United Methodist Churches Sharing Resources With Mission Projects

United Methodist Churches across the West Virginia Annual Conference are presently involved in a major campaign to fund mission ministries across the state with vital supplies and cash donations. The emphasis, named The Celebration of Mission Event (COME), has been a major contributor to mission ministries supported by The United Methodist Church for the past twenty-seven years. Included in the 2024 campaign are ten mission ministries spread across the state. They are: Ebenezer Community Outreach Center in Huntington, the House of the Carpenter in Wheeling, the Upshur Parish House in Buckhannon, Scott's Run Settlement House in Osage, New Vision Depot in Beaver, Tyrand Cooperative Ministries in Mill Creek, Heart and Hand House in Philippi, Heart+Hand Outreach Ministries in South Charleston, the Greater Clarksburg Church and Community Ministry, and Volunteers in Mission.

Nine of the mission ministries provide a wide range of assistance to needy families. Services include providing food, clothing, shelter, transportation, personal care items, pre-school and after-school care, layette and baby care supplies, school food backpacks, classroom supplies, Thanksgiving and Christmas meals, Christmas gifts, utility and rent assistance, natural disaster recovery supplies, work teams for home repairs, thrift stores and educational classes to help persons better provide for their needs. The tenth agency supported by COME is called Volunteers in Mission, which provides work teams for both national and international building projects.

Persons wishing to contribute either tangible goods or cash gifts to support the home mission effort can do so by contacting any United Methodist Church in the West Virginia Conference, which encompasses Garrett County, Maryland and all West Virginia counties except Morgan, Berkeley and Jefferson Counties in the eastern panhandle. The 2024 Celebration of Mission Event goal is to provide a minimum of \$100,000.00 cash support along with \$50,000.00 in food and other tangible gifts.

Earth Day Event At Clay Center

The West Virginia Department of Environmental Protection (WVDEP) and the Clay Center in Charleston are partnering again for their annual Earth Day Celebration.

This year's free event is scheduled from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. on April 23 and will include a day of environmental education for area grade school-age students. Earth Day is officially observed on April 22.

Exhibitors from various state and federal agencies will be on hand with educational displays and activities promoting environmental stewardship and resource conservation. Activities will take place on the terrace in front of the Clay Center but move indoors in case of bad weather.

Spring is at its best in West Virginia... I love the B. pear trees lining Main Street in Hurricane. I planted two in my backyard at Green Acres. Beautiful... Dogwood trees... the Burkes had the most gorgeous dogwood trees in their yard. I was sorry to see them cut down. The green grass of the yards coming alive. Mowing time... trimming... shrubs blooming... Tulips and Daffodils... fresh, clean air... Spring in its glory... one of my favorite seasons.

The days are comfortable, and the nights still cool enough for a blanket. Logs ablaze for snuggling with a good book. Windows open with a sweet breeze blowing... Awww.

Let us not forget spring cleaning... oh yes... I used to do that. Eventually, I realized that I was wasting my time... I clean every week, and there is no real reason for those arduous days of spring cleaning. Spring all the same...

We don't have seasons per se here in Florida. I did use my furnace one night during the winter to make sure it worked. The rest of the time, the air is on... even if it is cool outside, the inside of the condo stays warm... I use fans year round... windows are securely closed because I do not want those little tiny lizards evading my home. Patio doors the same. I do open one set of them, occasionally, to feel the breeze... palm trees blowing...

I have been in the mall about three times in three years... it is probably five or so miles in Clearwater... I just do not shop...

As to the other change, I am more of a recluse... if I am not with family or running errands, I am so happy to be at home doing my activities... sitting in the part at the ocean... just like being in this tiny little home.

Florida is the place to live... sometimes... not like WV... but... it is the place to vacation... I am hoping some of my West Virginia friends will vacation in Clearwater... I would be so happy... for the time being, I will enjoy spring in Florida... think about spring in WV... remember those Dogwood and B. Pear trees... the tulips I had in my yard at Green Acres... think about the tomatoes I planted... yummmm... because the way we were is the way we are... West Virginians forever... but for the time being, Floridians...

