should be blessed (Gen. 12:3) and the people chosen to receive the holy scriptures through Moses and to receive the word of God through the prophets.

The Gentiles had no such standing. They were without promise; God had not spoken directly to them.

Every born again Christian of today can relate to Paul's instruction to remember when they did not know Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior. All Christians, even those mature in age and faith, are impacted by Paul's directive. One who accepted Jesus as Lord and Savior in his long-past youth can imagine how desperate and alone he would have been without Christ in difficult times.

Believing Gentiles from every era are brought close to God by the blood of Christ. Jews experienced a closeness to God through the Abrahamic covenant and the covenant of the law. Personal failure to keep the law placed the Jew in need of God's grace and gift of faith. Both Jew and Gentile are in like need of Jesus Christ. He is the door by which all men must enter in. He is the provision for both Jew and Gentile. He has broken down the barrier between Circumcision and Uncircumcision. All have sinned and come short of the glory of God. Christ has paid the price of sin for all — both the Jew and the Gentile. By Him all are reconciled to God and all have access to Him through one Spirit.

Paul is specifically addressing the differences dividing the Jew and Gentile. The same discussion, however, applies to individuals who are divided by denominational divisions in the Christian community. While one denomination may pride itself in its doctrinal purity or its missions or its history of service or its loving tolerance, all who are saved are saved by grace through faith. The saved, regardless of denominational ties, are unified with each other by Jesus Christ. He breaks down any and all partitions of separation. All who are saved have access unto the Father by one Spirit.

Unity within the church at Ephesus and within the church today was not and is not achieved through the efforts of man. Unity is through Jesus Christ and by the Holy Spirit. All who are second born are not strangers, but are fellow citizens in the household of God. We are made fellow citizens solely by the work of the Lord Jesus Christ.

The one thing which all born again Christians enjoy is a new relationship with God. The bond of that new relationship is not achieved by human input (It is not of works, lest any man should boast). One can experience a warmth when in the physical presence of those who follow Him, but one does not achieve the new relationship with God by rubbing elbows with each other. The new relationship is a gift bestowed by the grace of God. It is by that gift that men may become luminaries of His love.

There exists a long history of division within the church. The division between the Circumcision and the Uncircumcision was not of Christ. Christ is our peace — a peace that unifies. Well meaning men may preach unity, but men cannot achieve unity without Christ. Christ and Christ alone brings unity through the Spirit. Let men not seek unity for unity's sake, but let each seek Jesus Christ and find unity.

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