Federal Jury Convicts Scott Depot Man

and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) when they interviewed Trador at his Scott Depot residence about his application for the FHA-insured mortgage. Trador denied submitting false bank statements with his loan application, and blamed his fellow employees of the mortgage lending business for the inclusion of

the false bank statements in the FHA loan file.

Trador is scheduled to be sentenced on July 29, 2024, and faces a maximum penalty of 41 years in prison.

“Loan officers are supposed to be gatekeepers who protect the integrity of the FHA program. Mr. Trador abused his position of trust as a loan officer and used his knowledge of FHA requirements to obtain a mortgage he knew he did

not qualify for, and then lied in an attempt to conceal his scheme,” said United States Attorney Will Thompson. “I commend HUD OIG and the FBI for their investigative work in this case, and Assistant United States Attorneys Andrew J. Tessman, Jonathan T. Storage and Erik S. Goes and our trial team for prosecuting the case and securing guilty verdicts on all five counts.”



The following events happened on these dates in West Virginia history. To read more, go to e-WV: The West Virginia Encyclopedia at www.wvencyclopedia.org.

April 18, 1756: The largest French & Indian War battle fought in present West Virginia occurred about two miles northeast of U.S. 50 and County Route 15 in present Capon Bridge, Hampshire County.

April 18, 1849: State Supreme Court Justice Marmaduke Dent was born in Monongalia County. He received the first bachelor’s and master’s degrees from West Virginia University. A populist judge, he ruled against railroads and supported Carrie Williams in an 1898 case finding that Black schools were entitled to the same length school terms as other schools.

April 18, 1861: At the beginning of the Civil War, retreating U.S. troops set fire to the national armory and arsenal at Harpers Ferry to keep them out of Confederate hands. However, Virginia militia extinguished the flames and sent much of the weapon-making equipment south before destroying the site in June 1861.

April 18, 1912: The Paint

Creek-Cabin Creek Strike of 1912–13 began when coal operators rejected the demands of their unionized workers for a wage increase. The strike that followed was one of the most dramatic and bloody conflicts in the early 20th century labor struggles in southern West Virginia known as the Mine Wars.

April 19, 1896: Writer Melville Davisson Post was born in Harrison County. His best-known works are the Randolph Mason series, published in three volumes, and the more successful collection, Uncle Abner: Master of Mysteries.

April 19, 1902: Author Jean Lee Latham was born in Buckhannon. She wrote a number of children’s books, including Carry On, Mr. Bowditch, which won the 1956 Newberry Award.

April 20, 1823: General Jesse Lee Reno was born in Wheeling and died in battle at South Mountain, Maryland, in 1862. He graduated from West Point in 1846 with another cadet from western Virginia, Thomas J. Jackson, later “Stonewall.” Reno was the highest-ranking officer from present West Virginia killed in the Civil War.

April 20, 1863: President Lincoln issued a

proclamation that in 60 days, West Virginia would become a state. This occasion was marked 100 years later during the state’s Centennial celebration with a special ceremonial session of the West Virginia legislature on April 20, 1963, in Wheeling.

April 20, 1909: Fiddler Melvin Wine was born near Burnsville. A favorite of old-time music enthusiasts nationally, he was chosen as a National Heritage Fellow in 1991 by the National Endowment for the Arts, the highest recognition given to a folk artist in the United States.

April 20, 1939: Poet Irene McKinney was born in Belington, Barbour County. Governor Gaston Caperton appointed her state poet laureate in 1993, and she served in that capacity until her death in 2012.

April 21, 1908: Traditional musician Phoebe Cottrell Parsons was born in Calhoun County. Parson’s traditional clawhammer banjo style, unaccompanied ballad singing, riddles and storytelling influenced countless numbers of younger musicians.

April 21, 1936: President Franklin Roosevelt established the Jefferson National Forest. The West Virginia portion of this forest includes nearly 20,000 acres in Monroe County.

April 22, 1908: Marshall “Little Sleepy” Glenn was born in Elkins. Glenn coached basketball at West Virginia University from 1934 to 1938 and football from 1937 to 1940. He was inducted into the WVU Sports Hall of Fame in 1992.

April 23, 1857: Andrew

S. Rowan was born in Gap famous.

Mills, Monroe County. Rowan, a military officer, was chosen as the messenger when President William McKinley wanted to send a message to Cuban General Calixto Garcia during the Spanish-American War. The 1899 pamphlet A Message to Garcia made the incident

April 24, 1865: McNeill’s Rangers surrendered to Union troops at New Creek (now Keyser). The Confederate guerrilla force probably never numbered more than 100 men at any time but managed to inflict regular damage on Union operations.

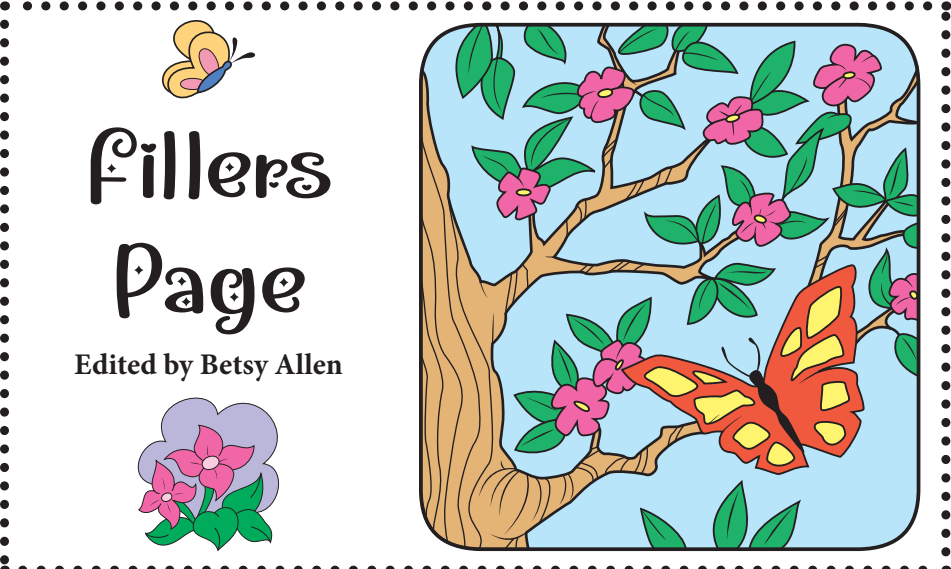

2 tablespoons brown sugar

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

1 teaspoon cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

1/4 teaspoon sea salt

maple syrup, for serving

Topping:

2 tablespoons unsalted butter or coconut oil, melted

2 tablespoons brown sugar

1/2 cup chopped pecans

1 cup frozen strawberries

1 cup frozen blueberries

confectioners’ sugar, for dusting

Grease 9-by-13-inch baking dish. Place bread cubes in baking dish. In large bowl, whisk eggs, milk, brown sugar, vanilla, cinnamon, nutmeg and salt. Pour mixture evenly over bread cubes.

If making casserole ahead, cover baking dish and refrigerate overnight. If baking immediately, let stand 30 minutes at room temperature to allow bread to soak up egg mixture.

Preheat oven to 350 F.

To make topping: Drizzle casserole with melted butter and sprinkle with brown sugar and pecans. Top with strawberries and blueberries.

Cover and bake 35 minutes then uncover and bake 10-20 minutes, or until topping is browned and egg mixture has mostly set.

Remove from oven, cover loosely with foil and let stand 10 minutes. Dust with confectioners’ sugar. Serve with maple syrup.

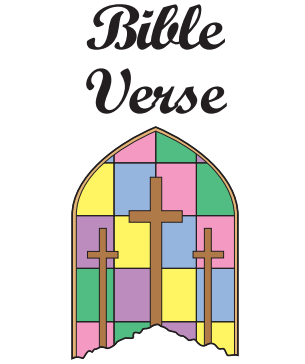

Healing on the Sabbath

Luke 6:1-11

Do not cross the street without looking both ways. There is a reason that mothers and fathers give this instruction. They do not want their child to put him or herself in harm's way. A child can religiously obey this instruction and still perish. Looking both ways and then stepping into the path of a speeding vehicle will not save anyone. The consequence of failing to consider the intent of instruction can be fatal.

God, in His commandment given to Moses, stated that no work was to be performed upon the sabbath (Ex. 20:10). God had a reason for giving this instruction. God gave this instruction because He wants men to be mindful that in six days He created the heaven and the earth and that He rested upon the seventh day. God did not give men a mindless act to perform. God told man to recognize His act of creation by resting on the seventh day as He rested on the seventh day. God would have all men know Him.

In the text before us, the Pharisees took issue with the fact that the disciples plucked ripe kernels of grain from stalks growing in the field and proceeded to eat the kernels. The issue with the Pharisees was the fact that this took place upon on the sabbath day. They asked: "Why do ye that which is not lawful to do on the sabbath days?"

Eating the kernels, in itself, was not unlawful. The Pharisees considered it unlawful because physical effort was involved in separating the husks from the kernels. Silly? Yes, there are numerous comical scenarios which one can envision. Mashed potatoes could be eaten on the sabbath only if mashed the day before.

Jesus did not directly challenge the Pharisees' interpretation of work. Instead, He directed their attention to an act performed by David which involved an unquestionable disregard of the law of Moses (See I Sam. 21:1-6). Through His question, Jesus required them to examine their traditions in the light of the scriptures. They could not condemn the actions of the disciples without bringing a similar condemnation upon David.

Jesus then declared to them that "the Son of Man is Lord also of the sabbath."

Jesus used the term, the Son of Man, to refer to Himself. The literal and spiritual meanings of the term are far different. All who are born of woman have a claim to this title from a literal perspective because all are members of the human race. The spiritual meaning is revealed to men through the Holy Spirit (see Matt. 16:16-17). The Holy Spirit declares the Son of Man to be the Christ, the Son of the living God. The Son of Man is God manifest in the flesh. There is one and only one who qualifies spiritually as the Son of Man.

Jesus declared Himself to be the Lord of the sabbath. While it is not incorrect to view the term Lord of the sabbath as a statement of Christ's authority over the sabbath, one performs a disservice if one does not reflect upon Jesus as the literal Lord of the sabbath. The literal Lord of the sabbath is the Creator who made all things that were made in six days and rested upon the seventh. The literal Lord of the sabbath is the God who is to be honored through the act of sabbath keeping. Note that Jesus said: "the Son of man is Lord also of the sabbath" (v. 5). The Lord of the sabbath is both God the Father and God the Son.

Jesus' words did not sit well with the scribes and Pharisees. Their view of keeping the sabbath and Jesus' teaching had collided head-on. They were intent upon destroying Him (v. 7).

Jesus, knowing their thoughts, did not turn from the true intent of the commandment given to Moses. Jesus used the opportunity to bring glory to both God the Father and God the Son.

On the sabbath day, He instructed a man with a withered hand to stand in the midst of the assembly. With every eye focused upon the man, Jesus asked if it were lawful to do good or to do evil on the sabbath, or, lawful to save life or to destroy life. Jesus, then, answered His own question by commanding the man with the withered hand to stretch forth his hand. The man did and his hand was made whole.

All who witnessed the happening would agree that the restoration was good, but not all believed that the restoration was lawful. The scribes and the Pharisees were enraged at what Jesus had done. Through His act of healing upon the sabbath, He exposed the god [not God] which the scribes and Pharisees honored. Their god was of their own construction; it was a god of mindlessness who is honored by mindless obedience to the traditions of men. It was a god who was honored by ignoring the needs of mankind. It was not the great I AM who spoke to Moses on Sinai. Mindlessly keeping the law does not fulfill the law. To satisfy the law, one must keep the intent of the law.

God the Son honored God the Father by doing good upon the sabbath day. Honor is found in adhering to the intent of the law. Let us be obedient to our calling. Let us keep both the commandment to love one another and the commandment to declare His love to all who have the ears to hear such that they might receive the free gift of life eternal in the presence of Him who is love.

High School Seniors Needed for Elaine Howell Scholarship

Every year since Elaine Howell’s death 25 years ago, the Hurricane Woman’s Club has awarded a scholarship to a female senior at Hurricane High School. This year since it is the 100th birthday of Ms. Howell, the awards have been increased in amount and number. There will be one \$1,000 and two \$500 awards. Applications are available in the school counselor’s office. Deadline for submission of application is April 30.

Biography of Elaine Howell

Elaine Nelia Edwards Howell was manager of a successful bookstore in Charleson, WV. Born in 1924, she was a 1943 graduate of Hurricane High School, she was a lifelong resident of Hurricane, WV. After graduating, she worked in the Works Progress Administration in Winfield, Wv and later, during World War II, the government agency that oversaw rationing of commodities throughout the war. In 1945 she married Lowell Howell of Winfield and, after the birth of her son David and daughter Nancy, moved to Hurricane, WV.

Elaine was an advocate for the establishment of the Hurricane Library in the early 1960s, reflecting her love of books. She worked for the Putnam County Library Hurricane branch and delivered books throughout Putnam County on the library’s Bookmobile. IN 1968 she was hired to manage a bookstore in the old Diamond Department Store in Charleston. Her small bookstore on the 5th Floor brought in an amazing array of authors, including Julia Child, Pearl Buck and other well-

known authors of the time. One of her specialty areas was keeping a diverse inventory of books by Appalachian authors, including her friend, Appalachian author Jesse Stuart.

In the 1960s, Elaine began taking a course at Morris Harvey College (now the University of Charleston) and, while working full time and attending school part time for many years, finally completed her bachelor’s degree in English in 1974.

She died in the plane crash of American Airlines Flight 191 on May 25, 1979 in Chicago. Like many others on the flight, she was en route to the American Booksellers Association annual meeting in Los Angeles. The ABA convention was always one of her favorite activities, as she met authors, learned of new books and spent time with colleagues from across the country.

Elaine Howell was 55 when she died. She was survived by her two children, David and Nancy, a new grandson, David, and two brothers, Henry and Virgil Edwards. Her father, Delford Edwards, was Putnam County assessor for many years and her mother, Lurecy, was a farmer and gardener on their farm located on Trace Fork in Putnam County.

PIPESOUNDS Presents Musical Themes of Million Dollar Movies

PipeSounds Organ Concert Series’ last concert of this season will be Sunday, April 21, 2024, at 3:00 p.m. Dave Wickerham performed in the 2022-2023 Concert Series, and by popular request has been invited to present “Music of the Million Dollar Movies.” He will be playing the renowned Harrah Symphonic Organ at Forrest Burdette Memorial UM Church, Hurricane, WV (Adults \$15.00 and Students - Free).

Dave is a “natural” musician as he began playing the electronic organ at the age of four and had his first pipe organ experience at age ten. His musical education started at age seven. He attended the University of Arizona in Tucson on a full scholarship, pursuing classical organ studies for six years with Dr. Roy Johnson.

Wickerham is a renowned theater organist over a career of forty years with staff positions in Lansing, IL (1984), Greenfield, WS (1990), and the FIESTA Casino and Hotel in Las Vegas, NV (2000). Over the years, Dave has concertized frequently and performed for many chapters of the American Theatre Organ Society, as well as ministering musically while serving at various churches. In 2023 he was

featured in the American Theater Organ Society’s National Convention, in Joliet, IL.

In April of 1999, he took great pleasure being a featured artist in Melbourne, Australia for the convention of the Theatre Organ Society of Australia for which he received rave reviews. He returned “Down Under” for a six-week concert tour in Australia and New Zealand during the summer of 2003 and 2012, as well as October/November of 2015.

At Forrest Burdette last year, Wickerham was so complimentary of the uniqueness of their musical instrument. The organ is a six manual (keyboard) and pedal organ with 456 draw knobs, 2,600 actual pipes and more than 20,000 digital pipe notes. When it was dedicated in 2003, it was the largest draw knob console in the world. The digital reproduction of sound in this instrument is supported by 148 systems and has 10,400 watts of power.
